

Thurmond Breaks With Nixon

Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S-C. broke sharply with President Nixon Friday and said the administration's hostility to the South may cost it the 1972 election.

Condemning recent Nixon administration actions aimed at enforcing school desegregation in the South, Thurmond declared the President has become surrounded by "ultra-liberal" advisers who

have undermined his devotion to the "great silent majority" that elected him to office.

Thurmond, widely credited with helping Nixon win his party's 1968 nomination and getting him Southern votes, denounced major administration decisions on desegregation policy which he said "cast grave doubt upon the Nixon administration's commitment to treat all sections of the

country with an even hand." Thurmond made his attack in a Senate speech.

The senator condemned the action of the Internal Revenue Service which has declared it will re-examine its position on the tax exempt status of private schools which have allegedly been used in the South as a means of sidestepping court-enforced integration of public school systems. And he also harshly criticized what he called the car-

petbagging invasion of Justice Department lawyers he said are being sent to the South "for the purpose of assuring forced integration of the public schools."

"I condemn these actions," Thurmond said.

"I strongly condemn them; without end I condemn them. They are wrong as social policy and they are wrong as law."

New Lamb Products — A \$23,650 research grant to the Texas A&M University Agricultural Market Research and Development Center from the American Sheep Producers has been made to market test a completely new line of lamb products. Center Coordinator Robert Branson said the tests will be made in Tyler and Tulsa, Oklahoma. The testing will require about five months, and will start in late September or early October, Branson said.

New Grain Sorghum Conversion Lines — The release of 63 lines from the conversion program of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station

and the U. S. Department of Agriculture was announced at a July 14 news conference at the Research and Extension Center at Lubbock. There is still much breeding work to be done in order to incorporate desirable characteristics into high yielding hybrids, said D. T. Rosenow, of the Center. This work will be largely done by commercial seed firms who will use this new germplasm in their breeding programs, he noted.

Annual Legion Meet Set For Fort Worth

The 52nd Annual Convention of The American Legion, Department of Texas, to be held in Fort Worth July 23-26, promises to be the most colorful and entertaining in history, according to Joe L. Matthews, the general convention chairman.

Department Commander Henry H. Hill of San Antonio, will preside over the Legion convocation with all general sessions being held in the Grand Ballroom of the Sheraton-Fort Worth Hotel. Heading the American Legion Auxiliary will be Mrs. Clayton Mann of Wichita Falls.

National Commander J. Milton Patrick of Skiatook, Oklahoma, is scheduled to deliver the keynote address on Friday afternoon at the opening joint session of the Legion and Auxiliary in the Grand Ballroom of the Sheraton-Fort Worth Hotel.

According to Commander Hill, The American Legion will have some 3,000 delegates and alternates in attendance and the Auxiliary anticipate approximately 1,000. In addition to the official delegation, Legionnaires and Auxiliary members from all over Texas will attend, many of them bringing their families to vacation in Fort Worth following the convention.

Outstanding speakers on

Saturday will include the Department Oratorical Contest Champion, Martin Nussbaum of Amarillo, who will deliver his winning oration. Rudy Gonzales of Corpus Christi, Boys State Governor, will also speak. H. Ross Perot, Dallas, founder of the organization "United We Stand," is scheduled to address the convention at 2 p.m. Perot will elaborate on his efforts to secure humane treatment of American POWs in North Vietnam, and to secure their early release.

Friday evening at 5 p.m., the Parade of Champions Contest for Uniformed Organizations, Albert Brandesky, chairman, will take place at the Tarrant Convention Center. More than \$2,900 in prizes will be awarded the winners of the colorful contest. This will be followed by a barbecue for registered delegates and guests. A Bathing Beauty Pageant will follow where Miss American Legion of 1970 will be crowned.

A breakfast will be given in honor of all 50-consecutive-year members, all veterans of World War One on Sunday morning at 7:30 at the Sheraton-Fort Worth Hotel.

Texas Voting Laws Dubbed Restrictive

Texas' voting laws may be the most restrictive among the 50 states in terms of voter convenience, says a recent study by a University of Texas government instructor. Dr. Janice C. May, in a special report published by the University's Institute of Public Affairs, said Texas is the only state requiring the annual registration of voters and has the earliest cutoff date for voter registration before a general election. It also has one of the earliest cutoff dates before the party primary.

"The cutoff periods require Texas voters to register often and early," she said. "The features of the present system derived from the old poll tax system make it one of the most, if not the most, restrictive among the 50 states in terms of voter convenience."

