The water front news is all good this week, plenty of fish and plenty of fishermen to catch them.

One fish was so anxious to be caught that it jumped into the boat with A. B. Vogt and A. E. Brown. It was a tarpon over four feet long and was probably after a trout Mr. Brown was landing. The Christilles were fishing near by and thought the men were fighting when the boat began to rock, then they saw the fish, so it must be true.

A. P. Heinen fished with Fred Christilles on Wednesday, bringing in 51 trout and 1 redfish, and on Friday Mr. and Mrs. Christilles and their son, Ralph Marx and wife of Houston, caught 203 trout. Saturday Dr. Thompson and Dr. Deane of Dallas got 197 lovely trout. Ernest Lawrence of Columbus, Texas, landed 119 nice trout Sunday. Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Bain of South Beach Cottages went out with Christilles Monday, bringing home 72 trout and Tuesday, Mr. Taiker of Odessa landed 143 trout.

Don Haywood and party of Houston fished at Mills' Wharf Saturday and Sunday and really did well, getting 300 rat reds and trout and 8 large drum. Sid Sulher of Houston caught 100 trout, rat reds and small drum and some large drum out there last Saturday and Sunday. Mr. and Mrs. Robt. Cornel of Robstown got 88 rat reds and drum Monday and McNatt of Dallas landed 35 trout. They are still catching rat reds and drum at the Wharf.

At Jolly Roger Camp quite a few rat reds, sheep head, croakers and drum are being taken at the pier and some large red fish were caught at the point. Floundering is good there too now.

Fishing is fine at Snug Harbor Mr. and Mrs. Van Ham and party of Moulton, Texas, caught 113 trout Wednesday morning. Bubba Barnes of Refugio caught 50 extra large trout, some of them weighing as much as 3 pounds. Reds are also plentiful, some have been caught weighing 7 to 8 pounds.

Bill Crist took a party out on the Freda Saturday which caught 203 fish, and on Sunday Harry Kamy and party of five from Hondo, got 165 nice sized trout, while on Monday Deininger and Jones caught 145 fish. Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Thomas and Mr. Crist went out in Mr. Thomas' boat Tuesday, they brought in 168 trout.

Mr. and Mrs. Dorsey Kerr of Dallas fished at Lenoir's Landing Monday and Tuesday, getting 150 trout and a number of gaff tops. People are catching redfish now along with the trout. Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Gist of Sinton caught over 80 trout at the Landing Wednesday morning and Nack McNatt and party of San Antonio also got a good string of fish.

Saturday Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Kotecky of Dallas fished with Earle Thomas, bringing in 65 trout. Mr. and Mrs. McCreke of Corpus Christi fished Saturday with Hugh Morrison on the Rambler, landing 72 trout and Sunday Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Miller got 60 trout. Miss Ethel Waldrop, of Houston, landed a 7-pound drum in the basin while fishing for perch Saturday night. Miss Waldrop had never caught anything larger than perch before and so she had an exciting experience.

Rockport, Fulton Fire Depts. To Have Training School

Starting Thursday night, September 18th, Mr. Bob Dotson of the A. & M. Fire Training Service will be with the local fire departments for five consecutive Thursday nights, (Sept. 18, 25, Oct. 2, 9, 16), to conduct a Training Service for the firemen of Aransas County.

This school is in connection with the State Training Service, and is paid for out of tax funds. Every taxpayer in the State of Texas contributes a small part of his taxes for fire protection and prevention.

This training does not cost Aransas County or the fire department one cent. The fire department may take advantage of this training or the State will use the money allotted to Aransas County in another community.

As to the value of this school, the fire department will receive the following:

1st: A training that as small a community as Aransas County could not buy with the small outlay of taxes it pays toward fire protection and prevention.

2nd: Any incorporated city which participates in this training receives a 3% discount off its regular rate of insurance. This does not sound like very much saving, but when the amount of insurance issued and paid for in Rockport is figured it is found to save approximately \$4,000.00 a year. This money comes out of the pockets of the citizens and does not pay for dollars of total insurance value.

The fire department has in the past and will continue to render the best service and protection that it is possible for it to give.

