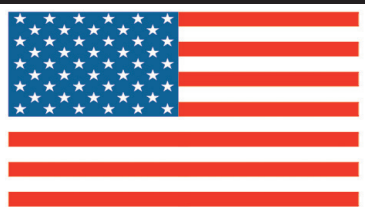

Forsan ISD to set proposed tax rate Thursday

The Forsan ISD school board will discuss setting a proposed tax rate when they meet Thursday. The meeting will be at 6 p.m. Thursday in the Superintendent's Office at 411 W. Fourth St. in Forsan.

The tax rate item on the agenda reads "Deliberation and possible action to adopt a proposed tax rate based on certified taxable values for Truth in Taxation publication."

According to the Texas Comptroller's website at comptroller.texas.gov/taxes/property-tax/truth-in-taxation/, local taxing entities are required to publish their proposed tax rate before holding a public hearing and voting to adopt the rate. "Truth-in-taxation is a concept embodied in the Texas Con-

stitution that requires local taxing units to make taxpayers aware of tax rate proposals and to afford taxpayers the opportunity to limit tax increases," the website says. "Property owners have the right to know about increases in their properties' appraised value and to be notified of the estimated taxes that could result from the new value."

The meeting will begin with an invocation and Pledge of Allegiance, followed by public comment. The board will recognize visitors, and then discuss the tax rate.

After taking action on the tax rate if the board so chooses, the final agenda item involves setting a date for a public hearing regarding the 2022-23 budget and tax rate.

After discussing the matter and voting on a date for the hearing, the meeting will be adjourned.

Police: Woman opened fire in Dallas airport; cop shot her

DALLAS (AP) — A 37-year-old woman fired several gunshots, apparently at the ceiling, inside of Dallas' Love Field Airport on Monday before an officer shot and wounded her, authorities said.

The woman was dropped off at the airport at about 11 a.m., walked inside near the ticketing counters and then entered a bathroom, Dallas police Chief Eddie Garcia said at a news conference. She emerged wearing a hooded sweatshirt or some other clothing that she hadn't arrived in, pulled a gun and fired several shots, apparently at the ceiling, he said.

"At this point, we don't know where exactly the individual was aiming," Garcia said.

An officer who was nearby shot the woman in her "lower extremities," wounding her and enabling her to be taken into custody, Garcia said. She was taken to a local hospital for treatment.

"No other individuals were injured in this event other than the suspect," Garcia said.

He didn't release the woman's name or speculate as to what her motive might have been.

"We wanted to ensure that our community knows that this is not an active situation," the chief said.

Karen Warner told The Dallas Morning News that she was checking in for her flight when she heard a loud argument about 20 feet (6 meters) behind her, followed by a gunshot. Then she started running.

"I heard about 10 more shots while I was running away," said Warner, who couldn't discern what the argument was about.

An airport spokeswoman said early Monday afternoon that airport operations were suspended and would resume once police finished investigating. A spokeswoman for the Federal

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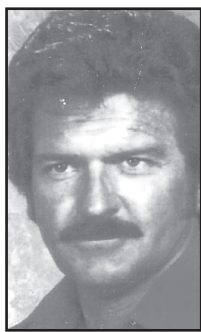

He was a longtime resident of Big Spring, Texas, after being stationed in the Air Force. He was a re-

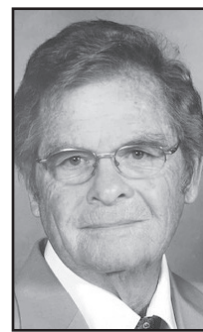

"As Big Spring continues to grow I feel it's important to offer things for our kids to do, that parents can feel at ease about. Art inspires both young and old and my goal is to create an environment where children can explore, learn, and create connections," Jamie Forrester, owner of The Art Spot, said.

With the new storefront space, Forrester will be able to expand the types of classes that are offered. There will be an opportunity for You & Me classes which focus on the connection between caregiver and child through art and play, there are also opportunities for classes that are referred to as drop off classes. During the Drop Off Class, younger students focus on exploring the process of art with sensory activities and older students will be able to experiment with various concepts to help develop their own unique artistic style. In addition, Forrester will be offering classes designed for children who may need a little extra support or accommodations. She will continue to host Kid's Art Night and Adult Paint Parties.

Whether you are looking for classes for babies, for siblings, for you and your children, or just for something to let your kids be creative, The Art Spot offers that. Forrester said. "We have a base set of art classes that we have been providing and those

will remain, but we are still adding to our schedule and looking at what else we can add to accommodate the different needs of our community."

