## Clayton To Retire From Electric Co.

Selling bait and fishing tackle will occupy the full time now of W. K. Clayton, who retires July 1 from the Wichita Falls power plant of Texas Electric Service Company after nearly 24 years of service.

Clayton was chief engineer at the Burk Burnett municipal power plant when he left to start with TESCO on Aug. 15, 1945 as a repairman. Six years ago he was promoted to machinist.

He and his wife operate a bait and tackle shop in Burk Burnett, but Clayton has been able to spend only his off hours helping her run the business.

Now, Mrs. Clayton will be able to have some "off" hours while he watches the shop, where they sell minnows, worms (which they raise), fishing tackle and other bait.

Clayton is a native of Eskridge, Kan., where he worked on the family's wheat, corn and livestock farm until he was 21 years old.

He was an auto mechanic at Topeka, Kan., and Bristow, Okla., before going to work for an automobile dealer in Burk Burnett.

He and Mrs. Clayton, the former Leora Walstrom, were married in 1930 in Topeka.

They are members of the First Christian Church in Burk Burnett. He is past master of Masonic Lodge 1037.

Clayton also is secretary of the Red River Rifle and Pistol Club, and one of his hobbies is rifle bench-rest shooting and loading ammunition.

Fishing, of course, comes first.

## City Police Chief Promises Steps To Eliminate Old Abandoned Cars

Burkburnett Chief of Police has promised — or threatened — strict enforcement of an ordinance which prohibits abandoned cars on city streets and other places this summer.

The ordinance, which has been in effect for several years, makes it unlawful to leave or permit to remain upon any lot, tract of land, or any public street or alley, a wrecked, damaged or demolished or disabled motor vehicle, or parts or portions thereof for a period of time exceeding 30 days.

The ordinance further states that such a practice is a public nuisance detrimental to the public safety, and subject to a fine not to exceed \$200 for failure to comply.

Parking of a car in the same spot each night is not illegal, Chief Abbott said. The ordinance applies to cars which have been abandoned, and in many cases stripped of engines and other parts. Some he said, carry old license plates.

One such instance Monday revealed that five vehicles had been parked at one place.

These were moved to allow street crews to go to work.

Abbott also stressed the part of the ordinance which states that leaving such abandoned cars in public view, also violates the law.

Not only are these an eyesore, he said, but they are dangerous as attractive nuisances for children, and often breeding places for mosquitos when water settles on the floorboards.

Written notice shall be served upon the owner of any vehicle so discovered, or if he cannot be located, upon the person in custody of the vehicle.

If the law is not complied with, the vehicle will be removed by the city, and held for 90 days. Storage charges will be made for that period, and, if not claimed, sold at public auction.

The ordinance was passed by the Burk Burnett City Commission on July 17, 1967.



Saturday's Bicycle Safety Inspection here Saturday was anything but a rousing success.

Only five bike riders showed up, much to the discouragement and disappointment of Chief of Police Buck Abbott and members of his department who worked long and hard to prepare for the event.

But Abbott was proud of the few who did make their appearance, they all scored high in the tests.

Youngsters attending were Janet Thornton, Tommy Thornton, Junior Cox, Selita Harris and Victoria Harris.

Abbott thought scheduling of the event on a Saturday morning may have kept attendance low, since many families planning a weekend outing were reluctant to allow children to attend and spoil the weekend.

The low attendance was even more surprising, coming soon after Burk Burnett had scored one bicycle fatality in recent months, and at least four collisions with autos since the first of the year, which resulted in injuries.

At the last such safety meeting, also held on Saturday morning in June, 53 youngsters responded.

Abbott, expecting a record number last week, moved the starting time up to 9:30, to take care of the larger crowd which never materialized.

A new date will be set for the next meeting, with prizes being offered, and a movie scheduled.

## Berry Street Paving Project Is Slated To Start Next Week

Construction of paving on Berry Street from Sheppard Road to the end of the street near Southside School will begin in about a week, City Manager Gary Bean reported to The Star yesterday.

The section of street, now about 18 feet wide, without curbs and gutters, will be widened to a 30-foot street, with curbs and gutters.

