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'It Must Be the Heat,' Is Excuse for That Run-down Feeling

"It must be the heat," is a common excuse these days for a run-down, no-good feeling. "The heat saps my strength." "All the starch has been taken out of me" — any number of sad tunes in the same key are offered as an excuse to get out of a tennis game or a dinner date.

These fagged-out persons probably wish they had more git-up-and-go, but they just don't know how to come by it. Since causes for summertime tiredness may be many, each of its victims should look into his daily routine.

First of all, does he get enough sound sleep? The usual six or eight hours is not enough if it is broken by having to swat mosquitoes, get up and quiet a baby suffering with prickly heat or colic, or yell at the neighbors hold-a-barbecue party in their backyard. Of course, the obvious thing to do is to get rid of the cause of sleeplessness if possible.

Next, the worn-out fellow might think about the exercise he is getting. Is it enough or too much? Too little exercise can lead to sheep counting. On the other hand, it takes only common sense to know that eighteen holes of golf in the mid-day sun is not good for comfort, much less for sleep. Swimming and sunning between 11 a. m. and 3 p. m., can have the additional danger of sunburn, itself a sleep killer at times.

Diet is important. Because of

less physical activity during the heat and because of the heat itself, the appetite may be expected to fall off. This is little excuse, however, for making snacks a regular routine or for "living out of cans." Even though less food may be needed, the right balance of fats, carbohydrates, and proteins is just as important as in cooler weather.

The amount of salt which a person should have during hot weather worries some unduly. In general, unless one does hard physical labor at extremely high temperatures in dry surroundings, he will not need any more salt than usual. If an extra amount is needed, however, there are any number of methods for getting it; salt can be used more freely in cooking or can be added to tomato juice, soup, broth, or even beer. Salty foods such as crackers and sardines might be added to the diet. Still other ways are to take salt tablets by mouth (which occasionally may cause nausea and vomiting) or to dissolve a small amount of table salt in the drinking water.

A common question is what the temperature of drinking water should be. That is a matter of personal preference, as there is little evidence that cool water itself is harmful. Regardless of its temperature, large amounts of water, as well as other liquids, are called for when the mercury soars. In moderation carbonated drinks and beverages such as iced tea and coffee are helpful.

Constipation, which may occur more often during summer, should be treated with an oil or vegetable laxative rather than a stronger medicine such as epsom salts.

Above all, if the weatherman predicts a severe heat wave, sickness such as heat exhaustion, sun stroke, and heat cramps must be prevented by avoiding exercise, especially bad exercise, in the noon-day heat, by making working and living quarters as cool as possible; by taking sufficient liquids by mouth; and, if necessary, by increasing the amount of salt in the diet.

G.I. BILL FOR KOREAN WAR VETERANS IS EXPLAINED

Because of the confusion created by the recently passed GI Bill for Korean veterans the following facts, submitted by Representative John E. Lyle, Jr., should be of interest to all veterans:

KOREAN G.I. BILL

The president signed into law on July 16 a new G.I. Bill for veterans who served in the armed forces any place in the world since the start of the Korean conflict on June 27, 1950.

The new law provides five benefits, all designed to assist veterans in their return to civilian life. Included are education and training; guaranteed or insured loans for homes, farms and businesses; unemployment compensation; mustering-out pay, and job-finding help.

The education and training provisions allow a veteran one and one-half days of training for each day in service after the outbreak of the Korean fighting—regardless of where the service was performed—up to a maximum of 36 months.

However, veterans who have previously trained under earlier veterans' training laws—the World War II GI Bill or Public Laws 16 or 894 for the disabled—may get up to 48 months, minus whatever time they've already spent in training under those earlier programs.

A veteran may train in school or college, on-the-job or on-the-farm, so long as the school or training establishment has been approved by an appropriate State Approving Agency and meets other qualifications of the law. Only one change of course program is allowed, except under certain conditions determined by the Veterans Administration.

Veterans in GI Bill training will receive an education and training allowance each month from the government, to meet part of the expenses of their training and living costs. Tuition, fees, books, supplies and equipment will not be paid by the government; instead, they will have to be paid out of the monthly allowance.

Rates for veterans in full-time training in schools and colleges are \$110 a month, if they have no dependents; \$135 if they have one dependent; and \$160 if they have more than one dependent. Those in training less than full time will receive lower monthly rates.

