VANDALS AND THIEFS HIT BURK DURING WEEK

The Burk Burnett Police Department reported thefts and one act of vandalism this past week.

About 9:30 p.m. Sunday, Police were notified that a hole had been shot thru the plate glass window in the home of the Hal Mabrys at 401 Peach Drive. The hole was made by a .177 caliber pellet according to police reports.

On August 18, Monday, police were told that a tire and wheel was removed from Clarence Pool's New and Used Cars. The same date, Burk Police arrested a suspect, recovered the stolen merchandise and returned it to the owner, filed charges against the suspect who will appear in court soon.

Tuesday, SSgt. Rivers Walden reported the theft of two rods and reels taken from his parked pickup at 623 Cottonwood. Police are continuing their investigation of the incidents.

Burkburnett, further indicating a dramatic increase in population and school children, approved a record \$1.7 million school budget at the public hearing and board meeting held Monday night. This compares with \$1.4 million last year.

The record amount is for the upcoming fiscal year. Unanimous approval by the board came immediately after presentation by Supt. I. C. Evans.

The 1969-70 budget proposed expenditures of approximately \$1,740,144.00. This includes \$69,160 for administration, \$1,266,877 for instruction, \$52,300 for pupil transportation, \$124,100 for operation of plant, \$26,000 for plant maintenance, \$79,000 for capital outlay, \$61,141 for debt service, \$20,000 for student activities, \$13,853 for fixed charges, \$17,972 for health services, \$1,740 for adult education.

Total revenues anticipated were announced as \$1,742,935 of which \$220,588 would be from local taxes, \$1,195,947 from state apportionment, \$326,200 from federal sources and \$200 from County sources. The tax rate will remain at \$1.50 per \$100 evaluation for the Burk Burnett School District.

The Burk Burnett district which now includes the Friberg Common School District, has an assessed valuation of \$14,572,390.00.

A record school enrollment for Burk Schools is anticipated for the 1969-70 school year with estimates indicating as many as 4,000 students this year.

ORDINANCE NO. 301
AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE USE OF THE CITY'S DUMP GROUND; PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT:

SECTION 1: Any person using the City of Burkburnett dump ground, which may be maintained for refuse, shall place their trees, hedges, bushes, vines, refuse, or garbage in areas in said dump ground in accordance with signs maintained by the City of Burkburnett, or its employees and agents directing the use of such grounds and in accordance with instructions of any attendant designated by the City of Burkburnett or its City Manager to be an attendant at said grounds.

SECTION 2: Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a

fine of not more than \$200.00.

SECTION 3: The fact that there is presently no adequate provisions to regulate the use of the City's dump grounds, creates an urgency and an emergency in the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, safety, comfort, and general welfare, and requires that this ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after its passage and publication.

