It has been a little quiet along the waterfront the last few days as far as fishing is concerned. There has been a light wind from the north, just enough to keep the water muddy. The boats started taking parties out again Wednesday, although very few went out Tues.

Fishing was good at Perry Jones' Bait House all last week and through Sunday. They had a goodly number fishing there over the weekend.

Dr. Harrison from Bay City, fishing at Mills' Wharf Friday with Herb Mills, bringing in 88 trout. The same day Arno Marchward of San Antonio, went out with Jack Lawler, getting 126 trout. On Saturday and Sunday, Mr. and Mrs. Golbort fished with Jack Lawler, catching 156 trout. Herb Mills had Mr. Gustusson of Gonzales, out Saturday and Monday. He got 180 trout, and W. L. Bennis of San Antonio, went out with Harry Mills the same days, bringing in 75 trout and some good redfish. J. T. Shannon got 55 trout Monday and H. Schveder fished with Harry Mills, catching 100. It was too windy to go out Tuesday.

At Johnson's Bait Stand most of the fishermen are catching some fish. One man got a 4 1/2 pound trout. Several other nice trout have been taken as well as pompano and reds.

Mr. and Mrs. Dancy Hamilton fished with Shorty Townsend Friday, getting 49 redfish and some drum. Shorty caught a tarpon while on this trip. Saturday Mr. Campbell, Mr. Weldon and Lt. Jones of the Naval Air Station in Corpus Christi, fished with Shorty. They brought in 109 big trout and threw back about 50 small ones.

Fred Christilles had Max Anthony and party from Houston fishing Wednesday. They caught 35 large trout and on Thursday Mr. and Mrs. Anthony went out again, landing 91 large trout. Mr. Krenshaw and party of San Antonio, got 68 nice trout Saturday, and Sunday Wesley Melius caught 50 trout and 20 reds. Mr. Christilles did not go out Monday and Tuesday because of the wind.

Hugh Morrison has had the Rambler out for a complete overhaul the past week and has not been fishing.

Sunday Karl Benchedler went fishing with Earl Thomas, getting 65 trout.

Snug Harbor reports good fishing. Mr. Anglin and Red Leggett of Dallas, fishing three days, took home about 350 trout and drum. Dr. and Mrs. Culpepper and Dr. and Mrs. Meyer of San Antonio, caught 275 trout and drum and U. S. Bluntzer and son of Yorktown caught 87 trout.

Fishing was good at Lenoir's Landing last week and the first part of this week until the weather got rough. Some large trout weighing two and three pounds being caught. Mr. and Mrs. T. C. Barrier of Dallas fished out there Tuesday, getting 100 trout, some of them two and three pounders. Mr. and Mrs. Alzenhoffer of Victoria, caught a nice string of fish. Mr. and Mrs. George Brock of Fulton, fished at the landing and caught a few, but George was not up to his usual form.

Fishing is fair at the Jolly Roger. There was a nice lot caught at the pier Saturday and Sunday, but the north wind muddied up the water after that.

Smith's try for the extra point was good.

The half-time score was Rockport 7, Miller 0. In the third quarter, the Pirates worked their way down to the Miller 2 yard stripe by short power plays, reverses, and end runs. Leon Bateman bucked over for the Pirates' second score. Smith's try for extra point was good. The second touchdown in the third quarter came when Diffe again passed to hit Cloyce Hayden in the end zone for the next 6 points. Diffe's pass this time was good for about 32 yards. Smith's try for extra point went wide and low. Score: 20-0.

The fourth quarter found both teams scoreless. Both teams made sizeable ground gains from time to time, but neither was able to punch over a touchdown.

The passing and receiving department looked very well, coupled with sustained short ground gains made by the Pirate backs. Stout defensive play in the line was very obvious the larger part of the evening on the Pirates' part.

This marked the second game of the season for the Pirates, as they played Woodsboro Sept. 12 to a 0-0 deadlock; beating them on penetrations.

