A NEW WAY TO CONTROL ANTS

Because ants attend so many picnics, one wonders why they ever gain the reputation for hard work. They may be despised and considered lowly and insignificant by genteel and fastidious homemakers, but no cookie jar, sugar bowl, pantry, or kitchen is too aristocratic for a visitation.

They are a nuisance all summer long. They invade homes, dig up lawns and, in general, make life miserable for town and country folks alike.

There are several types of ants, and each type has its own peculiar feeding habits. Some kinds prefer sweets, while others like greasy foods best. In fact, the food of ants is even more varied than that of humans. These varied and unpredictable food habits have vexed and baffled many a homemaker

in her attempt to control them with the use of poisoned baits often suggested for control.

There is now a new method for ant control which eliminates all the fuss and bother of trying to determine what kind of bait the ants will eat. The insecticide, chlordane, is the answer to the ant problem. It kills by direct contact, and thus eliminates the use of poison baits and the hazard which always accompanies their use; namely, that a child or pet may accidentally find and eat them.

Chlordane will kill any and all ants that walk or crawl on treated surfaces. Properly used, it can be depended upon to control them when and wherever they become a nuisance, such as in the home, on the lawn, the farm or the picnic grounds. Treatment is easy and simple.

The home and especially the kitchen is a place where ants seem to delight in making a nuisance of themselves. With chlordane the following simple procedure usually gives quick relief. Obtain a 2 per cent oil solution which has been manufactured for household use, apply it with a paint brush to baseboards, door jams, walls and around the base of cupboards, cabinets, table legs and other objects over which the ants crawl in gaining entrance to the house, or places where they are foraging. When used around the kitchen or other places where food is stored take care to use it in such a way that food will not be contaminated or children can easily get it on their hands or into their mouths.

If the whole house is being over-run with ants and the points of entrance cannot be determined, follow this procedure: Prepare a 2 per cent chlordane water emulsion (mix 1 quart of 45 to 47 per cent chlordane emulsified concentrate in 6 gallons of water) and spray all outside portions of the building

from the ground to the first floor window level, all window and door frames, steps, porch edges and sides, and all objects under the house, such as pillars and pipes, that may form a bridge from the ground to the house over which ants can crawl. This type of treatment has been found to keep homes, in the South, free of the pestiferous Argentine and other common household ants for an entire season.

Most ants which invade homes have their nests outside of the building. The line of marching ants can usually be followed back to the nests from which they come. If these nests and the hills they make can be found and "spot treated" with chlordane sprays or dusts, the ants in the house will disappear.

Lawns and picnic areas are often polluted with ants, and lawns on occasion may be seriously damaged. Chlordane is a top-notch insecticide for eliminating ants in such places. Foraging ants may be killed by dusting or spraying the areas. For each acre to be treated, use 30 pounds of a 5 per cent dust, or either 3 pounds of a 50 per cent wettable powder or 1 1/2 quarts of an emulsified concentrate in 100 gallons of water. For smaller areas use proportionately smaller quantities. One pound of the dust or 1 ounce of the wettable powder in 2 1/2 gallons of water is ample to treat 1,000 square feet of lawn.

Where there are many large ant hills in a lawn or picnic area it is desirable to seek them out and give them an extra dousing of spray. Often "spot treatment" of the ant hills is all that is necessary to eliminate ants from a field or lawn. This is accomplished by thoroughly wetting each individual ant hill along with an area of about 2 square feet surrounding it, with water containing 2 per cent chlordane.

In "spot treating" an ordinary sprinkling can may be used in making the treatments, if a sprayer is not available. A satisfactory solution (approximately 2 per cent) may be prepared by mixing 6 ounces of chlordane, either the 50 per cent wettable powder or the 45 to 47 per cent emulsified concentrate with 1 gallon of water.

Important in ant control is the destruction of the queens which lay the eggs that produce the workers. Since the queens live a protected life in their nests, they must be destroyed there. Because worker ants will collect poison baits, and take them back to the nest for the queens to eat, poisoned baits have proved quite satisfactory for killing queens. For this reason, poisoned baits are useful in eliminating hard to find nests. The type of bait required will depend upon the food habits of the particular ant. As already stated, some ants prefer a sweet bait, while others prefer a greasy bait.

