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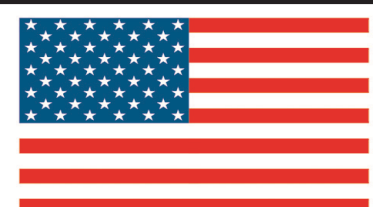

Lewis files to seek local U.S. Rep seat Lubbock Independent challenging Arrington in November

Nathan Lewis (I - Lubbock) has filed to challenge local District 19 U.S. Representative Jodey Arrington in the November General Election. Lewis, a Nebraska native, attended the University of Nebraska – Lincoln studying Electrical Engineering and other subjects, and interned for nine months at Cooper Nuclear Station near Brownville, Neb. Moving to Lubbock in 2006, he worked at the South Plains Food Bank Garden and Apple Orchard for 11 years, while implementing his own small-scale solar setup, and trialing local growing methods and other sustainable practices. Since leaving the Food Bank, Lewis has focused most of his attention on

politics, he said in a press release issued Tuesday. “I certainly can’t offer you the show that someone like Donald Trump can, or AOC or any other larger than life politician,” Lewis says on his campaign website (www.nathanlewis4congress.com). “I most certainly would be a boring politician mostly interested in analyzing legislation with my staff and spending time listening to constituents and anyone who wants to talk.” Also on the website, Lewis, although running as an Independent candidate, claims to most often vote for Democrat candidates. “A certain number of people reading this just want to know – Democrat or Republican? So, not to waste anyone’s time, I’ve almost always voted for Demo-

crats; not always... but mostly. And my tendency to vote against Republicans has grown stronger because of the almost complete backing they have given to Donald Trump in word and deed,” Lewis says on the site. Lewis will oppose Arrington, who was elected to represent the 19th Congressional District in 2017. Arrington, raised in Plainview, is a Texas Tech graduate who worked for then-Governor George W. Bush in Austin and as Chief of Staff of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) and as Vice-Chancellor of the Texas Tech University System and as president of healthcare innovation company Scott Laboratories in Lubbock. In Congress, Arrington has served on the Agriculture, Budget, and Veterans Affairs committees, and since 2019, the Committee on Ways and Means, and since 2021, the Joint Economic Committee.

Coahoma ISD to set proposed tax rate Thursday

The Coahoma ISD school board will discuss proposing a tax rate and setting a date for a public hearing on the 2022-23 tax rate and budget when it meets Thursday. The meeting will be held at 6 p.m. Thursday in the Elementary Board Room at 400 Ramsey St. in Coahoma. Following the meeting’s roll call, establishment of quorum, call to order and opening ceremony, the board will hold an open forum. Next, the board will consider approval of the meeting’s consent agenda, consisting of several items including: Approval of previous minutes from the June 13 regular meeting and the June 27 special meeting; approval of budget amendments; revision of the Employee Handbook; approval of Coahoma ISD board district goals for the 2022-23 school year; setting cafeteria lunch prices for 2022-23; approval of the Texas Teacher Evaluation and Support System (T-TESS) and the Texas Principal Evaluation and Support System (T-PESS); approval of T-TESS appraisers; approval of Region 18 Purchase Co-Op; approval of the Student Handbook; consideration and possible approval of the purchase of cafeteria equipment; approval of the updated Return to School Plan; approval of the Student Code of Conduct; approval of an update to GKC Policy, regarding community relations; and approval of Policy Update

119 recommended by the Texas Association of School Boards (TASB). The board will next deliberate and consider adoption of a proposed tax rate based on certified taxable values, for the district’s required Truth in Taxation publication; and consider setting the next school board meeting as the date for a public hearing on the tax rate and proposed Coahoma ISD budget. Next, the board will hold a budget workshop on funds the district has received through the Texas Education Association’s Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) program. The board will then handle informational items including: Enrollment and the Americans With Disabilities Act (ADA)/Weighted Americans With Disabilities Act (WADA) report; financial reports; and board meeting dates. Superintendent Brad Cox will next give his report, including information on bond projects in the district. The board will then adjourn into executive session to discuss personnel issues. Any action stemming from the closed session will be handled when the board returns to open session. After the closed session, the board will consider approval of employment issues including resignations and employment contracts for the 2022-23 school year, before the meeting is adjourned.

The only item on the meeting’s Consent Agenda is approval of the regular Board Meeting minutes from July 14. Action Items on the agenda include

consideration of Texas Teacher Evaluation and Support System (T-TESS) District Appraisers and the 2022-23 Appraisal Calendar; deliberation and possible action on proposing a tax rate, and setting a date for a public hearing concerning the tax rate and budget for 2022-23. Following the Action Items, the meeting will be adjourned.