Classes are being offered at times throughout the day, whether it be morning hours, early afternoon and after-school, or evening.

Forrester is a mom to two boys and states that is one of her greatest joys. She has been an educator and an artist which help support her teachings.

"I try to find joy in everything I do, which is one of the reasons why I love working with kids and creating art," Forrester said. "They both (her children) bring me joy. I love seeing a child's face light up when they've discovered something new! I also love being outside, listening to music, and spending time with friends and family. Art is one way that we can bring all the joys of life into one place."

According to Forrester, most of the classes start with a sensory activity; something that kids can be hands-on with. This opens up a world of discovery where the questions start flowing and the kids can start exploring. From the initial activity, students will head into an art project or a story to connect to the art project. In each class children then learn various concepts while exploring different techniques, materials, and mediums.

"Movement and music is integrated into our younger classes, helping to develop gross motor and social skills. Each class has developmental goals in mind, from developing sensorimotor skills, language skills, gross and fine motor skills

to hand-eye coordination, just to name a few," she said. "While those are really important the other benefits of our classes include learning patience, how to take risks, be adaptable, creative, and a team player. We are learning more than art; we are learning life lessons and even a little bit about ourselves."

The beginning of The Art Spot is rooted in Forrester's love of art. Every class she has is built on fun, excitement and with the hopes that it will be something the students remember after the class is over. As Forrester said, there is no better way she can think of than learning while having fun.

"Teaching is something that I have always wanted to do. I've known since about the 5th Grade. Teaching runs in my family, but art has always been a huge part of my life," she said. "Teaching is a passion of mine, but I wanted to incorporate art at the same time. Over the past several years I have done private classes and group classes and I just had this vision of combining both my love for art and teaching. I imagined a room full of children exploring, creating, trying new things, and really just immersing themselves in the joy of art."

That vision is blooming and at the beginning of August, the community of Howard County can be part of that vision.

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Old but gold: At 39, Verlander makes push for Cy Young award

Justin Verlander has a little more gray in his hair and stubble these days. Despite those details — and the fact he pitches for the Houston Astros now — it's sometimes hard to tell if this is 2009 or 2022.

The ageless 39-year-old Verlander continues to make a case to win his third Cy Young Award. He now has a 13-3 record and 1.86 ERA after giving up just one run over seven innings in a 3-1 victory over the Mariners.

His stellar season is even more amazing considering he missed nearly two full years after Tommy John surgery, starting just once in the abbreviated 2020 season before missing the entire 2021 campaign. But the nine-time All-Star has come back better than ever, even touching 99 mph in his seventh — and final — inning against the Mariners.

"I feel like I haven't been able to let it go like that in a long time," Verlander said on Saturday.

Verlander's push for a Cy Young Award is fairly rare for a player approaching 40 years old. Roger Clemens won at 42 back in 2004 when he won the award for the Astros, while Gaylord Perry was 40 when he won in 1978. Early Wynn was 39 in 1959.

Verlander will have plenty of competition for this year's AL Cy Young Award. Tampa Bay's Shane Bieber (10-3, 1.71 ERA) and Toronto's Alex Manoah (11-4, 2.24) also have impressive resumes.

BIG HITTIN' BLUE JAYS

The box score of the week came from Fenway Park, where the Blue Jays embarrassed the Red Sox in a 28-5 win that featured Raimel Tapia's unlikely inside-the-park grand slam.

If any team was going to score 28 runs this season, it makes sense the Blue Jays would do it.

The Blue Jays have MLB's highest team batting average with a .266 mark and are fourth in runs (460), sixth in home runs (124) and third in OPS (.769)

SEND IN THE SCOUTS

The hottest ticket last weekend — at least for MLB scouts — might have been in Phoenix, where two last-place teams were playing.

The Washington Nationals and Arizona Diamondbacks both have attractive candidates to be moved at the Aug. 2 trade deadline. The big name is obviously Washington slugger Juan Soto, who is still just 23 years old, doesn't hit free agency until 2024 and is still just \$440 million turned down a \$440 million from the Nationals earlier in the week.

Several of Soto's teammates, including sluggers Nelson Cruz and Josh Bell, along with relievers Steve Cishek and Carl Edwards Jr., could also be on the move.

But the D-backs are full of trade pieces, too. Veteran outfielder David Peralta, first baseman Christian Walker, All-Star reliever Joe Mantiplay and left-hander Madison Bumgarner all might make sense for a contender to grab.

