FT. BENNING, Ga. (AHTNC) — Paul D. Gilchrist, son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul L. Gilchrist, 503 Oak St., Burk Burnett, Tex., a student at Midwestern University in Wichita Falls, Tex., has completed the nation's only basic Reserve Officers' Training Corps summer camp at Ft. Benning, Ga., July 19.

The basic summer camp provides active-duty training in lieu of two years on-campus study, allowing him to enter the advanced ROTC program at the university.

During the six-week encampment, he received intensive training in leadership, rifle marksmanship, physical conditioning and other military subjects.

Upon completion of the advanced ROTC program and graduation from college, he is eligible to be commissioned as a second lieutenant in the U. S. Army.

Cadet Gilchrist is a 1965 graduate of Burk Burnett High School.

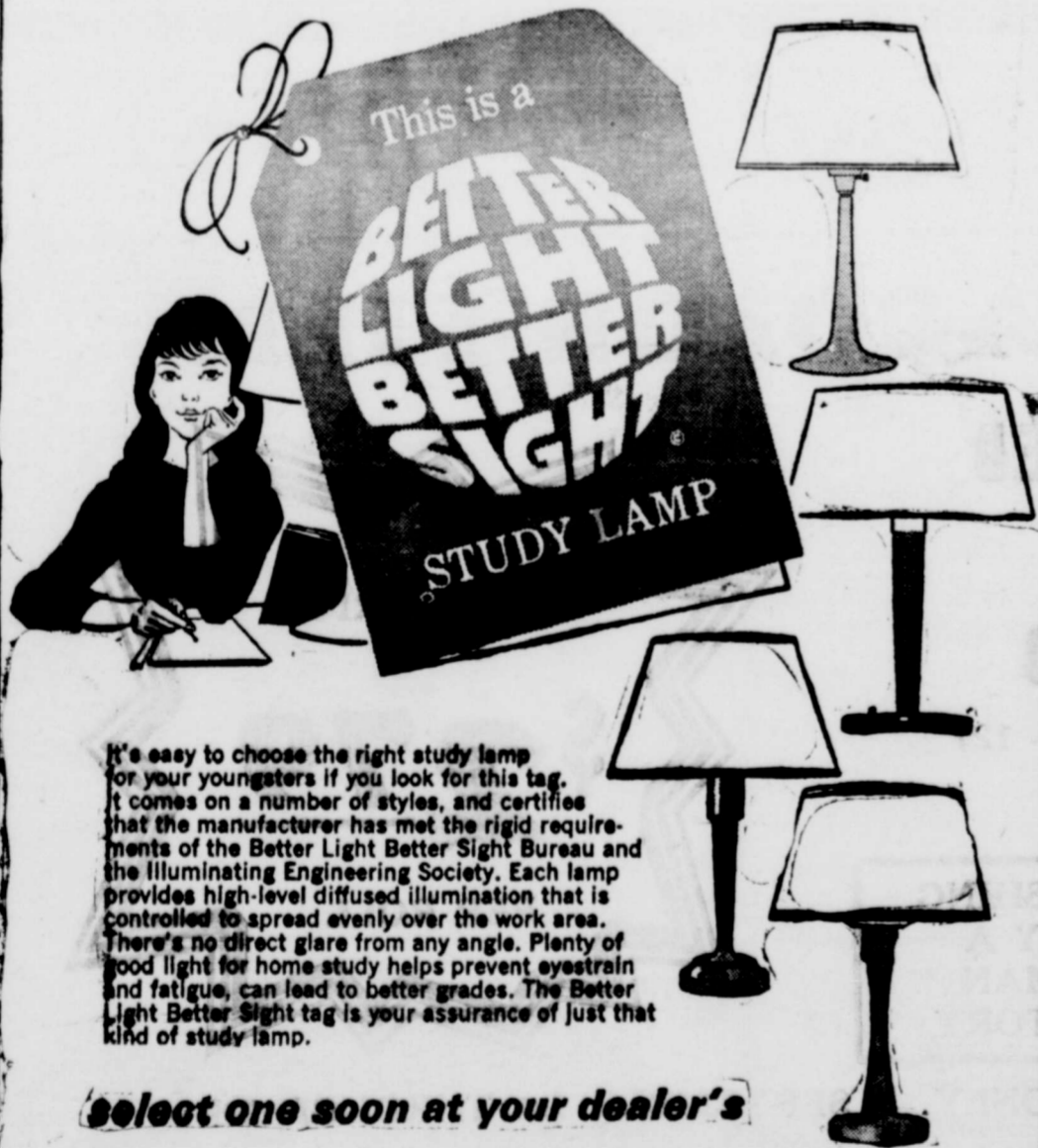

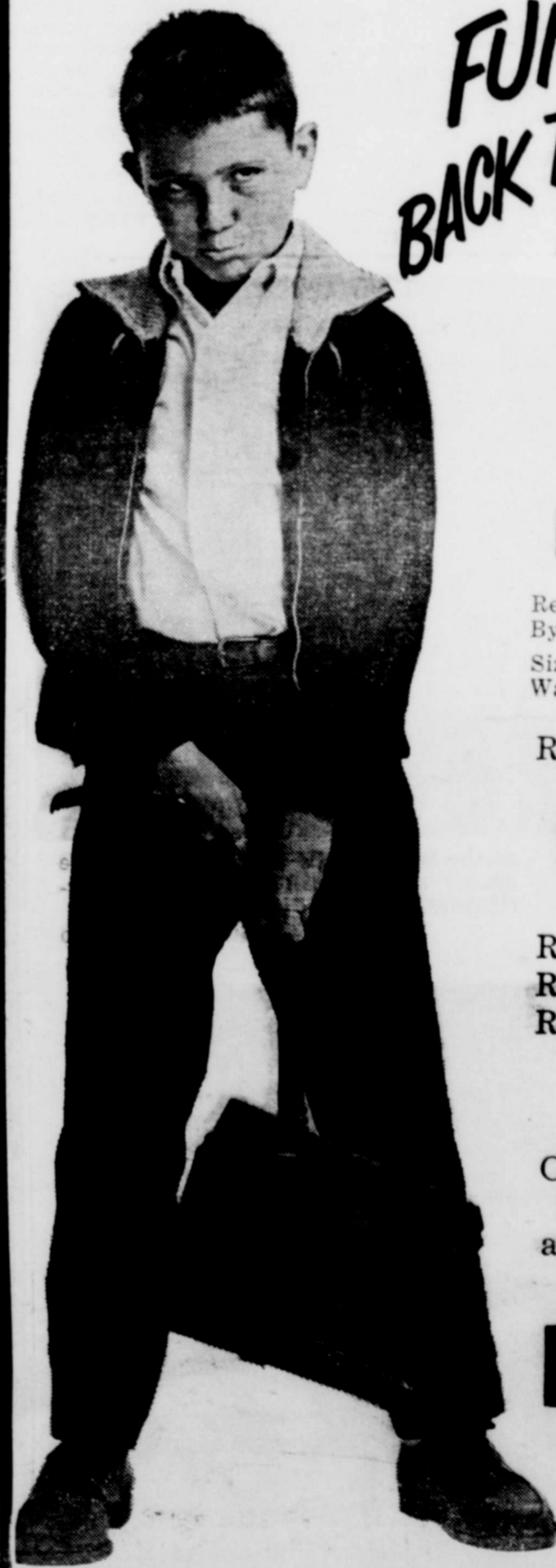

## SEN. RALPH YARBOROUGH'S NEWSLETTER

When Congress reconvenes after Labor Day following a four-week recess for the Democratic and Republican national conventions, members will find plenty of work waiting. Especially in the Senate the outlook for early adjournment is gloomy. In addition to many important bills which deserve consideration, the Senate must act on President Johnson's appointments of Justice Abe Fortas to become Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, as well as confirmation of our fellow Texan Homer Thornberry to fill the seat which Fortas will vacate. A few Senators who oppose those two appointments have threatened to filibuster against confirmation. While that is their right under the rules of the Senate, I hope that these few will not obstruct the Senate in its duty to vote on confirmation. I am confident that both Justice Fortas and Judge Thornberry will be confirmed if a vote is allowed. But in addition to this important duty for the Senate, we have much to do in terms of legislation. One of my top

reconvenes will be a continued fight for bilingual education funds under my Bilingual Education Bill passed last year. The House recklessly cut out funds for this much-needed program to better educate American children from non-English-speaking homes. I succeeded in reinserting \$10 million in the Senate Appropriations committee, not nearly enough for a national bilingual education program but at least a start. We authorized \$30 million for this year to serve three million children. I am hopeful that Congress will at least approve the \$10 million. After all, we spend that much every hour in our military budget. Another high priority bill awaiting action is my worker safety bill. On-the-job accidents and health hazards cause 14,500 deaths in the United States each year, and over seven million injuries. President Johnson has endorsed my bill to create job safety standards protecting our 75 million work-priority projects when Congress

the right to participate in their government.

These are high priority bills which have been listed by the President as vital to the success of the 90th Congress. There are many others — including local bills like my Big Thicket National Park Bill, my Palmetto Bend Dam proposal, and others.

It will be a busy period. I hope Congress will give these bills the attention they deserve before calling the 90th Congress to a close.