This Friday, Sept. 26 will find the Pirates resting at home. The following weekend, however, they will journey to Bishop, where they will engage in their initial district game of the season.

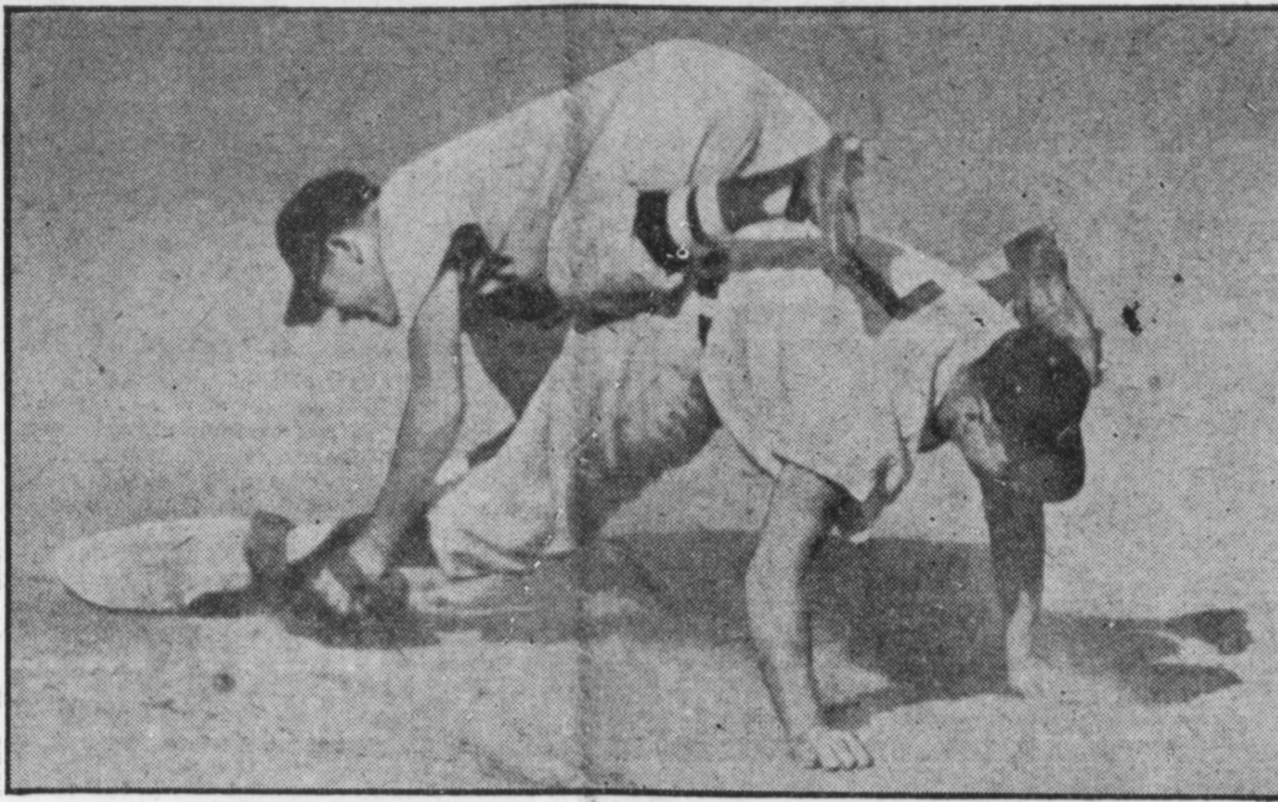
Mr. Hoffman has stated that he will be glad to meet with the parents of the band members and hopes to have a meeting with them and any other parents interested in their children playing in the band.

The community-wide observance of the publication of the Revised Standard Version of the Bible will be held at the Methodist Church next Tuesday at 7:30 p. m.

