Social Security Column

A sizable number of persons now past age 72 have inquired about Social Security benefits in recent years only to find that they did not have the minimum of six months benefits in recent years by law then in effect. A quarter of coverage is given for having been paid wages of at least \$50 in a calendar quarter, or \$150 in wages for agricultural work for one employed in a year, or, if self-employed, four such credits are given for a year in which at least \$400 in net profit was made.

The 1965 changes provide that some persons aged over 72 may now qualify with as few as three such quarters of coverage. All persons past age 72 who are not now receiving Social Security checks, and who think they might now qualify, are urged to write their Social Security office, giving their full name, date of birth, and Social Security account number. The records will be checked and arrangements made to secure necessary applications from those who will now qualify for the special \$35.00 per month benefit. A wife or dependent husband past age 72 can also be paid an additional \$17.50. Age proofs will be necessary.

Any widow past age 72, who was denied Social Security benefits because her husband had not worked long enough under Social Security to be insured, should also write her Social Security office, giving her full name, her husband's full name and Social Security account number, each date of birth and his date of death. After checking the records, arrangements will be made to secure claims from those now qualified. Age and marriage proofs will then be secured.

For example, Mr. A was born in 1880, and work only 3/4 of a year in all on a job covered by Social Security. If he now has 3 quarters of coverage, he is due \$35 per month, beginning with September of 1965. If he had died some time ago, and his widow is now 72 or older, she will be due \$35.00 per month.

Persons age 65 and over who are not receiving social security payments, railroad retirement benefits, or State old-age assistance need to get in touch with their social security office now, according to Erven Fisher, manager of

Enrollment At SHSC Climbed To New High

The enrollment at Sam Houston State College has climbed to a new high of 6,524 for the fall semester and includes students from 33 states and 22 foreign

countries. The new figure, exceeding last year's enrollment of 5,290, also includes students from 175 Texas counties.

Harris County's 1,844 students furnished more than 28 per cent of the enrollment. Other leading counties in enrollment are Walker, with 467; Galveston, 314; Brazoria, 257, and Brazos, 129.

Countries represented by one or more students are Argentina, Canada, Dominican Republic, El Salvador, Guatemala, Hong Kong, India, Iran, Iraq, Korea, Nepal, Mexico, Netherlands, Panama, Peru, Nicaragua, Philippines, Saudi Arabia, England, Syria, Talar, Taipei, and Venezuela.

Freshmen again make up the largest Sam Houston class with 2,491 enrolled for the first year. The men outnumbered the women enrolled by 3,659 to 2,865.

Other figures in the enrollment showed the Baptist Church listed most on statements of church preference with 2,381. Others most frequently listed were Methodist, 1,511; Catholic, 752; Church of Christ, 385; Presbyterian, 325; Lutheran, 304, and Episcopalian, 252.

The "2600" indicates a score fired with the .22, center fire, and .45 caliber pistols out of a possible 2700 points. The significance of this score is indicated by the fact that of 45,000 competitors, only 477 have fired 2600 in NRA sanctioned tournaments. In pistol competition, a score of 2600 is comparable to running a 4 minute mile.

Jesse N. Woody has been awarded a suitably engraved desk set and a letter of congratulations. In further recognition of his outstanding accomplishment, Mr. Woody's name has been inscribed on the "2600 Club" plaque in NRA Headquarters in Washington, D. C.