TRIVIA TIME

In Toronto's 28-5 win over Boston, Lourdes Gurriel Jr. became one of dozens in MLB history to have six hits in a nine-inning game.

But only one player has seven hits in a nine-inning game in the modern era. Who is he?

THE RACE FOR 200

Will any pitcher hit 200 innings this season? Almost certainly. Miami's Sandy Alcantara is the most likely candidate and the closest thing to a true workhorse in the big leagues. He's on pace to pitch about 230 innings, which would be the most in MLB since 2016 when David Price hit 230 innings with the Red Sox.

About a dozen pitchers around the league could reach 200 by the end of the season, including Philadelphia's Aaron Nola, Atlanta's Max Fried, St. Louis' Miles Mikolas, New York's Gerrit Cole and Toronto's Manoah.

That would be improvement over 2021, when only four pitchers hit the 200-inning mark.

It wasn't that long ago that 200 innings in a season was quite common. Back in 2010, 45 pitchers hit the mark.

Sydney McLaughlin anchors US on record-setting day at worlds

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — It only made sense that Sydney McLaughlin would run the last, victorious lap of world championships for the United States.

It only made sense she would win that race by a lot.

America's burgeoning speed star turned a close 4x400-meter relay into a laugh on the anchor leg Sunday, putting the final stamp on the first worlds held in the U.S. and delivering America's record 33rd medal of the meet.

It was the 13th gold for the U.S., one short of the all-time mark.

"We're deep," McLaughlin said. "We have a lot of really amazing athletes and we all put our 100% best out there every time we perform."

After taking the baton from Britton Wilson, McLaughlin turned a .73-second lead into a 2.95-second blowout over Jamaica, adding this burst of speed to the world record she set two nights earlier in the 400 hurdles, when she finished in 50.68.

This one was especially sweet, as it also marked the 14th and final world gold for 36-year-old Allyson Felix, who came out of retirement to run in the preliminary of the 4x400 and, so, gets a medal. She finishes her career with a record 20 world medals, overall.

"She came back yesterday and I was like, I mean, if we're gonna go do it, we might as well do it big," McLaughlin said. "And I'm really happy for her amazing career."

The U.S. team, also featuring Talitha Diggs and Abby Steiner, who was part of the winning 4x100 relay team the night before, won the women's race in 3 minutes, 17.79 seconds.

The 33 medals were three more than the U.S. collected in 2017, and two more than East Germany won in 1987.

Other records fell, too — in the very first and very last action of the last session at hot-and-sunny Hayward Stadium, the 25,000-seat gem built at University of Oregon to bring the worlds to Eugene.

Nigeria's Tobi Amusan opened the evening by setting the record for the 100-meter hurdles in the semifinals: 12.12 seconds. She came back about 90 minutes later to win the gold medal. Her medal-race time was actually faster — 12.06 — but the wind was too strong, so that mark doesn't go in the books.

"When I watched the record, I was like 'Whoa, who did that?'" Amusan said.

And after McLaughlin was done with her last lap, pole vaulter Armand Duplantis of Sweden cleared 6.21 meters (20 feet, 4 1/2 inches) to best his world record by .01.

"It's like mania, and you're just kind of going crazy," Duplantis said of his reaction. "I barely remember the moment."

As was the case through most of these 10 days, America's medals came from every corner of the track — and the field.

Athing Mu said she struggled in capturing gold in the 800, busting through the two laps in 1:56.30 — a .08 margin over Britain's Keely Hodgkinson.

"I'm just glad I could make it to the line and finish the race," she said. "And thank God I won gold."

The 20-year-old Mu is now the Olympic and world champion at that distance and, along with McLaughlin, part of a bright future for the United States with the Paris Olympics now two years away.

In between, a sprinter named Champion — Champion Allison — anchored the men's 4x400 to an easy win for medal No. 32. The U.S. won in 2:56.17 for a 2.41-second margin over Jamaica.

Another medal went to U.S. pole vaulter Christopher Nilsen, who cleared 5.94 meters (19 feet, 5 3/4

inches), to clinch silver, then stepped aside to see what Duplantis would do.

The Olympic champion known as "Mondo" missed on his first attempt at the record, then waited for the relay, then got the crowd clapping in rhythm for him and cleared the bar.

Last year at the Olympics in Tokyo, the U.S. men got shut out of the sprints, leading to some questions about what was wrong.

Answer: Not much. With Fred Kerley and Noah Lyles leading the way, the men swept the sprints earlier in the week, and Ryan Crouser led a sweep in shot put. The 4x100 silver-medal relay team was messy — nothing new there — but it was a blip.

