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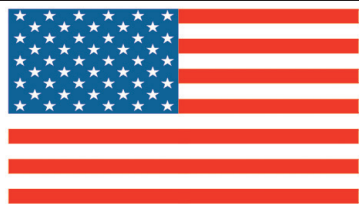

Council office space on tonight’s agenda

Should Big Spring City Council members be provided office space by the city? While the council under the administration of former Mayor Shannon Thomason approved a rule stating “No councilmember shall be issued a permanent or semi-permanent office in any city building,” the current council will consider an ordinance repealing that restriction when it meets this evening.

The council will meet at 5:30 p.m. at the Council Chambers, 307 E. Fourth Street.

No explanation for the proposed repeal is listed in the meeting’s agenda, beyond “Whereas, the City Council finds it necessary to repeal this section of the Big Spring City Code.

The meeting will begin with the call to order, invocation, and pledges to the U.S. and Texas flags, followed by public comment.

Next, City Manager Todd Darden will present his regular report, including items regarding: Large Item Pickup for District 2, scheduled Aug. 17; budget work sessions scheduled Aug. 15-18; updates on Purple Heart signage, the Water Office move, the city’s seal coat project, and the annual closing for the summer of the Russ McEwen Aquatic Center; and the 988 Suicide Hotline number.

The meeting’s Consent Agenda consists of three items which will be decided with a single vote, unless members of the council opt to remove one or more items for individual focus:

Approval of the regular council meeting minutes of July 26; final reading of an ordinance authorizing the City Manager to create two disabled parking spots on the west side of the Settles Hotel; and final reading of an ordinance rezoning 1801 W. Interstate 20 from Single Family (SF-2) to Heavy Industrial (HI).

Vouchers to be approved at the meeting include \$254,277.16 for July 28 and \$217,944.05 for Aug. 4, as well as manual checks and drafts totaling \$635,013.57.

The council will consider four bid items, including: Consideration and possible action on awarding sale of tax properties by Texas Communities Group; awarding Parcel 4754, 1111 Runnels St., to Cinthia Quezada and Fortino Quezada Camargo for \$5,300; and awarding Parcels 10037, 206 N. Nolan St., and 860, 1204 W. Second St., to Rosa Elia Avila of Midland for \$2,000 and \$1,150, respectively.

In New Business, the council will consider three ordinances and one resolution, including: An ordinance amending the 2021-22 budget by increasing the Utility Fund by \$56,000 to install a six-inch water line at Roy Anderson Sports Complex; the ordinance regarding offices for City Council members mentioned earlier; an ordinance making council members “second alternates” to the Zoning Board of Appeals, to serve when both the appointed member and the first alternate is not present; and a resolution approving a negotiated settlement between Atmos Energy Corp. and a committee of cities in West Texas served by Atmos. The settlement reduces a local rate increase from a total of \$8.77 million requested by Atmos to \$6.72 million. According to a memo included with the meeting’s agenda, the increase will raise an average local customer’s

bill by \$3.36 per month.

Also in New Business, the council will consider a memorandum of understanding concerning a future services contract with The Geo Group Inc., the company that operated two prisons in Big Spring until Governor Greg Abbott canceled government contracts with privately-run prisons.

The council will also:

- Consider a second change order on the 2021 Water Line Replacement Project. The change will add \$76,000 to the cost of the project for an additional 400 feet of 12-inch water line replacement.

- Discuss the city’s FY 2022-23 property tax rate.

- Discuss amendments to the city’s policies, procedures and ordinances concerning the operation of the Big Spring Animal Shelter and the animal population of Big Spring.

- Discuss the qualifications, appointments, policies, procedures and possible consolidation of city boards and committees.

- Consider appointments to city boards and committees, including:

- McMahon/Wrinkle Aviation Advisory Board – appoint Adriel Saldivar (nominated by Diane Yanez, District 2);

- Zoning Board of Adjustments – remove Erin Yeats, appoint Mark Sheedy (nominated by Maury Smith, District 6).

The council members will each have an opportunity to give input on matters they deem important, before the council adjourns into executive session to discuss litigation. Any action to be taken on items discussed in closed session will be voted on when the council returns to open session.

Following the executive session and any business arising from it, the meeting will be adjourned.

complete before submitting their entry.

