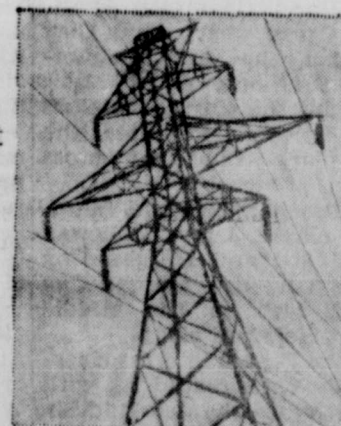

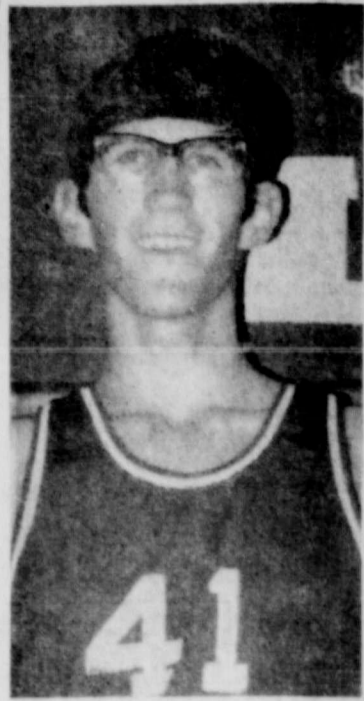

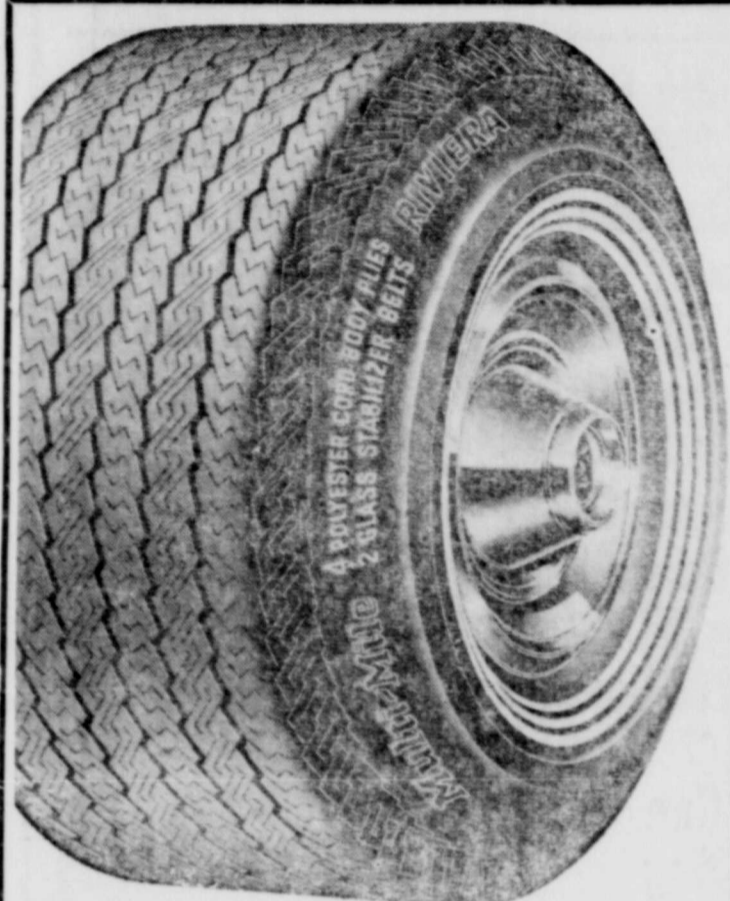
1971 Bond Sales Surpass Goals

December sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Martin County totaled \$2,592, according to County Bond Chairman James Jones. Sales during 1971 amounted to \$38,513. This represents 128 per cent of the sales goal of \$30,000.

Texans purchased \$15,207,564 in Savings Bonds during

the month. Total Bond sales for 1971 were \$199,830,508 for 110 per cent of the state's goal of \$181.9 million. One hundred six counties and twelve districts in the state achieved their 1971 sales goal.

Nationwide, December sales totaled \$439 million — a 14.4 per cent increase above December 1970. During the calendar year 1971, sales of E and H bonds amounted to \$5.5 billion. This is 114 per cent of the National goal of \$4.8 billion.

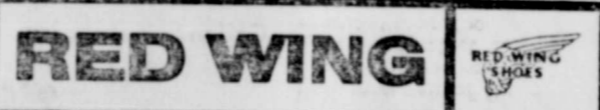
"growing up." Simple skills and hobbies also add to the enjoyment of life, then also remember — "That which we love we delight in; what we appreciate we learn to love."
