The Burk Burnett Independent School District's application for summer Head Start has been approved for 1969. The budget is the same as that approved for last year. The federal share of the budget is \$15,479. The non-federal share is \$3,875. The non-federal share is provided by volunteer aides.

The program provides for a staff director, a nurse, four teachers, four teachers' aides, a secretary, a cook and helper, and a bus driver.

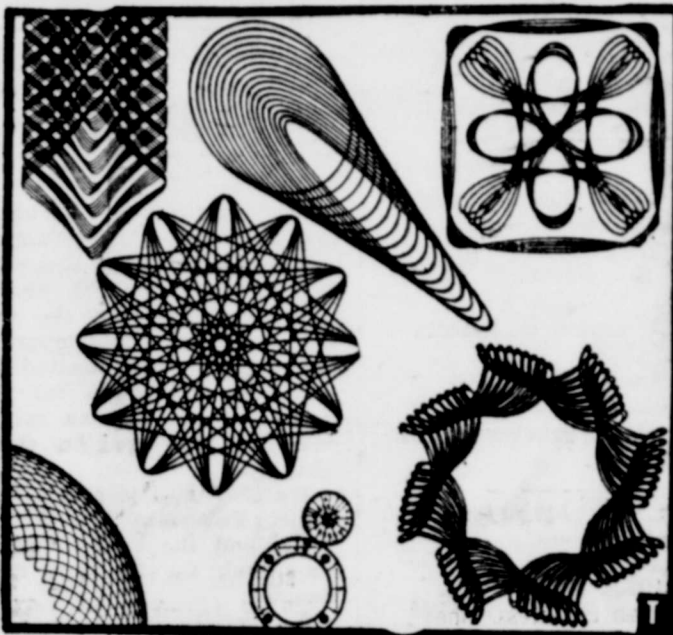

A Spirograph set consists of 18 plastic discs, 2 rings, 2 racks, 4 ball point pens, drawing paper, a baseboard and pins.

To create Spirographics, you pin a ring to the paper-covered baseboard, then place one of the discs inside the ring so that the gear teeth mesh. Next you insert a ball point pen into one of the larger holes and roll the disc against the ring, keeping the gear teeth meshed. As the pen moves, it creates delicate designs of astonishing intricacy.

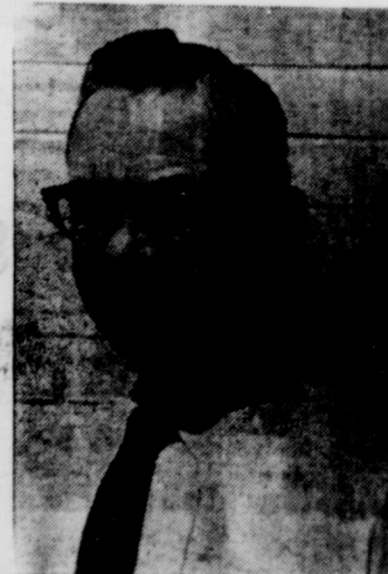

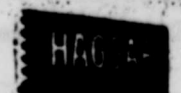

The Hardin Foundation supports the U.S. Government Documents Department of the Library.

Those interested in history and genealogy can have a field day with such items as census reports, name lists of armed forces units, Smithsonian Institution reports, State Department documents and congressional reports, Charles D. Heineke, assistant director, said.

Military history records offer an abundance of information. Two excellent retrospective sources are the War Department's "War of the Rebellion, Official Records of the Union and Confederate Armies," and the Navy Department's "Official Records of the Union and Confederate Navies in the War of the Rebellion." Both give the history of the Civil War and the names of those who participated.

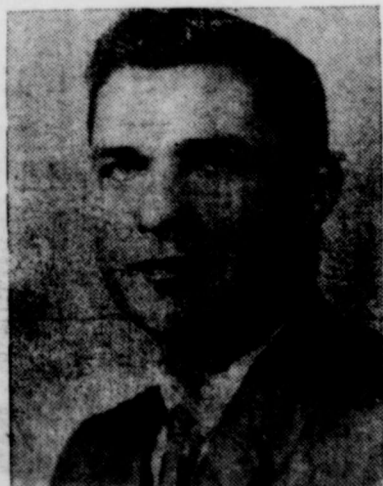

Without this grounding in the love of God, no government or society or way of life will long persevere and the freedoms which we hold so dear will inevitably perish. Therefore, even from a selfish point of view, one should support the Church for the sake of the welfare of himself and his family. Beyond that, however, every person should uphold and participate in the Church because it tells the truth about man's life, death and destiny; the truth which alone will set him free to live as a child of God.

News From The County Agent

The 1969 State 4-H Horse Show will be held in Sweetwater, August 14-16 at the Nolan County Coliseum. Some 400 4-H Club members from every section of Texas will participate in the show. All will have been named county and district winners earlier. A cutting horse contest will be included for the first time.

Veterinarians in USDA's Agricultural Research Service anticipate one of the worst outbreaks in the 7-year history of the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program. Conditions are favorable for a buildup this spring and stockmen are urged to inspect their herds regularly, to collect suspected larvae for identification and to treat all wounds with approved smears.

With an adequate supply of soil moisture in nearly all areas, now is the time to be seeding rangelands to restore forage production, says B. T. Haws, county agent. The Trans-Pecos region is about the only area that is now short of soil moisture, he adds.

Seeding with native grasses following mechanical brush control is an effective means of achieving long-term reduction of brush density, said Haws.

Home vegetable gardening can be profitable as well as enjoyable. But, points out county agent B. T. Haws, it's a good idea to follow a plan if you want maximum production and the best possible use of the space available.

A plan not only helps you determine the size of the garden, but also is a big aid in selecting the kinds of vegetables which will give the longest possible harvesting season, says the county agent.

The size of the garden will of course depend upon the space available and also upon the number in the family and the amount of time which can be devoted to caring for the garden. Another factor, he adds, will also be the amount of vegetables you plan to eat, can, freeze or store.

As an aid to home vegetable gardeners, Haws says he has

Rats are expensive to have around the farm. It isn't so much what they eat, but what they waste because of their filth and living habits.

County Agent B. T. Haws says a single rat may actually eat only about \$10 worth of grain or feed but will destroy 10 times as much.

These pests need food, water and shelter and around the farm it is difficult to remove these necessities. Rats can be discouraged if good housekeeping practices are carried out.
