

Freedom is not free and the sacrifices that led to that freedom are deserving of honor and recognition. This past Fourth of July, one Marine was recognized for those sacrifices and service to his country. During a family celebration, LCPL Thomas Horvatich was presented with a Quilt of Valor by Presenter Mike Tarpley.

# AAA Texas: Statewide gas price average slips below \$4 for first time since early May

The statewide gas price average in Texas is \$3.95 for a gallon of regular unleaded fuel, according to the AAA Texas Weekend Gas Watch. That price is 19 cents less than on this day last week and is \$1.12 more per gallon compared to this day last year. Of the major metropolitan areas surveyed in Texas, drivers in College Station are paying the most on average at \$4.08 per gallon while drivers in Laredo are paying the least at \$3.59 per gallon. The national average price for a gallon of regular unleaded is \$4.44, which is 16 cents less when compared to this day last week and \$1.28 more than the price per gallon at this same time last year.

Gas prices across the state fell as economic slowdown concerns, due to rising interest rates and inflation, outweigh crude oil supply worries as the war in Ukraine continues. The potential for declining crude oil demand, as it relates to possible reduced economic activity, could lead prices to follow suit. However, crude oil prices remain sensitive to headlines

– trading in wild swings somedays, and July is still a leading month for travel demand; therefore, it is unclear how long

downward pressure will remain on the price at the pump. In Big Spring, prices for a gallon of regular unleaded ranged Thursday from a low of \$3.59 at Murphy USA, to \$3.95

# Biden tests positive for COVID-19, has 'very mild symptoms' O'Connor, said in a letter that Biden had ing out a picture of hims

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Joe Biden tested positive for COVID-19 on Thursday and is experiencing "very mild symptoms," the White House said, as new variants of the highly contagious virus are challenging the nation's efforts to get back to normal after two and a half years of pandemic disrup-

White House Press Secretary Karine Jean-Pierre said Biden has begun taking Paxlovid, an antiviral drug designed to reduce the severity of the disease. He was isolating at the White House and "continuing to carry out all of his duties fully," she said. Biden's Dr. Kevin

a runny nose and "fatigue, with an occasional dry cough, which started yesterday evening."

"Folks, I'm doing great. Thanks for your concern," Biden tweeted. He added that he was "keeping busy!"

Biden, 79, is fully vaccinated, after getting two doses of the Pfizer coronavirus vaccine shortly before taking office, a first booster shot in September and an additional dose March 30. Jean-Pierre described the president's

symptoms as "very mild" and said Biden had been in contact with members of the White House staff by phone and would participate in his planned meetings "via phone and Zoom from the residence."

The White House took steps to show that the president was busy working

despite his diagnosis, with Biden tweet-

ing out a picture of himself making calls from the treaty room of the White House.

The president spoke by phone by lawmakers in Pennsylvania to apologize for having to cancel his planned trip Thursday to the city of Wilkes-Barre to promote his crime prevention plans. Biden also called South Carolina Rep. Jim Clyburn to wish him a happy birthday and congratulate him on receiving an award from the NAACP.

O'Connor wrote in his letter about the president's treatment plan: "I anticipate that he will respond favorably" to Paxlovid "as most maximally protected patients do."

Jean-Pierre said Biden had last tested negative on Tuesday, and he will stay isolated until he tests negative again.



The Quilt of Valor was presented during the family's annual celebration for the Fourth of July. As usual, family members flew in from different states to celebrate and honor these brave men and women at Howard County residents Jeremy and Tabitha Clark's home.

"Each year we get together and celebrate. In a sense it's like a big birthday party for all of those in our family and in our friend circle who have made the sacrifice for our country," Tabitha Clark said. "Each person who has made that choice deserves to be honored and to be shown appreciation, which is something we don't do nearly enough. The Fourth of July celebration is just one way we can do that in our family. Being able to add this presentation was an amazing experience and one that none of us will soon forget."

The Quilts of Valor organization is the result of a dream brought to fruition. A Gold-Star Mother, Catherine Roberts, had a dream while she was waiting on her son to return from service. During the recent presentation Tarpley described the dream.

"Katherine described the dream as vivid as real life. She saw a young man sitting on the side of his bed in the middle of the night, hunched over. There was a permeating feeling of despair. I could see his war demons clustered down into an emotional gutter," Tarpley read. "Katherine continued, it was as if in a movie. She saw him wrapped in a quilt and his whole demeanor changed. There was now a sense of hope and well being... quilts equal heal-

"I received my quilt one day in the mail and I was lucky to have my wife and my mother around me when I opened it," Quilts of Valor local presenter Mike Tarpley, said. "Since then I guess you could say I have been honored with many quilts that I have been able to present to our veterans. Each time a quilt is presented it is an opportunity for their family, their community and others who may not have an opportunity to show their appreciation do just that."

Since the founding of the organization, more than 350,000 quilts have been awarded in the United States, Germany, Iraq and Afghanistan. With each quilt the mission to honor service members and veterans is fulfilled - one human-being reaching out and touching another without judgement, reaching out with acceptance and with acknowledgement of service to our nation in very trying circumstances. According to Tarpley, this presentation draws him to more than 125 Quilts of Valor presented in Howard County. A good amount of the quilts have been presented to veterans of Howard County, veterans with family residing in Howard County, but also include a select few who have been honored during the Purple Heart Hunt and the annual Dove Hunt. Each honoree represents a story representative of honor and deserving of recognition.

