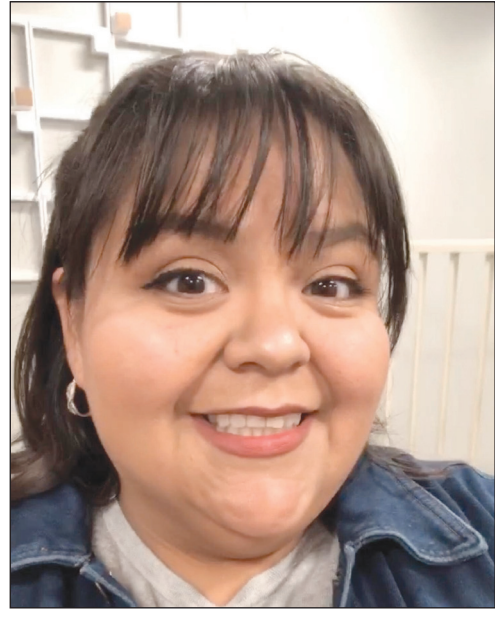

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Big Spring’s Green to perform in Dallas next week

On Dec. 8, one of Big Spring's most recognizable personalities will make a trip to Dallas with hopes of taking her celebrity to the next level. Adrienne Green, local comedienne and radio host, will compete at the Dallas Comedy Club in the Live Performance Showcase presented by comedy star Kenan Thompson, a veteran of Saturday Night Live.

“I entered a competition called the Kenan Thomason Ultimate Comedy Experience,” Green said. “Initially you submit a video clip of you performing comedy, and have people vote for it. I'm not exactly sure how they selected the people to move on, whether it's a combination of votes and material or however they decided that, but I got selected to move on to the next round which is a live showcase. It's going to be next Thursday at 7:30 in Dallas at the Dallas Comedy Club.”

TxDOT urges Texans to find a sober ride this holiday season

23% of Holiday Traffic Deaths Caused by Drunk Drivers

Six years have passed since a drunk driver killed Azeza Salama's fiancé and sent her and her two children to the hospital, but her memories of the crash remain as vivid as the day it happened.

As people celebrate the holidays with friends and family, TxDOT wants stories such as Azeza's to remind everyone to always find a sober ride.

Last year, Texas saw 48,641 traffic crashes during the holiday season—Dec. 1, 2021, through Jan. 1, 2022—which resulted in 433 fatalities and 1,695 serious injuries. Almost a quarter of those deaths—23 percent — were DUI-alcohol related with 98 people killed and 236 seriously injured in drunk driving crashes.

“With everything going on

in the world these past few years, we want everyone to be able to celebrate this joyous time of year without the tragic consequences of drinking and driving,” said TxDOT Executive Director Marc Williams. “Get together with family and friends and have a great time, but please find an alternative way home if you choose to drink. You have many options available.”

Drunk driving crashes can be easily prevented, yet they can have serious physical, emotional and financial consequences that can last for years. Designate a sober driver, call a taxi, use a rideshare service, stay put, call a friend or family member, or use public transportation to ensure you get home safely if you decide to

The City of Big Spring offers the Large/Bulk Item Pickup for citizens.

Residents must call and schedule a pickup for their district's scheduled pick up day.

This program is part of our plan to help keep our neighborhoods clean. We encourage all residents to take

advantage of this FREE program.

Program rules are: City staff will only pick up items that are placed on the curb upon arrival to your location. City staff will not be permitted to bring items to the curb from your home or from any other area of the residence (backyard, garage, etc.).

If you do not get on the schedule, your items will not be picked up. The Large/Bulk item pickup program is for residential customers only.

Customers are responsible for cleaning up any debris or trash left after your items are picked up.

Place your items on the curb at 7 a.m. on the day of your scheduled collection. Items will not be collected if they are in an alley, in front of a vacant lot, or in front of a business. If you have questions, please call the Public Works Office at 432-264-2501, prior to placing items out.

Items eligible for pickup are: Doors, carpet, furniture,

appliances, cardboard boxes, scrap metal, mattresses, tree brush or limbs (individual pieces not exceeding 8 in. in diameter or 10 feet in length), and yard trimmings (bagged organic yard waste such as twigs and shrubbery).

