## Resignation requests among items facing school board tonight

Snyder public schools board of trustees will discuss accepting resignations from two teachers and awarding a leave of absence for another during a regular board meeting that will open in executive session this evening.

The executive meeting is scheduled for 5 p.m., to be followed by the regular board meeting at 7 o'clock.

Other items on the agenda include the acceptance of bids for the construction of a restroom facility at the junior high tennis courts, a spring trip for the band, discussion of repairs to the drain pits at the school farm and approval of the year-end audit.

The board will also hear a report concerning North Elementary from Ray Courtney, principal.

Resignations will be presented from Phillip Wester, high school biology instructor and varsity assistant coach, and from Terrel Harris, junior high social studies teacher and coach. The board will also consider a leave of absence for Vanessa Taylor, a fifth grade teacher at Central Elementary.

A recommendation to hire a high school biology instructor with three years of experience is also on the agenda.

The restroom facility for which bids will be reviewed tonight is being constructed to serve both the junior high tennis courts and Snyder Soccer Association. Repairs to the drain pits at the school farm are estimated to be \$2,150, which includes six concrete covers and guard rails. (see SISD, page 8)

## Jayton ISD to discuss annexation

JAYTON — Jayton school board this evening is expected to review a detachment annexation petition that calls for the portion of Snyder Independent School District lying inside Kent County to be annexed into the Jayton district.

At the end of the 7 p.m. hearing, the board will vote to approve or deny the petition.

The petition has been signed by a majority of registered voters who reside in a portion of Kent County that is within the Snyder school district.

For the annexation to be effected, both districts must approve. If the districts disagree, the matter could be appealed to the Commissioner of Education in Austin.

The area involved includes some 55 square miles with property valued at \$12,496,718. At \$1.04 tax rate set by Snyder ISD, the local school system stands to lose some \$129,966 if the property is annexed to Jayton.

Snyder public schools board of trustees has not received the petition. The board did meet in executive session with County Attorney Pete Greene on Nov. 13, however, to gain legal information in the case.

Q—When a child is failing a subject, is the teacher supposed to send a note home with the child when they first begin to fail or at three weeks, or sometime?

A—Yes. Deficiency slips are sent home with students who are failing a subject after the first three weeks of each six weeks period. This policy should be in practice at all schools in the Snyder public schools system, according to Dalton Moseley, superintendent.

### Comp signed

AUSTIN (AP) — With the new workers' compensation insurance bill now law, Gov. Bill Clements says he expects businesses to be moving to Texas and those that are here now to stay.

Clements, who signed the bill into law Wednesday, said it healed "the black eye on our business environment."

"No longer will jobs and new investment go to other states because of our workers' compensation laws," Clements said. "This is a great big plus for business, there's no doubt about that."

However, the governor said, employers probably won't see relief from rising workers' comp insurance rates for two years.

"It'll probably be two years before there is a measurable difference in rates," Clements said.

# Bush to attend drug summit

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush, in a gesture of personal solidarity for Colombia's battle against the drug cartels, will join the leaders of the An-

dean nations in Cartagena, Colombia, on Feb. 15 for a one-day summit on the drug war.

Cartagena, a port city 680 miles north of Bogota, is located in a

Medellin cartel stronghold in a country ravaged by bombings and assassinations since Colombian President Virgilio Barco declared war on the drug traffickers three months ago.

The White House played down security concerns Wednesday as it formally announced Bush's plan to go to Colombia.

"We won't take him where it

isn't safe," said White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater.

He insisted the security challenge in Colombia is less formidable than at the annual economic summits with the major industrialized countries, where seven heads of state require protection.

"We've had heavy security lots of places," Fitzwater said.

## 'Asset teams' to study how Mobil can reduce workforce by 8 percent

The exploration and producing branch of Mobil Oil has appointed 11 "asset teams" to decide how the company can best reduce the number of its employees by eight percent.

Public affairs manager Mike Kimmitt of Dallas said Wednesday that the team leader for the Midland area, which includes Snyder, will be Larry Bohot, who is currently the company's pro-

duction engineering manager in New Orleans, La.

"We did announce to employees and management that we were going to restructure the organization into a more compact operational unit and that the reorganization will be based on an in-depth analysis," Kimmitt said.

## BCD approves Ag Day promotion for Feb. 19

Board of County Development members Wednesday approved advertising to promote "Ag Day" on Monday, Feb. 19 at the county coliseum — an event to be combined with the annual meeting of the Scurry County Producers Association.

Chamber of commerce executive director Bill Moss told board members that an effort will be made to attract people in agriculture from surrounding counties.

The board approved the expenditure of \$650 for advertising the event, which will feature U.S. Rep. Charles Stenholm of Stamford as the luncheon speaker.

Representatives of the Texas Department of Agriculture and the agriculture departments of Texas Tech University and Texas A&M University will also take part, Moss said.

In addition to the producers association meeting, the event will offer booths and displays of products by various companies, he said.

Board chairman Jack Denman said attempting to make Ag Day bigger and better is appropriate because "agriculture plays a very viable role in our economy" in Scurry County.

Moss announced that the BCD will end calendar 1989 having expended \$55,522 of its \$57,400 budget for a carry-over of \$1,878,

and he said former and recently elected chamber board members will be honored in a 4:30 p.m. Monday reception at the 2302 Ave. R chamber office.