In all, the men walked away with four more medals than the women during this 10-day meet.

"It kind of fueled us to make a mark and demonstrate that we are Team USA, instead of people doubting us," Michael Norman, who added the relay gold to his win in the 400 flat, said of the men's reset after Tokyo. "I think we really stepped up based on that."

In other action, Kevin Mayer of France won the decathlon, adding this to his title in 2017.

And the 5,000-meter title went to Jakob Ingebrigtsen of Norway, who finished in 13:09.24 in a special race.

That was the last race the legendary Steve Prefontaine of Oregon ran before a fatal car accident in Eugene in 1975.

It's a city brimming with tributes to "Pre," and in many ways, track's biggest event, the world championships, ended up in this college town of 170,000 thanks to the tracks he laid down a half-century ago.

"This is probably the best place I could have won it," Ingebrigtsen said.

All those U.S. medal holders would certainly agree.

Ode to Pre: Ingebrigtsen takes 5K in Prefontaine's backyard

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — They all had stories about how the distance runner known as "Pre" gave them motivation. How they considered it an honor to race in his backyard, in his signature event, at one of the biggest track meets in the world.

The presence of the late Steve Prefontaine looms large around these parts. This is the house that Pre built (even if Hayward Field has been renovated and resurfaced). The 5,000 meters was Pre's race.

Jakob Ingebrigtsen of Norway ran the final at world championships Sunday in a way Pre might have done it himself — racing not only to win, but to dictate the way the race would

be run.

"I couldn't think of a better place to win than here," Ingebrigtsen said after he won in 13 minutes, 9.24 seconds.

Everywhere in Eugene, there are reminders of Prefontaine, who died in a car accident in 1975 at 24. There's Pre's Trail, a bark-covered loop that meanders aside the Willamette River, where runners of every ability flock. There's Pre's Rock, the marker on the side of the road where he died that has become a pilgrimage for runners. Fans have been wearing shirts with Pre's image — including ones featuring his distinctive bushy mustache — all week.

There are movies about his life. Most notably, "Prefontaine," star-

ring Jared Leto as Pre, and "Without Limits," featuring Billy Crudup, that came out about the same time.

Sam Parsons didn't medal in the 5,000. The runner from Delaware who represents Germany finished last in the final. But he still felt like a rock star for one reason — racing in the place Pre made famous.

"I wish he could have been here watching," said Parsons, who can quote the Prefontaine movie "Without Limits" line by line. "I wish I could have shook his hand and taken a picture with him. I hope he'd be proud of me."

Growing up, Parsons had posters on his wall of Prefontaine. His favorite was the one of just Pre's eyes that read: "Where are all the rock star run-

ners?"

Parsons decided to be one.

"I was a 5-foot-nothing kid from middle-of-nowhere Delaware and out of place. But Pre made this sport cool for me," Parsons said. "It made me want to pursue it. ... He made it so you can talk to girls and have swagger — be the guy on campus."

American Grant Fisher would watch Prefontaine movies before cross country meets on a portable DVD player.

Just for extra inspiration.

"He started the running craze and running boom back in his day," said Fisher, who finished sixth. "It's just cool to be running the same event as him. He laid the groundwork for this."

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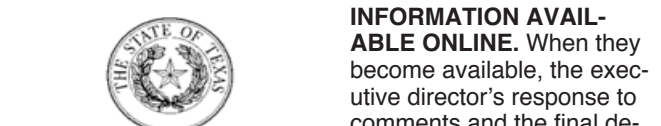

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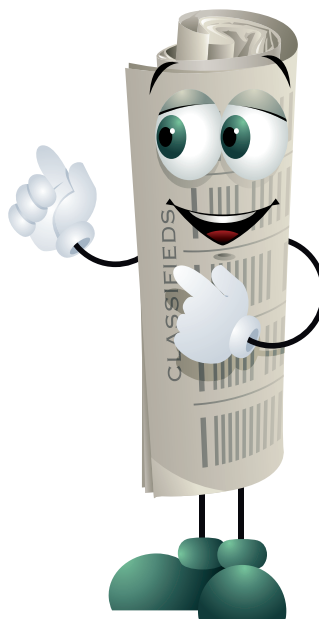

The prime directive

South dealer.
Neither side vulnerable.

Opening lead — king of hearts.

In political novels and spy thrillers, the "prime directive" is an inviolable decree that provides the motivation for the main characters. Anyone who deviates from the prime directive is a good bet not to survive to the final chapter.