There has been a number of men in the last few months that said they were interested in joining the fire department in both Rockport and Fulton, but for one reason or another they have managed to delay their good intentions.

This would be the best possible time for anyone to join the department and receive this training. The department is in need of five or six new members at the present time and would like to see some new faces at the school besides a 100% attendance of the present members.

School Buses Are Overloaded

The Aransas County Board of School Trustees held a special meeting at the Aransas County Courthouse on September 10, 1952, with the drivers of the school buses present for a discussion on the overloading of the school buses.

The State pays a large percent of the money used to run the buses and a wreck or an accident on a bus must be reported to the State, which expects the bus to haul only the number of students prescribed for it.

The following is a copy of the minutes of the meeting held by the County Board on September 10, and is self-explanatory:

"Notice, is hereby given to the District Superintendent, that on this the 10th day of September, 1952, the County Board of Trustees of Aransas County Independent School District with all board members present, resolved that the following minutes of said meeting be published and notification to bus drivers and students be posted on each bus, to-wit:

"Came on for discussion bus routes for 1952-53. After a thorough discussion by the Board it was found that due to the increased scholastic enrollment our present school buses are operating under overloaded conditions. The Board has taken into consideration the safety of the children, as well as complying with the two mile marker boundaries and rules of overloading of school buses, as specified by the State Board of Education.

"To correct this situation all school bus stops within the two mile boundary will be eliminated as of October 1st. However, the County Board will make one exception. One stop will be made within the two mile boundary at one specified designated place as determined by the County Board of Trustees, for those students who live one mile or farther, within said boundaries.

"No stop will be made for students living within a distance of one mile from the school. This stop will be indicated by the words "BUS STOP" written on the highway or roads in yellow paint.

"It is further ordered that 3/10 mile of Route 2 to Phillips Docks, and Route No. 1, Highway 35 business route be eliminated."

Harris has been stationed at Sandbag Castle and has been on duty 135 days, 105 of which have been spent on the front lines.

Aransas County Airport Leased For \$133,797.00

Offering for lease for oil and gas purposes for the first time on the only portion of the Aransas County Airport which Aransas County could lease for oil and gas purposes, the Commissioners Court on September 12th received bids totalling \$133,797.00 as cash bonuses for 121 acres. Hugh Fitzgerald, San Antonio, Texas, paid \$6,011.00 for a 2-acre tract on the extreme Southeast portion of the airport. Placid Oil Company, of Shreveport, Louisiana bid \$127,786.00 for tracts 2 to 21, both inclusive, totalling 119 acres. In addition to the cash bonuses Aransas County will receive a 3/16 royalty rather than the usual 1/8 royalty. The matter of the royalty was fixed in the proposed form of oil and gas lease. The leases were awarded to the above mentioned highest bidders subject to the approval of the Civil Aeronautics Administration. It is contemplated that the C. A. A. will require that all of these funds be used for airport purposes as well as the royalties as they have required in other instances.

The Aransas County Airport comprises approximately 668 acres. In addition to the property that Aransas County has just offered for lease Aransas County acquired approximately 488 acres from the Estates of William Kent and Charles R. Crane and approximately 60 acres from Steve Paul. In each instance of the Kent-Crane property and the Steve Paul property Aransas County did not acquire the right to use or develop that part of the airport for oil and gas purposes. The restriction in the deeds from the Kent-Crane and Steve Paul reads as follows: "with the condition that if said grantee, its successors or assigns, should fail to start bona fide construction within twelve (12) months thereafter, of an airport on said land and premises, or should cease to use for twelve (12) consecutive months such land and premises for airport purposes, then in that event all oil, gas and minerals of every kind and character shall absolutely revert to and become the property of the grantors, their heirs, successors and assigns, with full right of ingress and egress to explore, develop, produce and market same, and with the restriction in any and all events that the grantee, its successors and assigns shall never explore, develop, produce and/or market such oil, gas and/or minerals, it being distinctly understood that this condition, this reversion and this restriction shall be covenants running with the land and with the distinct understanding, that said grantee, its successors and assigns, in accepting this conveyance with such conditions, reversion and restriction, agrees to each and all of same."