The two common poisons used in ant baits are sodium arsenate and thallium sulphate. Both of these chemicals are deadly poisonous and must be handled with great care and in a manner so that children and pets cannot reach them. Ready-prepared baits containing these poisons either in a sweet or greasy base may be purchased at most stores handling insecticides. Detailed directions for their use will be found on the container.

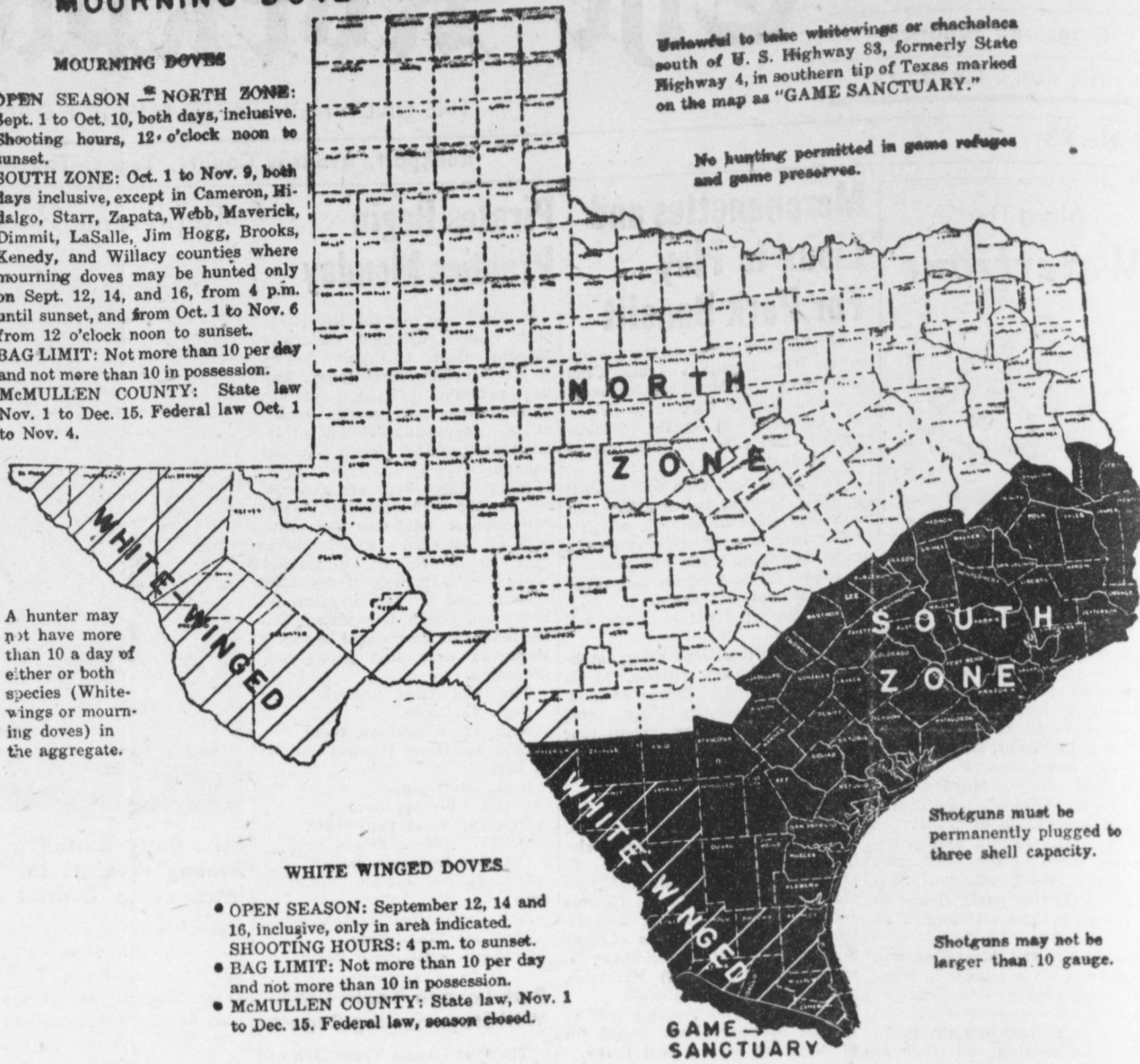

HOBBIES CAN BE YEAR 'ROUND VACATION

Hobbies might be thought of as a year-round vacation. If a job is your bread and butter, then a hobby could be the "jelly" to go on it. The kind of a hobby you can choose is limited mainly by your imagination.