Items not eligible for pickup are: Household trash, garbage, or any material in plastic bags, hazardous materials (chemicals and petroleum products), automotive parts, batteries, tires, construction, remodeling or demolition de-

bris such as shingles, wall-board and lumber, tires, dirt, rocks, concrete or ceramic tiles, TVs or electronics.

To schedule a pickup call Public Works or email nherandez@mybigspring.com by 5 p.m. Monday, Dec. 19.

This program is designed to help residents dispose of large items from their homes like couches, mattresses, appliances and any other large, bulky items without the expense and hassle of hauling it off.

Christine McVie, Fleetwood Mac singer-songwriter, dies at 79

NEW YORK (AP) — Christine McVie, the British-born Fleetwood Mac vocalist, songwriter and keyboard player whose cool, soulful contralto helped define such classics as "You Make Loving Fun," "Everywhere" and "Don't Stop," has died at age 79.

Her death was announced Wednesday on the band's social media accounts. No cause of death or other details were immediately provided.

"She was truly one-of-a-kind, special and talented beyond measure," the band's statement reads in part.

McVie was a steady presence and personality in a band known for its frequent lineup changes and volatile personalities — notably fellow singer-songwriters Stevie Nicks and Lindsey Buckingham.

During its peak commercial years, from 1975-80, the band sold tens of millions of records and was an ongoing source of fascination for fans as it transformed personal battles into melodic, compelling songs. McVie herself had been married to bassist John McVie, and their breakup — along with the split of Nicks and Buckingham — was famously documented on the 1977 release "Rumours," among the bestselling albums of all time.

Fleetwood Mac, co-founded by drummer Mick Fleetwood in 1967, was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1998. The group's many other hit singles included "Dreams," "Go Your Own Way" and "Little Lies."

Rolling Stones to release star-stuffed 2012 live recording at New Jersey venue

NEW YORK (AP) — The Rolling Stones plan to release what they're calling their "ultimate live greatest hits album," with appearances by Lady Gaga, Bruce Springsteen, Gary Clark Jr. and The Black Keys, early next year.

"GRRR Live!" contains songs recorded live on Dec. 15, 2012, at Newark, New Jersey's Prudential Center. That night saw guest appearances by The Black Keys ("Who Do You Love?"), Clark and John Mayer ("Going Down"), Lady Gaga ("Gimme Shel-

Police detain man after eggs thrown at King Charles III

LONDON (AP) — A 23-year-old man was arrested Wednesday after hurling eggs and vitriol at King Charles III and Camilla, the queen consort, as they walked in the northern England city of York.

The incident happened as the king and his wife were entering York through Micklegate Bar, a medieval gateway where monarchs are traditionally welcomed to the city.

Video footage showed several eggs in motion and smashed on the ground. None appeared to hit the royal couple, who continued to be greeted by local dignitaries and to meet assembled well-wishers.

Several police officers could be seen grappling with a man at a crowd barrier. Britain's PA news agency reported that the protester booed and shouted "This country was built on the blood of slaves" as he was being detained.

Other members of the crowd tried to drown him out by chanting "Shame on you" and "God save the King."

North Yorkshire Police said a 23-year-old man was arrested on suspicion of a public order offense and was being held in custody.

Charles and Camilla traveled to York as part of a series of engagements around the U.K. marking the start of the new king's reign. They attended a service at the city's cathedral, York Minster, and unveiled a statue of the king's mother, Queen Elizabeth II, who died in September after 70 years on the throne.

Tornadoes fueled by record highs wrecked homes around South

WETUMPKA, Ala. (AP) — Tornadoes damaged numerous homes, destroyed a fire station, briefly trapped people in a grocery store and ripped the roof off an apartment complex in Mississippi, while two people died as a tree crunched their mobile home in Alabama, authorities said Wednesday.

The National Weather Service had warned that strong twisters capable of carving up communities over long distances were possible as the storm front moved eastward from Texas. They were fueled by record high temperatures and threatened a stretch of the United States where more than 25 million people live.

A total of 73 tornado warnings and 120 severe thunderstorm warnings were issued from Tuesday afternoon to Wednesday morning, said Matthew Elliott, a meteorologist at the Storm Prediction Center in Norman, Oklahoma.

Significant tornado damage was evident in the Flatwood community north of Montgomery, Alabama, where two people were killed as a tree struck their home, said Christina Thornton, director of the Montgomery County Emergency Management Agency.

