**Texas A&M Forest Service urges wildfire safety during hunting season**

COLLEGE STATION, Texas — Texas A&M Forest Service reminds Texans to be careful with activities that may cause a wildfire this hunting season.  
 From 2017 to 2021, Texas A&M Forest Service responded to 3,682 wildfires burning 1.4 million acres. During that time, 42 percent of wildfires occurred during the major hunting season months of September through January.  
 “Texas A&M Forest Service wants all hunters to be safe this upcoming season,” said Karen Stafford, Texas A&M Forest Service State Wildfire Prevention Program Leader. “We all have a role to play in protecting our state from wildfires, so

remember to do your part and don’t let a wildfire start.”  
 The general season for white-tailed deer hunting opens Nov. 5 for all but the two westernmost counties in Texas.  
 Nine out of 10 wildfires in Texas are human caused, and 65 percent of wildfires that occur during hunting season are caused by debris burning and equipment use, which includes parking in dry grass and dragging trailer chains.  
 Recent rainfall has helped increase the amount of moisture in vegetation across the Texas landscape. The rainfall reduced wildfire activity for much of the state.  
 Even when wildfire activity is low, the possibility of an ignition is a concern.

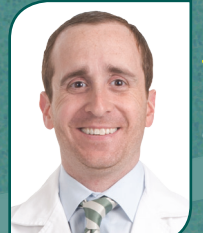

Precilla was born on April 16, 1957, in Big Spring to Josephine and Ernesto Saiz. She was a lifetime resident of Big Spring.

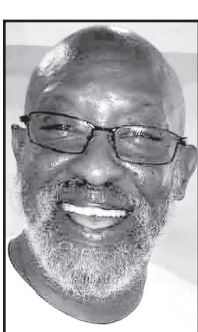

## Mexico, Day of the Dead is celebration of life

MEXICO CITY (AP) — During the Day of the Dead celebrations that take place in late October and early November in Mexico, the living remember and honor their dearly departed, but with celebration — not sorrow.

Marigolds decorate the streets as music blares from speakers. Adults and children alike dress as skeletons and take photos, capturing the annual joy-filled festivities. It is believed that during the Day of the Dead — or Dia de Muertos — they are able to commune with their deceased loved ones.

No one knows when the first observance took place, but it is rooted in agriculture-related beliefs from Mexico's pre-Hispanic era, said Andrés Medina, a researcher at the Anthropological Research Institute of the National Autonomous University of Mexico. Catholic traditions were incorporated into the celebration after the Spanish conquest in 1521.

"In that mythology, the corn is buried when it's planted and leads an underground life for a period to later reappear as a plant," Medina said. The grain of corn is seen as a seed, comparable to a bone, which is seen as the origin of life.

Today, skeletons are central to Day of the Dead celebrations, symbolizing a return of the bones to the living world. Like seeds planted under soil, the dead disappear temporarily only to return each year like the annual harvest.

Altars are core to the observance as well. Families place photographs of their ancestors on their home altars, which include decorations cut out of paper and candles. They also are adorned with offerings of items once beloved by those now gone. It could include cigars, a bottle of mezcal or a plate of mole, tortillas and chocolates.

Traditional altars can be adorned in a pattern representative of a Mesoamerican view that the world had levels, Medina said. But not everyone follows — or knows — this method.

"To the extent that Indigenous languages have been lost, the meaning (of the altar) has been lost as well, so people do it intuitively," he said. "Where the Indigenous languages have been maintained, the tradition is still alive."

The way Mexicans celebrate the Day of the Dead continues to evolve.

It only takes one spark to start a wildfire and hunters are encouraged to be cautious outdoors. Some tips to help avoid starting a wildfire while hunting and camping this fall include:

Avoid driving over and parking on dry grass - the heat from your vehicle can easily ignite the grass.

Always check with local officials for burn bans or other outdoor burning restrictions. Each county in Texas sets and lifts their own burn bans. Make sure you know your county's burn ban status and if it restricts open flames and other heat-causing activities such as using charcoal. View the latest burn ban map here: <https://tfsweb.tamu.edu/burnbans/>.

Never leave a cooking fire or campfire unattended, and always make sure it is completely out by drowning it, stirring it and feeling to ensure that it is out cold before you leave.

When taking a trailer out on your adventures, make sure that the tires are properly inflated, chains will not contact the road and that any loose metal will not continually hit anything else, all which can cause sparks.

Always be ready to put out a fire should one start. Have a shovel and water with you in camp and have a fire extinguisher with you at all times.

Typically, it is an intimate family tradition observed with home altars and visits to local cemeteries to decorate graves with flowers and sugar skulls. They bring their deceased loved ones' favorite food and hire musicians to perform their favorite songs.

