

## Along The Waterfront



Fishing is still fine in this area, but the interest of many of the sportsmen has turned to hunting. Dove shooting has been exceptionally good this season and with duck season opening tomorrow, every sportsman is engaged.

Mr. and Mrs. Harold E. Nichols were fishing at Redfish Point last Saturday. At first they lost their bait several times—then Mr. Nichols landed an 8-pound redfish. Mrs. Nichols caught two larges soon afterwards, one weighing 12 pounds and the other 12 3/4 pounds and measuring 30 inches in length. They caught plenty of redfish and some drum that day, and Mr. Nichols went back Tuesday morning and got a 9 pound red, which broke his pole.

The folk at Mills Wharf are very busy getting ready for the duck hunters, although fishing has been very good there. Thursday, F. L. Bonner went out with Harry Mills, bringing in 91 trout; Jack Parnell fished with Jack Lawler, getting 62 trout and Mr. Templeton of Three Rivers fished with Mullet Gregory, catching 90 trout. F. L. Bonner fished with Harry Mills again Friday, landing 39 trout. There were three boats out both Saturday and Sunday, all getting a fine lot of fish, but no record of the number was kept. Andy Deck-in fished with Jack Lawler Wednesday, landing 69 fish, most of them nice rat reds.

Mr. Buckner of San Marcos, fished with Earl Thomas Sunday, returning with 55 trout, and on Monday, Morris Kamin of Victoria, fished with Thomas; he caught 83 fish.

## TEXAS COMPANY WILL DRILL DEEP WILDCAT IN ARANSAS BAY

The Texas Co. has filed application to drill a deep wildcat three miles northeast of Rockport in Aransas Bay.

The firm's No. 1 State Tract 145 will be located 660 feet from the south and west lines of Tract 145. Projected to 12,500 feet, the test is scheduled to begin Nov. 2. Texaco also holds offset acreage to the north, south, east, and west. Humble is to the northeast and northwest.

Sun Oil Co. No. A-1 St. Charles Bay State Tract 368, wildcat 14 1/2 miles northeast of Rockport was drilling at 8,200 feet on an 11,500-foot permit.

Burdette Graham No. 1 Heard Unit, Lamar Field test in the Lamar Township will be 330 feet from the southwest (Copano Bay shoreline) and 330 from the southeast lines of a 40-acre lease in Lamar Township Survey. Permit depth is 7,500 feet.

Hunt Oil Co. No. 1 State Tract 91, Aransas County wildcat five miles north of Rockport, was testing from completion as a gaswell from unreported perforations. This project has 5 1/2-inch casing set at 8,620 feet.

Hunt Oil Co. No. 2 State Tract 84, test in Lamar Field one-half mile south of Lamar, was running tool to test perforations at 7,288-7,308 feet.

Western Natural Gas Company No. 23 St. Charles Ranch Company, St. Charles Field, was drilling at 6,494 feet Wednesday on a possible 12,000-foot test.

In the Blackjack Field, the Western Natural No. 24 St. Charles was drilling at 6,400 feet. Permit depth is 11,500 feet.

## VOTERS HAVE CHOICE OF WAYS TO MARK BALLOT

Something new has been added to the general election ballot that Texans will vote this year.

They have a choice in the way they mark it.

First, they may scratch out the names of the candidates they don't want, as they have been doing for years.

Second, they may use the new method, by placing an "X" in the little box in front of the name of the candidate for whom they wish to vote.

### Only Complete List

For those who want to vote the Democratic column straight, the easiest method is just to scratch out the other seven columns on the ballot.

Those who want to vote a straight Republican ticket can scratch out all but the Republican column. By doing this they actually vote against the Democratic nominees for district and local offices, because they are scratching them out.

### Split Ticket

Those who want to vote a split ticket may do it in several ways. Say the voter wants to vote for Eisenhower and Nixon in the presidential race, but wants to vote for Democratic nominees for state, district and local offices. Here is the way he would do it:

Scratch out the names of Stevenson and Sparkman in the Democratic column, leaving the rest of the column unmarked. In the Republican column, leave the names of Eisenhower and Nixon unmarked, but scratch out the rest of the column underneath the presidential nominees. Then scratch out all of the other six columns.

The same result can be accomplished by placing an "X" in the boxes in front of Eisenhower and Nixon in the Republican column and in front of the Democratic nominee for state, district and local offices in the Democratic column.