The street will also be lowered to the level of the new extension of Dana Street, which has already been completed, paved, with curbs and gutters.

Sidewalks, forty inches wide, will also be constructed along both sides of the new section

of Dana, to allow Southside School students to reach the expressway with greater safety, Bean said.

The project is being done by R. B. Swinford Construction of Burk Burnett.

Paving projects for the summer include 2500 feet of paving on Berry Street and Avenue B, plus 5000 feet of curb and gutter, sealcoating on about two miles in various sections of the city, and double sealcoating on Bradley Street, now unpaved.

The projects will be handled by city crews, Bean said.

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## LIMITLESS HORIZONS

Young people who turn their backs on careers in business in favor of allegedly devoting their lives to "public service" do not seem to understand that the profit motive and public service are not only compatible but complement each other. An illustration of how this works is contained in a late press release from one of the oldest prescription drug houses in the nation—Eli Lilly and Company. Mr. Eli Lilly, in the more than 60 years that he has been active with his company, has participated in the greatest era of medical and scientific advance in all time. Of course, his company profited from his efforts. If it had not, it would have been unable to carry on the research that helped to produce the miracle drugs that have brought many of the most dreaded diseases of man under control. Thanks to such efforts, the average life span has been vastly increased. If this is not public service, what is? The history of the drug industry as a whole is similar to that of this one company.

When talking about public service, it is well to define exactly what we mean. Spurning profits and climbing on the public payroll, which must be supported by profits, with the notion that this automatically casts a person in the enviable role of working for the public good is sheer nonsense. We already have too many public servants riding the backs of the taxpayers in this manner. The young person who wishes to rent a genuine public service—a service that will be remembered long after the faceless members of a bureaucracy are forgotten—can do no better than enter business where, as men like Mr. Lilly have found, the horizons are limitless.

## THE MISSING ELEMENT

Naval officer and Director of Naval History, Rear Admiral Ernest M. Eller (Ret.), recently made a point that is often overlooked in our strife-torn land. "Unhappily," he observes, "most education and most panaceas for social ills like riots, slums, and crime stress mostly material solutions rather than those of the soul and character. We should not neglect the material solutions but unless we emphasize first of all the nobler ones of the spirit we will surely fail."

Admiral Eller then quotes the words of a young naval aviator written to his wife shortly before he lost his life in Viet Nam. In them lie the soul and the character of which the Admiral speaks. "I don't want my sons to have to fight a war I should have fought. I wish more Americans felt that way. I am not a 'war monger.' It will be me who gets shot at. But it is blind and foolish not to have the courage of your convictions. I will not live under a totalitarian society and I don't want you to either. I believe in God and I will resist any force that attempts to remove God from society no matter what the name."

The Portland, Oregon, Traffic Safety Commission says that if more people would stop making excuses for not wearing safety belts—there would be a lot more people. What's your excuse?