What kind of hobbies are there? It's hard to pigeon-hole every one, but roughly they fall into the following kinds: (1) collecting things (butterflies, salt and pepper shakers, old jazz records), (2) making things (patchwork quilts, book ends, photographs), (3) learning things (all about family trees, birds, stars), (4) doing things (dancing, acting, hiking), (5) seeing things (movies, plays, concerts), and (6) competing in sports and games (baseball, canasta, chess).

You'd think with such a wide field from which to choose that everyone would pick a hobby which would be just right for him. Instead many people complain that they never do anything but "eat, sleep, and work." To find out why this should be means looking back into their childhood, because most often adults' hobbies are the same they had as children, sometimes in a slightly different form.

Youngsters between 6 and 12 years are interested in many, many activities. As they enter their teens, they tend to drop most of them and concentrate their efforts on one or two. It is hard for an adult, especially an older person, who has never learned to relax through hobbies, a form of play, to develop one. This is the reason that when children begin to show an interest in playing the piano, drawing, clay modeling, weaving, typing, or any other activity involving ability to use the fingers, they should be encouraged. Even though muscular control may not be gained fully

until later years, practice should begin early if skill is to be hoped for.

What should you look for in a hobby? First of all, it should be something in which you are deeply interested. Keeping up with the Joneses by golfing at the country club is small comfort if you'd rather be out fishing.

Next, a hobby should be suited to your nature. If you're the kind of fellow who enjoys taking a watch apart (even if you can't get it together again), you probably would enjoy learning a hobby in which you can use your hands. If you are neat and precise and like things nicely arranged, then stamp collecting might be your dish.

Even if you feel your choice of a hobby is too expensive, a second look might reveal a new angle. Are boats your weakness? Collecting yachts isn't necessary to get the greatest pleasure; it might be more fun to strip down and rebuild an old motor for a rowboat. Or, if you have artistic leanings, a collection of paintings or draw-

ings of ships might prove a source of satisfaction.

A hobby usually can be enjoyed alone or with others. It may lead to pleasant acquaintances with others having the same interest. Even though there may be times when you want to work in the company of others, you should be able to follow your chosen project at will and lay it aside when interest lags. For this reason it is better if working space for it can be set aside at home.

Your hobby will be more enjoyable if it is not too closely related to your work. A workday spent indoors calls for tennis or some other form of outdoor life when the five o'clock whistle blows. Cooking might be a hobby for the man of the house but a chore for the little woman—unless she's one in a hundred.

If your alibi for not having a hobby is not enough time, you'd better look at this hobby business in a different light. Devoting all your time to a job in the hopes of making more money—or turning what should be a hobby into a sec-

ondary job because of profit may make an old man of you before your time or give you ulcers. If the coins in your jeans begin to jingle loudly because of your hobby, it should be sheer accident, not because making money is your main object.

As you grow older you can enjoy the same hobby, but it might be best to change it slightly, taking into account that you have less physical endurance. Older people who find more time on their hands should steer away from such strenuous exercise as mountain climbing; they might find enjoyment in making a scrapbook of snapshots taken on expeditions, in talking to others interested in the hobby, and possibly in encouraging younger hobbyists in the field.

For a fuller, more meaningful life, a hobby is just what the doctor ordered.