The sandwich luncheon meeting in the chamber board room was attended by members Bill Parker, Jack Smartt and Max von Roeder, in addition to Denman. Eddie Johnson was absent.

The feller on Deep Creek says, "Some people in America buy on the lay-awake-plan."

Shirley Gorman, news editor, is one of the SDN's most dependable employees. Recently, however, she missed a full week of work because of illness.

Shirley is a health and physical fitness nut. She exercises regularly and eats only natural health foods.

After reading that so many people are dying of "natural causes," we think Shirley ought to get back on the junk food routine.

We read that car thieves, like car buyers, have distinct preferences—and those likes vary according to regions of the country.

In New York, which has only 10 percent of the nation's Toyota Cressidas, 58 percent of the theft reports are for that vehicle.

The most stolen vehicle in California is the 1988 Hyundai Excel. But the thieves appear to be after radios rather than cars. More than 90 percent are recovered, often with the radios gone.

Texas car thieves like to obtain cars that are in demand in Mexico. These include Ford and Chevy pickups, the Ford LTD Crown Victoria, Mercury Grand Marquis and the VW GTI and Jetta.

Almost 80 percent of the large theft claims for the Mercury Marquis came from Texas, although the Lone Star State has only 7 percent of the cars in the nation. Car thefts are a growing problem. In El Paso, for example, the city loses up to 400 vehicles per month.

### Reservoir regulations are standardized by CRMWD

New ordinances adopted by the Colorado River Municipal Water District standardize regulations at its three major reservoirs—Lakes J. B. Thomas, E. V. Spence, and O. H. Ivie. There are only a few minor changes in rules such as specifying that pets must be kept under control, and off-road vehicles being banned. Otherwise, most rules and regulations are the same as pertain to sanitation, safety, and structures. The permit schedule, after Jan. 1, 1990, will be \$2 per day for adults 17 through 64 years for individuals; \$50 annual to cover the holder and guests for aquatic activities. One major change is that permit fees will apply to all persons, picnickers as well as boaters, fishermen, and skiers. Permits will be acquired for aquatic activities whether they

originate from private or public lands.

Uniform rules and regulations were adopted last week by CRMWD directors, who earlier had decided to raise and broaden permit schedules so as to make applicable to all users, except under and over-age individuals.

At the same time the CRMWD has been asking for proposals to provide concession facilities and services in three public recreation areas provided by the district at Lake O. H. Ivie. At capacity, the reservoir will cover 19,200 surface acres (30 sq. miles) and impounding 554,000 ac. ft. of water. It is located six miles below the confluence of the Concho with the Colorado River. Proposals should include an outline of services to be provided, facilities to be constructed, and a financial statement showing ability to perform.

## Police investigate stabbing death in Midland restaurant

MIDLAND, Texas (AP) — A 69-year-old man who slept in a Midland restaurant because he was afraid of being burglarized at home was robbed and fatally stabbed in the eatery, authorities said.

A 19-year-old Midland man has been charged with the murder, police said.

Orvel McDaniel was found in a pool of blood on the floor of the Seafood Place restaurant shortly after 1 a.m. Wednesday, police said.

The owner of the restaurant had told McDaniel he could stay overnight. Witnesses told police the man's apartment had been burglarized last month and he feared the burglar's return.

Police discovered McDaniel's body after receiving a disturbance call at the restaurant at 1 a.m.

McDaniel had been stabbed twice in the back, and a 12-inch butcher knife was found protruding from one of his eyes, investigators said.

Officers found his empty wallet nearby, and signs of a struggle.

Tony Tucker Jr., was charged with McDaniel's murder late Wednesday, said Belinda Abila, a spokeswoman for the Midland Police Department. His bond was set at \$150,000 by Justice of the

Peace Keith Jobe, Ms. Abila said. Officer Rene Flores said he stopped Tucker wearing blood-soaked clothes walking less than a mile from where McDaniel's body was found.

Tucker told Flores he had been robbed and beaten, Flores said. After he was identified and photographed, Tucker was released by the officer, Flores said.

But after police noticed the large amount of blood in the restaurant, officers pursued Tucker at a local address, Flores said. A woman answered the door but refused to allow officers into the home or wake the suspect, police said.

According to an affidavit for the suspect's arrest warrant, at about 5:30 a.m. the woman left the house carrying a bag.

"The owner of the residence left the house carrying a large black bag," the affidavit states. "Officers stopped her and found inside the bag a white sweat shirt

with blood on it and a black jacket with blood on it. (The woman) said that (the suspect) told her to get rid of the clothes."

Flores said the garments in the bag matched the clothes McDaniel was wearing before entering the restaurant.

The woman, 26, has been jailed on a misdemeanor charge of tampering with evidence, police said.

Tucker was arrested without incident at 9:30 a.m. by members of the police SWAT team, spokesman Jim White said.

District Attorney Al Schorre said Tucker was on parole from state prison. A request has been filed with the state to revoke his parole, Schorre said.

Schorre declined to say if capital murder charges would be filed.

"The case is still under investigation," Schorre said. "Once all of the reports are completed we will review the charges, and may consider adding to or changing them."