“We had so many people tell us how much fun they had and how grateful they were for this opportunity,” Debbye ValVerde, Big Spring Area Chamber of Commerce Executive Director, said. “This was all about highlighting local businesses and having a good time and by the sound of it that is exactly what happened.”

The evening began with mingling and refreshments as the crowd waited for the big announcement. This year there were 104 people or groups who started the Amazing Shopping Race at Lula Blu Boutique and 61 contest entries who visited every stop and roadblock along the way. At the end of it all, there could only be three winners. As the night drew to an end the top 3 were announced: Third Place was Danelle Castillo; Second Place was Ruby Bruns and the overall First Place winner was Mercedes Rodriguez who claimed prizes valued at \$3,000.

“Our top three winners received an arrangement of gifts all donated by local businesses in Howard County. There were scholarships included to Howard College, items from local boutiques, gift cards

and so much more,” ValVerde said. “We even had businesses who weren’t on our stop list but wanted to contribute to the prizes, such as Big Spring Employees Federal Credit Union, H-E-B, Oncor, SMMC, and Star Dodge.”

According to ValVerde, the Amazing Shopping Race is an idea that came from local business owner Devine Martin last year as a way to highlight local business. There were 18 stops along the way this year, including many returning participating stops such as Big Mikes Farm Store and other Big Mike locations, Dazzling Decor, Expedition Royalty, Howard College, Inspirations, Queens of the Dude Ranch and Splurge. New businesses joined in this year including DL Clothing who recently opened a few months ago, Fash X Cas and Just Peachy, Too, new businesses Big Star Shooters and OC Farm and Ranch joined in drawing the participants out to explore the businesses in Coahoma. There was even an opportunity to look at new furniture while making the stop at Mitchell’s Furniture or gathering information about our community from the Big Spring Chamber office and United Way office. The goal was to help local businesses get back on their feet and encourage shopping local, supporting local as Covid restrictions were lifted.

“While shopping is fun and you really don’t need a reason to do it, the main reason we put this to-

gether and continued with it this year was to get people into local businesses and show off what Howard County has to offer,” she said. “When it comes to shopping there is no need to travel outside our community. We want to build commerce within our community and support one another.”

Each of the participating businesses came up with a task to be completed before the participant could receive the next clue for the next location. There were some stops that served only as a roadblock, but still provided an opportunity for the community to see a business they may not have visited before.

“Thank you to all the businesses who participated. Thank you for coming up with tasks and for supporting each other and our community,” ValVerde said. “Now that summer is winding down and the Amazing Shopping Race is over we want to encourage everyone to keep an eye out for more information on our Holiday Bingo event set to begin in November.”

gold in *And the Devil Makes Five*-The O’Malleys of Texas series Bk 1 (LP W RIC D) by Dusty Richards. Their mission: to steal the train’s shipment of powerful explosives. Their goal: to assassinate Mexico’s legendary resistance leader Benito Juarez. As a lifelong patriot himself, Joe O’Malley understands the struggle for freedom. As a proud Texan, he knows the importance of fighting for our land and your liberty. But as patriarch of the O’Malley clan, he also believes that his family comes first and any outsider who brings their war to his turf will have to face another deadly force of resistance named the O’Malleys.

An unambitious twenty-two-year-old, Darren lives in a Bed-Stuy brownstone with his mother, who wants nothing more than to see him live up to his potential as the valedictorian of Bronx Science in *Black Buck* (F ASK M) by Mateo Askaripour. But Darren is content working at Starbucks in the lobby of a Midtown office building, hanging out with his girlfriend, Soraya, and eating his mother’s home-cooked meals. All that changes when a chance encounter with Rhett Daniels, the silver-tongued CEO of Sumwun, NYC’s hottest tech startup, results in an exclusive invitation for Darren to join an elite sales team on the thirty-sixth floor. After enduring a “hell week” of training, Darren, the only Black person in the company, reimagines himself as “Buck,” a

ruthless salesman unrecognizable to his friends and family. But when things turn tragic at home and Buck feels he’s hit rock bottom, he begins to hatch a plan to help young people of color infiltrate America’s sales force, setting off a chain of events that forever changes the game.