New Greater Roadrunner Conservation License Plate available for Texas drivers

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) launched the long-awaited greater roadrunner conservation license plate today. The plate will raise money to help support and expand wildlife viewing programs and habitat conservation work in Texas. “The greater roadrunner is an iconic image for Texans that can be seen in every county of the state and is one of the toughest birds around—it’s even known for eating rattlesnakes,” said Shelly Plante, TPWD’s Nature Tourism manager. “It’s also one of the few birds people recognize and remember the first time they see it, given its unique profile—all of which makes it the per-

fect symbol for Texas wildlife viewing and nature tourism.” The public was invited to vote for their favorite design for the new roadrunner license plate last April and the winning design is on the new plate. The design shows the roadrunner in a proud, confident stance, a signature look for this Texas bird. Texas wildlife photographer Hector Astorga has generously donated the image appearing on the plate. In 2020, Hector was named one of the “We Will Not Be Tamed” ambassadors for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Foundation. “Wildlife photography opens people’s eyes to what we need to protect,” Astorga says. “That leads to

conservation and preserving the habitat that these wild creatures need to survive.”

Funding from sales of the roadrunner conservation license plate will help support and expand programs such as the Great Texas Wildlife Trails, Texas Paddling Trails and Great Texas Birding Classic, making it easier to find great places for Texans to view wildlife and enjoy nature.

The TPWD Conservation License Plate Program has raised \$10.5 million in the last 22 years for wildlife and habitat conservation in Texas, according to program marketing lead, Janis Johnson. The 11 conservation plate designs include a horned lizard, largemouth bass, hummingbird, white-tailed deer, bluebonnet, desert bighorn sheep and others. These plates benefit Texas fisheries and rivers, state parks, big game research and management and non-game wildlife species management. All TPWD conservation specialty plates cost \$30 a year, with \$22 supporting various programs and

efforts. Plates can be purchased for vehicles, RVs/travel trailers, trailers and motorcycles.

“The conservation license plate program creates license plates that people enjoy and want to buy while also knowing their plate fee goes to the worthy cause of helping fund conservation projects in Texas,” added Plante.

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Mariners get back to winning formula, hold off Rangers 4-3

SEATTLE (AP) — In the midst of their July surge back into playoff contention, it's become clear the Seattle Mariners have figured out how to succeed in one-run games.

On Monday night, it was a formula of good starting pitching, key baserunning and some more hot hitting from Ty France.

"It really ends up defining your season finding ways to win games like tonight," Seattle manager Scott Servais said.

France launched his 13th home run as part of a three-hit night, Cal Raleigh added an RBI single and the Mariners rebounded from a rough weekend with a 4-3 victory over the Texas Rangers.

Erik Swanson escaped a ninth-inning jam and Seattle won for the 15th time in 18 games, a stretch of success interrupted over the weekend when the Mariners were swept at home by AL West-leading Houston following a 14-game winning streak. But Texas was a welcome visitor as the Mariners won their sixth straight over the Rangers and improved to 9-2 against them this season.

Seattle also won its eighth straight game decided by one run and is 22-12 on the season. The last time the Mariners lost a one-run game was June 26 against the Los Angeles Angels.

"We play so many of them that when the time comes we don't fold into that pressure," France said.

France singled in his first two at-bats, but it was his solo shot to center field in the fifth inning off starter Glenn Otto that gave the Mariners a 3-1 lead. France has homered in three of his past five games, including Seattle's last one before the All-Star break when he went deep off Otto (4-7) in Texas.

Raleigh's RBI single in the fourth drove in France, and the Mariners added another run in the inning when Eugenio Suárez scampered home on a wild pitch. Carlos Santana added an RBI groundout in the seventh.

Seattle starter Chris Flexen won his fifth straight decision and extended his streak of allowing three runs or fewer to 11 consecutive starts.

Flexen (7-8) pitched six innings, giving up two runs and three hits. He es-

caped a bases-loaded jam in the third with only one run allowed and yielded Adolis García's 18th homer on the first pitch of the sixth.

"The thing with (Flexen), he's never going to wow you. He's just always going to keep you in the game," Servais said. "And I appreciate that. I think every manager appreciates those type of guys."

Mariners reliever Diego Castillo ran into trouble in the ninth. Nathaniel Lowe led off with his 14th homer. Leody Taveras followed with a single and Kole Calhoun walked. Castillo struck out Ezequiel Duran before Swanson retired Josh Smith and Marcus Semien for his second save.

"We've got to continue to have conversations and figure out OK, there's a lot of little plays in there that we have to make," Rangers manager Chris Woodward said. "They made some plays, we didn't. They made some pitches, we didn't. We had opportunities at the end. If we're going to win games, we've got to find a way to get it done there."