While all the details of the program have not been completed at this time, it can be announced that representatives of the several churches will participate in the program which, in addition to featuring information about the Bible, will include music by a joint choir and special musical numbers.

The Revised Standard Version of the Bible is the product of the monumental work of thirty-two outstanding scholars of the United States and Canada, noted for their proficiency in language study and their spiritual qualities. Their work of translation covered a period of more than fourteen years, during which time they had the benefit of the counsel and suggestions of advisory board composed of representatives from thirty-seven denominations—a total of ninety-one scholars giving themselves to the task of giving us "The Word of Life in the Language of Life."

It is unquestionably true that the Revised Standard Version approaches the original Scriptures as given in the Hebrew and Greek more closely than any other version of the Bible. Copies of this latest translation will be on exhibit at the Methodist Church next Tuesday night.

## MORE DEEP TRIES SET IN COUNTY

Union Producing Company No. 1 State, St. Charles Bay 377, wildcat about 3 1/2 miles northeast of Lamar, was drilling at 7,749 feet Monday on an 11,500 foot permit.

Western Natural Gas Co. No. 1 State Tract 372, just off the St. Charles Field, had flowed gas and distillate through 1/4-inch choke, under 2,200 pounds tubing pressure, from perforations at 7,627-44 feet, and was running casing for completion. Salt water had been recovered from perforations at 8,076-90 feet.

Western Natural No. 1 State Tract 70, Aransas Bay wildcat southeast of Lamar, was drilling at 8,958 feet on an 11,000-foot contract.

Two more deep tests had been scheduled for the St. Charles and Blackjack Fields, by Western Natural.

The 12,000-foot St. Charles Field test will be at Western Natural's No. 23 St. Charles Ranch. Location is 400 feet from the east line and 800 feet from the north line of the R. D. Blossman Survey 109, A-36, and 2,000 feet southwest of the No. 9, gas-distillate well. Elevation is 10 feet.

The 11,500-foot Blackjack Field test will be at the No. 24 St. Charles Ranch, 1,375 feet from the northerly south line and 4,200 feet from the northerly east line of the Aransas County School Land Survey, A-5. Location is 2,640 feet northwest of the No. 13, gas-distillate well, and about 3,200 feet west and slightly north of the No. 16, dry hole. Elevation is estimated at 15 feet.

Hunt Oil Co. No. 1 State Tract 81, Aransas County wildcat four miles northwest of Fulton was waiting on cement after setting 7-inch production string at 7,360 feet. This test is in Aransas Bay.

## Two Prisoners Removed To Huntsville Last Week

Two prisoners, Dan A. Thomas and Billy Southworth, each sentenced to two years in the penitentiary at the last term of District Court, were taken to Huntsville last week. There was only one prisoner in the Aransas County jail last Tuesday, according to Sheriff Shivers.

Homer E. Miller, of Odessa, was tried in county court for negligent homicide Monday, in connection with the wreck at the Ham G. Smith corner a few months ago.

The lawyers were Weldon Cabaniss and Neal Dancer. Judge Wendell fined Miller \$1,500.00 and his lawyer appealed the case.