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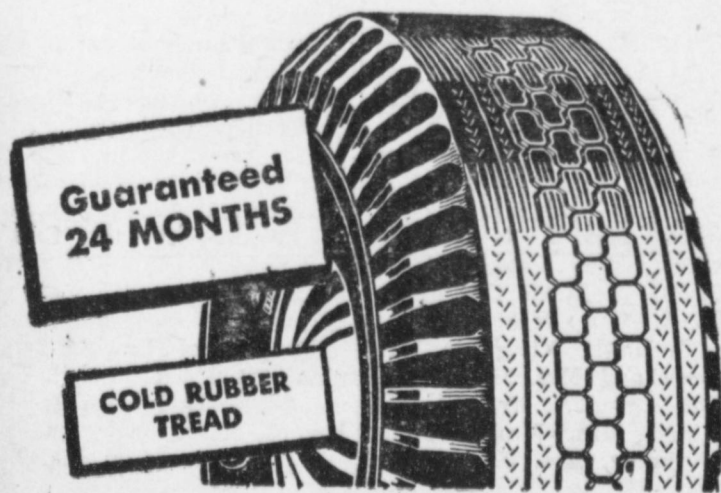

**Downtown Evening College Offers New Courses In Science**

Industrial scientists and university professors will offer courses in science beginning Sept. 15 at the Downtown Evening College of the University of Corpus Christi. Dr. Allan Lohse of the Shell Oil Company and Dr. O. V. Luke, Jr., head of the Petroleum Research Laboratory of the Celanese Corporation of America at Clarkwood are teaching courses. Dr. Lohse will teach a first year in geology, and Dr. Luke will offer the chemistry of hydrocarbons, a subject of interest to persons associated with all phases of the oil industry. Both men have formerly taught in their special fields at the University of Texas.

Dr. Gordon Gunter, head of the University of Texas Institute of Marine Science at Port Aransas will teach an introductory course in marine biology. Lectures will be at Evening College but for the laboratory work Dr. Gunter will use his laboratory at Port Aransas and the Nueces Bay. Dr.

Frances Marion Kenyan of the regular faculty of the University of Corpus Christi will teach the first year in biology and also a sophomore course in zoology.

Registration for courses at the Evening College will begin Sept. 9, but application for the courses may be made now to the Director of the University of Evening Colleges, P. O. Box 1695, Corpus Christi.

**Local CP&L Customers Now Receiving Service Through New Substation**

Electric customers in Rockport and the surrounding area are now receiving service through a new transmission substation just completed and put in service by Central Power and Light Co., B. T. Hardeman, Rockport CPL manager, has announced.

The new substation connects with the company's main transmission system by means of a 69,000-volt tap line from Aransas Pass. The substation reduces the voltage to 12,000 volts to serve the Rockport distribution system.

Before the new substation was built, Hardeman explained, Rockport was served through the Aransas Pass substation. The new arrangement is beneficial to both cities because it provides additional power capacity for continuing growth. Within the next few months another 69,000-volt line will be built from the new substation serving Rockport to the

Midway substation, near Taft. This will provide two-way service in the 69,000-volt system for both Rockport and Aransas Pass, assuring still greater protection of customer service.

Real Hurricane Filmed In 'Island of Desire'

'Island of Desire,' the new United Artists film showing Sunday and Monday, Aug. 31 and Sept. 1 at the Tarpon Drive-in Theatre in Aransas Pass, is the first picture in movie history to film a real—and extremely violent—hurricane as a part of the script. But it wasn't planned that way. Nature was an uninvited guest.

It all happened during the shooting, in Jamaica, British West Indies, of "Island of Desire," an exotic and suspenseful story of three people—two men and a woman—who are shipwrecked on a desert island in the Pacific. Stuart Heisler, the film's director, had been preparing for several days to photograph a hurricane scene, central to the picture's action. The terrain had been prepared, the Technicolor cameras set up, the wind machines readied. And then Radio Jamaica announced—and kept announcing for thirty hours—that the real thing was on its way.

The director conferred with Producer David E. Rose, with co-stars Linda Darnell, Donald Gray and Tab Hunter, sensational young film discovery, and with the production crew, and a unanimous decision was reached. They would stop away the wind machines, and make a daring attempt to shoot a real hurricane.