Otto allowed three runs and seven hits over 5 1/3 innings, but has not earned a victory since beating the Mariners on June 4.

Rangers: RHP Dane Dunning is expected to be activated from the injured list to start Tuesday. Dunning has been out since July 11 due to an impingement in his right ankle.

Mariners: Servais was hopeful All-Star CF Julio Rodríguez (wrist) would be back in the lineup Tuesday. Rodríguez was expected to increase his baseball activity and take swings before Monday's game to see how the wrist responds.

... LF Jesse Winker was out of the lineup after spraining his right ankle in Sunday's loss to Houston. The injury isn't considered serious and Winker is expected back Tuesday. ... OF Mitch Haniger (ankle) will have his rehab assignment transferred to Triple-A Tacoma starting Tuesday. Haniger played last weekend for Class A Everett. He has been out since late April and said he still needs significantly more at-bats before he'd be ready to rejoin the major league club. "I think I just need quantity right now. Just playing," Haniger said. "I can't tell you when that will be."

Tony Kemp homers, hits 2-run 2B as A's beat streaking Astros

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Adam Oller sat at his locker a nervous wreck as he watched the stressful final few outs on a corner clubhouse TV, elbows on knees and knees bouncing into the air.

Lou Trivino eventually finished it, and Oller finally had his first major league win, more than four months in the making.

"I'm glad it's over," the 27-year-old said of the weight off his shoulders, the sheer relief, special game ball ready to be sent to mom.

Tony Kemp homered and hit a two-run double, Skye Bolt added a two-run shot, and the Oakland Athletics held off the red-hot Houston Astros 7-5 on Monday night then celebrated Oller afterward with a beer shower.

Oller (1-3) struck out four over five innings, allowing four runs — three earned — on four hits and earned the victory in his sixth start and fourth stint of the year with Oakland that included some relief appearances.

He arrived in the trade in March that sent ace Chris Bassitt to the Mets. During one return to Triple-A Las Vegas, Oller was told to only throw fastballs until he rediscovered his rhythm.

"It's unreal," said Oller, who was born just outside Houston and still lives in the area. "It only took four months but we got it."

"It goes back to all the stuff in between, all the ups

and downs in the minor leagues, all the long hours in the offseason working to finally get to this point. It goes to trusting your stuff. That's kind of been something I've dealt with in the past, not being as confident in myself, thinking I don't deserve to be there."

Elvis Andrus added an insurance RBI single in the eighth for Oakland before closer Trivino surrendered a solo homer to Chas McCormick, then finished for his ninth save by striking out Jeremy Peña with runners on first and second.

AL West-leading Houston took its first defeat after a 5-0 start since the All-Star break. The Astros are an AL-best 28-10 dating to June 12 and are now 32-17 against the AL West.

"The bottom of their order, 7 and 8, Bolt and Kemp, they beat us by themselves tonight," manager Dusty Baker said. "We've certainly got to do better against them."

Peña homered in the first for Houston before Kemp's tying drive leading off the third against right-hander Jake Odorizzi (4-3), who had been 4-0 over his previous seven starts but dealt with a blister this time that bothered him.

Yordan Alvarez came home on a double-steal in the sixth and Peña doubled and scored on pitcher Domingo Acevedo's throwing error on a pickoff attempt as Houston pulled within 6-4.

Oakland's Chad Pinder made his third career start at first base and first since 2019.

Astros: LF Michael Brantley, sidelined since June 27 with right shoulder discomfort, continues baseball activity but it's unclear when he will begin swinging again. ... All-Star DH Alvarez returned to the lineup after sitting out Sunday's series finale with a sore right hand. Baker hopes to get him in the outfield again soon.

Athletics: RHP Dany Jiménez, who went on the 15-day injured list June 21 with a strained pitching shoulder, will throw about 20 pitches in live batting practice Tuesday. ... INF Jonah Bride came off the 10-day injured list and 1B/OF Seth Brown was placed on the paternity list. ... Oakland also recalled LHP Sam Selman from Triple-A Las Vegas and optioned RHP David McKay to Las Vegas.

A's second-round draft pick Henry Bolte was in uniform and took batting practice a day before reporting to Arizona to begin his minor league career. Manager Mark Kotsay likes his swagger already at just 18.

"As a big A's guy, Rickey Henderson was stealing bases all the time. I might not be as fast as him, he's a little special, but playing that type of way, I'm going to run out a hard 90 (feet), I'm going to steal bags," Bolte said. "Most of the time I'm going back in the locker room with a dirty jersey, that's how I like to play."

ALL ABOARD

Aaron Judge and Pete Alonso swing away as the Subway Series starts up at Citi Field with both New York teams in first place.