### Cross-filed

Now, suppose the voter wants to vote for Eisenhower and Nixon in the presidential race and for the Democratic nominee for state offices, but under the Republican column. The Republicans cross-filed, or "adopted," the Democratic nominees for state offices and only one, Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White, declined the G.O.P. nomination. Here is the way to do this:

Scratch out the Democratic column down to commissioner of agriculture (or through it, if the voter desires to vote against Mr. White.) Leave the Republican column as it is and scratch out the other six columns.

The same result here can be achieved by putting an "X" in the boxes in front of the names of the nominees of your choice.

### Write-In Vote

Three former Texas Supreme Court Justices in an opinion endorsed by Attorney General Price Daniel have said that there are two other ways of voting for Eisenhower and Nixon. If the voter wants to vote them under the Democratic column, he can scratch out the names of Stevenson and Sparkman and write in the names of Eisenhower and Nixon.

If the voter does this, he must be careful to scratch out the names of Eisenhower and Nixon under the Republican column.

The same legal opinion said a voter can scratch out the names of all presidential candidates printed on the ballot and write in the names of Eisenhower and Nixon in the write-in column provided on the ballot.

The Loyal Democrats have threatened law suits if either of these last two methods are used.

Of course, if a person wanted to vote for Stevenson and Sparkman in the Republican or write-in columns, he could do it by using the same methods as outlined for Eisenhower and Nixon. It is expected, however, that all who vote for the Stevenson-Sparkman ticket will be content to vote for them in the Democratic column.

Voters have two chances to vote for Gen. Douglas MacArthur for president. He is listed on the ballot as the nominee of the Christian National and the Constitution parties.

An important thing for all voters to remember is that there are two proposed constitutional amendments at the bottom of the general election ballot. The first one would permit only governments to provide workmen's compensation insurance for their employees. The second would provide state financial assistance to medical students who agree to practice in rural areas of Texas.

The duck and goose season will get underway Friday at noon and from all indications it should really open with a bang.

Plenty of geese and ducks have been sighted the past few weeks, however, it appears that the main flight is waiting up north for the expected cold weather which will send them on their way south.

From all reports the various private clubs are booked solid for the opening dates as well as the numerous guides around the area.

All hunting laws must be observed to the nth degree of the law. Herewith, are starting and quitting time of the duck and goose season, which opens Oct. 31, at noon, but starts half-hour before sunrise thereafter and ends one-hour before sunset through Dec. 29.

Duck hunters over age 16 must have in their possession a Migratory Bird Hunting Stamp signed across the face in ink.

Auto-loading and repeating shotguns must be plugged to limit gun to three shells.

**Bag Limit**  
DUCKS: Five per day including not more than one wood duck. Season closed on blackbellied tree duck. Possession limits 10 ducks after opening day.

GEESE: Five per day or in possession, limit not more than either two Canada geese or its subspecies. Hutchins or Cackling, or two white-fronted geese or one of each.

Hunters are asked to look for banded birds and send in the information as to location, and date the bird was killed.

## TWO CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS ON NOV. 4 BALLOT

**Christmas Seal Marks Anniversary**

Austin, Texas. — A modest symbol which sparked a world crusade marked its golden anniversary last week.

The red Double-Barred Cross, familiar trademark of the Christmas Seal, was adopted Oct. 23, 1902 as the emblem of the global war on tuberculosis at the first international conference on the disease when representatives of 20 nations met in Berlin to join forces against mankind's greatest killer.

Patterned after the historic Cross of Lorraine, the Double-Barred Cross was adopted in 1906 as official emblem of the National Tuberculosis Association and in 1920 was registered as its trademark, the Texas Tuberculosis Association reminded today.

Texas, who by their purchase of Christmas Seals since 1909 have supported the TB Associations' fight against the disease, will see the copyright on the 1952 seals which will be mailed them Nov. 17, TTA officials said.

"When the first Christmas Seal sale was held in Texas in 1909, TB was taking a greater toll of human life in this state than all other diseases," Miss Pansy Nichols, executive secretary, commented. "Since then the tuberculosis death rate has been forced down steadily, but each year it kills more Texans than any other infectious disease, striking hardest at young people from 15 to 35 where it leads as the cause of death.

"The heart-breaking tragedy lies in the needless waste," she continued, "waste of human life, waste of economic resources. Tuberculosis is costing Texans more than \$17,000,000 a year. It took 1,962 lives in the state last year. Yet, it is a preventable disease which can be controlled and eventually wiped out."