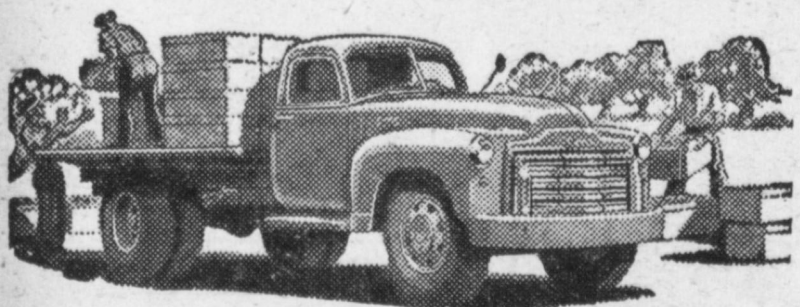

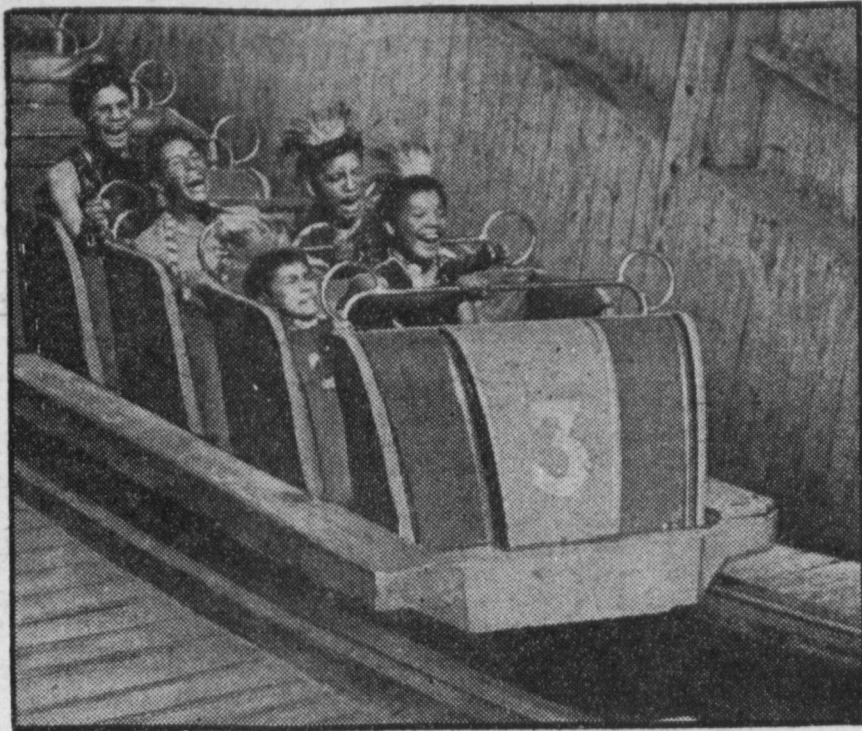

# Is Rockport to Become the Art Center of Texas?

The following story is clipped from the Sept. 4 issue of The Matagorda County Tribune. The halftones appearing on the page are furnished The Pilot through the courtesy of Carey Smith, publisher of The Tribune.

Is the beautiful little city of Rockport destined to become the art center of the entire State of Texas?

It is well on its way and continues to make rapid strides to that goal.

And it will become the center for art and teaching of art if two men, whose plans are to that end, can be carried through.

These two men are Emory M. Spencer, lawyer, oilman, expolitician, ex-judge, realtor, civic builder; and Simon Michael, artist and art instructor. This combination bids well to carry through plans to put the town of Rockport on the art map of the United States.

Emory M. Spencer, 47 year old independently wealthy oil man, graduate of Rice Institute among the honor group, worked for oil companies after leaving college. Always with designs on a law degree his years with an oil company were mere interludes in his studies and after many years he entered Texas University to continue his legal training. He was admitted to the bar in the early 30's and in jurisprudence rank he probably could gain no higher degree in the jurist's blue book. Yet he practices but little now since most of his time is devoted to the promotion of his oil holdings and to building the most modern abstract office in the state.

There are many facets to this man's makeup. Seemingly he is a busy man with his own ventures. But he still has time for the little town he loves and wishes to see advance to the position it merits. He has done much to add the needed impetus to the civic buildings and endeavors of the city. He has assisted with the construction of a Woman's Club building there which is used for general social and club gatherings of all kinds. He has worked for farm to market roads in his county which are now going to be built. And possibly he has helped a legion of individuals in needful times.

These remarks are by way of interpolation to show the type of man who is now pushing to the time when Rockport will gain national recognition as an art center.

Because it was he who planned the present studio for Simon Michael and was responsible for those plans to take concrete and brick form.

