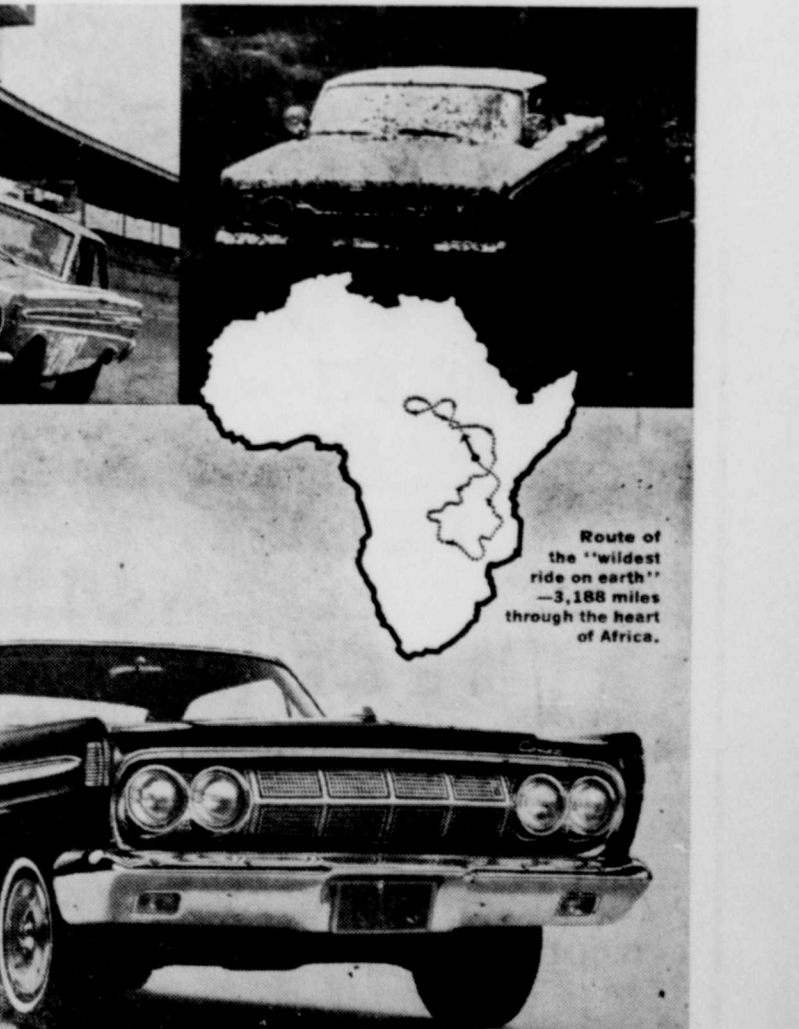

## Jim Langdon Against Water Pollution

Water pollution problems in Texas were discussed by Railroad Commissioner Jim C. Langdon in a talk before the Dallas Petroleum Engineers Club last week.

"It used to be said that the safest political platform was one that came out strong for God, Mother and The Flag," Langdon said in a talk titled, "In Texas, it is now highly desirable to add: 'and against water pollution.' I'd like the record to show that I am against it, too."

Citing complications that arise in trying to protect two great Texas resources—water and oil—Langdon gave assurances that there was no reason to fear the "joint problems in water pollution control cannot be worked out promptly and effectively, and on a reasonable basis."

The Commission, he said, is required by law to enforce rules concerning the operation of oil and gas wells to prevent pollution, and since passage of the water pollution control act in 1961 has reviewed casing requirements for 15,000 new wells and 2,300 exceptions; issued about 450 permits yearly for injection wells used to dispose of salt water; and banned unlined disposal pits in six fields and issued a no pit order for one watershed covering most of four counties.

Also, Langdon said, the oil and gas industry has responsibilities, too: 1) to prevent the contamination of fresh water supplies by oil field wastes, and 2) to do this job in a practical and economical, as well as an effective fashion.

Langdon pointed out that the Commission wants to be reasonable in its application of laws concerning water pollution. "These laws," he observed, "are not made by the Commission. They are made by the Legislature and sometimes interpreted by the courts. The Railroad Commission takes it up from there. Thus, 'reasonableness' does not, in the least, connote laxity . . . fresh water supplies must and will be protected to the extent of the Commission's scope and authority."

## Lake Meridian Yields 25-Pound Channel Cat

A giant 25-pound channel catfish was caught in Lake Meridian State Park, March 19, 1964, reports Bob Rhudy, Parks and Wildlife Department game warden. This was the weight as it came from the water. It had 26 rays on the anal fin and also had the telltale spots on the side. The giant channel cat was taken on a trotline with pure beef blood as bait.

William H. Brown, former fisheries biologist with the department, reporting on channel catfish in Bulletin 39, 1962. "The Fresh-Water Catfishes of Texas and How to Know Them," said, "The maximum weight is about 30 pounds, but few fish over 20 pounds are caught."

A channel catfish weighing 40 pounds has been reported taken from the Leon River below Lake Belton. However, the name of the fisherman, the date of catch, and authentic weight is not available.

## Reds Flown To Red Bluff

Parks and Wildlife Department fishery crews captured 515 marine fish fingerlings in the Gulf of Mexico on April 8 and flew them to Red Bluff Reservoir on the Pecos River, reports J. Weldon Watson, executive director of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

Immediately after capture the fingerling fish were placed in two-gallon oxygen-charged plastic bags and a Parks and Wildlife Department Cessna 185 flew the cargo non-stop to Pecos, Texas. Tank trucks then completed the trip to Red Bluff Reservoir where the fish were released in good condition. Time lapsed between the time of capture in the Gulf and their release in Red Bluff was less than four hours.

The high survival rate of over 90 per cent is attributed to the relatively short time the small fish were in transit.

Marine species released in Red Bluff included 378 redfish, 6 speckled trout, 15 flounder, 25 pinperch and 50 shrimp.



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
