PALACIOS YOUTH IMPROVED AFTER CAFE SHOOTING

William A. Jones, 52 year old shrimp boat captain from Rockport, has been charged with intent to murder after his actions against three men in Palacios early Tuesday morning, of last week, Deputy Sheriff E. T. Miller said.

Jones was released from the Bay City jail Tuesday after posting \$1,000 bond set for him by Justice of the Peace John F. Ward.

According to Deputy Miller, Jones had threatened the lives of two Palacios men and shot the third through the hand.

The shooting took place in front of Josephine's Cafe about 12:45 Tuesday morning after Jones insisted Jack Arthur, 23, of Palacios, stop at the cafe and eat with him, Miller said.

Arthur had picked up Jones as he was hitchhiking on the Rockport-Palacios highway, Miller also stated.

The gun-shot victim was William C. Tucker, 19, also of Palacios, who was taken to Bayview General Hospital for treatment. Tucker's condition was improved Thursday morning, according to Mrs. B. M. Walker at the hospital. He will be released in several days, Mrs. Walker stated.

While in the cafe, Jones and Arthur met Tucker, the boy who was shot, and A. O. Tucker, 18, both of whom are well known by Arthur.

As the trio of Palacios men left the cafe, Jones, who had been drinking heavily, insisted on getting into Arthur's car again, Miller said.

After the four were seated in the auto, Jones drew a German Luger from his shirt and told the boys he was going to kill them all. He warned them not to move or yell out. He pointed the gun at Tucker, who raised his hand to protect himself, and fired. The bullet tore through the back-side of Tucker's hand and out the palm-side near the fleshy part at the base of the thumb, according to Miller.

Fortunately, the gun jammed and the other two boys overpowered Jones.

Miller told the Beacon Wednesday that none of the three youths from Palacios nor Jones himself could explain why he fired the gun.

Jones was released from jail around 5:30 p.m. Tuesday. He is an employee of the Jackson Seafood Company, of Rockport, Deputy Miller continued.—The Palacios Beacon.

Coastal Marine Lab Greatly Aids Fishing

Activities of the Game and Fish Commission's marine laboratory at Rockport are described in a new pamphlet.

The broad purpose of the laboratory, which was established in 1948, is to discover how sports fishing can be improved and to help inspire the expansion of the state's commercial fisheries.

"Research in the field of sports fishing," according to the pamphlet, "is directed toward learning spawning, feeding and growth habits of these species in order that productive fish management techniques and proper protective laws may be established.

"In the commercial field, much work has been done toward locating concentrations of market fish. Private industry has been encouraged with some success to establish new industries, resulting in increased industrial income in Texas.

"Shrimp, oysters and edible fish crab have received a great deal of attention.

"Over 4,000 fish have been caught, measured, tagged and released. When caught and reported to the laboratory by fishermen, these tagged fish provide valuable material on growth rates and movements of the fish.

"A shrimp tagging program, along with studies of the migration, growth and distribution of the red shrimp, is designed to extend this fishery."

J. L. Baughman is chief marine biologist of the Commission, in direct charge of the coastal research.

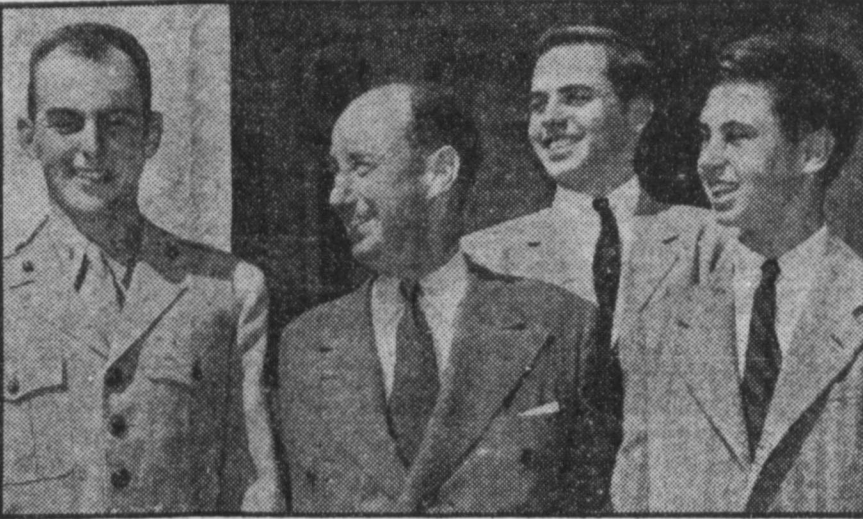
Boy Scouts Work To "Get-Out-The-Vote"

The remaining part of the first quarter was a vicious defensive duel between the two teams. Rockport was unable to carry the ball more than 4 yards on any one play as the Cub defense was alert and driving hard.

Late in the second quarter the Cubs started another drive which carried all the way down to the Pirate 2-yard stripe where big Gillis carried over for the second Cub score. This time Buster's try for the extra point was good and the score at the half time period was 14-0.

