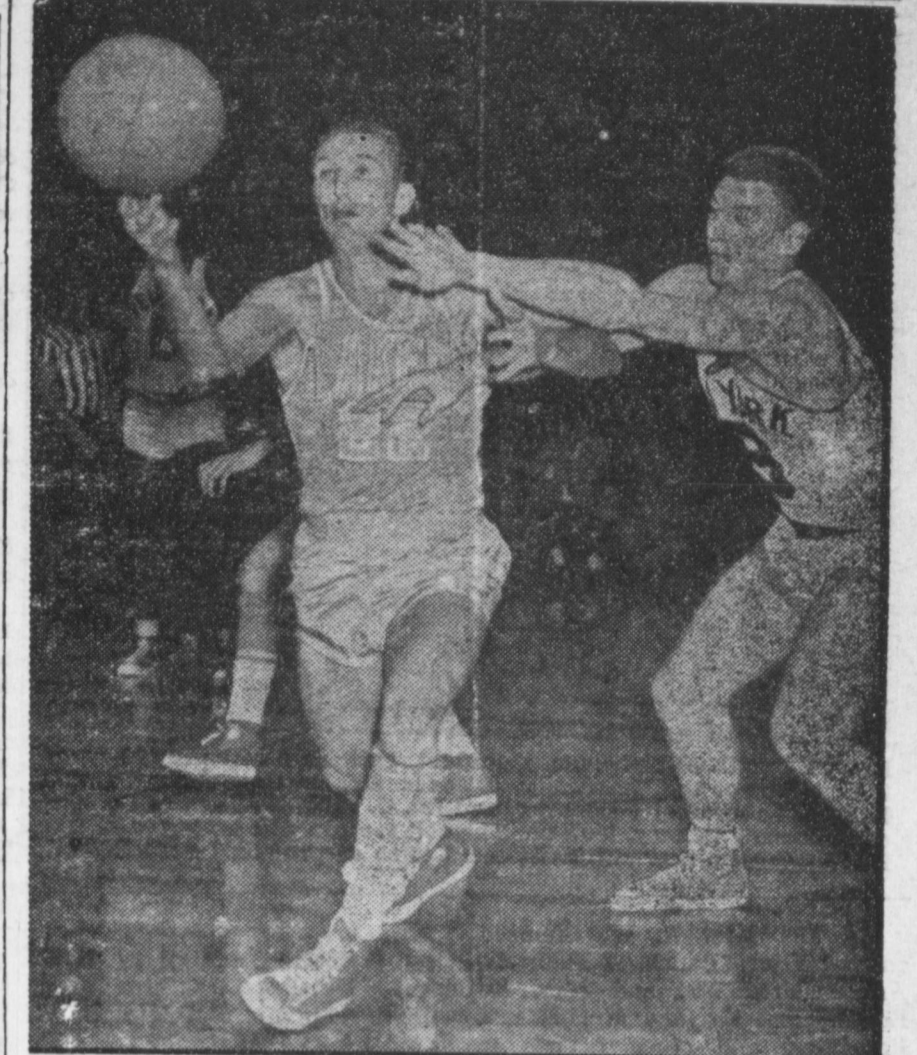

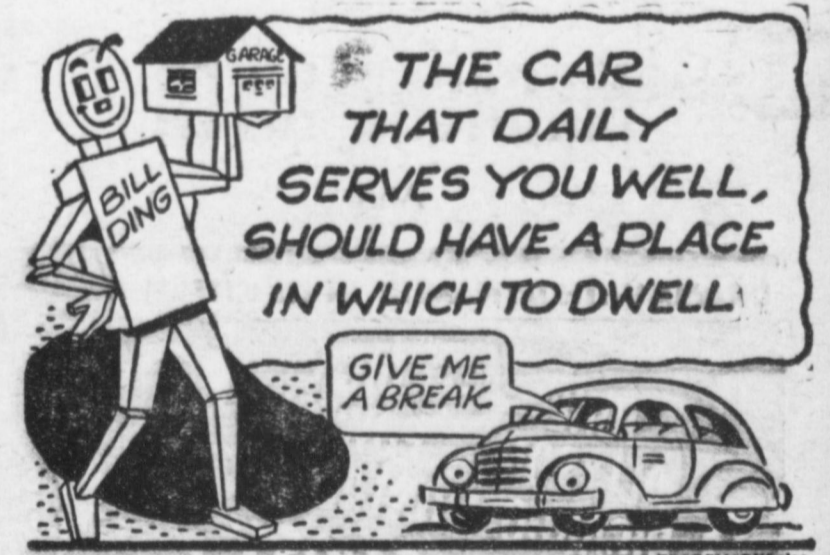

New Species of Fish Discovered In Gulf

Austin.—The Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission said 11 new species of deep water fish have been discovered in the Gulf off Port Aransas by Research biologists of the Commission's laboratory at Rockport. The fish were identified as new species by Dr. Loren P. Woods,

Curator of Fishes at the Chicago Natural History Museum. They were caught during the summer by E. D. McRae and J. L. Baughman, who is Chief Marine Biologist for the Commission.

