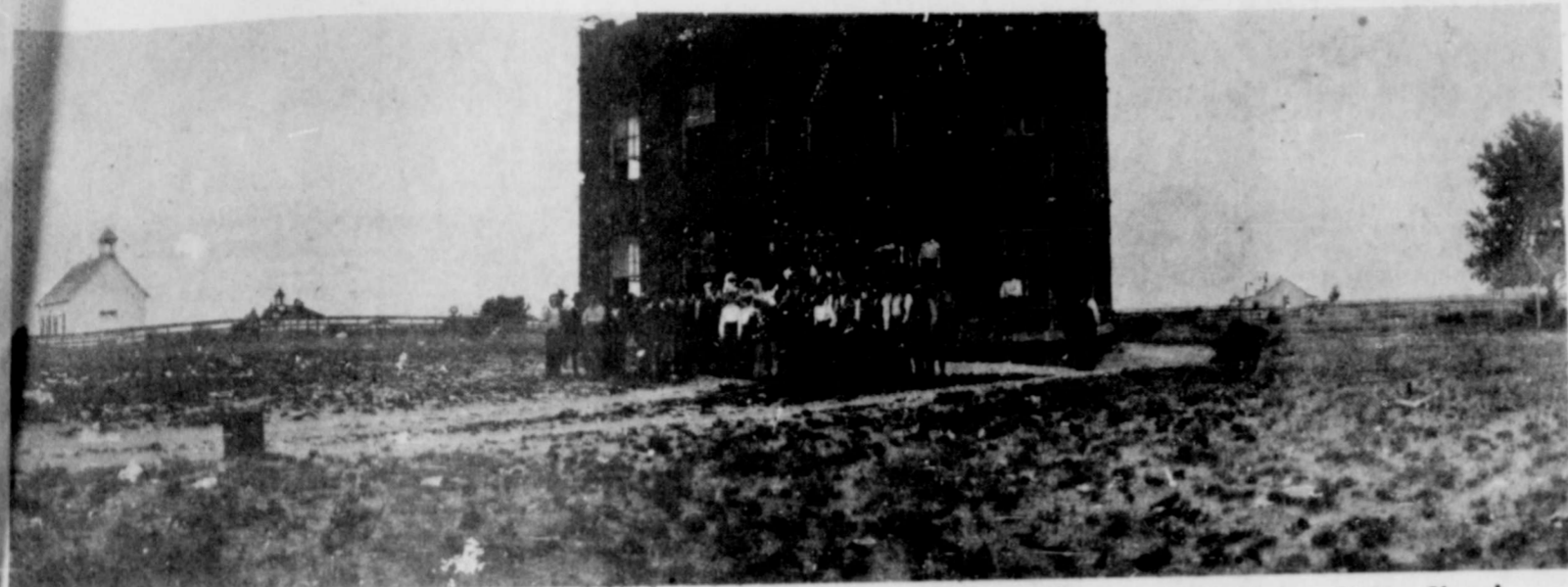

## Historic Courthouse Bids Farewell

They used to come for miles around to gather on the lawn of the spanking new courthouse for picture taking and some carefree visiting on Sunday afternoon.

lumber, before a ball and chain is implemented in knocking down the exterior walls of the courthouse.

In its' place will be a modern, functional courthouse which is designed to handle Martin County's needs for 100 years, and should again make Martin County home of one of the exceptional courthouses in the southwest.

The first courthouse in Martin County was built in

1887 and cost the taxpayers \$24,000, a huge sum at that time. While the county was being organized and the first courthouse built, Father B. Anastasius Peters loaned the county a building in which to conduct business.

That structure lasted until 1910 when the latest building was constructed at a cost of \$40,000. In 1910 West Texans hailed the courthouse as the most beautiful structure around.

A copy of the Texas Magazine, published in Houston, reported "Without a doubt the prettiest building in this section of the country," in a story concerning the new building.