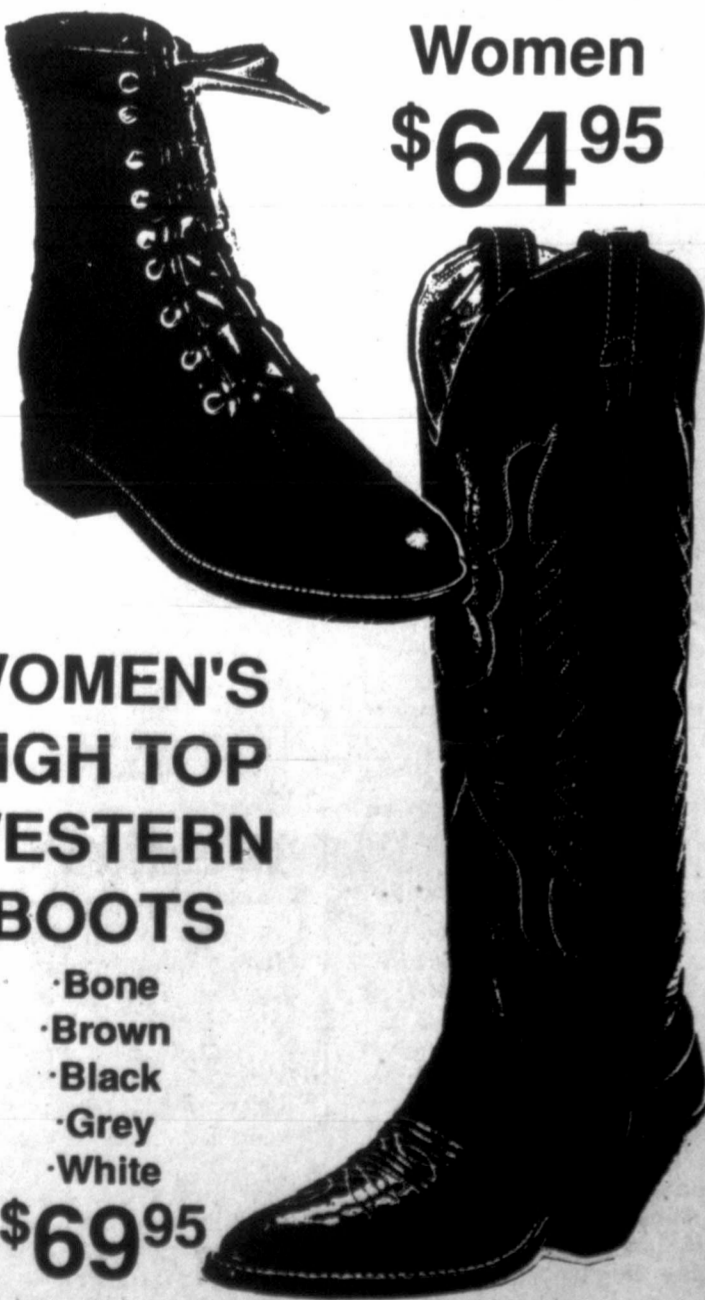

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've been diagnosed with Paget's disease. How could I have picked it up, and just what is it? I'm currently taking Didronel twice daily and Xanax before going to bed for pain. My doctor tells me not to expect relief from the pain for at least six weeks.

DEAR READER: Paget's disease of bone, a common disorder of unknown cause, affects older adults. It is characterized by areas of rapid bone destruction and production, leading to softened, enlarged bones that may be painful and break easily. The disease usually affects spotty portions of the skull, spinal column and legs.

Paget's disease is not communicable; you cannot "catch" it from someone else, nor do you get it by doing (or not doing) something. It is a metabolic disorder and can exist for many years without causing symptoms.

Treatment consists of drugs to retard the rate of bone turnover and to force additional calcium into weakened bones. Didronel is such a drug, as is calcitonin, a newer treatment that shows promise. Several weeks must pass before the medicine begins to alleviate symptoms. You seem to be receiving appropriate therapy for your condition.

Xanax, an anti-anxiety medicine, is not a common treatment for Paget's disease. It is useful for people with extreme nervousness. Since Xanax will not control your pain, ask your doctor to prescribe one of the many analgesics now available — or try over-the-counter pain relievers such as aspirin.

DEAR DR. GOTT: For the last 3½ years, I've been suffering from viral cardiomyopathy. I have no strength or energy and can do no work. What's my prognosis?

DEAR READER: Many types of virus affect the heart. Although most forms of viral heart inflammation heal themselves, some progress to a chronic state in which the heart muscle becomes flabby and irreparably damaged. This is called viral cardiomyopathy.

I do not know your prognosis. With medication (such as calcium-channel

blockers) to reduce cardiac work, the heart is allowed to rest and may recover. However, in some instances, for no apparent reason, the heart weakness becomes more pronounced, resulting in a dangerous cardiac insufficiency that can be cured only by a heart transplant.

You should be under the care of a cardiologist. Ask the specialist about your treatment and prognosis.