And it was done, with enormously satisfactory results. But the real story, as the "Island of Desire" company discovered the next day, after the hurricane had blown itself out, took place on the south coast of Jamaica. Fortunately, the filming was taking place on the north shore, which received the least destructive portion of the big blow. The town of Morant Bay had been wiped out, and Kingston, the capital of Jamaica, had been cruelly hit.

All in all, "Island of Desire" is a very entertaining picture.

## TEXAS TO KEEP GAME, FISH DATA

Austin, Tex. — The executive secretary of the Game & Fish Commission said arrangements are being made to make a record of unusual specimens of wild game and fish harvested in Texas.

He said cooperation of individuals, sportsmen's clubs, newspapers, radio stations and other facilities will be recruited to provide a permanent, accurate file of the rare specimens.

The executive secretary said the plan, which is the outgrowth of a suggestion formally submitted to the commission by Kenneth Foree, outdoor editor of the Dallas News, will be valuable for several reasons.

"It will be designed primarily to provide maximum pleasure for the hunter or fisherman harvesting the biggest trophy," he explained. "But, if the system can be established on an accurate basis, much vital information will be obtained for Game Commission purposes.

"We know that some species change over the years. Some become larger; others become smaller. This method may enable us to expand present facilities for keeping tab of periodic changes. The commission personnel now uses available data showing trends in game management routine."

The executive secretary said present plans are to chronicle practically every kind of species encountered by hunters and fishermen. For example, extraordinary game fish and rough fish catches alike would be registered.

He said present plans are to set up the system through distribution of literature in time for the main fall hunting season.

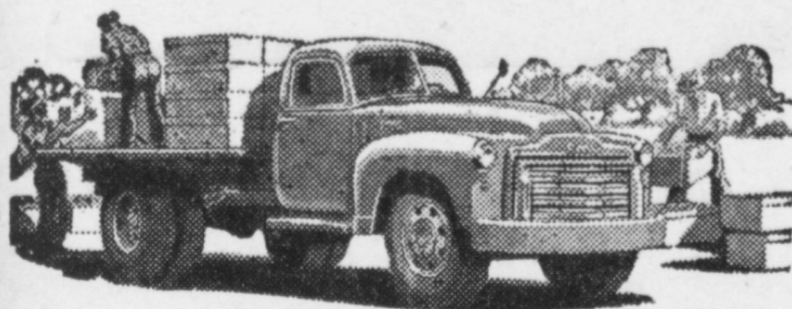

## Beneficiaries May Earn As Much as \$75 Monthly

Beneficiaries were limited to earnings of \$50 a month before this recent change in the law, according to H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Social Security Administration in Corpus Christi.

Cleveland stressed the fact that the limitation applies only to that income which one works for—earnings. Other income, such as rent, interest, dividends, royalties, and annuities does not affect the insurance payments in any way.

An employee or a self-employed person who continues to work after age 75 may receive the insurance payments without regard to the amount of his earnings.

### "Deed of Trust" Secures Real Estate Note

In most cases the seller wants the cash when the buyer buys the house. Then the problem to the buyer is how to raise the money? The answer is, borrow it. Regulation X of the federal government requires the buyer to have a certain amount of his own money on hand for payment on the house, if it is not older than a certain age. However, even as to houses not under Regulation X, the buyer should have some cash of his own.

One item common to all loans is the promissory note. In this note, the borrower promises to repay to the lender the amount of money borrowed. Of course, the borrower agrees to pay the lender some interest for the use of the money.

The rate of interest can be as high as 10% and still be legal in Texas, but most lenders today charge about one-half of that rate. The rate of interest is usually lowest on those loans that are insured by an instrumentality of the federal government, such as Federal Housing Administration and Veterans Administration.

A note usually provides for the sum of money being re-paid to lender in installments—monthly installments probably being the most common. This portion of the note is very important to the borrower as he does not want the installments to exceed the amount he can afford to pay.

On the other hand, the borrower does not usually want the installments to be too small. Small installments mean that the principal is re-paid very slowly and, therefore, over the life of the loan, the borrower pays more interest.