At the time the courthouse was built land was selling for \$10-15 an acre, and automobiles were just starting to really make their mark on the landscape. Many people did spend their Sunday afternoons in Stanton on the lawn

of the courthouse, a gathering spot for folks from all over the county.

As the years rolled along the courthouse began to feel the pressure of "Old Man Time" and in the mid 50s more than \$80,000 was spent by the county to re-model the structure.

Replacing the present structure will be a multi-faceted courthouse, modern in design, which county officials estimate will be able to

handle the expected growth of Martin County.

Riherd and Huckabee, architects and planers with offices in Andrews and Lubbock, designed the new courthouse, which will cost local taxpayers approximately \$616,000, depending on what course of action the commissioners court takes on a proposed fountain for the structure.

## Welcome Moisture Recorded

Black, threatening clouds moved across Martin County this week, blanketing the sky and dropping more than four inches of rain on the county.

For the farmers, who have been anxiously awaiting the moisture, the rain will help, but most agree that more than four inches is needed for another cotton crop like last year's.

The much-needed rains

in some places and only sprinkles in others.

The James Biggs farm north of Courtney received three inches Sunday, while the Cliff Hazlewood farm got two inches. Stanton recorded one and one-half inches Sunday night, and got another steady rain Tuesday night and Wednesday morning.

Jack Elrod, soil conservationist with the Mustang Soil

also brought high winds, lots of thunder and brilliant electrical displays in the skies. At Pecos a tornado touched down and demolished four mobile homes, and high winds are credited with killing a 12-year old Crane girl.

In the initial and probably longest shower Sunday night and early Monday morning, the county received as much as three and one-half inches

and Water Conservation District in Stanton, reported that the rainfall was varied and that the east side of Martin County near Knott only received one-half of an inch Sunday night.

Elrod was one of those who predicted a leaner cotton crop this year. "I doubt seriously, without more rain,

## Board Approves New Budget

Increasing salaries and soaring supply expenses caused the new budget, approved by the Stanton Independent School District Board of Trustees in a special called meeting Tuesday night, to jump \$65,653 above last year's, according to superintendent Russell McMeans.

The board approved the new budget of \$924,038, and announced that no tax hike would be necessary for the next school year. The present \$1.70 per \$100 of assessed value will stand.

The board then called a board of equalization hearing for May 16 at the school administration building. A time will be announced later. Head coach and Athletic Director Bill Young appeared before the board to discuss his new budget for next year. Young asked for and was approved, \$14,992.40 for an operating budget during the 1974-75 school year.

Included in the budget was \$9,439.45 for the football

program, \$1,010.45 for the basketball campaign and \$1,055.50 for track purposes. Others included tennis, \$288; golf, \$446; and awards, \$1,013. Total figure for high school athletics was \$13,892.40, plus \$1,000 for

junior high school.

McMeans also unveiled the new school calendar for next year, and had it approved by the board. The superintendent told the board that beginning next year the school year had to be divided

into the three quarter system.

The calendar will remain similar to this year's schedule, with students attending school a total of 180 days. School will begin August 14 for students and August 12

for teachers, who will report early for two days of inservice training.

School will dismiss for all the usual holidays, but Stanton students will get an

## Blanchard-Hance Race Highlights Sat. Primary

The 28th State Senatorial District race between incumbent H. J. "Doc" Blanchard and his challenger, Kent Hance, is expected to generate the most interest across Martin County Saturday when voters go to the polls in the first Democratic party primary.

Both men are from Lubbock, and both have been hitting the campaign trails

regularly in the past few weeks. Hance has been to Stanton three times during his campaign, and his wife was here Tuesday, while Blanchard was in town Friday.

The six polling places in Martin County will open at 8 a.m. Saturday and will close at 7 p.m. Voters in precinct one can vote at the Stanton Elementary School Cafeteria,

with precinct two inhabitants voting in the Stanton Methodist Church basement.