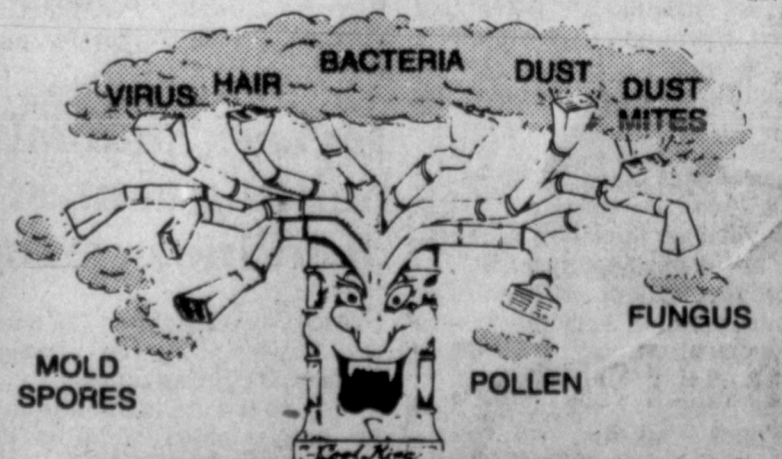

### County opts not to set up nativity scene

**PITTSBURGH (AP)** — Allegheny County officials have decided not to set up a nativity scene surrounded by reindeer and Santa Claus, even though the U.S. Supreme Court says a secular display is permissible. The Supreme Court ruled in July that the county's traditional nativity scene crossed the constitutional boundary between church and state. But the court upheld the city of Pittsburgh's right to display a Jewish menorah, which stood alongside a Christmas tree in the City-County Building.

The Supreme Court said placing secular items around the Nativity scene would make the display acceptable. Given that choice, the county chose to not display the creche at all.

"You have to ask yourself, how much do you want to junk it up? Then who do you offend?" said Maura Minter, manager of the county's Bureau of Cultural Programs. "Do you put in a reindeer and a blue Smurf? I'd just as soon not do it."

As in past years, the county will erect a 12-foot Christmas tree in the courthouse Wednesday, along with wreaths and poinsettias, Ms. Minter said.

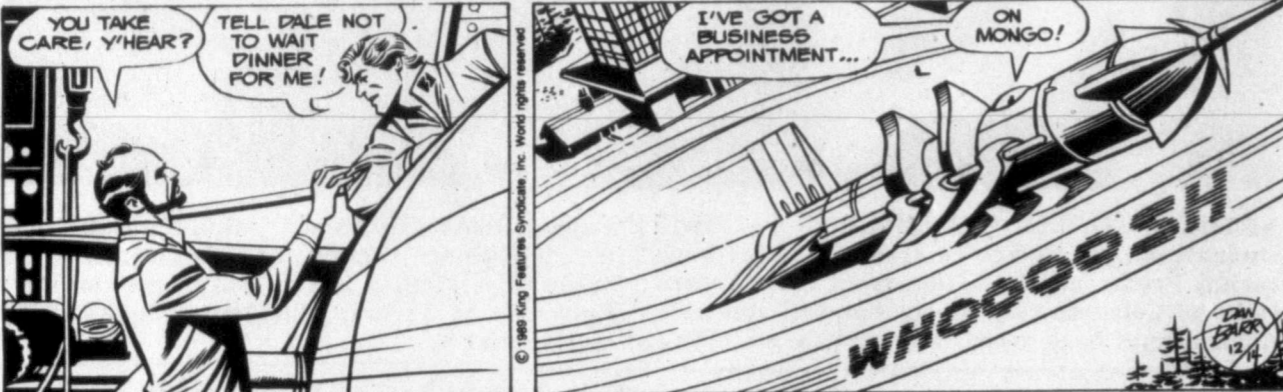

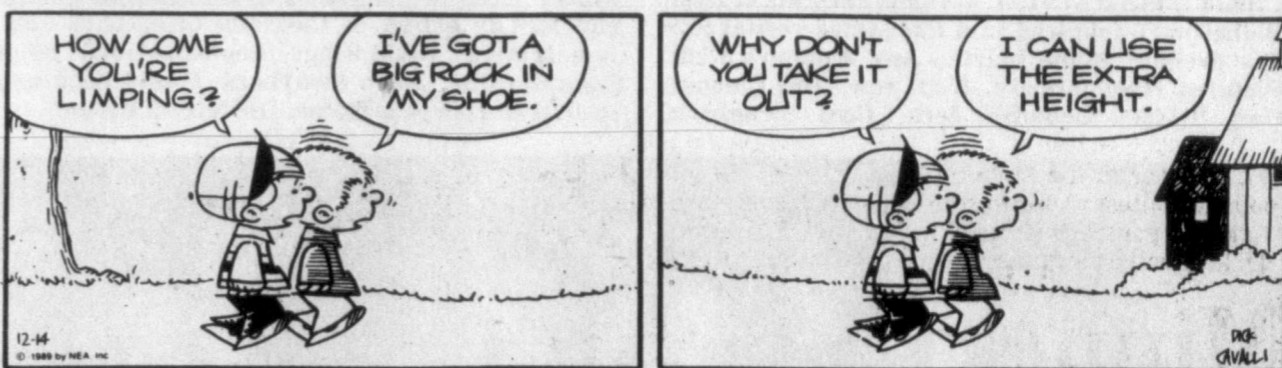

# Minnesota victims of Mavericks' run

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Expansion gave the Dallas Mavericks life in 1980 and continues to give them life in 1989.

Admitted into the NBA nine years ago, Dallas emerged as a model expansion franchise, becoming a legitimate title contender within five years and maintaining excellence for several seasons. The last 1 1/2 years, however, haven't been kind to the Mavericks.

# Schembechler retires

## Michigan coach will quit after Rose Bowl

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP) — For over a quarter century, Bo Schembechler has alternately glowered and glowed, one of the brightest stars in the college football galaxy. Now he'll literally fade away in the West.

When the Michigan Wolverines walk off the field at the Rose Bowl after playing Southern California on New Year's Day, it will mark the end of one of the

greatest coaching careers in history.