In regard to re-payment, if the note contains a provision enabling the borrower to pay the loan in part or in full prior to the maturity of the note, ("payment privi-

lege") then the borrower can use his extra cash to reduce his indebtedness. Also, a liberal prepayment privilege may be very useful to a borrower if and when he desires to sell his house.

In order for the lender to have something to fall back on in case the borrower does not fulfill his promise to re-pay the money, most borrowers are required to place a mortgage on the house and let them be buying. In Texas, the mortgage instrument used is a "Deed of Trust," a complicated instrument.

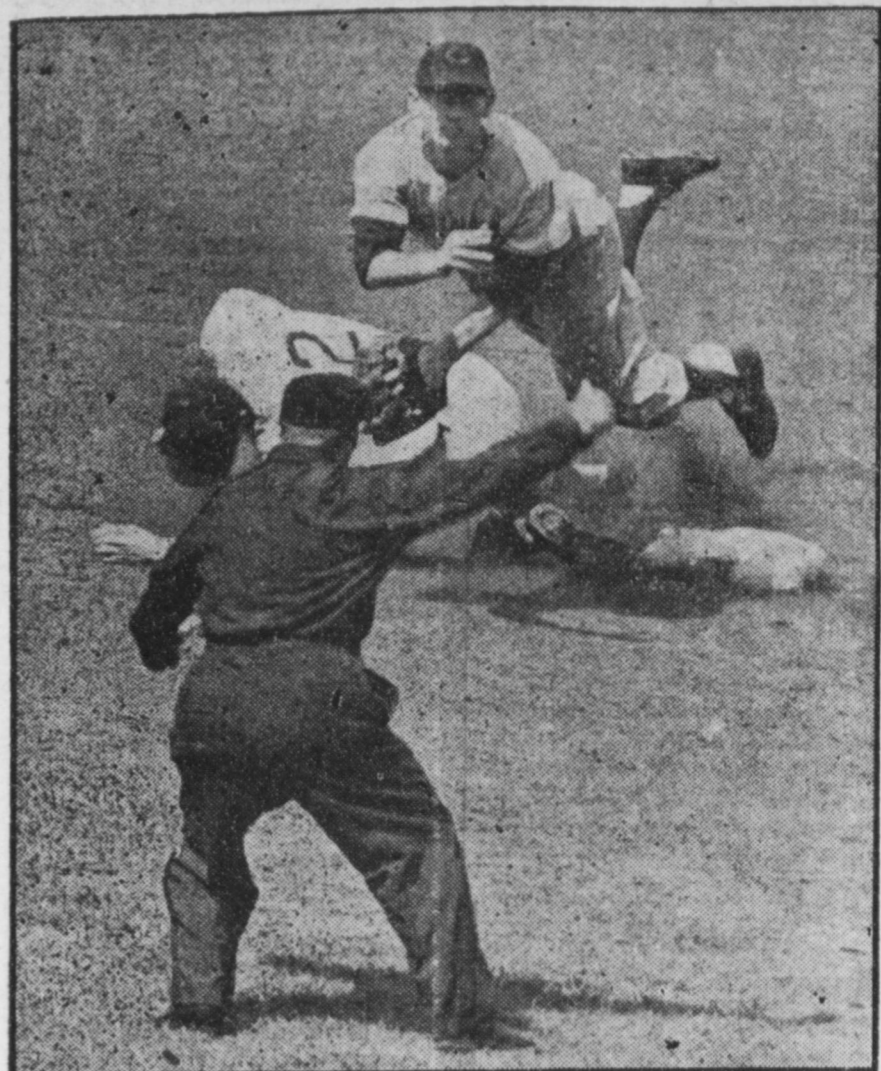
In its essentials, it is a conveyance of the real estate by the borrower to a third party ("Trustee") for the benefit of and as security for the lender. If the borrower defaults in the performance of the note or defaults in the performance of certain promises made in the Deed of Trust, then the Trustee is authorized to sell the property and apply the proceeds to the satisfaction of the borrower's debt to the lender.