Precinct three voters will cast their ballots at Grady School, while the Lenorah Baptist Church will be the scene of voting in precinct four. Precinct five will vote at the Flower Grove School and precinct six voters will make their choices at Brown Paymaster gin.

Mrs. Doris Stephenson, Martin County Clerk, reported 35 absentee ballots cast before the cutoff date Tuesday. She termed the turnout "ordinary."

Also on the ballot will be the governor's race between Governor Dolph Briscoe and challenger Frances (Sissy) Farenthold, and the race for

## Locals At State Meet

The final hurdle in high school track, the state meet, will be held in Austin Friday and Saturday. Stanton High School will be represented by David Standefer and Joe Luis Hernandez.

Standefer will be battling the state's best in the 220-yard run, while Hernandez will be matching flying feet with athletes in the 880-yard run.

Stanton's top notch girl athlete, Connie Christon, failed to qualify for the state meet at regional last Saturday in Levelland. The sophomore coed was fourth in the 220 with a 26.2 time and sixth in the 100 with an 11.3.

Coach Tommy Gregory, who coached the girl's track team this year, was pleased with Miss Christon's efforts however. "Connie has run real good this year, and has improved her times at almost every meet," Gregory commented.

Coach Bob Richardson took his two state entries to a state qualifiers meet in Lubbock last Saturday. Hernandez took fourth with a 1:59.8 in the 880 and Standefer was sixth in the 220 with a 21.9. Standefer also clocked a 9.9 in the 100-yard dash and broke the 10 second barrier for the fourth time this year.

The SHS athletes will be competing Friday night beginning at 7:30 p.m.

The new courthouse will be split up into four sections. One will contain the county attorney, Texas Highway

Patrol, county judge's office and the commissioner's courtroom.

Another will house the tax office, sheriff's office and justice of the peace's office, besides the underground jail facilities, which will be some of the most modern in the area.

Another section will contain the district and county clerk offices, along with their records storage area. In the section with the district courtroom, a law library, jury room, witness lounge and judge's office will be housed.

The courthouse will face east, with the proposed fountain planned for the west side of the complex. The existing museum will remain intact.

Actual construction on the courthouse is planned immediately following the completion of demolition on the

present building. Martin County officials hope to be moved into the new building by June or July of 1975.

 that the crop will be more than one-half of what it was last year in Martin County. The price is still good, but production may be the problem this year," Elrod advised.

"All the farmers are trying to plant now, following the rain. Those who got at least one and one-half inches will be in pretty good shape, but the others will need more rain," Elrod continued.

"We've only had four or five tenths of moisture four months into the year, and normally should already have two or three inches. There is also no underground moisture, which is supplied by winter rains or snow. The winter moisture gives the roots something to go down to," the conservationist said.

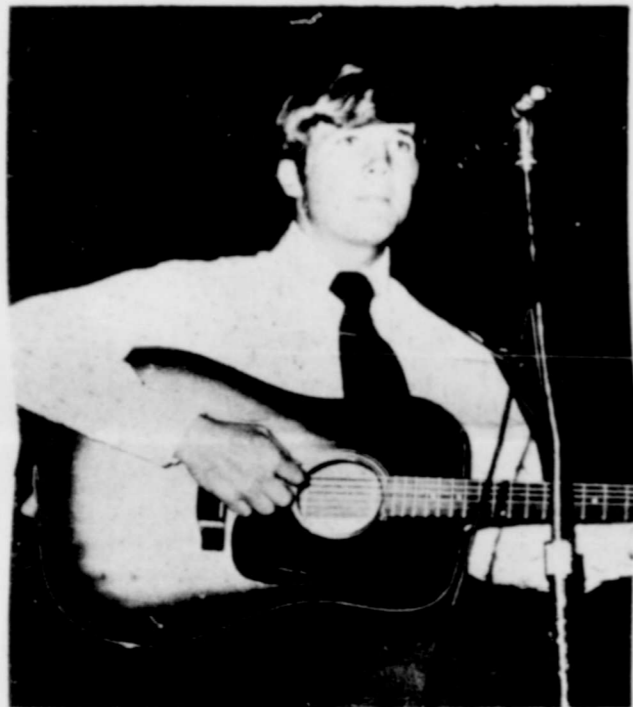

## Veterans Pose Questions

Persons who have served in the Army, Navy, Air Force, or Marine Corps Reserves, or in the Armed National Guard, frequently ask whether they are eligible for any veterans benefits under State or Federal laws, according to Martin L. Gibson, Veterans Service Officer for Martin County.