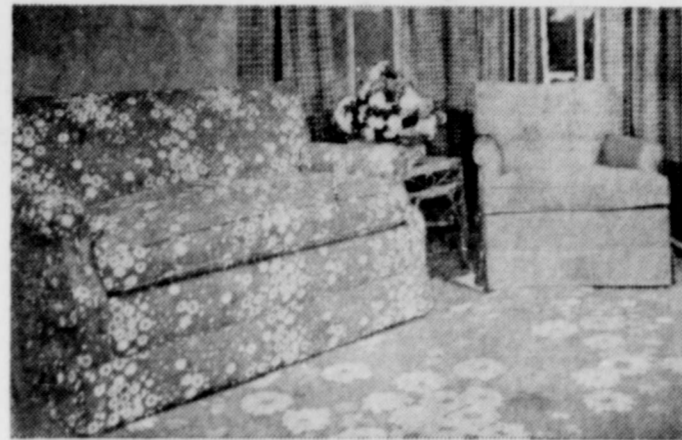

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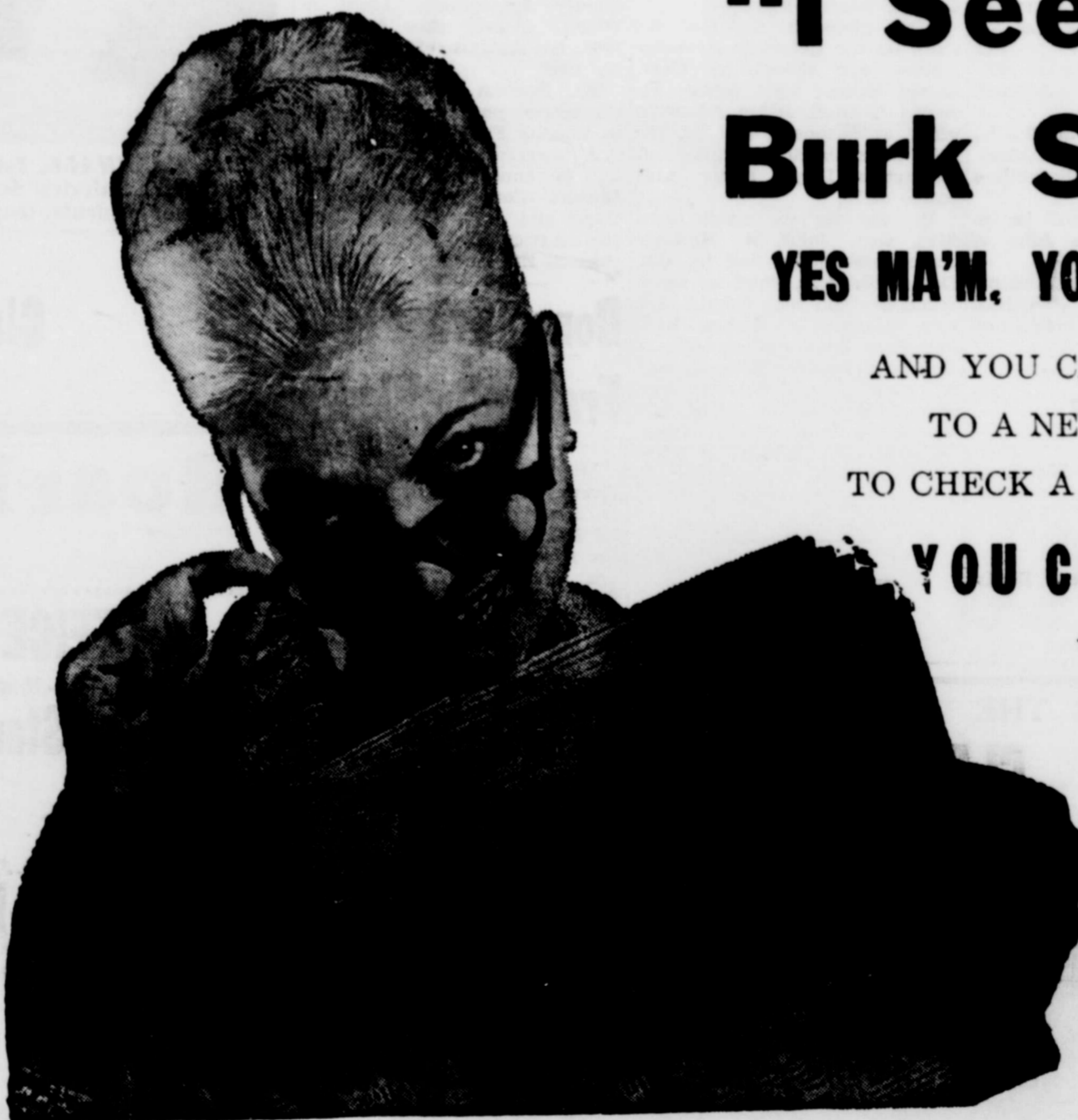

**THE THINKING MAN'S GAME**

It's been said that a good fisherman is almost a genius. Somehow he solves all the problems and catches fish when no one else does.

Consider the variables connected with fishing. They include water temperature, depth and clarity, vegetative growth, underwater terrain, the lure, the fish itself, and many other factors which must be taken into account.

