Any kind of trash burning, in a barrel, incinerator, or in any manner whatsoever, within this designated fire zone is expressly against a city ordinance.

This fire zone extends from the railroad property on the northwest corner, south along the west side of Magnolia St. to Market St., then east along the morth side of Market St. to Bay St., which is the street between the hospital and the Surf Courts; thence along the west side of Bay St. north until it connects the railroad property, which is roughly the street just north of the postoffice. This is the same area in which building restrictions are enforced, or the main mercantile district.







Self-Employed File Special Tax Form

Despite much publicity, some self-employed persons are still not aware that social security coverage is compulsory for them, according to H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Social Security Administration in Corpus Christi. Their net earnings of \$400 or more from a trade or business, in a year, are credited to their accounts for old-age and survivors insurance.

Just as a private insurance company would not write "voluntary" group insurance, Congress did not extend coverage to the self-employed on a voluntary basis, Cleveland said. The tax rate for the selfemployed is 21/4% on net earnings of \$400 up to a maximum of \$3600 a year.

The owner of an unincorporated business reports his earnings and pays his social security taxes at the time he files his income tax return for the year. The Social Security part of the report is on Schedule C. Anyone in business for himself who did not file that special report for 1951 should get in touch with the Bureau of Internal Revenue now to file the return without further delay.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38

providing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 50a, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Scholarship Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine; providing that such students shall agree to practice in rural areas of this State; providing certain restrictions and limitations; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 50a which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 50a. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law.
