The Launching Pad

Monday, July 20, marked another anniversary all Americans should remember. It was on this date in 1969 that the two astronauts landed successfully on the moon. NEIL ARMSTRONG, the first man to step out of the spacecraft said: "That's one small step for a Man, one giant leap for Mankind." The Eagle had landed moments earlier.

PLOSSIE and CLAYTON BURNAM were reunion visitors. As a matter of fact, they arrived in town a few days before the Old Settlers celebrated their day and spent the time visiting with relatives and friends and working in the yard of their home here. They live in Eastland but still maintain a residence in Stanton. CLAY-TON was in the insurance business while living in our city. He authorized an ad in the paper every week for the thirty years or more he was in business in Stanton. The H. C. BURNAM INSURANCE AGENCY was a household word in Martin County. The BURNAMS were kind enough to give the newspaper credit for helping them build such a fine business reputation while they operated their agency here. CLAYTON always felt like the newspaper in the county he was doing business in was good enough to get his messages across. He never bought advertising out of town.

Three new teachers were hired by the school board serving the Stanton Independent School District the past week and only one vacancy remains to be filled on the faculty. Two teachers resigned during the past ten days and in spite of the large number of resignations reported to date the board is having little difficulty in finding replacements. The list of faculty members from Grady and Flower Grove will be published, along with the full membership of the Stanton schools, as soon as they are made available to the press.

The GEORGE DOWDENS are vacationing in East Texas. They are natives of Overton, Rusk County. Henderson is the county seat of Rusk. GEORGE advised the writer that the family expected to be back home in Stanton around the first of August.

There is another date in history that will undoubtedly be remembered from now until eternity by SEN. EDWARD KENNEDY. It was on July 19, 1969, that his female companion on the evening of a party for the "boiler room girls" the late MARY JO KOPECHNE died in TEDDY's car when the vehicle plunged off a bridge near Martha's Vineyard in Mass. The death of MARY JO put a sudden end to the plans to become president of the last of the three KENNEDY brothers. No student of politics is counting TEDDY out permanently but the drowning incident caused him to make the decision not to seek the nomination of his party in 1972. MISS KOPECHNE had worked in the campaign for the slain SEN. ROBERT KENNEDY and a group of the girls associated with the New York solon did yeoman service in the political campaign and were styled the "boiler room girls" by none other than BOBBY KENNEDY himself before he was slain in California on the eve of a victory celebration.

There is nothing on earth finer than the admiration and deep appreciation a lonely man has for his hound dogs. I enjoy rising early in the mornings so I can share some communion with my beagles before going to work. Tuesday morning was exceptional in that the hot winds of July had turned over night as if by magic, into the cooling breezes of September, the exhilarating atmosphere caused the hounds to dash wildly around their enclosure and then dance with apparent pleasure at the anticipated repeat resting on the plates of food I held in my hands for them. There in total companionship with my dogs I forgot all about the stupidity of SENATOR MONDALE'S comments about the migrant workers. I forgot the headlines made by the anti-south hater, SEN. BYAH of Indiana. I forgot about SEN. McGOVERN'S tirade against most of the country. BYAH, MONDALE, and McGOVERN can all go fly a big ultra-liberal kite. I patted my conservative dogs on their respective heads, took a good long draw on the brisk breeze, and went back in the house and satisfied my appetite with buckwheat cakes and hot coffee. My chief thought: Thank God for giving us this great land to love and serve in time of crisis. After breakfast I backed my car out to head for the office and the editor's chair and typewriter. The lines composed here should serve as a signal that the silent majority is not going to remain silent when friends of foreign forces attempt to stifle the trumpets of freedom.