The fish were taken in shrimp nets at depths ranging from 300 feet to 1200 feet during research operations for commercial shrimp outside the depth limits now being fished.

Baughman reported that the new fish ran between two or three inches and a foot in length and that several of the species were probably large enough, if they could be taken in any quantity, to serve as food. He particularly mentioned a bright red, big-eyed squirrel fish which apparently occurs in some numbers and rather closely resembles the rose fish which is so plentiful in the New England fishery.

Another of the fishes discovered belonged to the group known as fishing frogs. Baughman said these squat, wide-bodied fish are equipped with a pole, line and bait in the form of a long filament growing out of their nose, ending in a whitish piece of gristle that looks like shrimp. The squat on the bottom, dangling this before

their open mouth and when some little fish comes up to investigate they grab and seldom miss.

In addition to the 11 identified species, Baughman said there were probably 15 or 20 others which had not previously been recorded in Texas waters. One of them, has generally been found around Venezuela.

DIFFERENCE BETWEEN DIVORCE AND ANNULMENT EXPLAINED

Notice of the filing of suits for divorce appear daily in our newspapers. Something has gone wrong with the marriage, and one of the spouses is asking the court to end the marriage by granting a divorce.

Occasionally, however, we read that someone is suing for an annulment of their marriage. The average reader may be inclined to say, "What is the difference?" Obviously the marriage is terminated if the court grants the petition, whether for divorce or annulment.

In the case of a divorce, the plaintiff (the person asking for an end to the marriage, whether the husband or wife) recognizes that the two parties involved were validly married and that there is an existing valid marriage.

The plaintiff alleges, though, that the other spouse has been guilty of some act which the law says constitutes a ground for divorce. If the divorce is granted, a marriage that actually exists is terminated legally by the court.

In effect, the court tells the couple that they were validly and legally married at one time, but no longer are.

Annulment Differs

In the case of an annulment, however, the plaintiff alleges that there never was a valid marriage in the first place because of some impediment of the parties or because of some fraud in its inception.

In this case the court must determine whether there ever was a valid marriage. If the court agrees with the plaintiff, the decree says in effect that the couple never was legally and validly married, and is not now.

Such a decree of annulment establishes for the public record the fact that the marriage was and is invalid according to law.

Children Protected

Whether the action takes the form of a divorce or an annulment, the decree will have no effect on the legitimacy of the couple's children. Our statutes provide that the children of couples whose marriages have been declared null shall nevertheless be legitimate.

Every divorce petition must set out the name, age, sex and residence of each child under 16 years of age born of the marriage involved. Then, before a divorce may be granted, the trial judge is required by law to inquire into the "surroundings and circumstances" of each such child.

Having considered all the pertinent facts and circumstances, the court in granting a divorce may give the custody and education of the child to either the father or mother. The governing factor here is the judge's belief and findings with regard to the best interests of the child himself.

Either parent may be required to make periodical payments for the benefit of the child, and may be punished for contempt of court in event of failure to comply with the support order.

In the past some trouble has been experienced in enforcing support orders against parents who

move out of the state, as a person cannot ordinarily be extradited for the purpose of answering a contempt of court charge. However, many states (including Texas) have recently passed laws providing for the reciprocal enforcement of such orders, which is bringing some relief in support cases.