However, after it became apparent that these portions of the Airport were prospective for oil and gas purposes, agreements were had both with the Kent-Crane Estates and Steve Paul et al, whereby Aransas County acquired 1/16th royalty, being one-half of the usual 1/8th and in turn made it possible that the properties could be developed for oil and gas purposes while still being used for airport purposes also.

The Aransas County Airport was acquired in 1942-43 by Aransas County as sponsor as our contribution to the war effort. The County acquired the site and agreed to operate the airport as a civilian airport when not in use by the U. S. Navy. The C. A. A. used Federal funds to place improvements upon the site costing in excess of one million dollars. The U. S. Navy had the exclusive use of the airport during World War II and used the field for practice landings. Since World War II the Aransas County Airport has been operated as a civilian airport and recently the U. S. Navy has taken a lease from Aransas County for the joint use while repairs and new construction are being made at Chase Field at Beeville, Texas.

The Aransas County Airport was turned out to be a very good investment for Aransas County indeed. The cost of the site was less than \$20,000.00. Including the cash bonuses which were bid on September 12th, Aransas County will receive approximately \$150,000.00 in cash, other than oil and gas royalties. Royalty payments which have been received and those which will be received according to the

TEXAS GAME AND FISH COMMISSION

Migratory Game Bird Regulations

Warning: On the opening day of season, no person may possess any migratory game bird in excess of the daily bag limit.

Birds must be placed on storage within three days after close of season.

Migratory game birds may be possessed for only 90 days after the close of the season.

Means of Taking: Baiting or live decoys prohibited. Taking by means, aid or use of automobile or aircraft prohibited. May not use shotgun larger than 10 gauge, and may not use auto-loading or repeating shotgun capable of holding more than three shells, including those in the magazine and chamber. Only shotguns may be used.

May not take migratory game birds from any power-driven boat or boat under tow or sail. Sinkbox prohibited.

May not take waterfowl by means, aid or use of cattle, horses or mules.

May not take birds any time any place where feed or salt has been placed or exposed.

Restricted Areas: May not take ducks or geese on any State or Federal refuge or preserve, nor from any enclosed private property without the consent of the owner or agent of said property. May not hunt on public road or highway.

Federal Stamp: No person over the age of 16 may hunt migratory waterfowl without a Federal

stamp (procurable at Post Office).

Brant, Coot, Ducks and Geese

Open Season: October 31 to December 29, both dates inclusive. Exception; no open season on black-bellied tree duck.

Shooting Hours: On Oct. 31, from 12:00 o'clock noon to one hour before sunset; all other days of season one-half hour before sunrise to one hour before sunset.

Bag and Possession Limits

Coot: 10 per day or in possession. Ducks: 5 per day, 10 in possession, including not more than one wood duck.

Exception: American and Red-breasted Mergansers: 25 singly or in the aggregate per day. No possession limit.

Geese and Brant: 5 in the aggregate per day or in possession, including in such limit not more than either 2 Canada geese (or its subspecies, Hutchins or cackling geese), or 2 white-fronted geese, or one of each.

Gallinules and Rails (Except Coot)

Open Season: Sept. 1 to Oct. 30, both dates inclusive. Shooting Hours: One-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

Bag and Possession Limits

Rails and Gallinules (except Sora): 15 in the aggregate per day or in possession. Sora: 25 per day or in possession.

Doves

Bag Limit: Ten in the aggregate

estimated oil and gas reserves underlying the airport will exceed \$350,000.00. The Aransas County Airport was acquired at a time when there was no oil interest in Aransas County. The first commercial production in Fulton Beach Field came in approximately five years after the acquisition of the Aransas County Airport. As a matter of fact at the time of the

acquiring of the Aransas County Airport site it looked as if that area had been condemned for oil and gas purposes as the land lies between a 7,600 ft. dry hole, the Housch-Thompson No. 1, to the Southwest and the Humble Oil and Refining Company 11,000 ft. dry hole to the Northeast. For that reason as well as the price that Aransas County proposed to pay for the land, \$25.00 to \$30.00 per acre, Aransas County acquired only a very small part of the minerals under the Aransas County Airport.