Top monthly amounts for on-the-job trainees are \$70 without dependents; \$85 with one dependent, and \$105 with more than one dependent. The maximums for in-

stitutional on-farm trainees are \$95, \$110 and \$130, respectively. The law requires that on-job and on-farm rates be reduced, at four-month intervals, as the training progresses and the veteran's own earnings increase.

The law also specifies that veterans taking institutional on-farm training must devote full time to their program.

The new GI Bill places a \$310-a-month ceiling on job training, regardless of dependency status. Should a veteran's training allowance plus his earnings as a trainee exceed this amount, VA will reduce the allowance accordingly. There's no ceiling, however, on what he may earn.

A veteran will get his monthly allowance some time after the end of each month of training completed. Before the VA can pay him, the law requires a certification from both the veteran and his school or training establishment, that he was enrolled in and pursuing his course during that period.

This new method of payment differs from procedures followed under previous veterans' training laws. Under earlier laws, VA paid tuition and other costs directly to schools, and also paid eligible veterans a monthly subsistence allowance.

The loan provisions of the new GI Bill for post-Korean veterans are similar to the GI loan program now in effect for World War II veterans. Some changes have been made, however, to protect the interests of home-buying veterans.

The amount of VA guarantee on a loan is the same for both groups of veterans. Home loans may be guaranteed for up to 60 percent of the loan, but the guaranteed portion may not exceed \$7,500. Other real estate loans may be guaranteed up to 50 percent, with a \$4,000 top. And non-real-estate loans, such as GI business loans, may be guaranteed for up to 50 percent with a \$2,000 ceiling as to the guarantee. All such loans also may be insured.

VA's direct loan program, now in effect for World War II veterans, has been extended to veterans who served since Korea. Under the program, VA may make loans directly to veterans, but only in certain areas where four percent

GI loan money is not available. GI loan safeguards, written into the new law, apply both to World War II veterans and those with post-Korean service. Among them are the following:

A veteran's property must meet or exceed minimum requirements for planning, construction and general acceptability. This provision doesn't apply to construction started within 60 days of July 16, nor to houses which have been completed at least a year before they were purchased with GI loan.

VA may refuse to appraise any dwelling or housing project owned or built by anyone who has attempted to take unfair advantage of veterans in the past. Examples would be substantial deficiencies in the house, failure to discharge contract liabilities, or unfair practices in regard to contracts or marketing of the houses.

Also, VA may refuse to guarantee loans made by lenders who have failed to keep adequate loan accounting records, who have failed to keep adequate loan accounting records, who have shown poor credit judgment, or who have engaged in other practices detrimental to the veteran or to the government.

In the case of World War II veterans who have returned to active duty, their unused loan entitlement under the World War II GI Bill will be replaced by the same amount of entitlement under the new law. The result is that they won't be bound by the GI loan deadline of July 25, 1957, set up in the earlier law; instead, under the new law, they'll have 10 years from the end of the present emergency to obtain GI loans.

Payments are \$300 for those with at least 60 days' service who were on active duty outside the continental limits of the United States or Alaska; \$200 for those with 60 days or more service who were not outside the USA or Alaska, and \$100 for those who spent less than 60 days on active duty. Veterans eligible for \$300 will

get \$100 upon discharge; \$100 a month later, and \$100 a month after that. Those who are to receive \$200 will get \$100 at discharge and the remainder a month later. And veterans eligible for only \$100 will be paid that amount all at once.

Post-Korea veterans discharged before the new GI Bill became law also may receive mustering-out pay. To obtain the money, they must apply to their branch of service within two years from July 16, 1952.

The mustering-out program similar to that in effect after World War II, will be administered by the Armed Forces and the Treasury Department, and not by the VA.

The new GI Bill extends job-finding assistance to veterans with service after the start of Korean hostilities, on the same basis as veterans of World War II. The help includes job counseling and employment placement services of the Veterans Employment Service, a part of the U. S. Employment Service.

Veterans were reminded that the last three benefits of the new GI Bill—unemployment compensation, mustering-out pay and job-hunting aid—are not administered by the Veterans Administration. So veterans should not write VA about them, if they want further information or have questions to be answered; instead, they should correspond directly with the agency concerned.

The new GI Bill contains important deadlines that post-Korea veterans should keep in mind, VA said.