A person can generally determine whether he or she is eligible for Veteran Administration benefits by referring to Item 17 of their Release from active duty, Form DD 214. If they were Reservists or National Guardsmen, this particular

item will show ACDUTRA or a similar indication of active duty for training purposes only, and they would not be eligible for VA benefits.

## Lt. Governors Report

By Bill Hobby

AUSTIN — With the Constitutional Convention in brief recess, I believe it is a good time to look again at some of what has been done.

The Local Government Article has been approved tentatively. Basically, local government would not be changed from the present Constitution, but new flexibility is provided.

The new article contains provisions which are now scattered in five separate articles. It reduces the length of those provisions from about 9,500 words to 1,400 words.

Under the proposed article, the population limit for home-rule cities is reduced from 5,000 to 1,500. The Texas Municipal League reports that this will more than double the number of cities eligible to adopt a home rule charter.

If the Local Government Article is finally adopted it would, for the first time, give counties the power to enact ordinances. Such enacting power would have to be granted by a majority vote of

the county's residents, and could be taken away at a later date.

The majority vote requirement for changing county boundaries is retained and a provision allowing for merger of two counties or a change of the county seat by a two-thirds vote is added.

County and district officers are retained as elective officers. The voters may, however, create, eliminate or combine county offices.

New tax rate and debt limitations for cities and counties will represent a major departure from the present limitations. The Convention version sets an ad valorem tax rate limit of \$2 per \$100 assessed valuation for cities and \$1.25 for counties, but these limitations apply only to taxes for operations.

The present limitations are \$2.50 for home-rule cities, \$1.50 for general law cities, and \$1.25 for counties. These limits apply to taxes for both operation and debt service.

Under the new article, tax rate limits for debt service

would be left for the Legislature to decide. This is designed to make the bonds of political subdivisions more attractive to buyers and should lower interest charges to the taxpayers. It is estimated that this provision could save cities as much as \$30 million a year in interest