Schembechler, who announced his retirement Wednesday, has compiled a record of 234-64-8, making him the winningest active coach in NCAA Division I-A and fourth on the all-time list. His 194-47-3 record at Michigan also is a school record which may never be matched.

Schembechler, 60, cited age

and health — he's undergone two quadruple heart bypass operations — as reasons for giving up his coaching duties.

"I want it understood that I am in good shape physically," Schembechler said. "The primary reason for me stepping down at this time is that I don't want to run my luck too far. I've been fortunate to coach for 20 years following a heart attack. I just think at 60 years of age, it's time for me to step down."

He said he would decide later whether to continue as athletic director, a job he inherited in 1988, saying that Gary Moeller, the 48-year-old assistant who will succeed him as coach, shouldn't have the old coach looking over his shoulder.

"I'm not sure that it's in the best interest of Michigan or the program or myself or Gary Moeller for me to be hanging around," Schembechler said. "It might be pretty difficult for me to sit in the athletic director's chair. I'd want to go to practice, and I don't think I should do that."

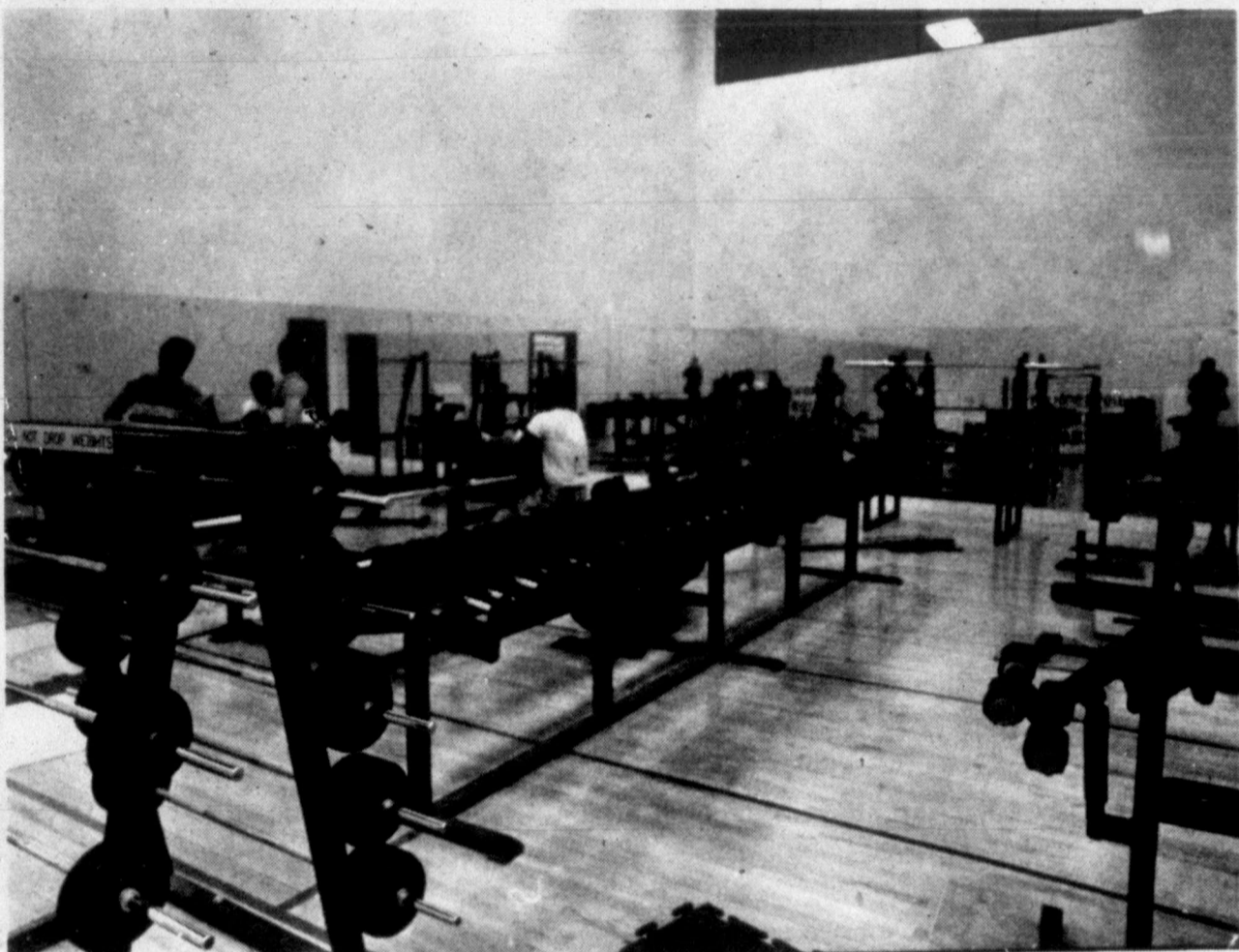
That wouldn't be a problem, Moeller said.

"It's never been in my mind, 'God, I wish he would quit.' I can say that very honestly," Moeller said. "But we can carry on without him."

"It isn't going to bother me if he stays around. He says it will and maybe he's right. But I'd love to have him around."

Moeller said Schembechler's loss will be felt most in recruiting.

Schembechler said he had been thinking all season about retiring and decided to make the announcement now because he wanted prospective recruits to know Moeller would be their coach.

