AN OPEN LETTER TO THE ARANSAS COUNTY SCHOOL BOARD

Possibly the recent curtailment of school bus service within a mile of Rockport's schools, was an essential piece of economy. We assume that it was. But in the doing we sincerely trust that it does not end in tragedy for some youngster and it's parents.

We are not contending that walking a few blocks to and from school, even in inclement weather, will hurt a child. Actually we believe such walking will do them good, but not under existing conditions. One very vital fact seems to have been overlooked or ignored by the board. That is that the city of Rockport offers neither sidewalks nor crossing protection to the hundreds of children in their daily coming and going. Any child living beyond the actual business district is compelled to trudge through weeds, grass and mud beside the roads, or else take a chance and walk directly in the streets and highways, protecting themselves from speeding vehicles as best they can.

The city does not even attempt to curtail reckless driving and excess speed, yet young children, some of them barely out of toddling age, are expected to guard themselves against juggernaut operators, many of whom not only don't think—they don't even care. We are not too familiar with the sources and amounts of school revenues, nor are we attempting to

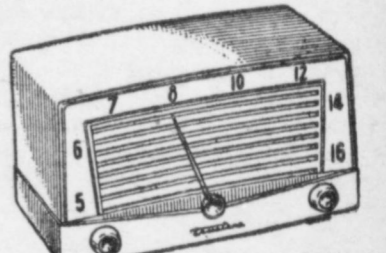

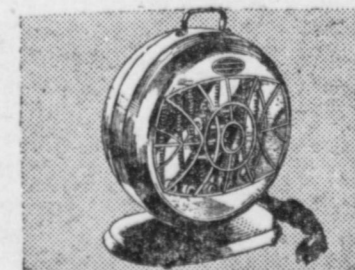

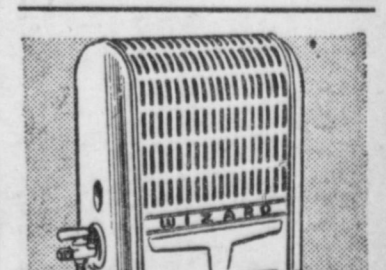

Fred Brachts Retire From Active Business After Four Generations

This week the Model Cash Grocery is operating under new management. After four generations

in the mercantile business, the Bracht family has retired from active business life. The concern has been purchased by Grady West of Premont, owner of a large mercantile establishment in that city and well known in business circles throughout the Rio Grande Valley.

Victor Bracht, first postmaster of Rockport, had a small grocery store in the rear of the postoffice in 1885, several years before the railroad came in. In 1887, Bracht Bros. was established and functioned as such until 1907. This business was owned by R. P. Bracht and L. M. Bracht, sons of Victor Bracht. In 1907, L. M. Bracht became sole owner and the name was changed to the Rockport Mercantile Co. As such it was known until 1941, when, upon the failing health of his father, Fred A.

Bracht became owner and the establishment, now thoroughly modernized, became the Model Cash Grocery. L. M. Bracht died in August, 1942.

In 1946, after serving three years in the infantry in World War II, Fred A. Bracht, Jr., became associated with his father in the business. The Brachts have another son, James C. Bracht and a daughter, Miss Mary Jo Bracht.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Bracht are very active in the civic and social life of the community. Members of Sacred Heart Catholic Church, they are instrumental in promoting all phases of the church life. Mr. Bracht is a director of the First National Bank, president of the Park Board, and has served in various capacities with the Chamber of Commerce. He is an enthusiastic member of the Rotary Club, of which organization he is a charter member. During World War II he served as chairman of the sale of bonds and as funds

chairman for the American Red Cross. He was also chairman of the drive for funds necessary for the purchase of the gymnasium for the public schools.

Mrs. Bracht is a member of the Ladies Auxiliary of the V.F.W. and the Woman's Club and headed a drive for funds when the Rockport Volunteer Fire Department purchased its present equipment. She has been closely associated with the Tourist Bureau of the Chamber of Commerce in promoting social activities for the winter tourists.

