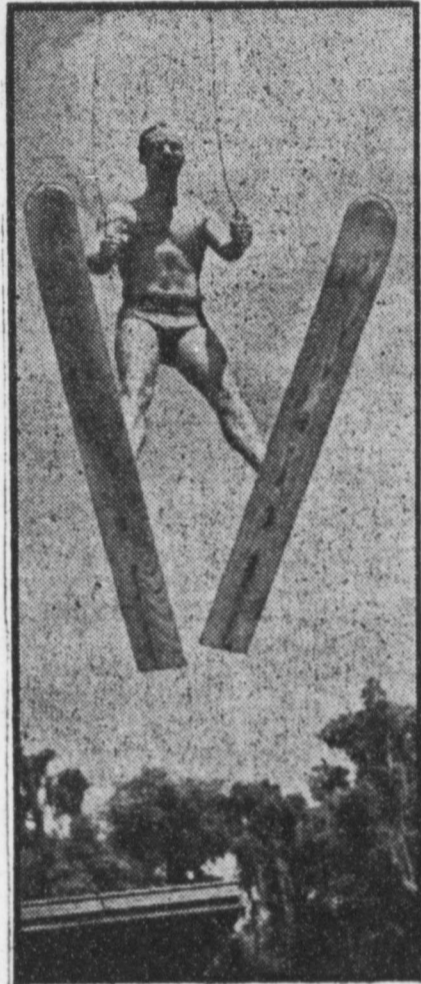

Art Students from All Points of Texas Attend Michael School

Parisian Rose Stone, weighing 3,500 pounds. This will contain tropical plants. A versatile collection of submarine lanterns and other odd pieces make ideal props for still life studies.

Michael plans to develop a playground area for children visiting their parents who are enrolled in the school. Mr. Michael, a man with vision, was born in Pennsylvania, and devoted most of his forty years to the study of art, and an effort to share with others some of the meanings of art and its power to enrich every day living. He has studied and exhibited in the United States and abroad, and has connections with various galleries throughout the United States. During World War II he was stationed in Mineral Wells, Texas, where he was awarded the Legion of Merit for his rare ability to produce in miniature and full scale the foreign cities in enemy territories which had to be studied prior to invasion.

At the end of the war, he chose to remain in Texas, particularly in the section of Rockport where wind and rain, sun and seasons, have made a thing of beauty of this finger of sand. The flasher folk and the summer people have known its charm for generations.

The students who are painting with Mr. Michael are not painting "pretty pictures." Mr. Michael has no patience with "pretty pictures." They are learning that painting is

hard work, and through that hard work, they are experiencing the deep satisfaction and the joy to be found in all creative activities. Exhibitionism and the arty pose are not welcomed in those classes where the students have no time or thought to waste on such foolishness. The artists and students are not confined to the studio grounds for their picture material. Daily tours are conducted to various places of interest, such as Rockport, Fulton, Goose Island, Lamar, Bayside, Aransas Pass and Port Aransas. The artists and students are required to paint two subjects daily and criticism is given at constant intervals on the spot.

Michael's Art Colony on the Gulf has been attracting tourists and painters for several years, and the demand for Mr. Michael's instruction necessitates his traveling day and night to such places as Victoria, Yoakum, Bay City, Goilad, Gonzales, Palacios, Corpus Christi, and other towns along the Gulf coast. The Rockport School of Painting is rapidly becoming nationally known through the many exhibitions of paintings produced in this area.

Texas Will Furnish 2,733 Men In Oct. Draft

Austin, Tex. — State Selective Service headquarters was called on Thursday to furnish 2,733 men for the armed forces in October, the state's share of a national call of 47,000. This is the heaviest call placed on Texas since March 1951 and all inductees will be utilized by the Army.

Lt. Col. Morris S. Schwartz, deputy state selective service director, said quotas for local boards will be computed and put in the mail soon.

The October quota will be filled with men 20 years old or older. Selective service headquarters said that at present it appears Texas can furnish around 400 men in October who will be 21 or older. The remainder of the quota will have to come from the 20-year-old group.

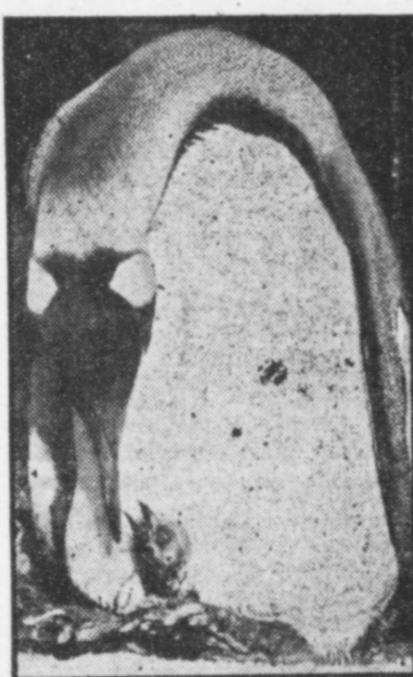
The local boards will not be able to send any man for induction in October below the age of 20 with the exception of delinquents and volunteers.

The October call compares with a September call of 1,188, previously announced. The October 1951 call was for only 807 men.

KTSA Will Inaugurate Alcoholics Anonymous Program Sunday

"The Lonesome Road," in eight quarter-hour radio broadcasts, attacks the misunderstood problems of alcoholism with restraint and sympathy and no sacrifice of candor. Gunnar Back, of the ABC new staff said "We're going to talk a while about the drunkenness in your town—but this time not with the futile anger and scorn of the past." The series of programs on alcoholism over radio station KTSA in San Antonio will get under way at 10:30 p. m. Sunday, Aug. 24.

This series is certain to attract attention, and is being released by the Communication Material Center of Columbia University Press; is sponsored by the Texas Committee on Alcoholism, Inc., San Antonio Central Committee of A.A. and Bexar County Medical Society.

Some of the most effective parts of the program are interviews with people who have had bitter personal experiences with a compulsive drinking problem.

Mr. Back offers no quick cure for the problem drinker, and suggests only that many have been helped by Alcoholics Anonymous, by doctors and health centers equipped especially for such treatment. He explains why alcoholism is recognized as an illness; what the alcoholic can do to gain his own recovery, and what the community can do to alleviate a costly public health problem.