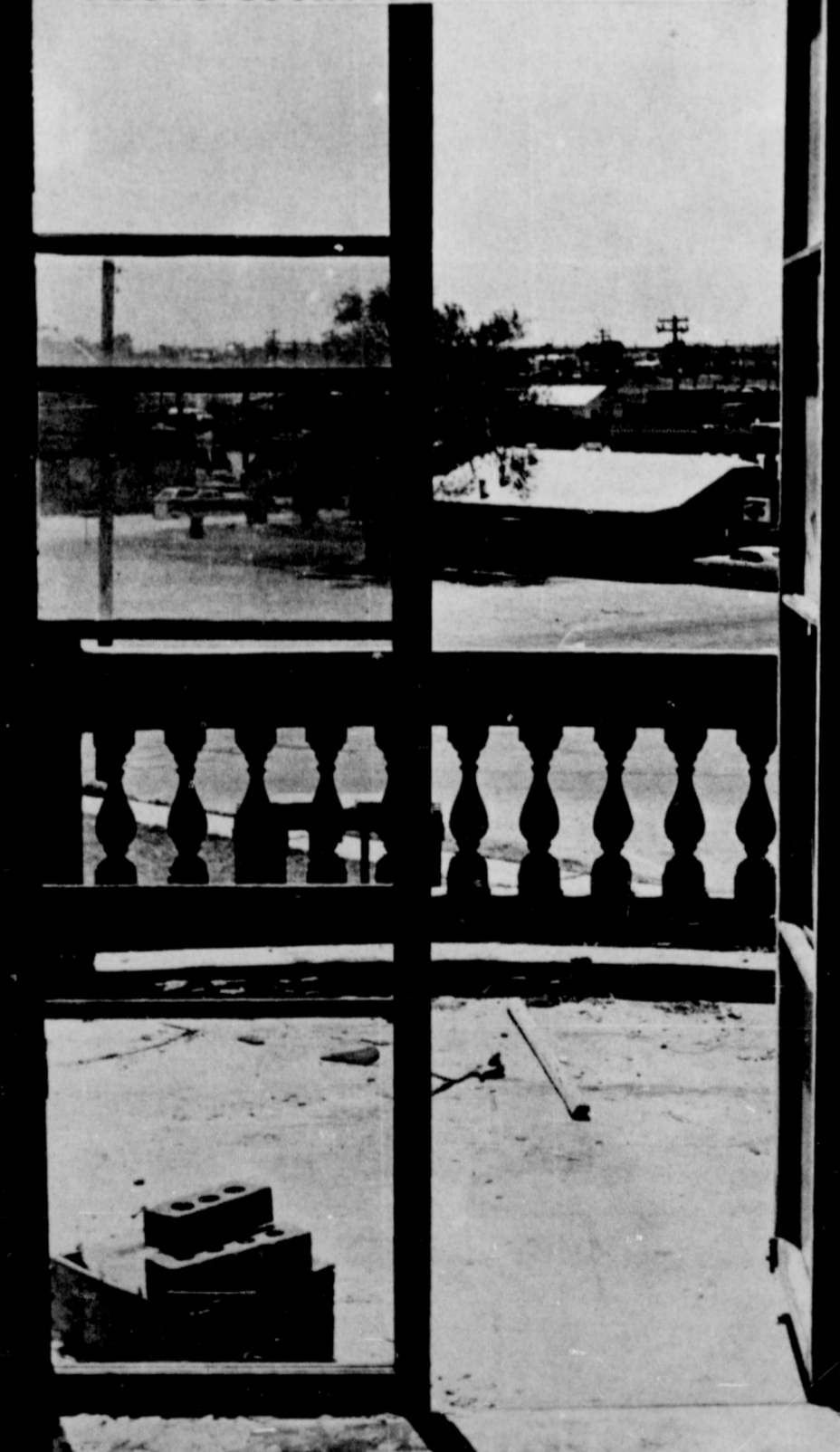

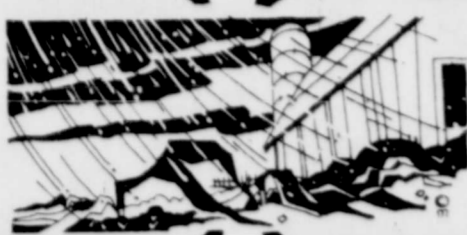

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

**AUSTIN, Tex** — Pressure on Gov. Dolph Briscoe to call a special legislative session increased with an appeal by inflation-hit state employees for a \$62 million a year emergency pay raise.

Forty-five thousand state employees signed a petition addressed to Briscoe requesting a special session on these pay matters.

A 10.2 per cent (three step) increase for classified and hourly workers immediately.

An additional 6.8 per cent (two step) boost for 1974-75 benefitting all employees.

An increase in the per diem travel allowance from \$18 to \$25 a day.

An increase in the mileage rate paid for use of personal cars on state business from 12 cents to 20 cents a mile.

Texas Public Employees Association represents more than 70,000 state employees.

TPEA President Walter H. Looney said the raises are needed to help keep up with the inflation spiral and catch up with last year's zooming living cost.

If inflation continues at present rate until September, said Looney, soaring prices will have nullified 98 per cent of the wage raises given state classified employees in the last seven years.

Governor Briscoe said he is "concerned" about the employees' problem and will consider it "along with the other priority matters in state government."