Helen’s idyllic life—handsome architect husband, gorgeous Victorian house, and cherished baby on the way (after years of trying)—begins to change the day she attends her first prenatal class and meets Rachel, an unpredictable single mother-to-be in “Greenwich Park” (F FAU K) by Katherine Faulkner. Rachel doesn’t seem very maternal: she smokes, drinks, and professes little interest in parenthood. Still, Helen is drawn to her. Maybe Rachel just needs a friend. And to be honest, Helen’s a bit lonely herself. At least Rachel is fun to be with. She makes Helen laugh, invites her confidences, and distracts her from her fears. But her increasingly erratic behavior is unsettling. And Helen’s not the only one who’s noticed. Her friends and family begin to suspect that her strange new friend may be linked to their shared history in unexpected ways. When Rachel threatens to expose a past crime that could destroy all of their lives, it becomes clear that there are more than a few secrets laying beneath the broad-leaved trees and warm lamplight of Greenwich Park.

Opening lead — two of diamonds.
Many seemingly normal leads turn out to be very costly. Consider this case from a team match where South wound up in four hearts doubled at both tables.
At the first table, West led a diamond, and South had an easy time of it. He ruffed in dummy, led a club to his ace, ruffed another diamond, then discarded both of his spades on the K-Q of clubs.

After ruffing a spade, declarer trumped a third diamond in dummy, then discarded his last diamond on the jack of clubs. West ruffed with the heart five and also got his A-K of trump, but South had the rest for a score of 590.

The deal illustrates the devastating effectiveness of a crossruff. South made 10 tricks even though he and dummy together had only 17 high-card points to the opponents' 23!
At the second table, where four hearts doubled was reached on similar bidding, West decided to lead the king of hearts in order to take a look at the dummy. Upon seeing dummy's dearth of diamonds, he then continued with the ace and another heart.

This left South in very bad shape. He could not ruff any of his diamond losers in dummy, nor did he have any way to reach dummy's clubs. All told, South lost two spades, two hearts and four diamonds to finish with only five tricks! He thus lost 1,100 points with the very same cards with which the first declarer had scored 590, a 1,690-point swing brought about by West's seemingly innocent lead of a diamond at the first table.

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Today in History

Today in History:
August 9, atomic bomb dropped on Nagasaki

Today is Tuesday, Aug. 9, the 221st day of 2022. There are 144 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Aug. 9, 1974, Vice President Gerald R. Ford became the nation's 38th chief executive as President Richard Nixon's resignation took effect.

On this date:

In 1854, Henry David Thoreau's "Walden," which described Thoreau's experiences while living near Walden Pond in Massachusetts, was first published.

In 1934, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed an executive order denationalizing silver.

In 1936, Jesse Owens won his fourth gold medal at the Berlin Olympics as the United States took first place in the 400-meter relay.

In 1944, 258 African-American sailors based at Port Chicago, California, refused to load a munitions ship following a cargo vessel explosion that killed 320 men, many of them Black. (Fifty of the sailors were convicted of mutiny, fined and imprisoned.)

In 1945, three days after the atomic bombing of Hiroshima, Japan, a U.S. B-29 Superfortress code-named Bockscar dropped a nuclear device ("Fat Man") over Nagasaki, killing an estimated 74,000 people.

In 1969, actor Sharon Tate and four other people were found brutally slain at Tate's Los Angeles home; cult

leader Charles Manson and a group of his followers were later convicted of the crime.

In 1982, a federal judge in Washington ordered John W. Hinckley Jr., who'd been acquitted of shooting President Ronald Reagan and three others by reason of insanity, committed to a mental hospital.

In 1988, President Ronald Reagan nominated Lauro Cavazos (kah-VAH'-zohs) to be secretary of education; Cavazos became the first Hispanic to serve in the Cabinet.

In 1995, Jerry Garcia, lead singer of the Grateful Dead, died in Forest Knolls, California, of a heart attack at age 53.

In 2004, Oklahoma City bombing conspirator Terry Nichols, addressing a court for the first time, asked victims of the blast for forgiveness as a judge sentenced him to 161 consecutive life sentences.

In 2014, Michael Brown Jr., a Black 18-year-old, was shot to death by a police officer following an altercation in Ferguson, Missouri; Brown's death led to sometimes-violent protests in Ferguson and other U.S. cities, spawning a national "Black Lives Matter" movement.

In 2016, at the Rio Games, Michael Phelps earned the 20th and 21st Olympic gold medals of his career as he won the 200-meter butterfly and anchored the United States to victory in the 4x200 freestyle relay. Katie Ledecky earned her second gold in Rio by winning the 200-meter freestyle. The U.S. women's gymnastics team won gold for a second consecutive

Olympics.