And there, nestled among the acres of beautiful old gnarled oaks, bent and swept by an eternal gale and bruised and pushed by storms in their two hundred or more years, is the beautiful and modern studio where students from many sections of Texas go to study under Simon Michael.

Spencer, the practical, Michael the artist, collaborated and the result was a studio that sturdily and artistically reflect the co-labor of men, each preeminent in his field. And there where nature has bountifully blessed was begun what someday may become the artist's art center of Texas.

Simon George Michael, art critic and connoisseur, is well known among the local Bay City and Matagorda students of art. Several years ago he began an art class here and since he began his school here many have worked under this man and continue to work under his tutelage, both here when he makes his weekly trips to the city and in his art schools at his new studio at Rockport.

Michael, whose energy seems limitless, since this is but one of many schools he teaches weekly, has devoted much of his years to preaching the doctrine that all men should be equal in their ability to appreciate the arts, even though some are better fitted to express them.

After four years of service in the army Michael decided to come to Texas and here he has made his home, miles of it up and down the Gulf Coast of Texas. His first man show was held in Detroit at the age of 18. When he was 24 he held an exhibition in Paris, France, and since that time many other shows of like nature were held in various parts of the U.S.

In locating at Rockport Michael has said that there every type of scenic wonder for the artist exists. But he had his difficulties in getting a studio started. Students came to study, that was true and he went among students in the different communities, carrying his message and his teachings to scores and scores of students who wished to learn more. Yet he needed a studio, a place to work and let his students work.

There is where Emory Spencer stepped into the picture. There is where an artist's dreams gained

form because Spencer turned those dreams into brick and concrete.