Education and training for post-Korea veterans, must be started by Aug. 20, 1954, or two years after

release from active duty, whichever comes later. No training may be given beyond either seven years after discharge or seven years after the end of the current emergency, whichever is later.

In contrast, for most World War II veterans, the GI Bill cut-off date for starting has already passed, and training may not extend beyond July 25, 1956.

The deadline for loans for veterans with service after Korea is 10 years after the present emergency comes to an end. The deadline for World War II veterans who have not gone back on active duty is July 25, 1957.

Finally, the deadline for unemployment compensation under the new law will be five years after the end of the emergency period.

The date on which the present emergency comes to an end is one that has to be determined either by Presidential proclamation or by concurrent resolution of Congress.

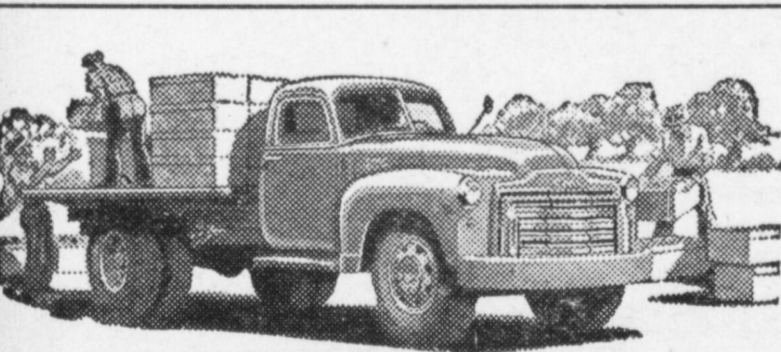

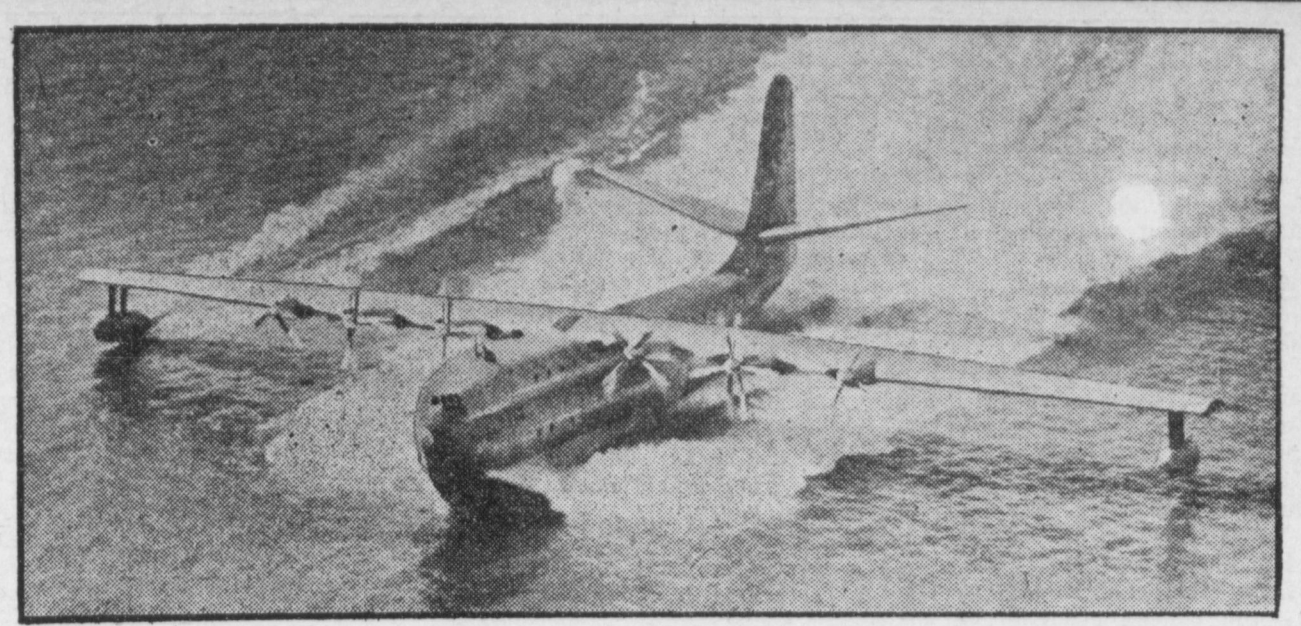

Social Security Payments Figured By New Formula

Beginning in September, a new method will be used in figuring the amount of social security insurance for workers who retire or die. A recent Congressional amendment of the Social Security Act provides an increase in the payments, according to H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration.