Others in the tight-knit community narrowly escaped with their lives: Caroline Bankston said she and Tim Wiseman were watching the news and trying to figure out where the twister was when she looked out the window and realized it was on top of them. They ran to a safer corner as the roof caved in, burying their sofa in debris.

"We just prayed, prayed, prayed, 'Please God Please take care of us. Please,' and he did. You can replace stuff, but you can't replace a person," Bankston said, her voice still trembling. "We were just sitting there on the couch. Thank God we moved."

Search and rescue teams would continue going door to door until everyone's accounted for, Montgomery County Sheriff Derrick Cunningham said.

Isaiah Sankey, who represents Flatwood as vice chairman of the Montgomery County Commission, expressed grief for the lives lost and vowed that installing storm shelters will be a priority.

"When we do rebuild, we will have storm shelters," Sankey said. "We have got to prepare for these unforeseen circumstances."

In the west Alabama town of Eutaw, large sections of the roof were missing from an apartment complex, displacing 15 families in the middle of the night, and power lines and trees were "all over the road," Eutaw Police Chief Tommy Johnson told WBRC-TV.

A suspected tornado damaged numerous homes during the night in Hale County, Alabama, where the emergency director said more than a third of the people live in highly vulnerable mobile homes.

"I have seen some really nice mobile homes tied down, but they just don't stand a chance against a tornado," Hale County Emergency Management Director Russell Weeden told WBRC.

Two other people were injured as the storm tore apart homes in Caldwell Parish, Louisiana, Sheriff Clay Bennett told KNOE-TV.

Marquette's defense overwhelms No. 6 Baylor in 96-70 win

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Marquette has developed a habit under Shaka Smart of saving its top performances for the best opponents on its schedule.

Olivier-Maxence Prosper scored 24 points and Marquette capitalized on a dominant start from its defense to roll past No. 6 Baylor 96-70 on Tuesday night in the Big 12-Big East Battle. This was the highest-ranked team Marquette (6-2) has beaten under Smart and the Golden Eagles improved to 7-6 against AP Top 25 squads in his tenure.

"Most of the time against these great teams, they don't have us winning that game," said David Joplin, who scored 19 points. "We just come out, we want to go out and prove everybody wrong. And that feeling, that chip makes us play so much better."

Marquette nearly produced its

most lopsided victory against a Top 25 team. The Golden Eagles trounced No. 16 Providence 88-56 on Jan. 4 in Smart's debut season.

"When you go into a game and the game is bigger in the minds of your players than anything else, to me that's the best recipe for winning," Smart said. "It should be that way all the time, but human nature sometimes messes with that."

Marquette's defense embarrassed a highly regarded Baylor backcourt.

The Golden Eagles raced to a 51-25 halftime lead thanks to a 24-0 edge in points off turnovers. Baylor (5-2) already had a season-high 16 turnovers by halftime.

Baylor entered Tuesday ranked third among Division I teams in assist-turnover margin. The Bears had 20 turnovers and 12 assists against Marquette.

"I didn't see that coming," Baylor coach Scott Drew said. "Credit the crowd. Credit them for

building momentum. Credit Shaka for having them prepared and how hard they played. At the end of the day, we fed to the fire by turning it over and making some uncharacteristic mistakes."

Prosper scored 10 points and sank two 3-pointers during a 23-2 run that turned an early 7-2 deficit into a 25-9 advantage. Chase Ross capped the spurt by getting a steal and throwing down a left-handed dunk.

Baylor never cut Marquette's lead below 22 points in the second half.

Kam Jones had 20 points as Marquette shot 58.3% overall to win its third straight. The Golden Eagles shot 12 of 25 from 3-point range, with Jones going 4 of 7 and Prosper and Joplin each going 3 of 4.

Baylor's LJ Cryer had 17 of his 19 points, in the second half. Adam Flagler had 16 and Keyonte George added 12 for the Bears.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Dec. 1, 1991, Ukrainians voted overwhelmingly for
independence from the Soviet Union.

On this date:

In 1824, the presidential election was turned over to
the U.S. House of Representatives when a deadlock de-
veloped among John Quincy Adams, Andrew Jackson,
William H. Crawford and Henry Clay. (Adams ended
up the winner.)

In 1862, President Abraham Lincoln sent his Second
Annual Message to Congress, in which he called for the
abolition of slavery, and went on to say, "Fellow-cit-
izens, we can not escape history. We of this Congress
and this Administration will be remembered in spite of
ourselves."