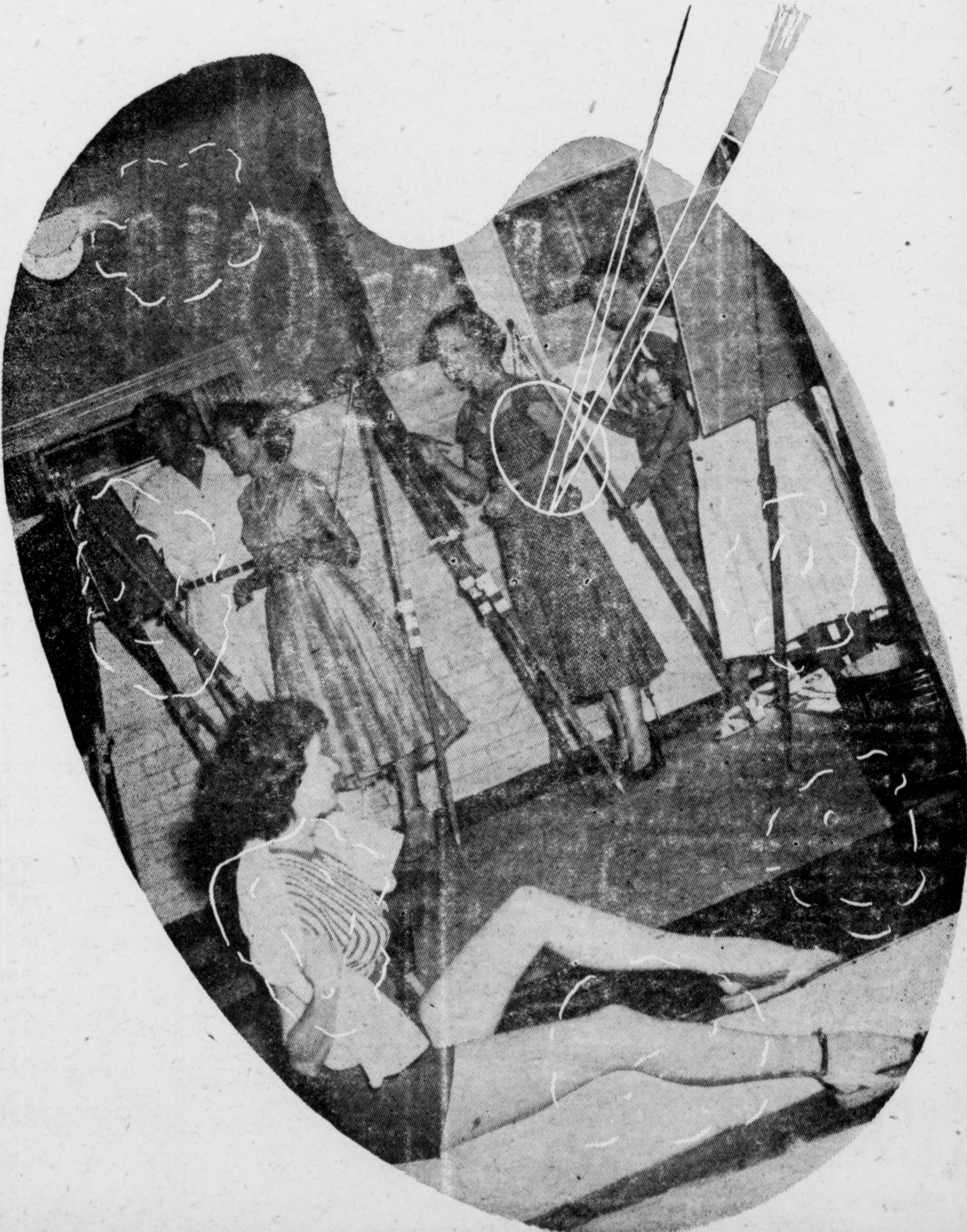
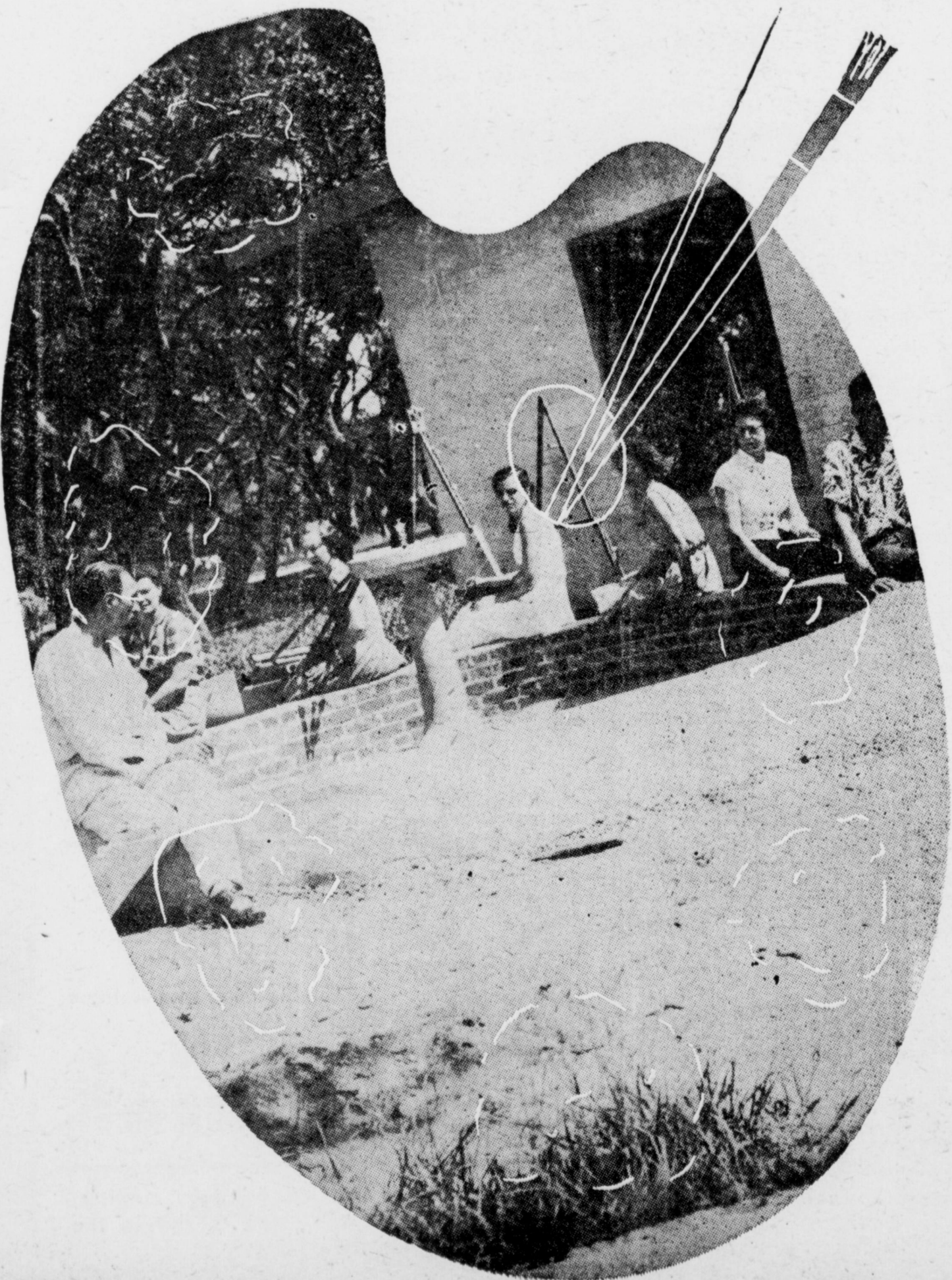
Yes—it is a happy combination for a community—one with dreams and one who knows how to capture those dreams.