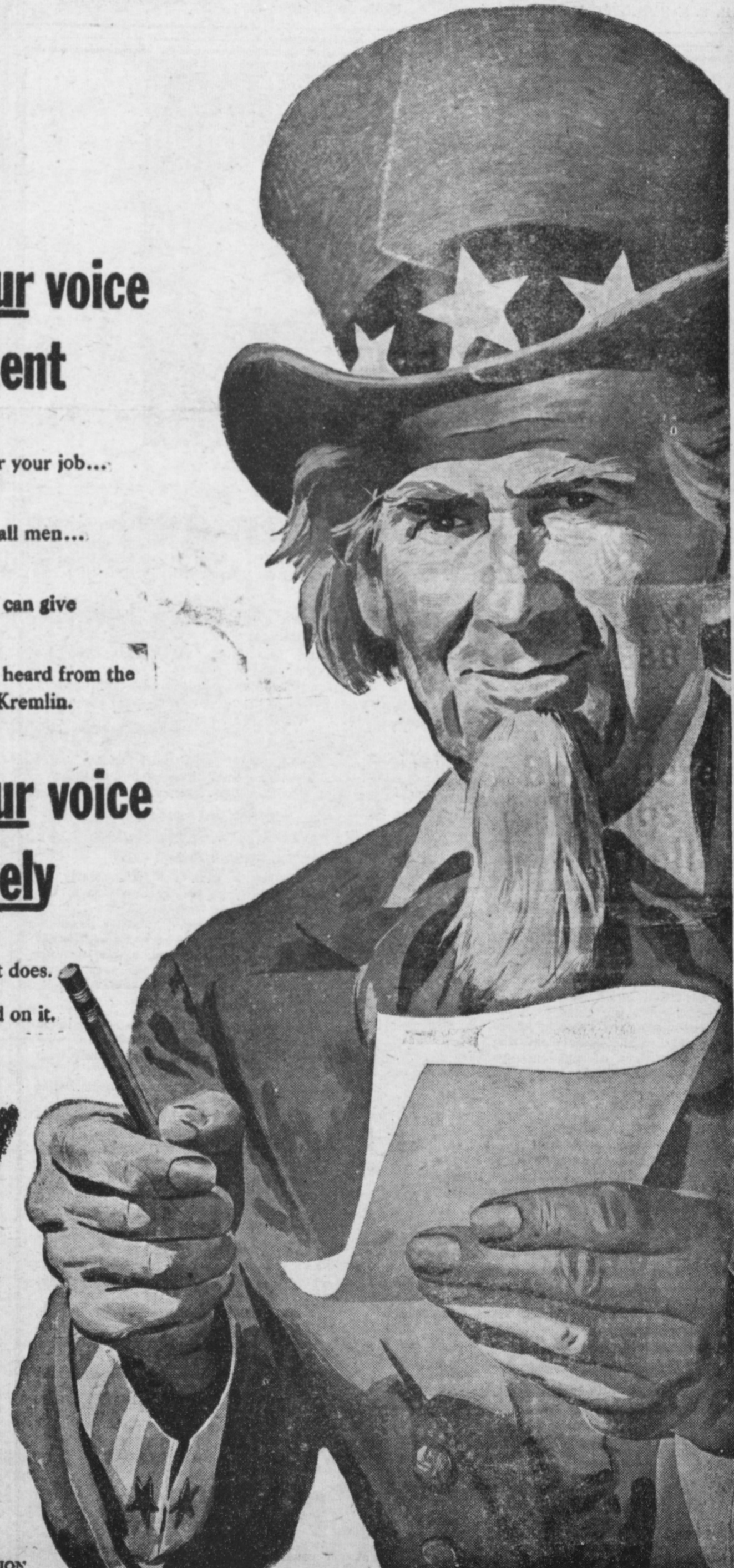

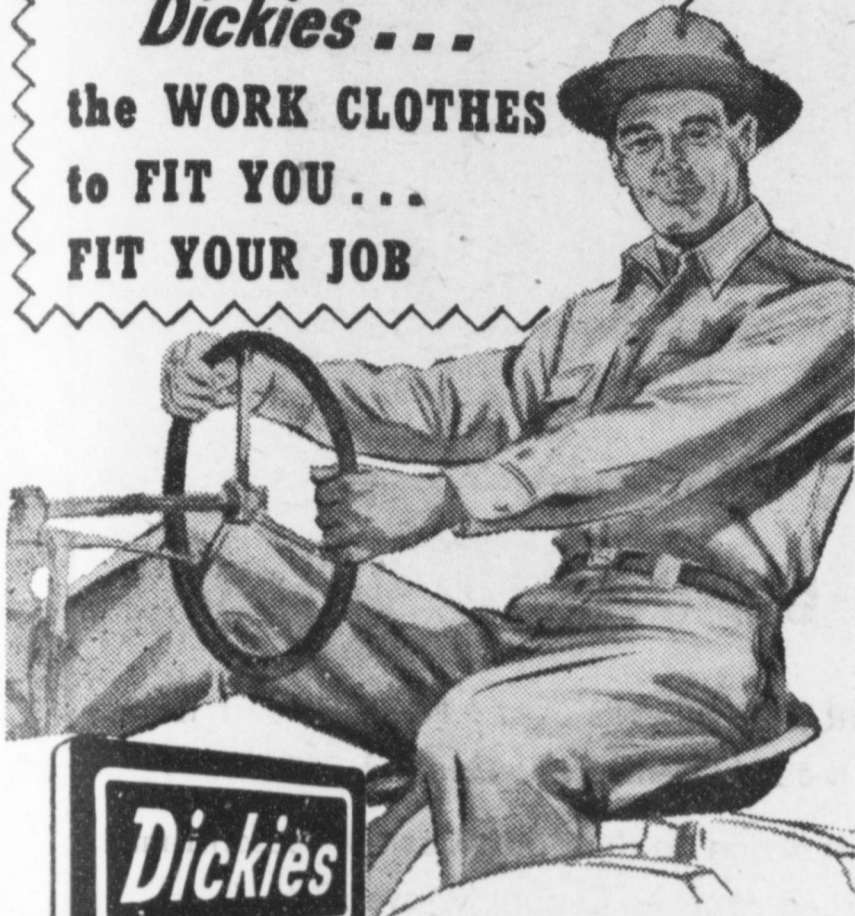

Showdown Looms On Federal-State Stream Control

A court issue designed to test the right of the Federal Power Commission to issue permits for dams on rivers where state law prohibits or limits their construction, is nearing a showdown in the state of Washington.

The city of Takoma plans to construct two hydro-electric dams across the Cowlitz River, although a law enacted by the 1949 state legislature bans dams more than 25 feet high on the Cowlitz. The Tokoma Public Utilities Commission appealed directly to the Federal Power Commission and was told to proceed with its plans to dam the river in spite of the fact that the construction would be in direct violation of state legislation. The heads of the State Game Commission and a group of taxpayers opposed the dam on the Cowlitz because of its effect on salmon runs.