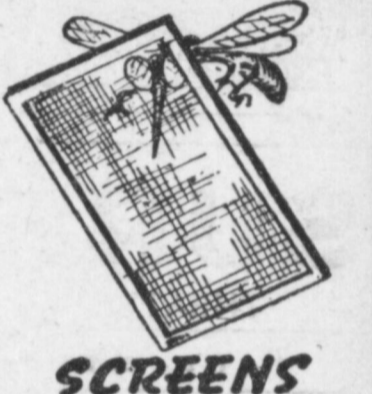

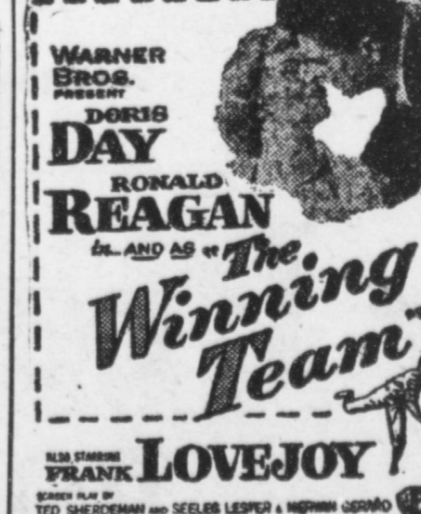

**Poll Favors Conditions Of Small Loan Bill**

Nearly 100 per cent of the San Antonians answering a recent mail poll, involving thousands of small loan borrowers, said that the charges for personal loans obtained under the conditions provided by Senate Bill 339, the new Texas lending law, were satisfactory, according to Leo Brewer, San Antonio attorney.

"Nearly all the borrowers reported that the charge for personal loans under the new act, which is the discount, or flat dollar charge method, is satisfactory," Brewer said. "Nearly all of the borrowers stated they would continue to borrow in the future, if and when necessary, with lenders who offer the services provided by the new Texas discount lending law," he declared.

"The new lending law," Brewer explained, "became effective in September 1951. Since then, state-wide inquiries to tens of thousands of small loan borrowers have revealed that Texans overwhelmingly favor this new act which provides for examination of all lenders by the State Department of Banking."

**Claim for Combat Pay Forms Due Here Soon**

The combat duty pay act of 1952, recently passed by Congress, provides that each member and former member of the uniformed services shall be entitled to receive combat pay for services as a member of a combat unit in Korea after May 31, 1950.

As soon as possible the government printing office will distribute to all postmasters a form entitled "Claim for Combat Pay," DD Form 667, which has instructions for applicants thereon.

Postmaster Marion L. McElveen states that as soon as he receives the forms he will place notices in the postoffice and in The Pilot.

