Aransas Discovery Finaled By Hunt

Hunt Oil Company was moving the rig from a new Aransas Bay gas discovery Tuesday and had a wildcat near the Lamar Field running surface casing.

Hunt's No. 1 State Tract 81, more than a mile west and a little south of the Lamar Field production in the bay, was completed as a gas well on 52-shot perforations at 7,001-14 feet. The well had flowed at the daily rate of 2.5 million cubic feet of gas, plus 21 barrels of distillate per million feet, through 15/64-inch choke, under 2,250 pounds pressure on tubing.

The Prince Drilling Company rig from the discovery was being moved to the Hunt No. 1 State Tract 91, wildcat more than a mile north and a little east of the new East Fulton Beach Field. Permit depth is 9,000 feet.

Surface casing was being run to around 1,000 feet at the Hunt No. 1 State Tract 84, wildcat northwest of the west tip of Goose Island and near the Lamar Field. Penrod Drilling Company, a Hunt firm, is contractor.

Western Natural Gas Co. No. 1 Aransas State Tract 70, proposed 11,000-foot wildcat 2 miles southeast of Lamar, was making hole at 9,590 feet in shale.

Placid Oil Co. No. 1 Aransas County in East Fulton Beach Field, will be 100 feet from the south and 380 from the east lines of Lot 15 in Fulton Outlot Survey. Permit depth is 8,000 feet. This test will also be 1,560 feet south of the firm's No. 2 location.

Union Producing Company No. 1 State-St. Charles Bay 377, wildcat 3 1/2 miles northeast of Lamar, was coring at 8,110 feet on a possible 11,500-foot test. Coring was started at 8,020 feet and had produced no shows.

C. G. Glascock and Pontiac Refining Corporation No. 8 State Tract, 48, West Fulton Beach Field, was cleaning on perforations at 6,151-59 feet.

Atlantic Refining Company had scheduled another East Fulton Beach Field test at the No. 1 Jewell Fulton Unit, four miles north of Rockport and west of the field discovery well.

The Atlantic location is 467 feet from the northeast line and 345 feet from the east line of the 37.59-acre unit lease and in Farm Lot 79 and the William M. Carper Survey, A-147.

The test will be about 1,020 feet west southwest of the A. O. Phillips No. 1 L. E. Sanders, Jr., oil and gas-distillate discovery, and on the 32,343-acre Jewell Fulton tract which includes Farm Lots 77, 78 and 79.

Also included in the unit lease is a 2,789-acre Moran Oil Company tract on a road right-of-way, a .74-acre Fulton tract in Fulton Townsite Block 95 and the 1,718-acre W. G. Hattenbach tract in Block 94. Permit depth is 8,000 feet.

Townsend Resigns As Harbor Master, Weber Appointed

There were three or four applications for the position. The board appointed Jordan Weber, who will assume duties on October 1.

Telephone Co. To Display New Gadget At Fair

You can't beat it. "Except by fooling it," S. F. Bell, District Manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, said smilingly as he described the miraculous gadget his company will have on display at the State Fair of Texas October 4 through October 19.

The gadget is a "Tick-Tack-Toe Machine" which actually competes with human beings in the game so familiar to all. The machine was designed to demonstrate how accurately and efficiently the electronic switching equipment used in the operation of the telephone system works. It is made of actual telephone relays, or switches.

"It's amazing how intelligently this gadget plays the game. Just like a man, only better. You push

a button which light up an "X" in one of the squares. The machine automatically lights up an "O" in another square," Bell said.

"Then no matter where you place your next "X" the machine will outguess you and either force you into a tie, or perhaps beat you."

The Tick-Tack-Toe machine will be a part of Southwestern Bell's big exhibit in the General Exhibits Building at the annual State Fair.

Also on display at the telephone company exhibit will be a working model of the famous radio-relay, or microwave, system which is being used to bring live television programs and long distance calls to some of Texas' largest cities.

"A crew of specially trained instructors will be on hand at the telephone exhibit at all times during the Fair to show you how the microwave system, and other telephone equipment operates," Bell said.

One of the most outstanding portions of this telephone exhibit will be a demonstration of operator toll dialing in which long distance telephone calls will be placed direct from the exhibit at the State Fair to any of the 15,000,000 dial telephones from coast-to-coast that are connected to the system.

Other features of the telephone company exhibit will be devices enabling Fair goers to test the quality of their hearing, and hear how they sound over the telephone. They will also observe cable splicers at work on huge telephone cables demonstrating the exacting task of splicing hundreds of pairs of tiny wires together.

The Tick-Tack-Toe machine? How can you beat it? The telephone company manager laughed. "Oh, it's just like trying to get a mathematician to give the wrong answer to a question like "How much is 2 and 2?". The only way to beat the machine is by getting it confused.

"If you are planning to go to the Fair this year, stop by our exhibit in the General Exhibits Building and see it and the other demonstrations. You'll find it to be one of the most interesting exhibits at the 1952 State Fair," he said.

Outdoor News By Wildlife Management Institute

Although Canada is taking vigorous and apparently successful action to stamp out hoof and mouth disease among its cattle, there is no prospect that regulations imposed by the Federal Government of the United States relative to the importation of hooved mammals will be relaxed before next year.

No meat, hides, horns, antlers, or hooves of deer, moose, elk or other hooved game may be imported unless the meat is thoroughly cooked, hides hard-dried or tanned, and other portions completely clean and dry. All such trophies must be inspected at the port of entry.

From all indications, one of the most successful waterfowl seasons since the great duck decline in the 1930's appears to be looming on the horizon for North America's wildfowls. The largest number of ducks, geese, and brant seen in many years are now winging their way southward.

Ten days have been added to the open season with bag and possession limits remaining the same as last year.

Farm ponds which are too muddy to support fish life or desirable aquatic vegetation can be cleared by the application of gypsum without destroying larvae on which the fish feed.

Schemes rarely take the place of good, hard work in the lives of those who succeed.