Bridge also has a prime directive: declarer must do everything possible to fulfill his contract. Failure to abide by this principle can lead to the demise of many contracts that would have succeeded with proper play.

Take this case where South got to

three notrump after West had over-called in hearts. Declarer held up on the first two hearts, took the third with the ace, crossed to dummy with a spade and tried the diamond finesse. West won with the king and cashed two hearts to sink the contract.

South was guilty of playing more by habit than by reason. The correct play is to lay down the ace of diamonds rather than attempt the finesse. In the actual deal, West's king falls under the ace, and South has an easy 10 tricks.

While this line of play may seem to be based on a peek at West's cards, there is in fact irrefutable justification for this approach. In the given case, declarer cannot lose the contract by cashing the ace if East has the king of diamonds. Even if a trick is lost to the king in the East hand, South will still have nine tricks in the form of three spades, four diamonds, a club and a heart.

This being so, declarer should play the diamond ace to guard against the possibility that West was dealt the singleton king. If the king does not appear, a second diamond is led. If East has the king, nine tricks are assured, since East has no heart to return; if West has the king, the contract could not be made no matter how South played.

Today in History: July 26, Hillary Clinton is nominated

Today is Tuesday, July 26, the 207th day of 2022. There are 158 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On July 26, 2016, Hillary Clinton became the first woman to be nominated for president by a major political party at the Democratic National Convention in Philadelphia.

On this date:

In 1775, the Continental Congress established a Post Office and appointed Benjamin Franklin its Postmaster-General.

In 1847, the western African country of Liberia, founded by freed American slaves, declared its independence.

In 1863, Sam Houston, former president of the Republic of Texas, died in Huntsville at age 70.

In 1945, the Potsdam Declaration warned Imperial Japan to unconditionally surrender, or face "prompt and utter destruction." Winston Churchill resigned as Britain's prime minister after his Conservatives were soundly defeated by the Labour Party; Clement Attlee succeeded him.

In 1947, President Harry S. Truman signed the National Security Act, which reorganized America's armed forces as the National Military Establishment and created the Central Intelligence Agency.

In 1953, Fidel Castro began his revolt against Fulgencio Batista (fool-HEN'-see-oh bah-TEES'-tah) with an unsuccessful attack on an army barracks in eastern Cuba. (Castro ousted Batista in 1959.)

In 1956, the Italian liner Andrea Doria sank off New England, some 11 hours after colliding with the Swedish liner Stockholm; at least 51 people died, from both vessels.

In 1971, Apollo 15 was launched from Cape Kennedy on America's fourth successful manned mission to the moon.

In 1990, President George H.W. Bush signed the Americans with Disabilities Act.

In 2002, the Republican-led House voted, 295-132, to create an enormous Homeland Security Department in the biggest government reorganization in decades.

In 2013, Ariel Castro, the man who'd imprisoned three women in his Cleveland home, subjecting them to a decade of rapes and beatings, pleaded guilty to 937 counts in a deal to avoid the death penalty. (Castro later committed suicide in prison.)

In 2020, a procession with the casket of the late U.S. Rep. John Lewis crossed the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Alabama, where Lewis and other civil rights marchers were beaten 55 years earlier. Authorities declared a riot in Portland, Oregon, after protesters breached a fence surrounding the city's federal courthouse; thousands had gathered for another night of protests over the killing of George Floyd and the presence of federal agents.

Ten years ago: The White House said President Barack Obama would not push for stricter gun laws, one day after his impassioned remarks about the need to keep assault weapons off the streets.

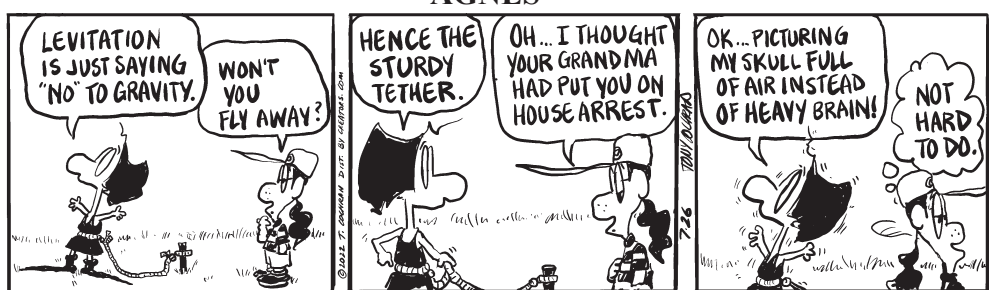