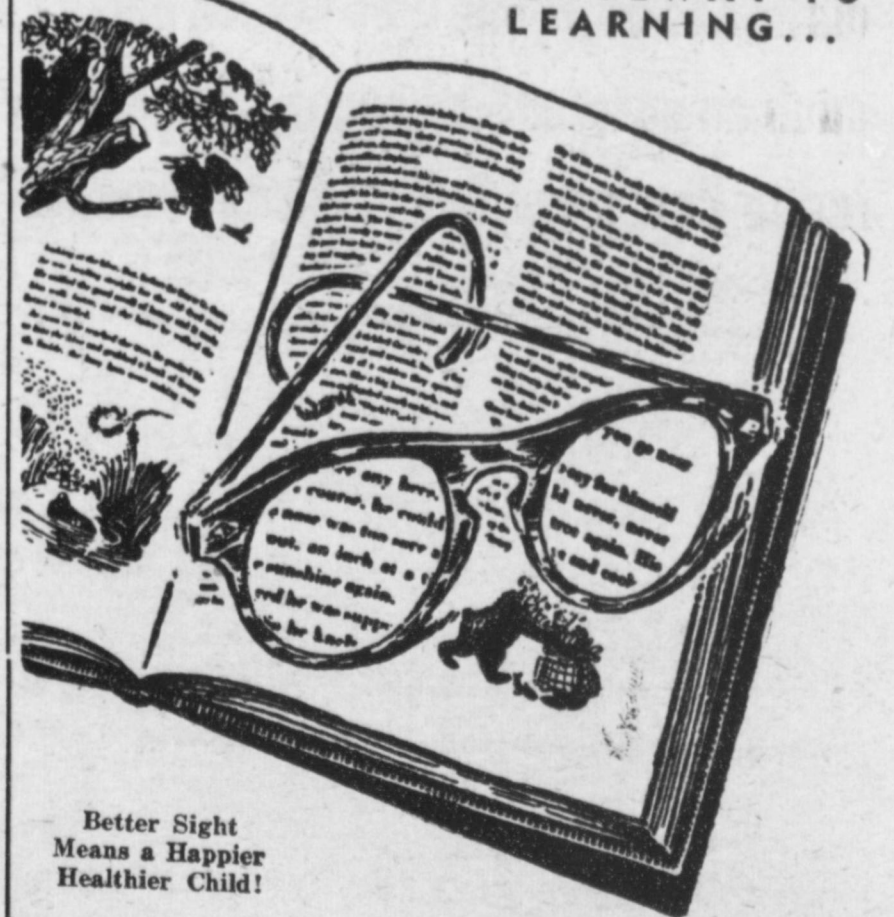

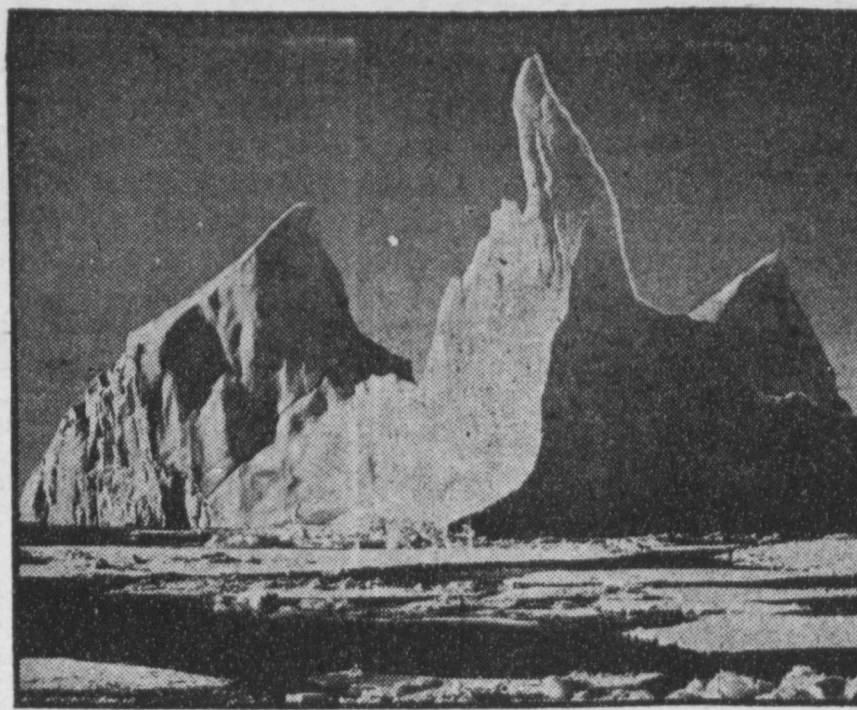

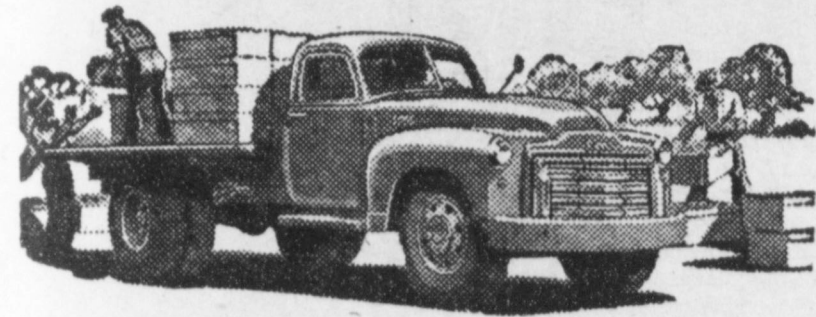

**Selective Service Seeks 2,784 Men In December Draft**

Austin, Texas. — State Selective Service headquarters Monday received a call for 2,784 men for the Army in December, biggest monthly call received by Texas in 20 months.

The national quota for December is 47,000 men, all for the Army.

Lt. Col. Morris S. Schwartz, deputy state Selective Service director, said calls to the state's 137 local boards will be mailed "later this month." He said the call would be largely filled with men in the 20-year-old age group.

Local boards must fill the call from among men 20 years old and older at time of induction. The boards will not be able to send any man for induction below the age of 20 except delinquents and volunteers.

Local boards previously have been authorized in Texas to examine men down to the age of 19 years and 11 months, but such men cannot be inducted under present authorization. Authority will have to be received from national headquarters before men can be inducted below the age of 20.

The December induction call is the biggest received in Texas since March 1951, when 4,145 men were inducted into the Army. Only 362 men were inducted in December 1951.

Induction of men in December will take place from December 1 through December 13 because of customary armed forces holiday leaves and furloughs at Christmas time. Normally, inductions and pre-induction examinations are spread more fully throughout a month.

State Selective Service headquarters Monday also received a call for 14 doctors and six dentists for the armed services in November. This is the state's share of a national quota of 341 doctors and 200 dentists for both the Army and Air Force.