**Dewey Brock Escaped Injury In Boxer Explosion**

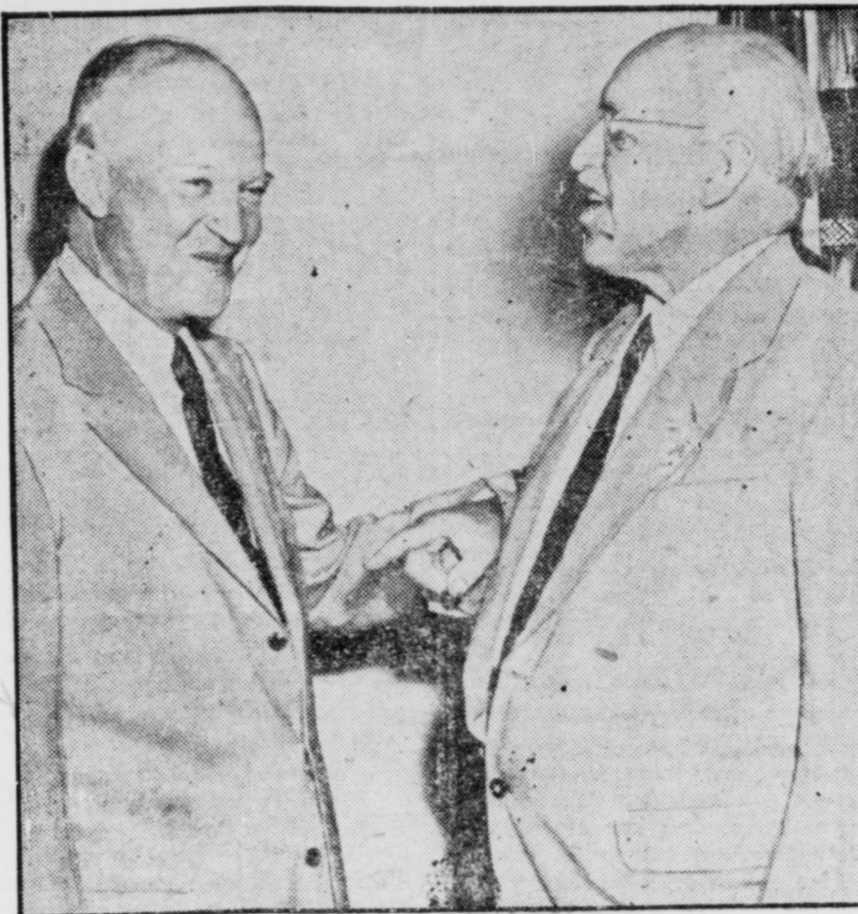

Dewey wrote that during the fire he was on the flight deck taking

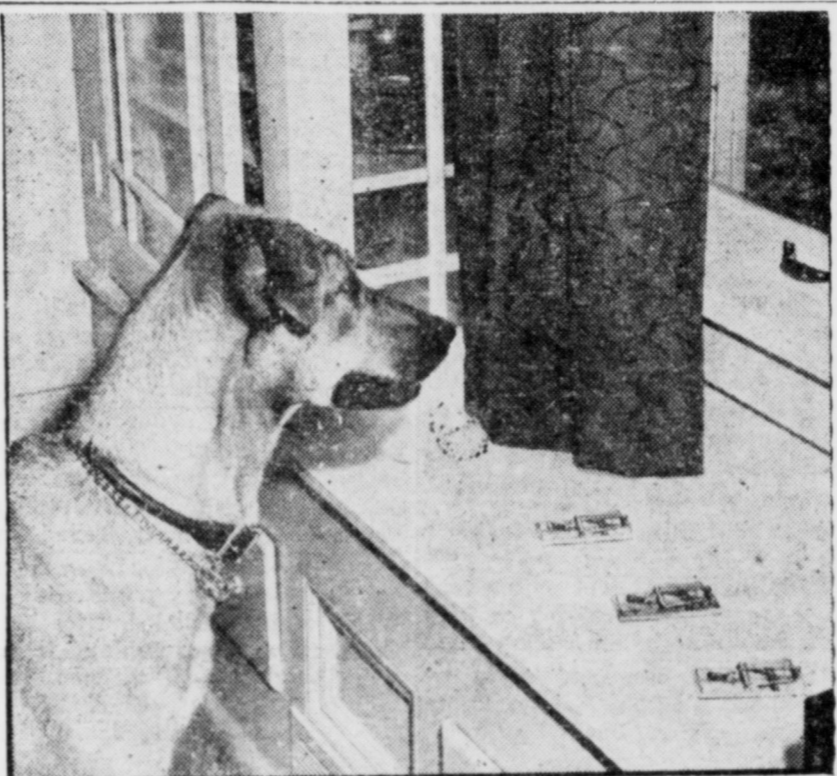
nose pins out of bombs and throwing them overboard. Twelve jet planes were destroyed and considerable damage was done to the 27,000 ton carrier.

have not yet enrolled. Between 140-150, students are expected in high school, and close to 475 are expected in elementary school. It was estimated that there will be 115 students in Fulton.

The policy regarding admission of under age children, as announced by the school board is as follows: Children who are not 6 years of age before Sept. 1 will be admitted, subject to avoiding overcrowded classes, provided the child will be six years of age on or before Nov. 30.

All children starting in the first grade are required to have small-pox vaccination. All other children who have not been vaccinated must receive the vaccination before they will be admitted. ### ARANSAS WELL HAS NEW PAY

C. G. Glasscock and Pontiac Refining Co. No. 1 State Tract 48, opener of production from the A-4 Sand in the Fulton Beach West Field in Aransas County, was completed for 102.79 barrels of 40.1 gravity oil.