"Nowadays there's an influence of American Halloween in the celebration," Medina said. "These elements carry a new meaning in the context of the original meaning of the festival, which is to celebrate the dead. To celebrate life."

In 2016, the government started a popular annual parade in Mexico City that concludes in a main square featuring altars built by artisans from across the country. The roughly three-hour-long affair features one of the holiday's most iconic characters, Catrinas. The female skeleton is dressed in elegant clothes inspired by the engravings of José Guadalupe Posada, a Mexican artist who drew satirical cartoons at the beginning of the 20th century.

On Friday afternoon in the capital city, Paola Valencia, 30, walked through the main square looking at some of the altars and explained her appreciation for the holiday: "I love this tradition because it reminds me that they (the dead) are still among us."

Originally from the Mexican state of Oaxaca, she said the residents of her hometown, Santa Cruz Xoxocotlán, take a lot of time to build large altars each year. They are a source of pride for the whole community.

"Sometimes I feel like crying. Our altars show who we are. We are very traditional and we love to feel that they (the dead) will be with us at least once a year," she said.

# Candy makers grapple with waste

Halloween treats have a tricky problem: plastic packaging that's difficult to recycle.

As America loads up on an estimated 600 million pounds of candy for Halloween, a handful of companies are trying to make it easier to recycle all those wrappers. But they acknowledge their efforts are only making a small dent and say more fundamental changes are needed.

Since the beginning of October, Mars — the maker of Snickers and M&Ms — has distributed 17,400 candy waste collection bags to U.S. consumers through its website and at community events. The bags can be filled with wrappers and packaging from any brand and mailed free to a specialty recycler in Illinois. That recycler, G2 Revolution, forms the packages into pellets and uses them to make waste bags for dogs.

The bags fit around 4 ounces of material; if all 17,400 are returned, that would equal more than 2 tons of recycled wrappers. But even then, the recycling program would still address just a fraction of the problem.

"What I'd like to see is this program actually goes away over time and we have a solution where it's no longer required and we're fully recyclable," said Tim LeBel, president of sales for Mars Wrigley U.S.

Mars is partnering with Lexington, Kentucky-based Rubicon Technologies, a consultant and software provider that connects companies and municipalities to recyclers. Since 2019, Rubicon has had its own program called Trick or Trash, which mails one free box to schools, businesses and community groups to collect candy wrappers for recycling. An additional box, or a box for personal use, is \$100; Rubicon says that covers the cost of making the box, shipping it both ways and recycling the wrappers. Rubicon expects to send out 5,000 boxes this year. Mars and Rubicon won't say how much they're spending on their Halloween programs. Rubicon notes that it pays extra to UPS to offset the carbon emissions from shipping. Plastic wrappers are ideal for candy for lots of reasons. They're cheap and lightweight, which cuts down on shipping costs, said Muhammad Rabnawaz, an associate professor in the school of packaging at Michigan State University. They're also easy to modify for different functions; some might have a coating so candy doesn't stick to them, for example. But plastic wrappers are a challenge for recycling companies. They often contain a mix of materials, like foil, which must be separated. They're small and flimsy, making it easy for them to bypass typical sorting equipment. They have to be cleaned to remove grease, oil and other food waste. They're multi-colored, so when they're mixed together they come out as an unappealing brown.

Even when companies do go to the effort of recycling candy wrappers, they produce such a low-value plastic that it doesn't recoup the cost of recycling. "It's got to be profitable. These guys aren't social workers," said Brandon Wright, a spokesman for the National Waste and Recycling Association, which represents waste management companies.

As a result, a lot of plastic packaging ends up getting thrown away. According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, containers and packaging made up 21% of trash going into landfills in 2018.

That's why it's critical to have food companies or individual consumers funding recycling efforts,

said Tom Szaky, the CEO of TerraCycle.

The New Jersey-based recycling company recycles candy wrappers in the United Kingdom through partnerships with Nestle and Ferrero. In the U.S., the company will ship boxes to consumers to collect candy and snack wrappers and return them for recycling.

A small box is \$86; a large one is \$218. TerraCycle said that covers the cost of shipping and the multi-part recycling process. Szaky said TerraCycle has recycled approximately 40 million candy wrappers worldwide since 2014.

Leah Karrer, a conservationist in Washington D.C., bought a TerraCycle box in 2020 and collected 5 pounds of Halloween candy wrappers from about 20 neighbors.

She liked raising awareness about the problem and supporting TerraCycle, but she hasn't done it again because the box was so expensive. "This is not a cost-effective solution for most families, when the items can simply be thrown into a trash container to be picked up for free," she said.

