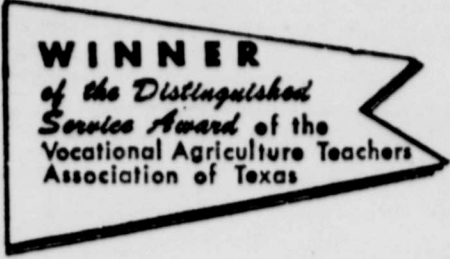

Tower Raps Wirtz Stand On Braceros

Sen. John Tower, Texas Republican, criticized the secretary of labor this week for what he called failure to include Texas in an order allowing limited numbers of Mexican farm workers to work in this country. In a senate speech Tower said of Secretary Willard Wirtz: "Earlier this month he admitted that his past position on admission of bracero farm workers was grossly in error. "On April 9 he reversed his stand and ban — and allowed thousands of West Indian workers to enter the country as they normally have in the past to assist in the citrus harvest in Florida. "I see that California has been admitted to the Labor Department's union and that 1,500 Mexican bracero workers have been admitted to work the asparagus and strawberry harvests in the San Joaquin and Salinas valleys. "Texas faces the same economic chaos on the farm as did Florida and California. Once again I urgently call on the secretary of labor to readmit Texas to his special union of states to apply his bracero remedy nationwide without discrimination."

Yarborough stated that the extra money was to enable Urban Renewal to acquire another 25 pieces of sub-standard property. This grant will bring the total number of properties to 58 or 59 it was learned. The area covered in the program includes property in the residential sections and no business, city or county property is included, UR authorities pointed out to newsmen this week.

(Continued from page 1) ly hopeful side of the disease," said Mrs. Barnes.

"There are now 1,300,000 Americans who are alive and cured of cancer, and in 1965, 183,000 people will be saved. But we could save more. Most early cancers can be cured. We want to alert people to cancer's seven danger signals, and we want to encourage them to have a complete physical examination by a reputable physician at least once a year.

"More school children will die of cancer this year than from any other disease," said Mrs. Barnes. "That's why so many mothers will be working on the Cancer Drive Monday night, May 3.

"About half of the cancer deaths in children are from leukemia, which is a cancer of the blood-forming tissue, but this type of cancer is not primarily a disease of children. There is an increasing rate among adults.

"The American Cancer Society is currently supporting more research on leukemia than on any other form of cancer, and many scientists believe that cures will be found for leukemia sooner than any other cancer. We are seeing some progress now because we have drugs which can extend the lives of children with acute leukemia for many months and in some cases for as long as seven or eight years.

"Like adults, children should have regular physical examinations, but there are some warning signs that should be called to the physician's attention if they persist longer than two weeks. We urge parents to watch for: swellings, lumps, or masses in any part of the body; pains, or the persistent crying of a baby or child, for which no reason can be found; any change in the size or appearance of outward growths, such as moles or birthmarks; nausea and vomiting for which there is no apparent cause; a marked change in bowel or bladder habits; bloody discharge of any sort; blood in the urine; heavy spontaneous nose bleeds or other type of hemorrhage; failure of bleeding to stop in the usual time after a cut or injury; unexplained stumbling in a child who has been walking well; a general 'run-down' condition," Mrs. Barnes explained.

Samedan Oil Corp., Penroc Oil Corp. and Wolfson Oil Co. of Midland have completed No. 1 Beth Fowler as a 3/4-mile southwest extension to the Gordon Street, South (lower Wolfcamp) pool of Glasscock County.