Rockport was able only one time during the game to threaten to score when they went down to the Cub 4-yard line in the third quarter. The rest of the game was a stout defensive battle. Gillis was the big gun for the Cubs with his 5.9 yards per carry. Sparks was the leading ball carrier for the Pirates with an average of about 3.6 yards per carry. Rockport made a total of 9 first downs while West Osu made 7. The Pirates attempted 12 passes with two of them being good for 23 yards and they punted 6 times for 222 yards with a punt average of 37 yards. Wayland Diffe took care of this department. Rockport was penalized for a total of 35 yards.

West Osu attempted 5 passes, completing one for 15 yards and punted for a total of 120 yards with an average of 30 yards. They were penalized for a total of 50 yards.

Leon Barber, Kenneth and Keith Nelson played outstanding ball throughout the game. Their defensive efforts especially were outstanding for the Pirates.

The routine business was transacted and an efficiency examination was given to a member in

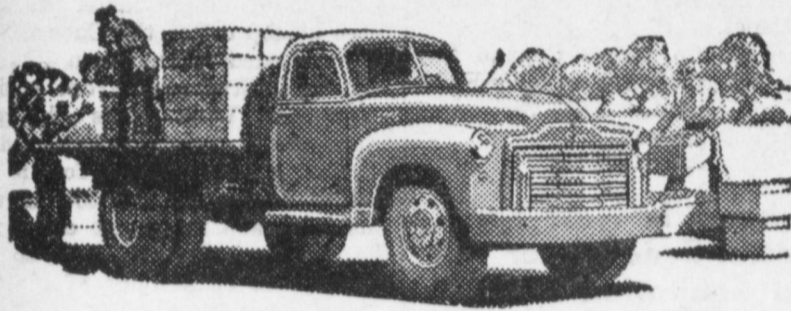

The attendance in the elementary school fell off somewhat last week due to the cool weather and illness in the community. It is better again this week and the average daily attendance never went below 500, according to Mr. Griffith.

Progress 1952

Texans have a natural interest in the oil industry, which is so important in our State, and in the progress made since Oil Progress Week was last observed.

Here are a few quick facts:

New Wells—During the twelve months ending August 31, 1952, the Texas oil industry drilled 17,000 new wells, at a cost of over \$700 million. Most of the heavy expense of drilling these new wells was paid from earnings plowed back into the development of the State's oil resources.

Transportation—The total mileage of Texas' trunk pipe lines for oil and finished products is over 29,000. This low-cost transportation system is a major factor in the maintenance of the low prices you pay for petroleum products.

Reserves—Proved oil reserves in Texas of 18 billion barrels represented 57 per cent of the U. S. total at the beginning of 1952. During 1951, the last year for which figures are available, proved reserves increased two billion barrels. These are developed oil reserves and the figure is important: developed reserves supply our needs currently and provide reserve capacity that is immediately available when we need it.

Refining—The Texas refineries will have a big year. They now employ, in round numbers, 46,000 Texans, and process about 28% of all the oil refined in the U. S. The daily refining capacity of all Texas refineries exceeds 2,000,000 barrels. A program to expand and improve these facilities has been general throughout the industry.

Taxes—The Texas oil industry continues to be the largest tax-payer in the State. Through the year ending August 31, gross production taxes alone on Texas oil and natural gas amounted to more than \$137 million; in addition, the industry pays large amounts in other taxes.

In brief, the Texas oil industry during the past year continued to do its part in meeting the demand for oil. It has expanded pipelines to provide low-cost transportation. It has improved facilities for making more and better petroleum products for your use. Today, two gallons of gasoline do work that required three gallons in 1925; and the gasoline costs no more than it did then.

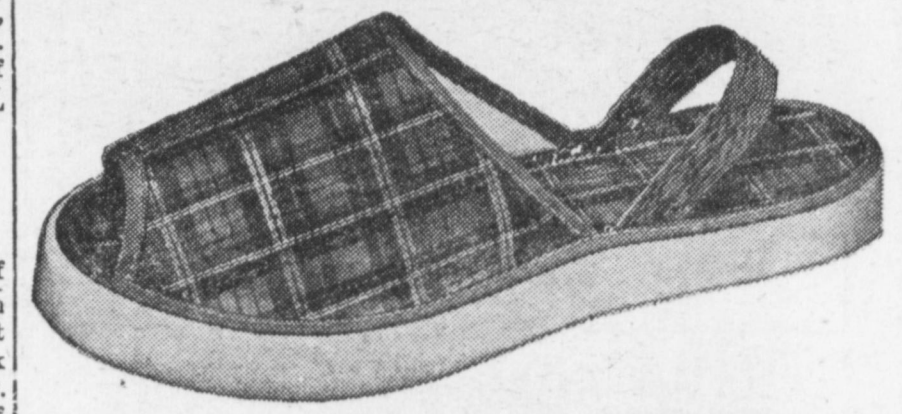