In 1941, Japan's Emperor Hirohito approved waging
war against the United States, Britain and the Neth-
erlands after his government rejected U.S. demands
contained in the Hull Note.

In 1942, during World War II, nationwide gasoline
rationing went into effect in the United States; the goal
was not so much to save on gas, but to conserve rubber
that was desperately needed for the war effort by reduc-
ing the use of tires.

In 1952, the New York Daily News ran a front-page
story on Christine Jorgensen's sex-reassignment surgery
with the headline, "Ex-GI Becomes Blonde Beauty".

In 1955, Rosa Parks, a Black seamstress, was arrested
after refusing to give up her seat to a white man on a
Montgomery, Alabama, city bus; the incident sparked a
year-long boycott of the buses by Blacks.

In 1965, an airlift of refugees from Cuba to the Unit-
ed States began in which thousands of Cubans were
allowed to leave their homeland.

In 1969, the U.S. government held its first draft lottery
since World War II.

In 1974, TWA Flight 514, a Washington-bound Boe-
ing 727, crashed in Virginia after being diverted from
National Airport to Dulles International Airport; all 92
people on board were killed. Northwest Orient Airlines
Flight 6231, a Boeing 727, crashed near Stony Point,
New York, with the loss of its three crew members (the
plane had been chartered to pick up the Baltimore Colts
football team in Buffalo, New York).

In 2005, a roadside bomb killed 10 U.S. Marines near
Fallujah, Iraq.

In 2009, President Barack Obama ordered 30,000 more
U.S. troops into the war in Afghanistan but promised
during a speech to cadets at the U.S. Military Academy
at West Point to begin withdrawals in 18 months.

In 2020, disputing President Donald Trump's persistent,
baseless claims, Attorney General William Barr told
The Associated Press that the U.S. Justice Department
had uncovered no evidence of widespread voter fraud
that could change the outcome of the 2020 election.
Trump filed a lawsuit in Wisconsin seeking to disqual-
ify more than 221,000 ballots in a longshot attempt to
overturn Democrat Joe Biden's win in the battleground
state.

Ten years ago: Kansas City Chiefs linebacker Jovan
Belcher fatally shot his girlfriend, Kasandra Perkins,
then drove to Arrowhead Stadium and took his own
life in front of the team's coach and general manager.
Enrique Pena Nieto took the oath of office as Mexico's
new president, vowing to restore peace and security.

Five years ago: Retired general Michael Flynn, who
served as President Donald Trump's first national se-
curity adviser, pleaded guilty to lying to the FBI about
reaching out to the Russians on Trump's behalf. (Fly-
nn would be pardoned by Trump after twice pleading
guilty to lying to the FBI.)

One year ago: As the Supreme Court heard arguments
on a challenge to a Mississippi law banning abortion af-
ter 15 weeks of pregnancy, members of the court's con-
servative majority signaled that they would allow states
to ban abortion much earlier in pregnancy and possibly
even overturn the nationwide right that had existed for
nearly 50 years. (In June 2022, the court would use the
Mississippi case to overturn its Roe v. Wade decision