# Missouri edges Razorbacks, 89-88, in Wednesday contest

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. (AP) — The shot chart said as much about Missouri's victory over Arkansas as did the scoreboard.

The chart showed that fourth-ranked Missouri attempted 30 shots in the layup range Wednesday night against No. 7 Arkansas, with 6-foot-10 Doug Smith and 6-9 Nathan Buntin the main contributors. Smith hit five layups, including the game-

winner with 12 seconds left, and Buntin had six of 11 field goals from point-blank range as the Tigers beat the Razorbacks 89-88 in a battle of college basketball unbeatens.

In the only other Top Twenty Five game, No. 3 Georgetown routed St. Leo 92-51.

Smith and Buntin scored 24 points each for Missouri (8-0), many of them put-backs of offensive rebounds. The Tigers had 16 offensive rebounds, including nine by Buntin and six by Smith.

"Our biggest concern before the game was their inside game," Arkansas coach Nolan Richardson said. "They are big and strong and stuck it back in the hole on us. We felt that was where they could beat us. We worked on it but I guess I didn't prepare us enough."

"When you have a guy that is 6-10 and can take the ball coast-to-coast and score, it makes your entire team better," he said of Smith.

"Nathan Buntin was tremendous," Missouri coach Norm Stewart said. "It was one of the best games he has played."

He said the Missouri defense tightened after Arkansas (5-1) broke on top early.

"We didn't shake but we were trembling a little bit," he said.

Arkansas led by as much as nine in the first seven minutes before Missouri opened a 49-45 halftime lead.

**COLORADO RIVER MUNICIPAL WATER DISTRICT RULES AND REGULATIONS AS ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS DEC. 7, 1989 ORDINANCE**

An Ordinance enacted by the Board of Directors of the Colorado River Municipal Water District adopting Rules and Regulations under the powers and provisions of Chapter 12, Title 128 (Article 8280-137) of the Laws of the State of Texas and Chapter 51, Title 4 (Texas Water Code, Section 51.127 et seq.) providing for and to:

Secure, maintain and preserve the sanitary condition of all water in and to flow into any reservoir owned by the District, to secure and maintain safe, sanitary and adequate plumbing installations, connections and appurtenances as subsidiary parts of sanitary sewer systems, to prevent waste of water or the unauthorized use thereof, to regulate residence, hunting, fishing, boating and camping, and all recreational and business privileges, along or around any such reservoir and the Colorado River and its tributaries, or, any body of land, or easement owned or controlled by the District.

Regulating toilets and sewage disposal; regulating industries upstream from the lakes and reservoirs; regulating garbage and trash disposal; requiring permit for any construction on lands bordering on the lakes and reservoirs owned by the District and covered by flowage easements held by the District.

Requiring certain standards of safety, size, construction, equipment, and occupancy of boats; providing for the removal of boats in violation of applicable provisions; providing certain sanitary standards for boats having overnight accommodations; defining certain types of boats and docks; providing that the Texas Boat Safety Laws apply to the lakes or reservoirs.

Requiring permit for operation of commercial activities on waters of District owned lakes and reservoirs or lands owned by District and providing for concession areas.

Providing for the inspection of boats and other floating devices on the District owned lakes and reservoirs for sanitation and safety; providing for certain recreation permits and fees to be charged by the District for boating, fishing, skiing, surf-boarding, camping and picnicking on the lakes and reservoirs or in designated recreation areas adjoining the lakes and reservoirs; providing for certain exemptions.

Regulating the use of firearms, pellet and B.B. guns on District owned land, lakes and reservoirs.

Providing that State Laws regulating fishing in Borden, Coke, Coleman, Concho, Howard, Mitchell, Runnels and Scurry Counties shall apply to District owned lakes or reservoirs located therein.

Providing for the establishment of code enforcement officers and defining the powers of such officers.

Prohibiting the use of sirens on any boat except those used and occupied by peace officers and/or code enforcement officers.

Regulating the construction of piers and wharves, floats, and bathouses.

Regulating the anchoring of rafts and floats.

Prohibiting the anchoring of boats, trot lines and other apparatus to buoys and floats owned by the District.

Prohibiting the discarding of cans, bottles and rubbish into or on the water of District owned land, lakes and reservoirs.

Providing a time limit for camping in public areas.

Providing certain penalties for violation of the terms of this Ordinance, said penalties shall not exceed fines of Two Hundred (\$200) Dollars nor imprisonment of more than thirty (30) days.

Providing for structures to be built on areas covered by a flood easements granted to the District: (a) Lake J.B. Thomas between Elevations 2258.00 and 2265.00 mean sea level; (b) E.V. Spence Reservoir between Elevations 1900.00 and 1912.00 mean sea level; and (c) O.H. Ivie Reservoir between Elevations 1555.00 and 1567.00 mean sea level.

Providing for pumping of water for personal and private use.

Providing for pumping of water for commercial use.

Providing for the changing the water line of District owned lakes and reservoirs by channels, etc.

Providing for commercial development of District owned land and water.

Providing for impounding abandoned property on District owned land, lake or reservoir areas.

Providing for speed limits on District owned lands, lakes and reservoirs.

Prohibiting the sale of fish taken from District owned lakes and reservoirs.

Prohibiting the entry onto private lands to fish, camp and picnic.

Prohibiting the use of and providing for the destruction of traps, nets and seines and other seine-type devices in violation of State Law and Lake and Reservoir Ordinances.

