The House soundly knocked down a measure to continue foreign aid to the United Arab Republic by a vote of 204 to 177. It was the first defeat of the New Year for the JOHN-SON administration. Six members of the 12-man jury needed to hear evidence in the trial of Daniel Odell McDonald, 19year-old defendant charged with the murder of his grandmother, Mrs. W. S. McDonald, age 82, have been picked. They are: B. H. Hicks, Bob Cox, J. C. Mitchell, Harold Brantley, Mauryne Varnadore and Don Glaser. Six more are needed. The original 125man venire has dwindled to less than two dozen prospects. The state is qualifying jurors on the death penalty. Unless six more jurors are found the case could be transferred to another county on a change of venue. If District Judge Ralph Caton instructs Sheriff Dan Saunders to find some additional veniremen, there is a possibility that 12 jurors can be found and the trial will get underway shortly after the jury is seated. In the meantime, the slow questioning of prospective jurors continues in 118th District Court.







The Launching Pad

THE list of Texans privileged to attend one of the five black-tie inaugural balls in Washington last week could have been selected from Bradstreet & Dun. These Texans were truly representative of the fashion conscious, mink draped, millionaire and multi millionaire members of the Lone Star state's already "Great Society." From reading about the balls and the long list of Texas celebrities published in the state dailies, I failed to find a single share-cropper from De Berry, Texas, a poverty pocket in Panola County in East Texas where that fellow qualified last Friday for one of the first Economic Readjustment loans. I also noted that none of my old neighbors from Tin Rag, Pecan Gap, Ladonia, Dime Box, Fairlie, South Sulphur, Ridgeway, Cumby, Muddig, or Horton were announced as being present. Maybe the reason they didn't make it to Washington was because it is hog-killing time up there on the blackland. Besides you could search the fourth congressional district blind for days and you wouldn't fine a dozen formals in the whole seven counties.

T has seemed to me for the past few years as though the whole country might be suffering a radical inferiority complex. Perhaps this is what many say is "changing times." I don't think anything has been wrong with the times—but the individuals who are tired and restless and have just about given up the task of trying to provide for themselves. We have blamed our misfortunes on the bankers, on Wall Street, on the Republicans or Democrats, on the delinquency for foreign debtors, on the capitalistic system, on the rich, on technology and over-production — in fact on everything and everybody except ourselves, our own past follies and the selfishness which has governed individuals of low or well as high estate. Certain plans for social reform have, in recent years, gained tremendous followings because they are based on this psychological weakness in so many people. The plans I refer to are those calculated to protect the individual not only against his own failures, passions, and bad habits, but against the vicissitudes of life generally. Millions of people, unable to plan their personal or family enconomy, are now enthusiastic over a PLANNED NA-TIONAL ECONOMY. Strange how a few capital letters can transform a knotty personal problem into a plausible panacea for society. In so far as social reforms become a permanent part of the social structure, they will destroy the very people they are intended to save. The mechanism of this destruction is the process of depriving the individual of the responsibility for himself and his own deeds. It is the same mechanism which we see operating in families, where parents continue to assume responsibility for their children after they should be independent. What happens to the child will happen to a nation of citi-