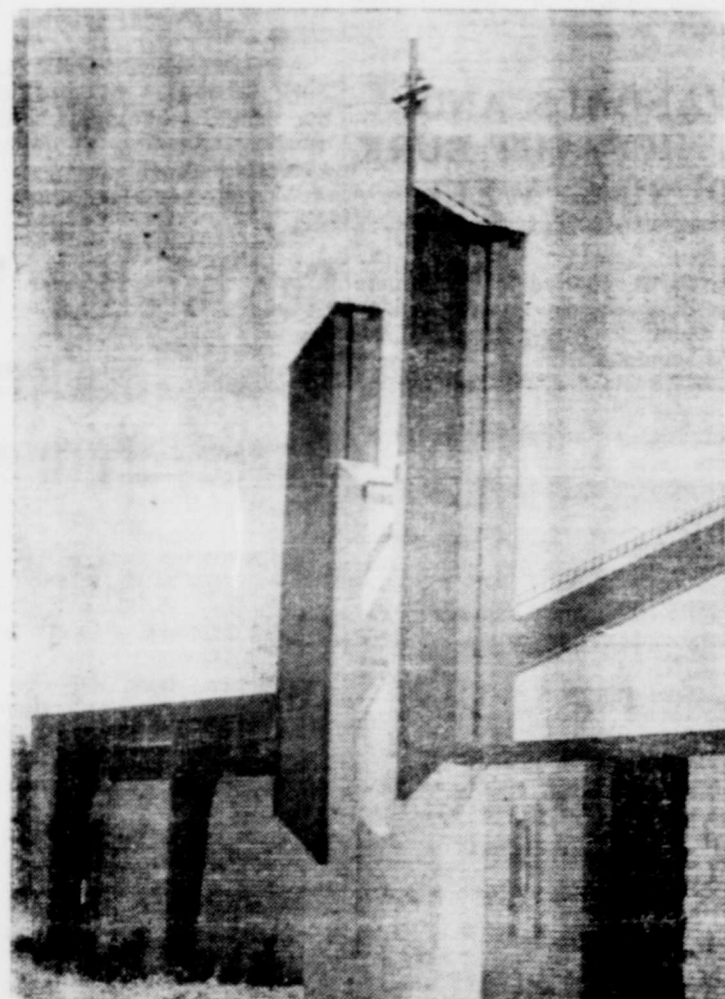

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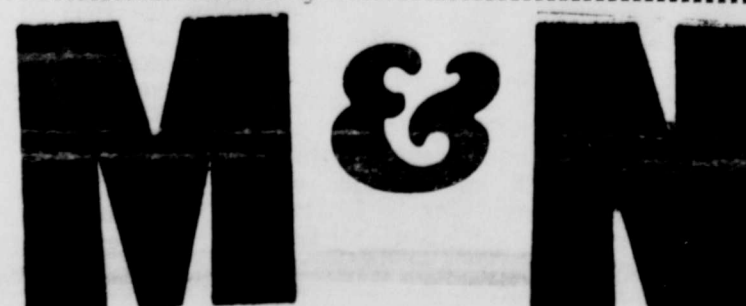

News From The County Agent

Nematodes, small hair-like roundworms which live in soil, will soon be getting a lot of special attention.

Because of the increasing importance of plant parasitic nematode control, and the need for agricultural producers and homeowners to have information needed for control, a detection laboratory has been established at Texas A&M University.

B. T. Haws, county agricultural agent, said the lab would operate on much the same basis as the soil testing laboratory, also an Extension facility. A fee of \$2 per sample will be charged for the detection service which will include the identification of nematodes present, infestation level, whether or not chemical or cultural control methods are justified, and a listing of resistant varieties of plants.

Livestock producers who fail to include for a year-round supply of high-quality forage in their plans often face difficult problems. The present prolonged period of hot and dry weather emphasizes the importance for such a plan, points out the county agent.

Research and on-farm demonstrations have shown the value of fertilizers in areas where it is needed, to keep forage production high even in years when rainfall is below normal, says the county agent.

Pastures fertilized in accordance with soil test recommen-

dations will produce more grazing during dry weather, than those not fertilized and the quality of the forage will be better. Therefore, says Haws the logical starting point for an improvement program is a soil test. Now is the time to take soil samples from fields which can be put into temporary pastures for use this fall.

With the unfavorable outlook for hay supplies, the county agent suggests that permanent pastures be given special attention at this time. With late summer and early fall rains, these pastures can be fertilized and a good cutting or two of hay produced.

In the light of the present situation, anything stockmen can do to stretch forage supplies will be in order and no bets should be overlooked.

Hot, windless days of August and September are the times pond owners should watch ponds for summer die-off of fish.

Oxygen depletion usually is the major cause for fish die-off and is due to ebbing and rapid decay of water weeds and other organic substances when the weather is hot and still.

All animal life in a pond uses oxygen 24 hours a day, but oxygen is replaced by surface absorption from air and releases from microscopic plants only during hours of sunlight.

Oxygen is lowest in ponds at daybreak. If it is dangerously low, fish will come to the surface early in the morning and gasp for air.

To relieve the oxygen shortage, the county agent suggests broadcasting from 50 to 100 pounds of superphosphate per acre over the pond. This buffers toxic effects of carbon dioxide and ammonia and stimulates microscopic plants to produce more oxygen. If treated soon after fish show distress, the situation is usually relieved within an hour.

Using outboard motors to stir up the water and replenish the oxygen supply is often recommended for small ponds. If a pump is available, water can be pumped from the bottom and sprayed back on the surface.

Suffocation from oxygen is not the only cause of fish die-off. Careless use of agricultural chemicals can also cause a lot of trouble. Therefore, possible contamination of fish ponds should be considered before chemicals are used.