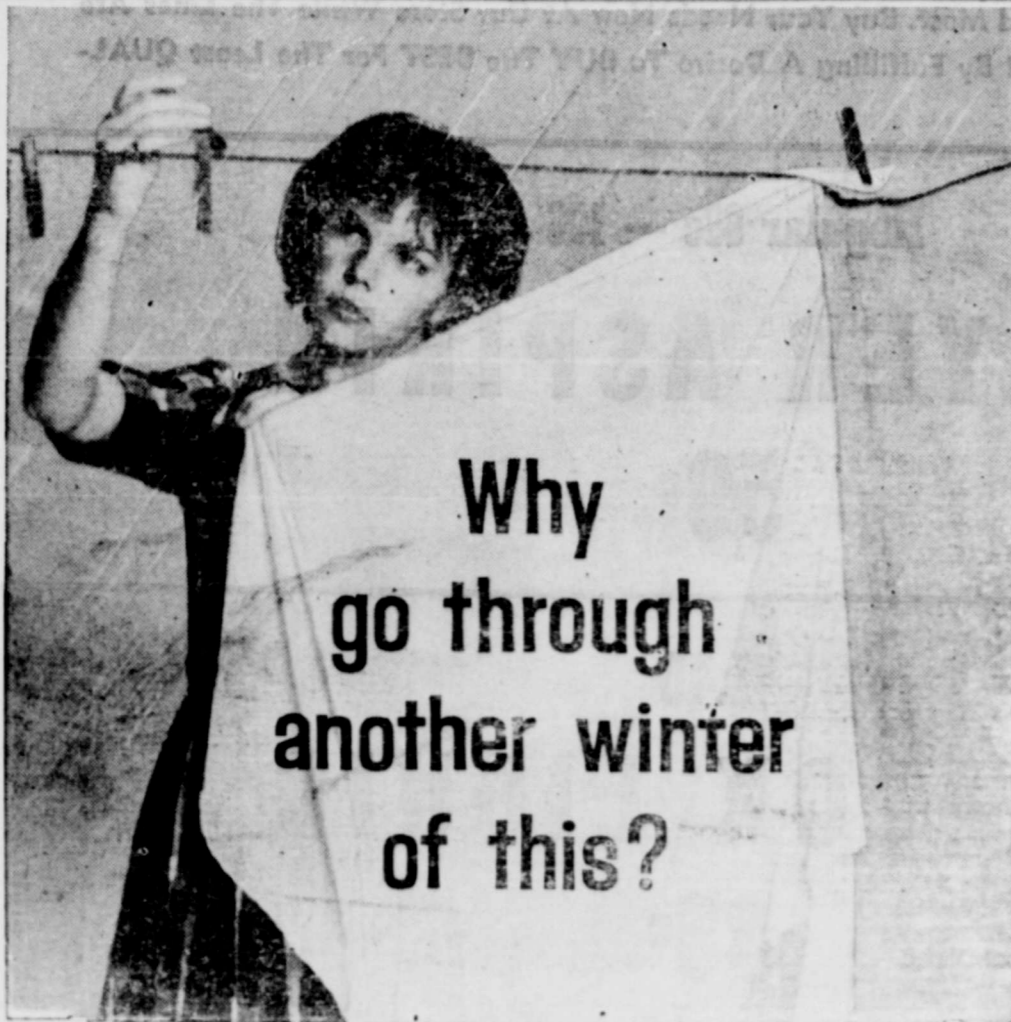

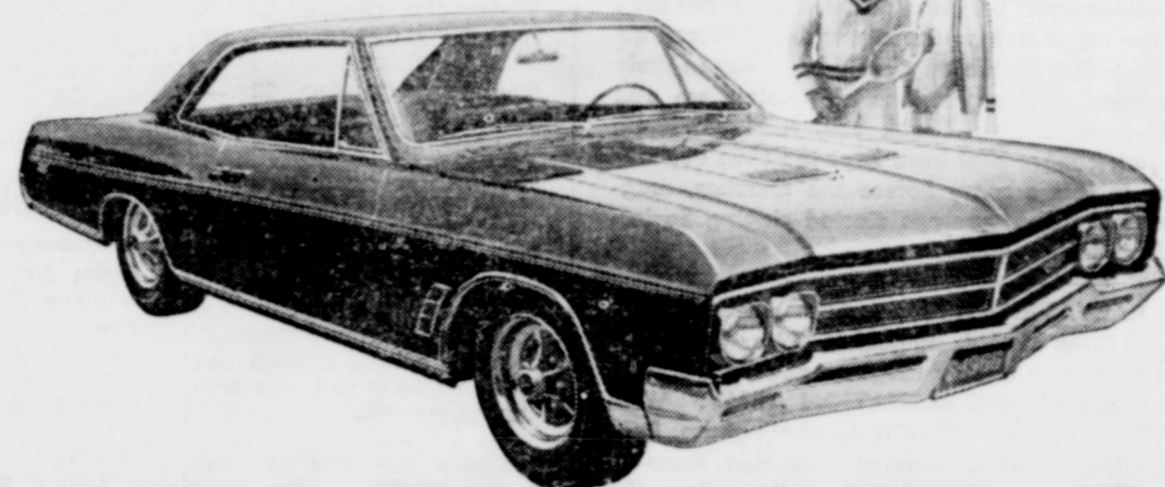