From all over this part of Texas and from many out of the state, students will begin to enroll now for next year's classes. Simon George Michael will continue to teach and make of the little resort town an art center. Emory Maurice Spencer will keep an eye on the advancement of the community as an art center but the last time I talked to him he said something about "You know my wife ought to get busy and do something about the girl scouts in this town." Always a builder and planner he is ready to move on to other ventures once he has seen his last under way.

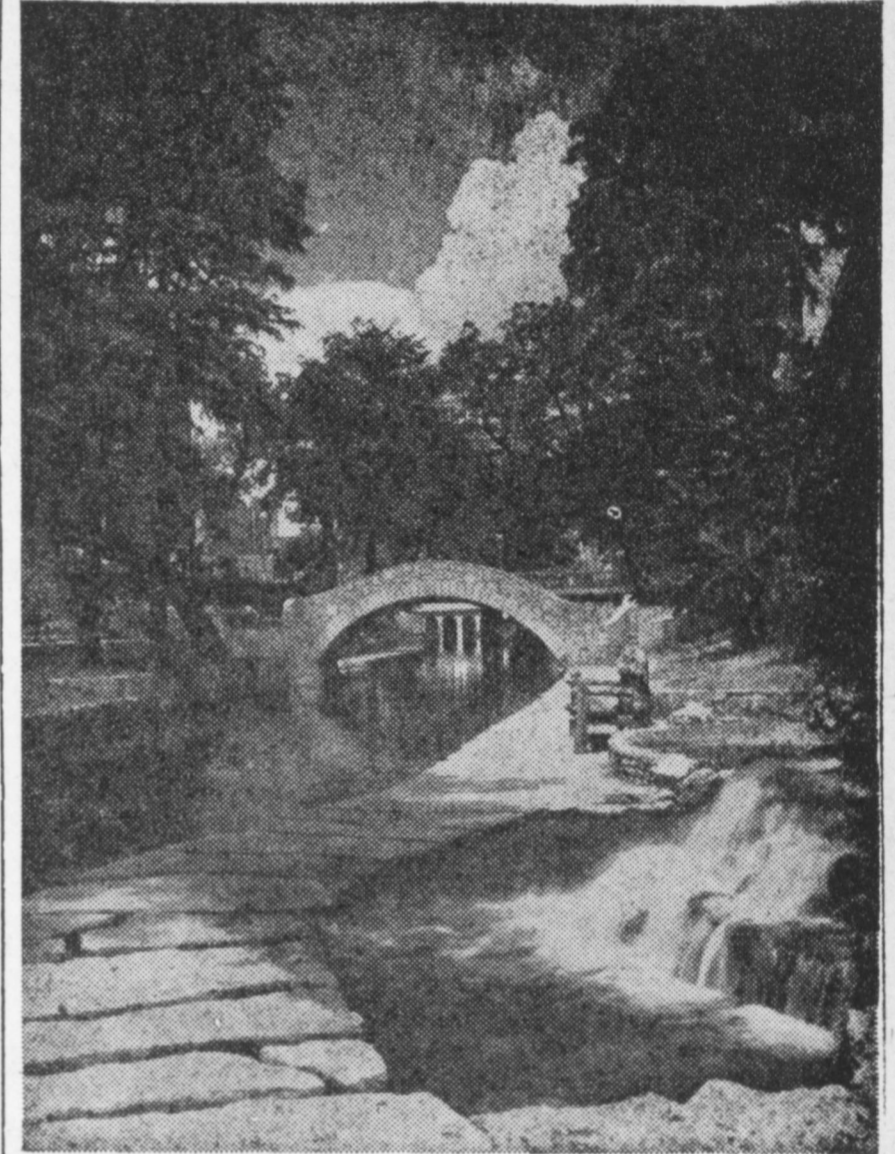

Shaped like a huge barrel with a floor inside, the device takes its riders on a dizzying spin, leaving them pinned to the walls by centrifugal force, suspended in mid air when the floor drops away.

The fabulous "Sky Wheels" ride, 33 other rides of all kinds, a dozen sideshows, the three-ring Variety Club Circus and "Show Boat," the popular musical presented by St. John Terrell's Music Circus, also will be midway features.

More than 4,000 beef and dairy cattle, horse, sheep, swine, goat and junior livestock entries have been received for the big 27-breed livestock exposition, over 250 for the Pan-American Holstein Show Oct. 10-17. Junior livestock entries have broken all records.

Approximately 3,500 entries are expected by the Women's Department for its greatest program yet.

Participants in the multitude of activities at the fair are expected to take home more than \$250,000 in prizes, premiums, awards and auction sale proceeds from art, livestock, poultry and women's show competition.

The giant "Story Book of Texas Agriculture" has begun to take shape, with every county in Texas represented. Exhibits are being built in the new Electric Building, Science Building, General Exhibits Building, and all museums on the fairgrounds.

Other attractions at the fair include the Dean Martin-Jerry Lewis auditorium revue, Ice Cycles of 1953, South's largest automobile show, Cotton Bowl football every weekend, numerous free shows and special events.

### Floresville Peanut Festival To Be Staged Sept. 26-27

After being postponed last year on account of conditions, the colorful and unique Floresville Peanut Festival is coming back this year bigger and better than ever. Friday and Saturday, September 26-27, will mark the days for the 10th Annual Fall Festival.

A brilliant coronation ceremony depicting the "Court of Paradise", in which a hundred people will participate, will see Queen Tunaep X and King Reboog crowned before a spectacular court at the high school gym on Thursday evening at 8:00 P.M. The queen's ball will follow with Buddy Hancock's Orchestra furnishing the music.

Representatives from about thirty-five South Texas towns and cities will pay homage to Her Highness at the royal court.

Honorable John C. White, Texas' Commissioner of Agriculture, will head the mile-long street parade at 10 o'clock Friday morning and officially open the festival on the courthouse square. This will be School Children's Day and Club Boys' Day and three thousand or more school children will participate in the opening parade and the day's festivities.