Every indication is that the new owners of the Model Cash Grocery will soon take their place in the business, civic and social life of the community and become valuable assets to their new home.

Mr. West is a director of the Premont State Bank and has been active in the Lions Club and the Chamber of Commerce. Mrs. West has mostly confined her activities to church work and the Parent-Teacher Association as her time has had to be shared with four-year-old Randy and one-year-old twin daughters, Barbara and Brownie. Another son, 13-year-old Abner, will be in junior high school this year.

Mr. and Mrs. West are affiliated

with the First Baptist Church in Premont, their home for the past seven years. They plan to build a home here and are anxious to become acquainted with their new friends and customers.

When interviewed on the subject of his selling the business, Mr. Bracht said, "You will understand why I love the mercantile business when I tell you that I started in when I was only eight years old and with the exception of several years away at school and my service in World War I, I have been there ever since, just like my fa-

ther and my grandfather gave their lives to the business. Families who traded with my father are still trading with me." He further added, "I want every one of my customers to know how I appreciate their loyalty and ask for their continued consideration for my successor."

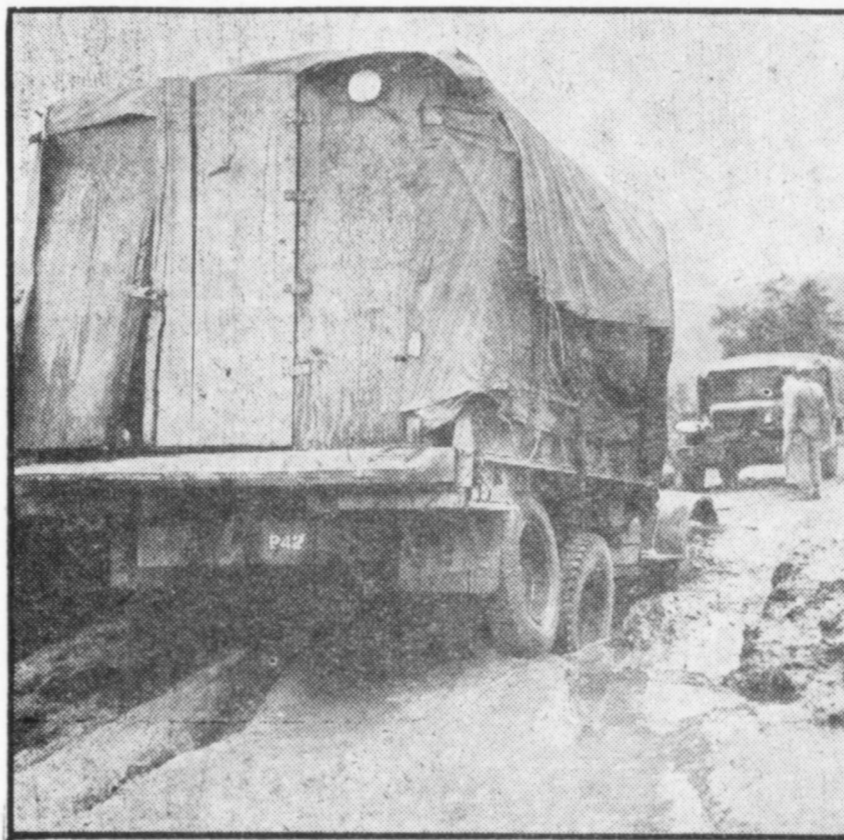

IT'S THE LAW
in Texas
 A public service feature of the State Bar of Texas

RIGHT OF WAY VARIES AT INTERSECTIONS
 Misunderstanding of simple driving rules by numerous motorists is one factor which places Texas right at the top in number of traffic deaths. Possibly the most mystifying of all traffic rules to the average driver are those relating to "Right of Way" at an intersection.

In trying to understand the laws regulating intersecting traffic, it is best to start off with the premise that all streets are of equal dignity legally speaking. Traffic signs and signals may vary this rule somewhat, but when in doubt it is safest to assume that all drivers crossing your path have a claim to the right of way equal to your own.