On the plus side, Mrs. May said, Texas registration laws do not require a literacy test "and overt discrimination against black voters has not been a significant factor in recent years. In fact, statistics published by the U. S. Commission on Civil Rights, indicates that a larger percentage of blacks register in proportion to their race in Texas than do whites."

Mrs. May said that "proof that the Texas voter registration system prevents people from voting is not unwelcome in Texas. Many politicians and citizens have embraced the theory that if one does not have enough interest to

M. L. Jenkins Won Western Grant-In-Aid

Marshall Lee Jenkins son of Mr. and Mrs. Gus Jenkins, and grandson of W. D. Chandler, Sr., and the nephew of W. D. Chandler, Jr., who was a graduate of Lovington High school, has been awarded a Western Activity Grant-In-Aid at Western New Mexico University in Silver City, New Mexico.

While attending Lovington High, Jenkins was a member of the Roadrunner Club, the Athletic Club, the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and was a member of the Wildcat's Tale school paper staff. He had his own column called "Way Back When."

He was also a member of the 1968 and 1969 Wildcat state champion football teams, and a member of the 1969 and 1970 Wildcat state champion track teams. From his halfback position, the 175 pounder was the Wildcat's second leading rusher in 1970, and was named to the First Team All-District squad, and to the Second Team All-State team. He received the Gold Helmet award for his play in the state semi-final game against Bayard Cobre. Jenkins also rushed for 112 yards in the Wildcats 46-14 victory over West Las Vegas for the New Mexico Class A State championship in 1969.

Jenkins ran track for three years, and was on the Wildcat 440 yard relay team, which set the state record in 1969 (43.2), and also set the school record in 1969 (42.9). He qualified in the 100 yard dash for the state meet in 1969 and 1970. In 1970 the 440 yard relay team took first in district. Jenkins did not get to run in the state meet, as of a leg injury in 1970.

Jenkins is the son of the former Linnona Howard Jenkins, who resided in Stanton a few years ago.

Tax Man Sam Sez:

If you are one of those affluent Americans who can still find household help you may have a problem with your maid tax. As most folks know, household employees are covered by Social Security if you pay the household employee more than \$50 per calendar quarter. This is not an optional tax — and the fact that the maid does not want you to pay Social Security tax on her has no bearing. You are liable under the law to pay Social Security taxes if the total wages for the quarter exceeded \$50 for the employee.

Under the new 1969 Tax Reform Act the employees can voluntarily ask that income tax be withheld from their wages as household or agricultural employees. When Internal Revenue Service issues regulations you can also withhold the voluntary income tax deduction on your household or farm employees, and pay this in addition to the Social Security tax.

It's A Fact Emergency Service Can Kill You

We just read about a woman who was in an auto accident. In terms of accidents this was probably only a minor one. The woman's injuries were somewhat like the accident; they were minor, too. Today this young woman is paralyzed from the waist down.

Paralysis occurred when she was incorrectly lifted and transported to the hospital.

It is estimated that over 20,000 needless deaths occurred last year alone. Why? Because of poor communication facilities, inadequately equipped ambulances, untrained ambulance crews, unprepared hospital facilities and lack of emergency ordinances.

In many communities ambulances cannot communicate with the hospitals. Do you know if our emergency vehicles can? And that ambulance may be bright and shiny on the outside, but what's inside? Is there a law or ordinance that requires that specific emergency care equipment be carried? And is that ordinance enforced? What about the attendants? Are they trained? Do they really know what they are doing, or will we know someone someday like that young woman who is now paralyzed? Chances are pretty good that the least experienced beautician in your neighborhood hair salon has more hours of training than the person who might try to remove you from a wreck.

Have we failed to prepare for disaster? It's worth looking into. Employers Insurance of Wausau, Wisconsin, has arrived at the same conclusion. They have made available to interested groups and communities a film called "BEFORE THE EMERGENCY," designed to motivate and educate all of us about upgrading emergency facilities. The film is really a tribute to how the community of Minocqua, Wisconsin, has prepared itself to meet almost any emergency situation.

Minocqua organized a community emergency council made up of medical and hospital personnel, police and fire department officials, ambulance attendants and concerned citizens.

This council has established a central dispatch communications system. It conducts training courses in emergency medical and rescue techniques. The group even simulates disasters to test and train the skills of the members.

Whatever the disaster, Minocqua is prepared. Are we? If the answer to that last question is "No," then let's get cracking . . . now!