"The Quilts of Valor Foundation recognizes war demons that plague soldiers from all wars. There are thousands of quilters across the United States working to make these quilts to cover our warriors, from all conflicts," Tarpley said. "Each of these quilts is composed of love, tears, and heartfelt appreciation and gratitude from many ladies."

The quilts are made up of three layers: the top with its many colors, shapes and fabrics represent the community and the many individuals we are; the batting - filler - is the center of the quilt, its

"This second layer represents the hope that this quilt will bring warmth, comfort, peace and healing to the individual who receives it," Tarpley said during the presentation.

The backing is the final layer and it represents strength that supports the other layers. It represents the strength of the recipient, the support of his or her family, communities and nation. Each of the stitches holding the layers together represent love, gratitude and sometimes the tears of the maker. Each quilt represents the three-part message from the givers to the recipient. "We honor you for your service. We honor you for

leaving all you hold dear and to stand in harm's way in a time of crisis, protecting us from the effects of war," Tarpley said. "Next, we know that freedom is not free. The cost of freedom is the dedication of the lives of men and women like you, and this quilt is meant to say thank you for your sacrifice." He continued, "Finally, this quilt is meant to of-

fer comfort to you and to remind you that although your family and friends cannot be with you at all times, you are forever in our thoughts and hearts."

Veterans are, simply put, those who made the decision to make a sacrifice for their country in hopes that a brighter tomorrow would remain possible. The Howard County community has done a wonderful job of not only growing those kinds of hearts, but of realizing that hearts that hold that

When administered within five days of symptoms appearing, Paxlovid, produced by drugmaker Pfizer, has been proven to bring about a 90% reduction in hospitalizations and deaths among patients most likely to get severe disease.

In an April 30 speech to more than 2,600 attendees at the White House Correspondents' Association dinner, Biden acknowledged the risks of attending large events, but said it was worthwhile to attend. "I know there are questions about

whether we should gather here tonight because of COVID," he said. "Well, we're here to show the country that we're getting through this pandemic."

Biden is far from the first world leader — and not the first U.S. president — to get the coronavirus, which has infected British Prime Minister Boris Johnson, French President Emmanuel Macron and more than a dozen other leaders and highranking officials globally.

When Biden's predecessor, President Donald Trump, contracted the disease in October 2020, it was a far different time. Vaccines were not available and treatment options were limited and less advanced. After being diagnosed with CO-VID-19 at the White House, Trump was given an experimental antibody treatment and steroids after his blood oxygen levels fell dangerously low. He was hospitalized at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center for three days



an eagle being raised as a chicken. The farmer explained the bird was no longer an eagle; he was now a chicken because that is all he has ever known. However, the zookeeper knew the bird had the heart and soul of a lofty eagle, and was never meant to live on the ground, was to be unrestrained and soar in the clouds. He lifted the eagle onto

a fence and told him to fly. The eagle glanced down at the comfortable chicken coop, jumped off the fence, and continued doing what chickens do. The man returned the next day realizing the eagle was born for something much greater – he just had to know it! This time he carried the eagle up to the rooftop of the farmhouse and again told him to stretch his wings and fly. ### Bidding quiz

You are the dealer and open One Diamond. Partner responds One Heart. What would you bid now with each of the following four hands? 1. **♦**AK7 ♥ — ♦ KQ9743 **♣** AJ85

2. ♠5 ♥ Q974 ♦ AK82 ♣ AQ94 3. ★ K96 ♥ AJ5 ♦ KJ8753 ♣ 10 **♠** 73 ♥ AK10 ♦ KQJ94 **♣** AJ7 **1. Two clubs.** The value of a hand

rises or falls depending on the bids made by your partner and/or the opponents. In this case, for example, when partner responds with one heart, the value of your hand falls at least a couple of points. It is bad news to hear that partner has length in a suit where you're void.

Your first reaction to the unwelcome heart response should be to draw in your horns and take things easy until you learn whether or not the hand is a complete misfit.

In line with this, you rebid two clubs. A great advantage of this call is that it is ambiguous since an opening bidder's change of suit may be based on anywhere from 13 to 18 points. What happens next depends mostly on partner's reaction to two clubs. The original promise of the hand would be restored if, for example, partner were to jump to three diamonds or raise to three clubs.

hearts; including distribution, it's worth about 18 points.

rebid your six-card diamond suit. Either rebid puts you in the minimum opening range, but the immediate heart raise has the merit of indicating that most of your cards are in diamonds and hearts. This in turn suggests that you have shortness in spades and/or clubs.

4. Three hearts. Partner expect you to have four-card support for the jump-raise, but when you show up with 18 high-card points and the A-K-10 of trump, he may find it in his heart to forgive you for having only three. Unfortunately, there simply isn't any better bid available. So, while it may be argued that three hearts is not a perfect bid, it nevertheless comes closer than anything else you can do to picture the potential of your

One year ago: In papers filed with the Supreme Court, Mississippi's Republican attorney general called on the court to overturn its landmark 1973 ruling that legalized abortion nationwide, and let states decide whether to regulate abortion before a fetus can survive outside the womb. (The court would agree to overturn Roe v. Wade