Ten years ago: The United States began a landmark project to clean up dioxin left from Agent Orange at the site of a former U.S. air base in Danang in central Vietnam, 50 years after the defoliant was first sprayed by American planes on Vietnam's jungles to destroy enemy cover.

At the London Games, Usain Bolt won the 200 meters in 19.32 seconds, making him the only man with two Olympic titles in that event. The U.S. women's soccer team won the gold medal, avenging one of its most painful defeats with a 2-1 victory over Japan.

Five years ago: North Korea's army said it was studying a plan to create an "enveloping fire" in areas around the U.S. territory of Guam with medium- to long-range ballistic missiles. Prosecutors in Florida said golfer Tiger Woods had agreed to plead guilty to reckless driving and would enter a diversion program that would allow him to have his record wiped clean; he'd been charged with DUI in May when he was found asleep in his car, apparently under the influence of a prescription painkiller and sleeping medication.

One year ago: Officials said the Taliban had taken control of two more provincial capitals in Afghanistan, as U.S. and NATO forces finalized their pull-out from the country. Testifying at his Los Angeles murder trial, Robert Durst denied killing his best friend, Susan Berman, at her home in 2000. (Durst would be convicted of first-degree murder; the real estate heir died in January 2022 at age

78 while serving a life sentence.) The authoritative Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change warned that Earth was getting so hot that temperatures within about a decade would probably blow past a level of warming that world leaders had sought to prevent. 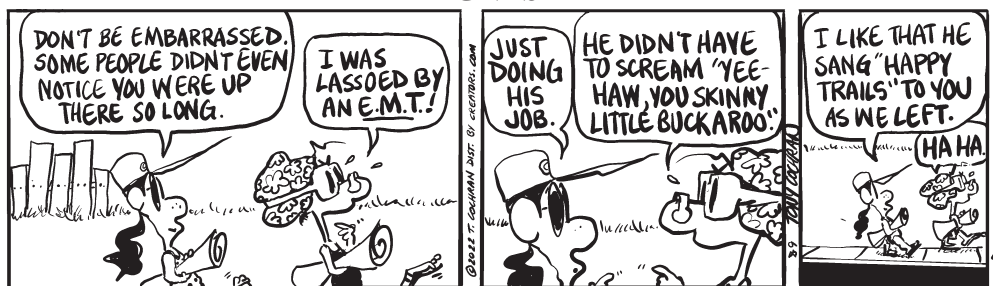

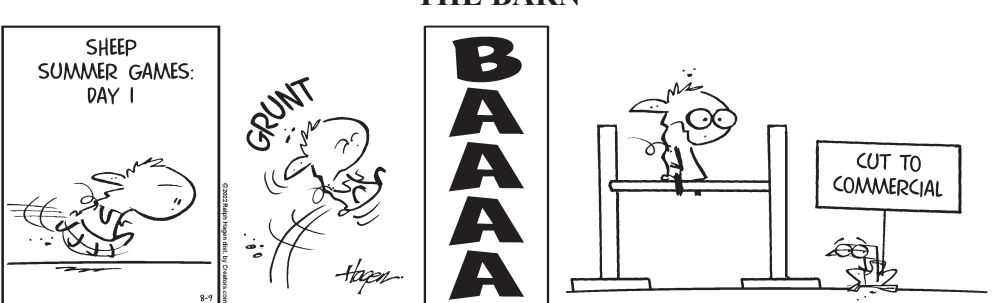

Chicago pounds out 15 hits, beats Texas 8-2 for series split

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Andrew Vaughn had a two-run home run among his three hits, Luis Robert hit a two-run double, and AJ Pollock had two doubles in a three-hit game as the Chicago White Sox beat the Texas Rangers 8-2 on Sunday to split a four-game series.

Leury Garcia had three hits and scored and Jose Abreu had three singles as the White Sox broke out offensively. They had 15 hits, five for extra bases, after being limited to four runs and 13 hits in the previous three games. The White Sox pulled within two games of first-place Minnesota in the AL Central and remained three games behind in the wild-card race.