Obviously, however, in many cases one driver or the other will be legally entitled to the right of way. When it becomes necessary to determine right of way in a particular situation, the driver who reaches the intersection first, or who is going to get there first, is ordinarily favored.

But when two automobiles are equal distance from the intersection, that one approaching from the drivers right normally has the right of way.

Some intersections are known as "courtesy corners," having a stop sign or a flashing red signal facing each direction of approach. The first driver reaching the corner and coming to a complete stop will normally have the right of way over other vehicles not already in the intersection. However, don't depend too much on the other fellow's courtesy, and be sure to keep a "proper look-out" and your car under "proper control," as explained in a preceding column.

At intersections involving one through street and another street having a stop sign, a driver approaching the stop sign and com-

ing to a full stop is ordinarily said to have the right of way over vehicles approaching on the through street but not already in the intersection.

However, this rule must be qualified by saying that you should not proceed, cross or turn into the through street until you can do so without interfering with oncoming traffic. In other words, if an approaching car will arrive within the intersection before you are completely clear, wait just a little longer. The same rules apply to entering a highway from a side road containing a stop sign.

Many drivers violate the rules of right of way covering left hand turns at intersections. When turning left, you should always be on the inside (or center) lane, displaying the proper hand signal. You must allow all cars coming from the opposite direction, already in the intersection, to pass through before completing your turn. Even when the intersection is cleared, do not proceed unless other oncoming traffic is far enough away to be able to see your signal and slow down to allow you to turn with safety to all concerned.

Stay in the inside lane until your left-hand turn is entirely completed, and only then move gradually over to the right-hand lane if you wish. When turning right, stay in the right-hand lane at all times. Do not swing wide into the center lane, as to do so is unnecessary, unlawful and dangerous.

Many detailed rules and suggestions for safe driving are included in the official "Texas Driving Handbook" which is available to any person requesting same from the Texas Department of Public Safety, Drivers License Division, Austin, Texas.

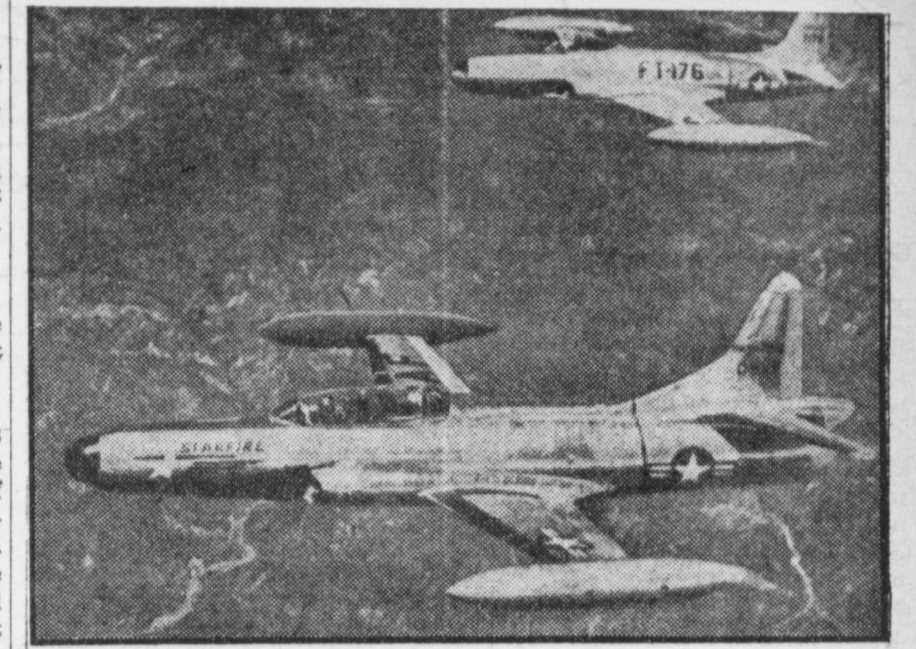