Jordan Montgomery (3-2, 3.24 ERA) pitches for the Yankees, who own the best record in the majors at 66-31 and a whopping 12 1/2-game lead over Toronto in the AL East.

Taijuan Walker (7-2, 2.55) starts for the Mets, whose once-formidable NL East edge over Atlanta is down to two games. Walker is 4-0 with a 1.80 ERA in his last seven outings.

Judge tops the majors with 37 homers and has 81 RBIs for the Yankees. Alonso leads the big leagues with 82 RBIs and has hit 25 home runs.

The teams play twice this week at the Mets' home, then meet for two more games in late August at Yankee Stadium.

PAPI POWER

The Boston Red Sox will honor David Ortiz in a pregame tribute at Fenway Park, two days after he was inducted into the Hall of Fame.

Ortiz pins will be given to fans as they enter the ballpark for the game against Cleveland.

Big Papi helped the Red Sox win three World Series championships. In 14 years with the Red Sox, Ortiz hit 500 homers, 17 of them in the postseason.

Ortiz was cheered by fans chanting his name and wearing his No. 34 jersey during Sunday's ceremonies in Cooperstown, New York, about a four-hour drive from Fenway.

Zunino, a 31-year-old catcher, hasn't played since June 9 because of left shoulder problems. He's out for the season because of thoracic outlet syndrome surgery, according to a team spokesman.

Opening lead — nine of clubs.

Let's say you arrive at four hearts on the bidding shown and West leads a club, won by East with the jack. East cashes the king of clubs and then shifts to the four of diamonds. This is a disappointing development. Had East led a third club, you would have been certain to make the contract.

After ruffing high, you would draw two rounds of trump, cash the A-K of spades, ruff a spade, play a trump to dummy's queen

and lead the jack of diamonds. West would win the trick, as expected, but would then have to return a diamond or hand you a ruff-and-discard. Either way, you would be home free.

But when East shifts to a diamond at trick three, that plan goes up in smoke. You know from the bidding, as well as the size of East's diamond, that the four is a singleton, so that if you finesse, West will win and return a diamond to put you down one. You also know that rising with the ace of diamonds will leave you with two apparently unavoidable diamond losers — again down one.

But after mulling this over for a while, you suddenly realize there's a way out. You can still execute an endplay, though of an entirely different sort.

So you win the diamond with the ace, draw trump, cash the A-K of spades, ruff a spade, cross to dummy with a trump and lead the queen of clubs. When East covers the queen with the ace, you discard a diamond, deliberately losing a club trick you didn't have to lose.

This forces East to return a spade or a club, on which you discard your last diamond as dummy ruffs. The club trick you didn't have to lose yields two tricks in return.

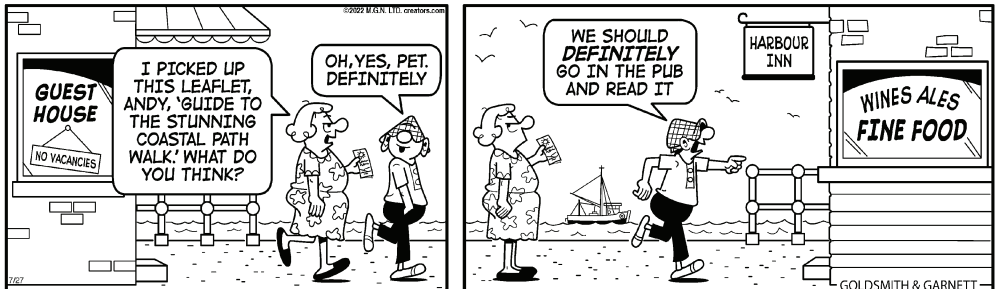
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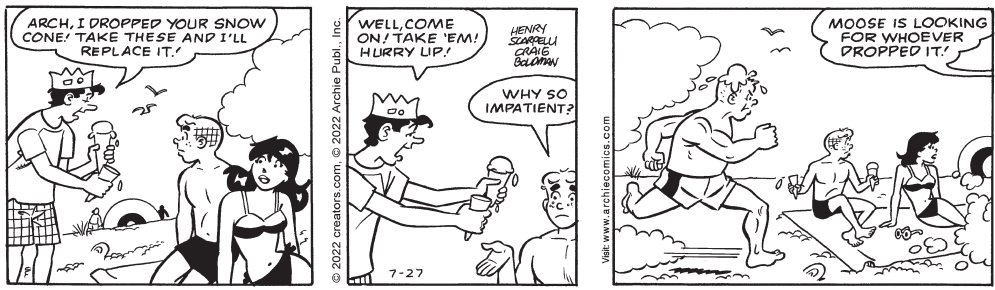