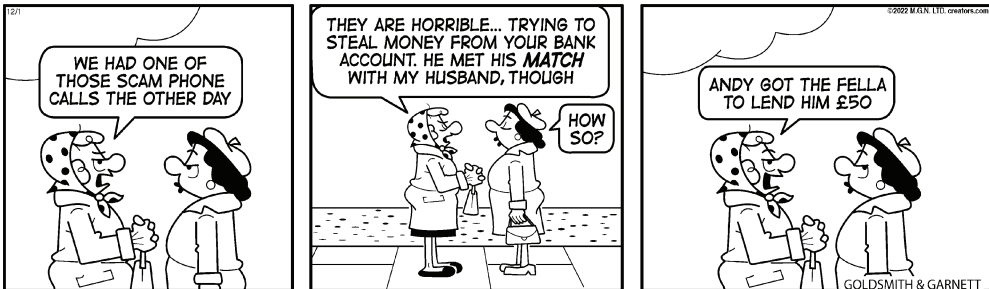

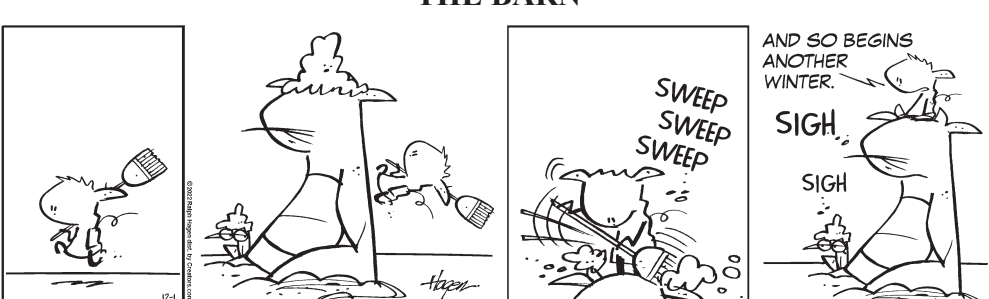

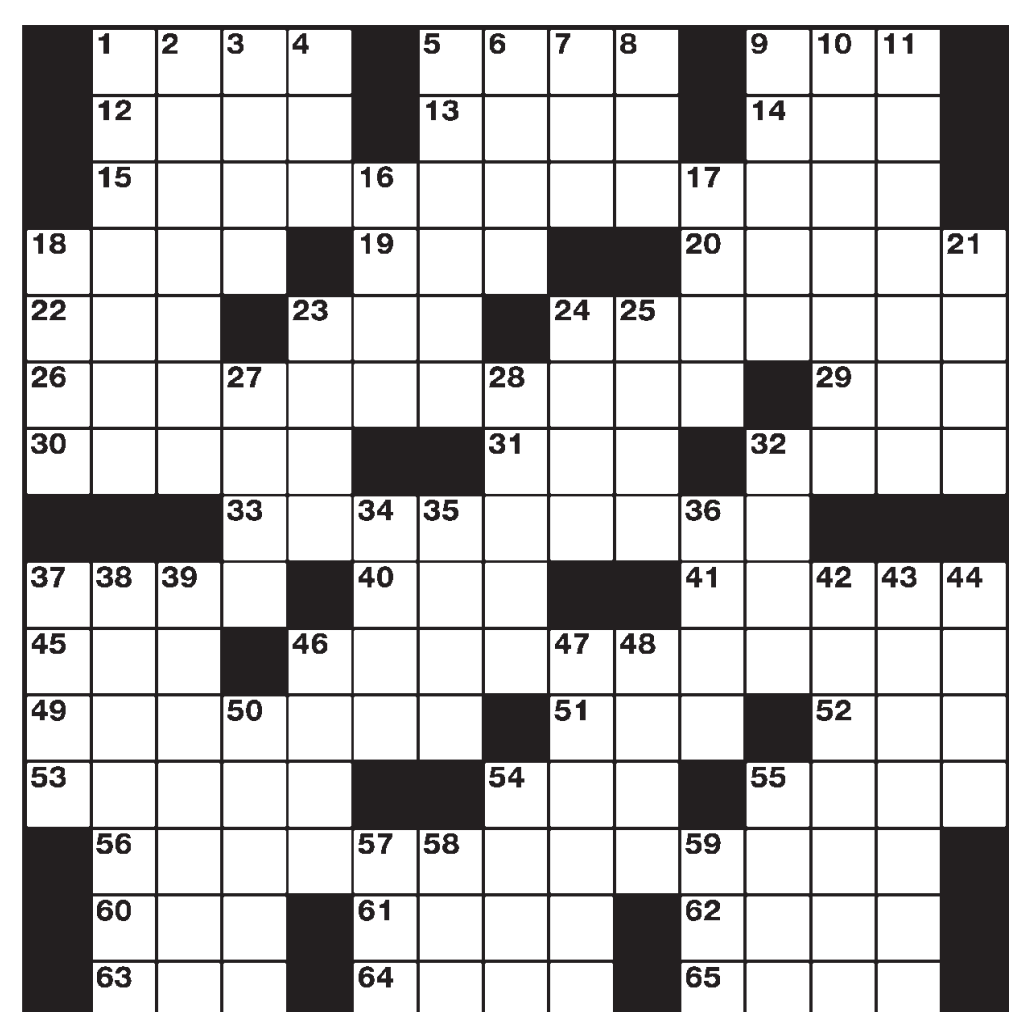