The Governor is weighing demands for a special session to provide \$200 million in emergency school finance aid to help hold down local property tax increases.

**COURTS SPEAK** — The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals held both criminal and civil penalties can be exacted for water pollution.

A divided State Supreme Court concluded an Abilene fireman, who was fired for declining to take a lie detector test concerning a stolen truck, must be reinstated.

A new trial was ordered by the Court of Criminal Appeals for a 23-year-old man sentenced to 101 years imprisonment for stabbing a drinking companion to death near Brownwood in 1970.

**MANUFACTURING FIRMS WIN** — Five manufacturing firms won the annual governor's Industrial Expansion Awards for 1973.

Winners were Hi Pro Feeds Inc. of Friona, Datapoint Corporation of San Antonio, Superior Continental Corporation of Brownwood, Owens-Corning Fiberglass Corporation of Waxahachie and the Beaumont Shipyards of Bethlehem Steel Corporation.

Local Chambers of Commerce nominated the winners. Selections were made by the Texas Industrial Commission for civic and economic contributions to communities.

**COTTON DEADLINES SET** — Agriculture Commissioner

John C. White ordered cotton farmers from the Winter Garden area to the coast to complete planting by midnight May 10.

The area is ahead of last year's planting schedule, and some of the counties have reached 99 per cent completion, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. White said cotton planting statewide is 16 per cent complete, compared with nine per cent this time last year.

Estimated total acreage for Texas is 5,933,000 acres, up 10 per cent from 1973. Planting deadlines are fixed as part of the Texas Pink Bollworm Act control program.

White said probability of bollworm infestations is greater this year due to delay in cotton stalk destruction and a mild winter.

**FEDERALS HELP** — A \$195,000 federal Economic Development Administration grant has been awarded to Laredo and Mineral Wells for industrial site development to offset shutdown of U.S. military installations.

Of the total, \$89,000 will go to Laredo to help offset loss of jobs through closing of Laredo Air Force Base. The funds will be concentrated on development of industrial sites and transportation and to improve tourism.

Another \$90,000 EDA money to ease closure of Fort Wolters at Mineral Wells will be used to conduct a water development study and develop industrial sites in Mineral Wells and Weatherford.

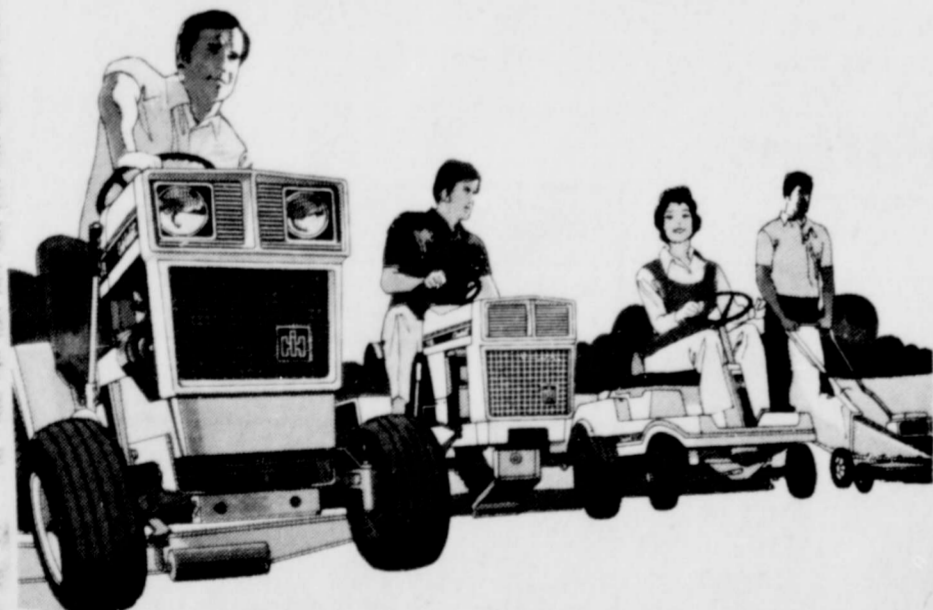

**Hints For Homemakers**

by Katherine Luckenbach

**EATING DOWN, FOOD SPENDING UP.** We ate 1 1/2% less food in 1973, according to the U.S.D.A. Food prices rose more sharply than they have in 25 years, and one way of dealing with the problem was to eat less. What foods were affected? Meat consumption was off six per cent, eggs by five per cent. On the other hand, we ate five per cent more cheese, four per cent more fruit and more canned and frozen fish.