Providing for the repeal of conflicting Ordinances.

Providing a severability clause.

Providing for the lawful publication of this Ordinance, and fixing of the time at which this Ordinance will be in full force and effect.

**BE IT ENACTED AND ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE COLORADO RIVER MUNICIPAL WATER DISTRICT.**

## Lost in Big Bend...

# Search continues for missing teenager

BIG BEND NATIONAL PARK, Texas (AP) — More than 60 searchers still have found no definite traces of a 16-year-old boy believed to be wandering somewhere in the vast park.

Paul Paddor of South Miami, Fla., walked away from a campsite after an argument Sunday afternoon and has not been seen since, park spokesman Robert Rothe said. The campsite was

nine miles east of Castolon, a tiny settlement near the mouth of Santa Elena Canyon on the park's western boundary.

The diabetic boy, clad only in a flannel shirt and jeans, and carrying some trail mix, insulin, syringes and about a gallon of water, is assumed to still be somewhere in the rugged desert park, which is bigger than Connecticut, Rothe said.

"We hope if someone in a car picked him up that they would read about this or hear it on the radio and tell us," he said.

Some footprints have been found, but trackers can't tell if they are from Paddor, spokesman Roy Given said this morning.

"We haven't found any

evidence at all," Given said. "No wrapper from his cheese, no capsules of insulin, no needles, no water from his canteen."

He said an additional, fourth helicopter was expected to be brought in today, and said officials are trying to find some bloodhounds that can track a person long after he has passed through.

Nighttime temperatures have been near or below freezing since the boy walked away from the campsite, Rothe said. He discounted the threat of the numerous mountain lions living in the remote park.

"Our concern about wildlife isn't as much as our concern about dehydration and cold," Rothe said. "The cold out here is

more dangerous than any lion. He's inexperienced. He went to a survival school for four days prior to his disappearing, so I don't know how helpful that's going to be to him."

Rothe said 62 people from the National Park Service, the Border Patrol, U.S. Customs, the Brewster County sheriff's office, the U.S. Agriculture Department and local trackers and river guides were conducting searches on the ground, in helicopters and on rafts on the Rio Grande, which separates the park from a sister park in Mexico.

Pathfinders, Inc., of Sandpoint, Idaho, had brought two counselors and four youths who had been having trouble at home or school to the park.

## Cast reunion held for 1939 film, 'Gone With The Wind'

ATLANTA (AP) — Some disliked their roles, others were too young to remember theirs, but 10 surviving cast members of "Gone With The Wind" are excited about the hoopla surrounding the classic's 50th anniversary celebration.

"Thank God I had a part in it," said Ric Holt, who played Beau Wilkes, son of Melanie and Ashley Wilkes.

The Civil War saga's lone surviving star, Olivia De Havilland, who played Melanie, was at Wednesday's reunion in spirit.

De Havilland, who lives in Paris, sent her "warmest salutations" to the reunion in a letter read by a tearful Rand Brooks, who played Charles Hamilton.

She signed the letter Melanie Hamilton Wilkes and asked Brooks to remember her to the cast, especially "the several Beau Wilkeses, and my fond eternal greetings to the sole representative of the Hamilton clan."

"Anyone who had read the book sensed they were into something that would belong to the ages, and everyone was in a frenzy to read the book," said Ann Rutherford, who won the role of Scarlett O'Hara's youngest sister, Carreen, because Judy Garland was filming "The Wizard of Oz."

The cast members were in town for the weeklong anniversary fete of the movie's Dec. 15, 1939, world premiere in Atlanta. The movie's "re-premiere" is scheduled for Friday.

At the reunion were Butterfly McQueen, who portrayed the slave Prissy; Patrick Curtis and Mickey Kuhn, who played Beau Wilkes at various ages; Gregg Geiss, who played Bonnie Blue Butler, Scarlett's and Rhett's daughter, as an infant; Evelyn Keyes, who played Suellen O'Hara; Cammie King Conlon, who portrayed Bonnie Blue as a child, and Fred Crane who as Brent Tarleton spoke the movie's opening lines.

McQueen, whose portrayal of the flighty maid who didn't "know nothing 'bout birthing babies" won her acclaim, said she sometimes hated her role because she thought it demeaning to blacks.

"To me it was just a job, but at times I hated the role," she said. Brooks also said he despised his part as Scarlett's mild-

## Conviction overturned...

# Brandley nervous before he heard news

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) — Every Wednesday for about six months, Clarence Brandley has met with a couple of reporters to find out if the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals had ruled on his case.

Wednesday traditionally is the day the court decides capital murder cases and coincidentally is the only day when reporters are allowed to speak with death row inmates.

This Wednesday, a discouraged Brandley decided to pass on the interview session. Instead, he planned to play some chess.

Then a prison guard relayed word to him that the court had issued a ruling.

"I was beginning to get real nervous and jittery. I didn't know the outcome. Until you deal with it and face with it and you have all this hope. It's real hard to deal with," Brandley said.

His hands shook as he dressed, he said.

"When I was walking down the hallway, I was in a state of nervousness," Brandley said. "I was jittery. It's something you want to know until you deal with it and face it."

"All kinds of things were running through my mind. It was a long walk. At first I was real glad. Then I got worried."

As he was led into the visiting area, guards unlocked handcuffs

before placing him in a tiny cage.

When told the court overturned his conviction, his first word was, "Really?"