The lowest payment for a retired worker is now \$25 a month, and the retirement insurance will range up to \$85 a month. Total family payments will run from a minimum of \$18.75 to a maximum of \$168.75 a month. In every case the amount depends upon the average monthly earnings of each insured worker, and the number of qualified dependents in his family. For retiring workers, benefits

based on earnings after 1950 are figured as follows: (1) Take 55 percent of the first \$100 of average monthly wages, and (2) add 15% of the remainder. For example, suppose a worker reaches age 65, retires, and files his application in October of this year. From January 1, 1951, to October 1, 1952, he averaged \$150.00 a month in covered employment. His retirement insurance is:
55% of \$100.....\$55.00
15% of the remainder (\$50) 7.50
Monthly retirement ins.....\$62.50
The payments to dependents are based on those of the worker, Cleveland explained. No more than \$3600 a year is used in figuring the average monthly wage.

Typhus Fever Still Prevalent In Texas

Austin, Tex. — Typhus fever continues to make its appearance in various counties of Texas, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer. Like typhoid fever, most cases appear during the summer and fall and all citizens are urged to help control the spread of typhus by assisting in exterminating rats.

"There is only one way in which typhus can be controlled," Dr. Cox said, "and that is by, as nearly as possible, completely exterminating rats in the state, since fleas from infected rats transmit the disease to men. We can begin to visualize the extent of the needed extermination campaign when we realize that there is estimated to be 13,000,000 rats in Texas."

There has been some confusion concerning the type of typhus fever which is occurring in Texas, but Dr. Cox pointed out that this disease is entirely different from the old world type which has followed some of the armies in Europe. Ordinarily the kind of typhus which makes its appearance in this section of the country is not a fatal disease, although there has been a death rate of about 2 per cent from typhus this year.

The poisoning and trapping of rats throughout the state will help to control the spread of this disease although these are temporary measures. In order to be permanently rid of rats they will have to be starved out, which means that buildings housing food supplies must be rat proofed.

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

"RULES OF THE ROAD" EXPLAINED

With the death-laden Labor Day weekend just past and the usual series of football weekends coming up, the thoughts of many Texans are turning toward traffic safety. There can be no doubt but that a better acquaintance among drivers with the "rules of the road" and other traffic safety regulations could greatly reduce the death toll of our highways.

To obtain correct and authoritative information about driving is a simple matter. A letter or postcard to the Department of Public Safety, Driver's License Division, Austin, Texas, will bring an official publication, the "Texas Driving Handbook", to anyone who requests it.

Aside from considerations of personal safety, proper driving habits and observance of traffic laws will help prevent financial loss. This is true in spite of the fact that most people now carry liability insurance as a protection under the Texas "Drivers Responsibility Act." Jury verdicts in personal injury cases tend to go higher and higher, and the likelihood of suffering an adverse judgment for an amount in excess of the limits of your liability policy is ever present.

Fault, or liability, is determined by applying the law to the particular facts of an accident. In Texas the law is in several forms—the statutes as enacted by the Legislature, the ordinances of each city and town, and the court decisions in cases similar to the one to be decided.

A negligent or intentional act is necessary in order to impose a legal liability for damages. Where both parties to an accident are negligent, the court will very likely say that both are at fault, and that each must pay for his own damages.

Two of the most important legal rules pertaining to accidents are those having to do with "proper look-out" and "proper control". Driving in a lawful manner and complying with all ordinary traffic rules is not always sufficient. In addition, the driver is expected by law to be alert to all that is happening around him.

If an accident should occur and the driver has not been alert—has failed to keep a proper look-out—he may be charged with "improper look-out" as a traffic violation and also held liable in damages to the other driver. The courts call a "proper look-out" such a look-out as a reasonably prudent driver would have kept under the same circumstances.

Of equal importance is the rule of "proper control". This rule means pretty much what those words imply—that the driver should have his car under such degree of control as to be ready for any emergencies as might arise. It may be breached even though no violation of ordinary traffic law is involved.

For instance, a driver may be complying with the legal speed limit but still be driving at a rate of speed which is unsafe under the existing circumstances.