The hitting attack came minus All-Star shortstop Tim Anderson — the team's "igniter" according to manager Tony La Russa. Anderson began a two-game suspension for making contact with plate umpire Nick Mahrley during an argument on July 29 and was replaced at shortstop on Sunday by Garcia, who primarily plays second base.

La Russa said of Anderson: "He's so special; you can't replace him. But Leury, he's a player, too."

"When you see the team like today, we put everything together," Garcia said. "Pitching, hitting, defense. We can do it."

Lucas Giolito earned one run in five innings on six singles and three walks to earn his second consecutive win. Giolito (8-6) struck out five and threw 103 pitches, four short of his season high.

Nathaniel Lowe hit a solo homer in the seventh inning and delivered an RBI single in the third among his three hits for the Rangers. The 452-foot homer, a lefty-on-lefty shot, was the longest by a Rangers player this season.

Texas completed a 2-5 homestand and dropped 12 games below .500, matching its season low.

"Once we fell behind, that third inning kind of put things in a tough spot for us," Rangers manager Chris Woodward said.

Spencer Howard (2-4) gave up six runs, five earned, in 3 1/3 innings.

Vaughn hit his 11th homer of the season in the third inning to give Chicago a 3-1 lead.

Robert's two-run double came in the three-run fourth, making the score 6-1 and chasing Howard.

Pollock's RBI single in the second inning scored the game's first run. Pollock doubled in the fourth and the sixth for his third three-hit game of the season.

Howard struggled for a second consecutive start — he allowed six runs in four innings last Tuesday in an 8-2 loss to Baltimore — after his best outing of the season, when he outpitched Shohei Ohtani in a 2-0 road win over the Los Angeles Angels.

Garcia scored from first base in the seventh inning when Texas third baseman Ezequiel Duran's throw to first went wide. As Garcia raced toward third base, third base coach Joe McEwing emphatically waved him on with both arms.

"Super Joe' sent me," Garcia said. "Oh, man. I've got to go."

ANDERSON'S SUSPENSION BEGINS

Anderson will also miss the White Sox's next game, the opener of Tuesday's doubleheader at Kansas City.

MLB initially suspended Anderson for three games. He appealed, and the suspension was reduced.

"He just picked a day and the first game on Tuesday," La Russa said. "Seemed to make the most sense."

Anderson is hitting .301, but is hitless in his last 15 at-bats. La Russa said Anderson has been pressing.

SHORT HOPS

The Rangers left 11 runners on base, the White Sox 10. ... Lowe has reached base in 14 consecutive games. ... The White Sox recalled INF Lenyn Sosa from Triple-A Charlotte and optioned RHP reliever Tanner Banks. ... Chicago is 3-0-5 in its last eight series.

McKenzie's 8 Ks, Maile's HR puts Guardians over Astros 1-0

CLEVELAND (AP) — Triston McKenzie held Houston to two hits and struck out eight in eight innings, Luke Maile homered for the first time in three years and the Cleveland Guardians defeated the Houston Astros 1-0 on Sunday.

McKenzie (8-8) retired 15 straight hitters before pinch-hitter Kyle Tucker walked with one out in the eighth. Pinch-hitter Jose Altuve then bounced into an inning-ending double play, and McKenzie let out a yell and pounded his right hand into his glove as he headed to dugout behind a loud ovation from 22,688 fans.

McKenzie admitted the moment got him pumped up.

"It was less the guy and more the spot the team was in," he said. "Being up 1-0 in the eighth, that's a huge out, especially a double play to end the inning."

Altuve, who homered twice off McKenzie last season, wasn't in the starting lineup but bench coach Joe Espada found an opportune moment to use his star second baseman. Altuve was 3 for 6 off McKenzie before Sunday.

McKenzie walked one and threw 91 pitches. He struck out Alex Bregman to begin the second, but Trey Mancini and Chas McCormick followed with one-out singles to put runners at first and second. McKenzie struck out Mauricio Dubón and Jake Meyers to end the inning.

"He had no margin for error today, and fortunately he didn't make any," Cleveland manager Terry Francona said.

The 25-year-old right-hander was 3-1 with a 1.34 ERA in July, but had allowed a three-run homer in each of his last two starts — both losses.

Maile's fifth-inning home run off Christian Javier ended on the home run in left field for his first homer since May 20, 2019.

"I wasn't really looking for anything in particular," Maile said. "He got me 0-2 pretty quick and then there was a fastball up that I checked my swing on. I thought if anything he might have sped me up a little bit, so I had to focus on getting started just a little earlier."