He looked shocked. "That just made my Christmas," he said, smiling weakly. "I'm trying to hold back the tears."

Only once did he wipe his face with the tissue paper he clutched in his right hand. The flow of tears would have to wait until he returned to his cell, he said.

"When I get back," Brandley said. "It's kind of hard to sit here and try to hold it back. When I get back I'll be in my own little space and I can relax and let it go."

"I will shed some tears. This is something to shed some tears over. I'm going to go back and probably just let it soak in and share some of the joy with some of the other fellows who have been pulling for me as well."

Asked if he was bitter, he replied, "I don't think anyone could say they haven't been bitter, but it's not a bitterness where I want to seek out revenge. It's not a bitterness where I want to hold a grudge on someone. I think anyone would be bitter."

Brandley said his experience has taught him to be less self-centered.

"It has made me think more of other people than normally," he said. "The world today is all about self. But now I've come to understand you can't be so selfish and be caught up with yourself. You've got to help other people. Hopefully one day I'll be able to help others as people have come together to help me."

He's also looking forward to another walk — this one out the prison door for hopefully the final time.

"I'll kiss the ground, walk in

the grass for the first time in a long time," Brandley said. "It's been a long road, a lot of doors. Everytime I came along, one of those doors would close."

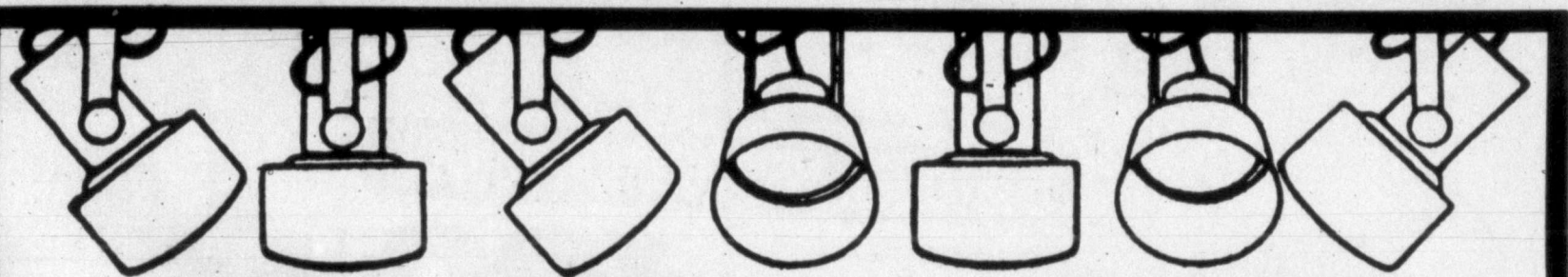
## Public hearing set in Lubbock

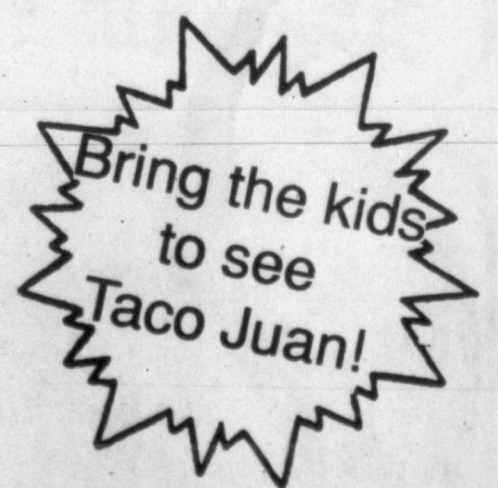

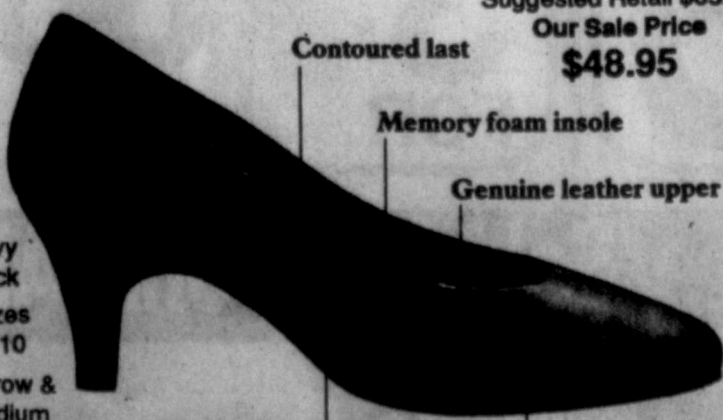

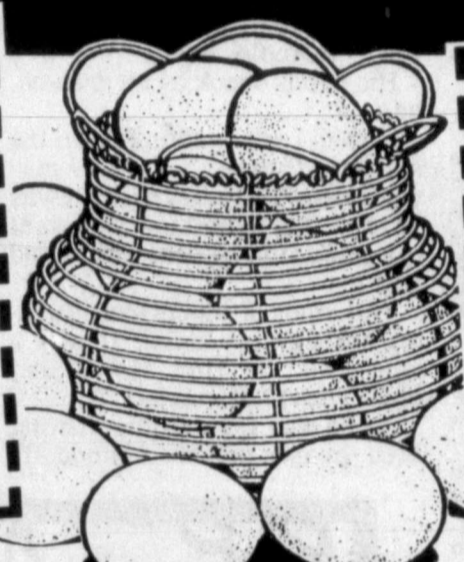