The percentage of disposable income Americans spend on food has been dropping steadily for 15 years. Last year, however, there was a slight increase, from 15.7 per cent in 1972 to 15.9 in 1973.

With these changes in spending it is important for us to plan our eating. Keep these things in mind when planning: Plan by the basic four. You know that each day you need two servings of meat, four servings of fruits and vegetables, four servings of breads and cereals and two servings of milk for adults. If we shop once a week we need to plan for 14 meats, 28 fruits and vegetables, 28 breads and cereals and 14 milks for each family member.

For ease in planning establish a meal planning pattern such as a meat, a vegetable, salad, beverage and dessert.

Consider cost when planning a meal. Don't plan to have expensive cuts of meat with expensive vegetables. Buy vegetables in season.

Don't forget to plan around family likes and dislikes. If little Johnny hates vegetable "X" plan to have his favorite meat dish along with it.

Planning can cut the food bill, improve your nutritional intake, and save time and energy. So be a smart homemaker take time to plan.

**STILL PROBLEMS**

Weeds are still a major problem in raising food and fiber crops, and farmers are using the cheapest and most effective means to combat them — herbicides. According to Dr. Dudley T. Smith, assistant director of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, more than 70 per cent of the U.S. cropland was treated with herbicides in 1968. About 90 to 95 per cent of the cotton, rice and peanuts is treated today.