This year, she ordered a free bag from Mars, so that she can send a message that consumers care about plastic waste and want companies to switch to sustainable packaging.

"The onus cannot be on the customer to fix the massive plastic waste problem," she said.

"The solution is system change." Candy makers say they're spending millions to develop new packaging that would be easier to recycle or compost.

Mondelez's Cadbury introduced more easily recyclable packaging — made of 30% recycled plastic — in some markets this year. Mars recently partnered with Danimer Scientific, a biotech company, to develop compostable packaging.

Hershey has set a goal of making all its packaging easily recyclable, reusable or compostable by 2030.

The National Confectioners Association, which represents the candy industry, says federal, state, and local governments also need to invest in more advanced recycling.

But Janet Dominitz, the executive director of the Massachusetts Public Interest Research Group, said recycling alone will never keep up with amount of packaging waste people generate. Dominitz said single-use plastic packaging needs to be eliminated altogether. "The problem isn't the number of candy wrappers on Halloween, but the 365 days a year that our infrastructure is set up to throw away," she said.

Big Spring's Bergan Pinkley and the Steers cross country team will head out to Round Rock today as they get ready to compete in the UIL Class 4A State Cross Country Meet on Friday.

Pinkley and the Steers cross country team qualified for the state meet after competing in the UIL Region I Meet in Lubbock last Monday. Pinkley was the lone Lady Steer state qualifier as she finished 24th overall. Pinkley was part of the next top ten individuals group that were not on a qualifying team to advance to the state meet.

On the boys side, the Steers finished second overall as a team to advance to the state meet for the second year in a row. The Steers have been considered to be top contenders for the state title this year as they have been ranked in the top three in the state for Class 4A all season long.

Leading the way for the Steers were seniors Adrian Solis who finished 9th overall and Isaac Gonzales who finished 10th overall. The goal of getting back to the state meet began last year for the Steers as they qualified to state last year where they finished fourth overall.

With the majority of their runners returning from last year's team it wasn't hard for coaches from across the state to recognize that the Steers cross country team were serious contenders.

At the beginning of the season the boys team made it clear that their goal was to not only get back to state but to hopefully bring back home the title. "We got a real shot at state again this year and we're looking to at least finish top three," both Solis and Gonzales said at the beginning of the season. Both runners made it clear though that the team are chasing the coveted state title.

The Steers are heading into the state meet with some momentum on their side as all of Big Spring's runners are dropping faster times at the right time. Sophomore Diego Rios ran sub 17 minutes at the regional meet and senior Au-

gustin Salgado was just a few seconds behind.

Senior's Kevin Quezada, Jordan Mitchell, and Enrique Calderon all dropped their time as well by 20-30 seconds. That's a huge time drop in the sport of cross country. Canyon will no doubt be the favorites heading into the state meet as they have been ranked No. 1 all season long.

The Eagles have gotten the best of the Steers so far this season and will again be the team to beat on Friday. Per head coach Brandon Clemmons the Steers have a tough task of taking down Canyon but is confident that his Steers will be really competitive come Friday.