It really doesn't take a genius to understand these things and apply them successfully. Almost any angler can learn how, according to fishing experts at Mercury outboards. The solution lies in developing a fishing system — a method of quickly finding out what it takes to catch fish at any particular moment.

First you must experiment. Call upon all your experience to determine where the fish are and what lure they'll take. If your first guess isn't correct, change both lure and the method of presentation. Don't try any one method too long.

Use all the fishing tricks and tips you know. Keep changing things until you get a strike.

When this happens, stop fishing and analyze each step of the successful cast and retrieve. Understand exactly what you did. Where was the lure? On top, bottom or in between? Was the retrieve slow, medium or fast? Did the strike occur in shade or sun? How far was the lure from the boat when the fish hit? What does the bottom of the lake look like?

When you've answered these questions, and any others you can think of, you're ready to make another cast — exactly like the one which earned you the strike.

This then is the system. Experiment and analyze. Apply your findings to the next cast. Anglers who practice a system, like the Mercury lads, are the ones who consistently bring home good catches. They've put some thinking into their sport, and find it more

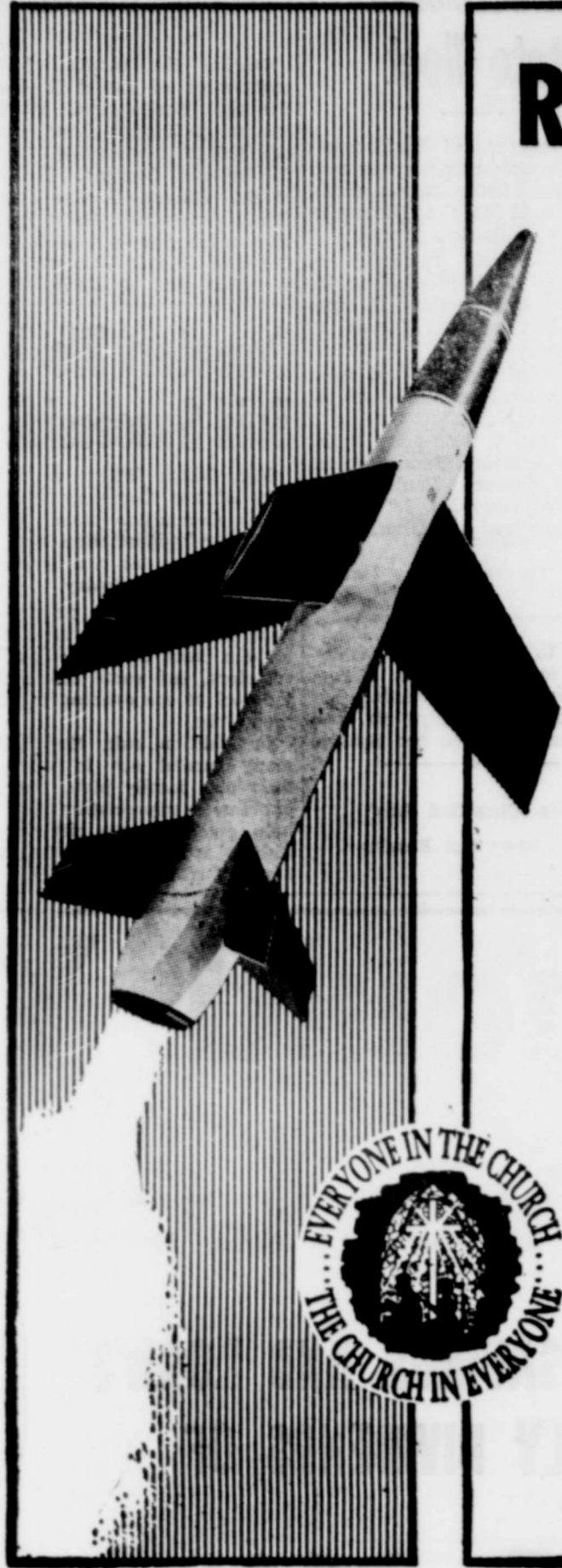