Emmanuel Clase struck out two of the three hitters he faced in the ninth for his 24th save in 26 opportunities.

The win gave Cleveland a split of the four-game series against the AL West leaders. Houston won the first two games of the series by a combined score of 15-3 and is an AL-best 36-23 on the road.

Javier (6-8) is 0-5 over his last six starts. The right-hander gave up six hits, struck out four and didn't walk a batter over six innings.

BAKER UPDATE

Espada spoke on the phone Sunday morning with Astros manager Dusty Baker, who was out for the series after testing positive for COVID-19 on Friday.

"He's in good spirits," Espada said. "He's feel-

ing a lot better. Hopefully he gets to travel back to Houston sometime this week."

A NEEDED BREAK

The Astros have their first day off Monday since the All-Star break after a stretch of 19 consecutive games.

"We have to know how to go about it, which is thinking long term and trying to get these guys rest and recover," Espada said.

The Guardians aren't far behind — 18 games in 17 days.

"The guys need it," Francona said of Cleveland's day off Monday. "It'll be really good for them."

TRAINER'S ROOM

Astros: Altuve and 1B Yuli Gurriel were out of the starting lineup. Houston is off Monday. Mancini started at first while Diaz played second.

Guardians: OF Steven Kwan returned after not playing Saturday and being pulled from Friday's game after fouling a ball off his leg. Kwan was 0 for 2 on Friday, ending his 18-game hitting streak. The rookie singled in the third and fifth Sunday.

UP NEXT

Astros: Houston opens a three-game home series against Texas on Tuesday night. RHP José Urquidy (10-4, 3.82) is the scheduled starter.

This Date in Baseball-Barry Bonds hit his 600th homer

1916 — The Philadelphia A's ended their 20-game losing streak as Joe Bush beat the Detroit Tigers 7-1.

1939 — Red Rolfe of the New York Yankees started a streak of 18 consecutive games in which he scored at least one run. During those games, he scored a total of 30 runs.

1960 — Ted Williams of the Boston Red Sox hit home run No. 511 to tie Mel Ott for fourth place on the all-time list.

1975 — Davey Lopes of the Los Angeles Dodgers stole his 32nd consecutive base without being caught in a 2-0 victory over the New York Mets, breaking Max Carey's 1922 record. Lopes tacked on six more steals before being caught on Aug. 24.

1976 — John Candelaria became the first Pirate pitcher in 69 years to throw a no-hitter in Pittsburgh by blanking the Los Angeles Dodgers 2-0. Candelaria's no-hitter came at Three Rivers Stadium. No Pirate ever threw a no-hitter at Forbes Field.

1981 — Baseball returned following the strike with the All-Star game in Cleveland before a crowd of 72,086. Gary Carter of the Montreal Expos hit two home runs to give the NL a 5-4 triumph over the AL. Vida Blue became the first pitcher to win an

All-Star game in both leagues. His AL victory came in 1971 at Detroit.

1988 — The Chicago Cubs won the first official night game at Wrigley Field by beating the New York Mets 6-4.

1998 — Dennis Martinez became the winningest Latin pitcher in baseball history, breaking Juan Marichal's record of 243 victories. Martinez pitched a perfect eighth inning and got the victory when Chipper Jones hit a tiebreaking, two-run single in the ninth inning and the Atlanta Braves held on for the win.

2001 — Mike Hampton tied the NL record for pitchers with his seventh homer as the Rockies beat the Cubs 14-5. Hampton's seventh homer matched the NL mark shared by Don Drysdale (1958, 1965) and Don Newcombe (1955). The major league record is nine by Cleveland's Wes Ferrell in 1931.

2002 — Barry Bonds hit his 600th homer, becoming the fourth major leaguer to reach the mark. With a 421-foot, solo shot off Pittsburgh's Kip Wells, the San Francisco Giants slugger joined Hank Aaron, Babe Ruth and Willie Mays in the exclusive club.

2007 — Failed pitcher Rick Ankiel hit a three-run home run to cap his debut as a major league outfielder in St. Louis' 5-0 victory over San Diego.

2018 — Mookie Betts homered for Boston in the ninth inning to complete his first career cycle, and Toronto held on to beat the Red Sox 8-5.

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