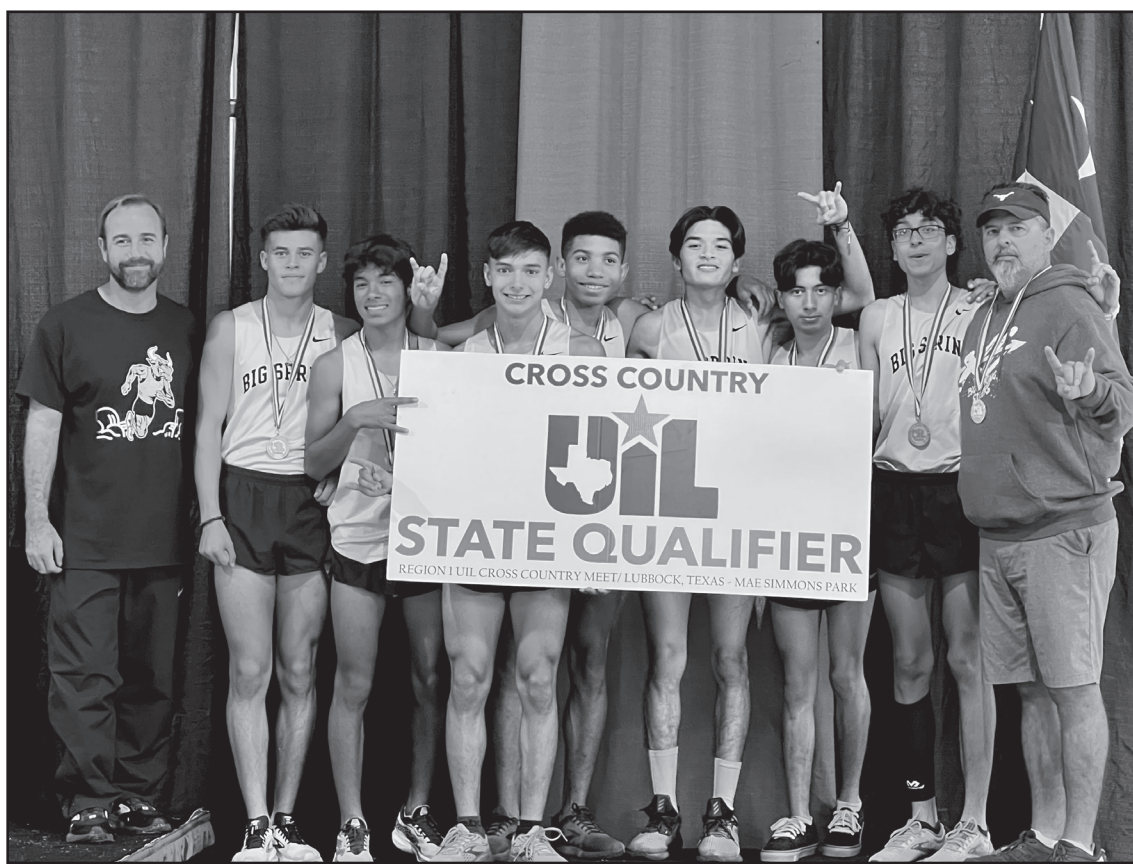
"Our region is tough and pretty much ninety-nine percent of the time the top three teams in Region I are the top three teams at state," Clemmons stated. "Canyon is going to be really tough. We just have to go out and compete at our highest level and control what we can. If we can do that then we are for sure a top three team that's in contention for the title." Clemmons added.

While the boys are looking to cap off a historic season with a state title, Bergan Pinkley is looking to build her own legacy. The rising freshman star set high expectations for herself this season and she's meeting them every step of the way.

At the beginning of the season one of Pinkley's goals was to make it to state as a freshman. "I really want to make it to state in cross country and try to be a four time state qualifier through our high school," Pinkley stated at the beginning of the season. "It's a little pressure, but I think im putting the most pressure on myself. Coach Clemmons has given me confidence though that I can get there," Pinkley added.

Pinkley will look to claim a spot on the podium come Friday and to cap off her great freshman year. Pinkley will run first Friday at 8:30 a.m. followed by the Steers cross country team at 9 a.m.

The state meet will be held Old Settlers Park in Round Rock. Good luck to both Bergan Pinkley and the Steers cross country team at the state meet!

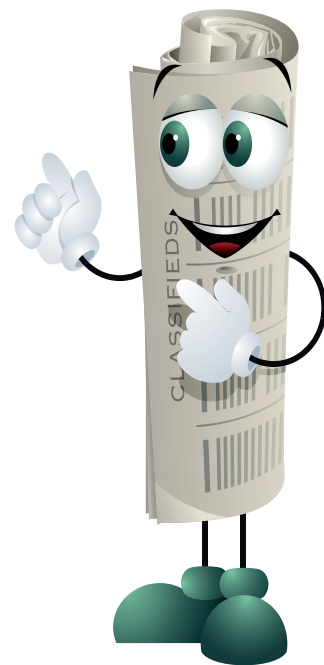

Opening lead — two of clubs.  
Despite the many uncertainties faced by the defenders during the play, it is nearly always possible for them to reason out the best course of action.

Consider this deal where South wound up in four spades after opening with a weak two-bid. East won the club lead with the king and cashed the ace, felling South's queen. The fate of the contract now rested with East, who had to make the seemingly dangerous return of a diamond to establish the setting trick.

East had no way of knowing

whether declarer or his partner held the queen, but it did not take him long to put a low diamond on the table. South took West's queen with dummy's ace and had little choice but to try a spade finesse. When he did, West won the queen with the king and returned a diamond to East's king to set the contract.

If East had opted for the "safe" club return at trick three, declarer would have made the contract. The question that remains, therefore, is whether East's successful diamond shift was a matter of luck or logic.

The fact is that luck did not enter into East's decision. He reasoned that since South was marked with six spades for his weak two-bid and had already followed to two clubs, he could not have more than five red cards. Since these five cards were covered by five high-card winners in dummy, it couldn't cost if South had the queen of diamonds and scored a trick with it. This would merely present declarer with an extra trick he didn't need.

Thus, the diamond return could do no harm but might do a great deal of good if West happened to have a trump trick as well as the queen of diamonds. Returning a diamond was therefore neither daring nor reckless but was absolutely essential under the circumstances.