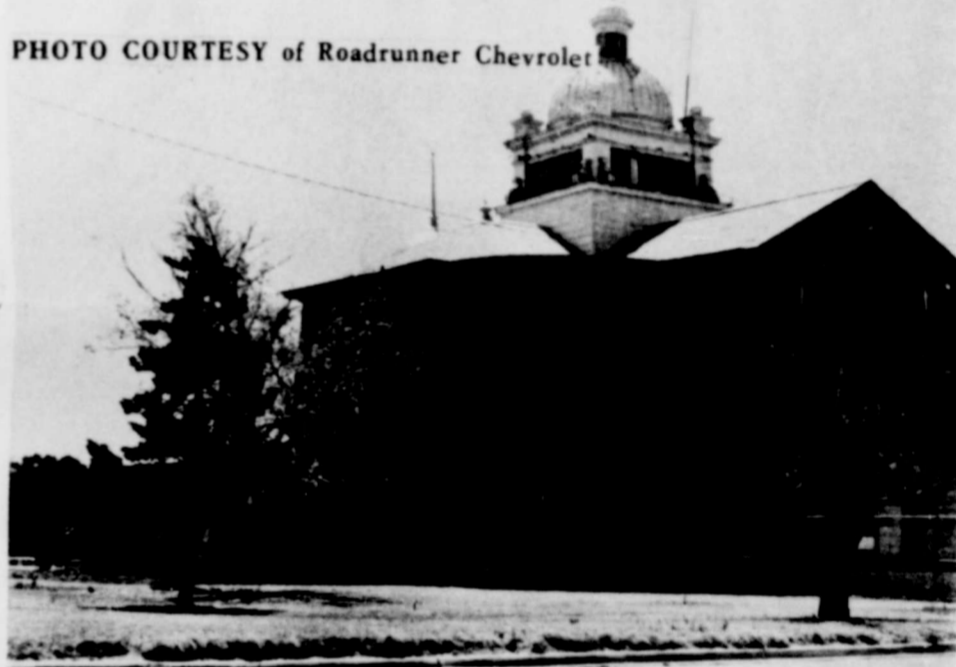

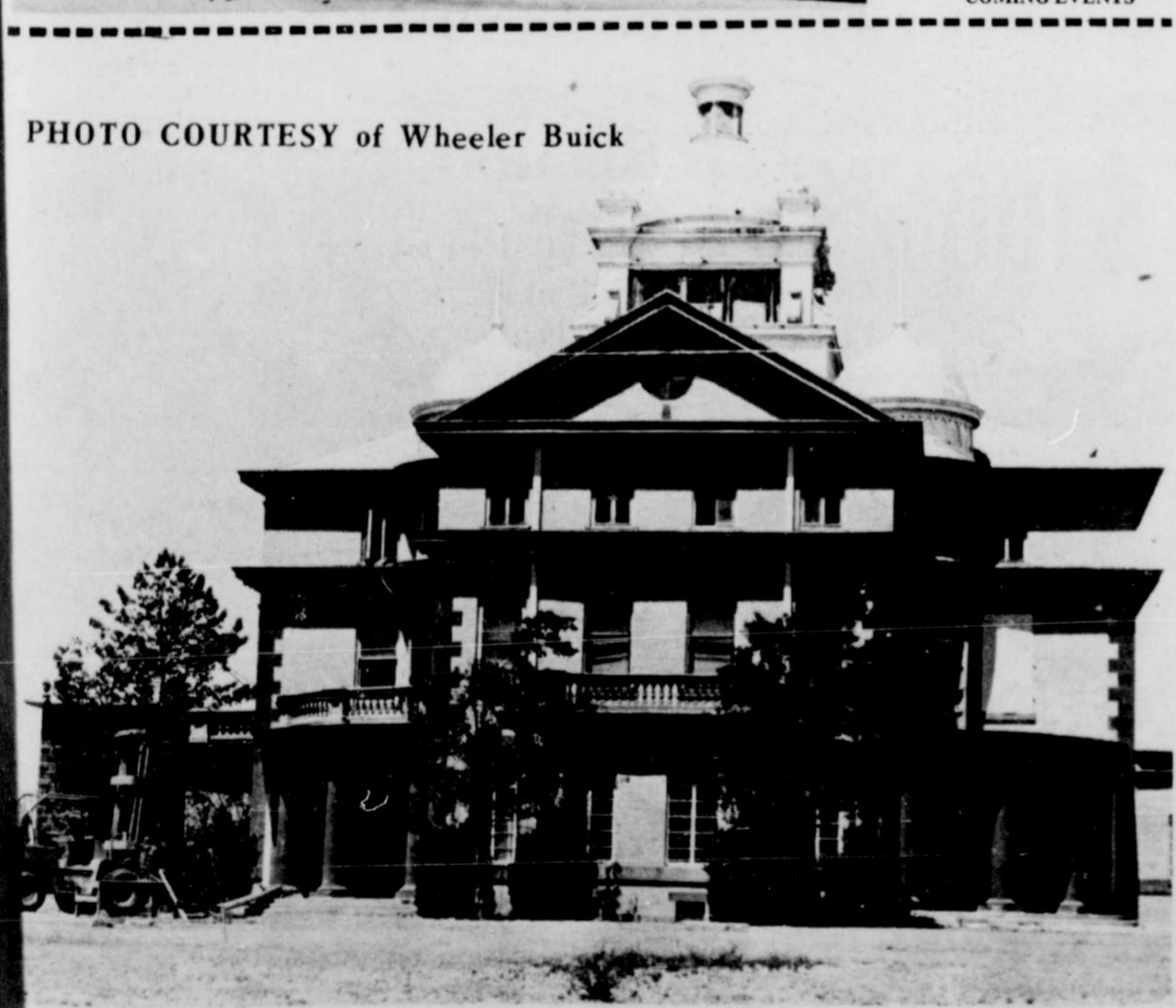