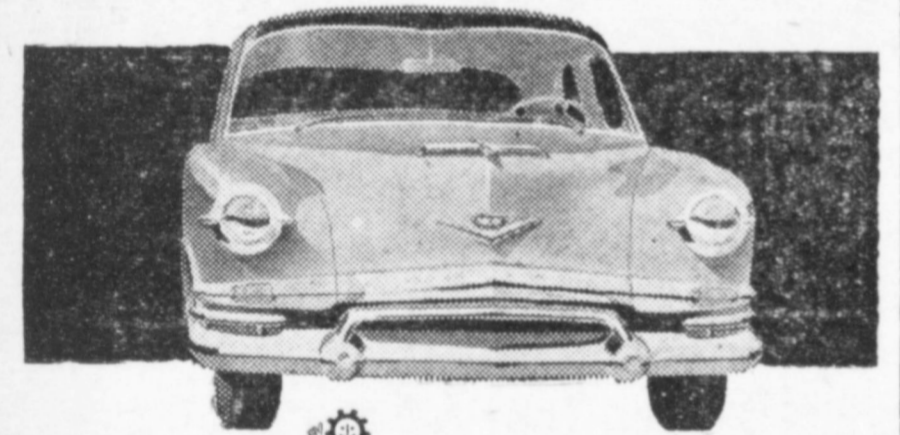

New Policy Will Step-up Marine Re-enlistments

A new policy to step up Marine re-enlistments was outlined this week by the Marine Corps recruiting station in Corpus Christi.

Under the new procedure, all Marines in the rank of sergeant or below are guaranteed a choice of three options upon reenlistment: 1. They may elect to be transferred or assigned to one of five geographic areas; 2. They may request retraining in a new occupational field; or 3. They may request and receive first consideration for assignment to a school of instruction in their present occupation field.

The Marine Corps said it could not guarantee transfer of men to a specific unit or location, but

that it will guarantee transfer or assignment to one of several geographic locations.

If he elects retraining, the re-enlistee will be retrained into a new occupational field from a list of three submitted by him, provided he meets the necessary requirements for successful performance of duty in the field selected.

Personnel who reenlist in order to be assigned to a school or course of instruction "may be guaranteed that they will receive first consideration in assignment to schools or courses of instruction in their present occupational field."

Further details of this new re-enlistment policy may be obtained at the Marine Corps recruiting station at Room 315, Federal Building, in Corpus Christi.

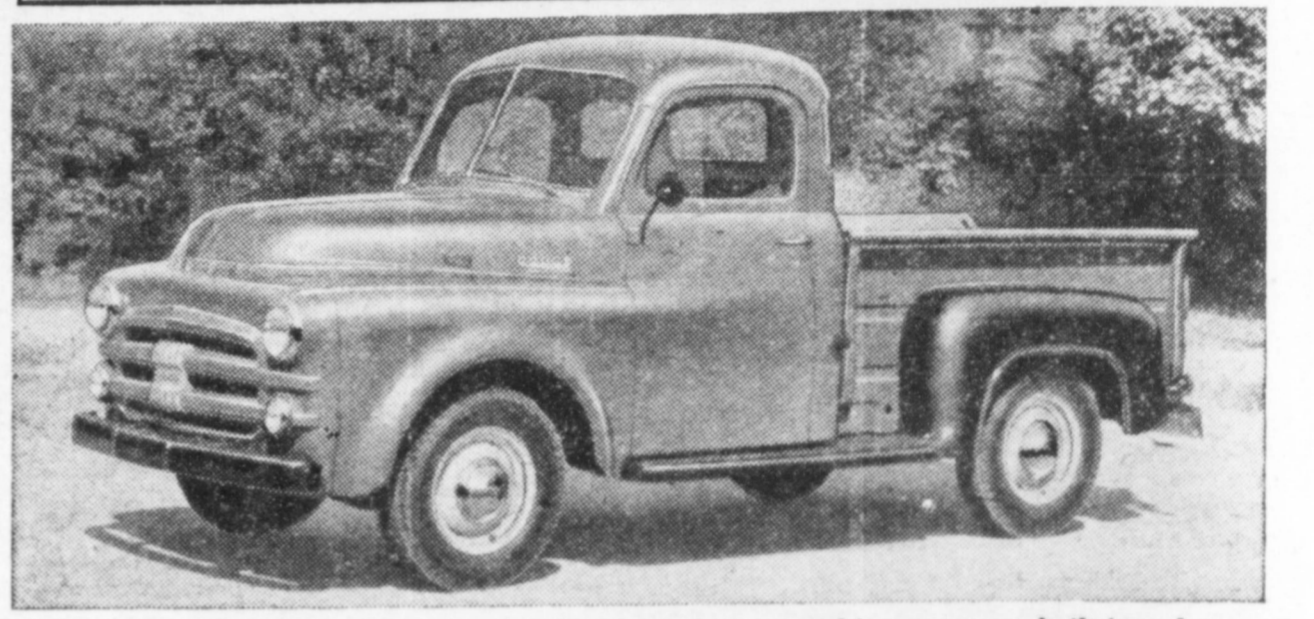

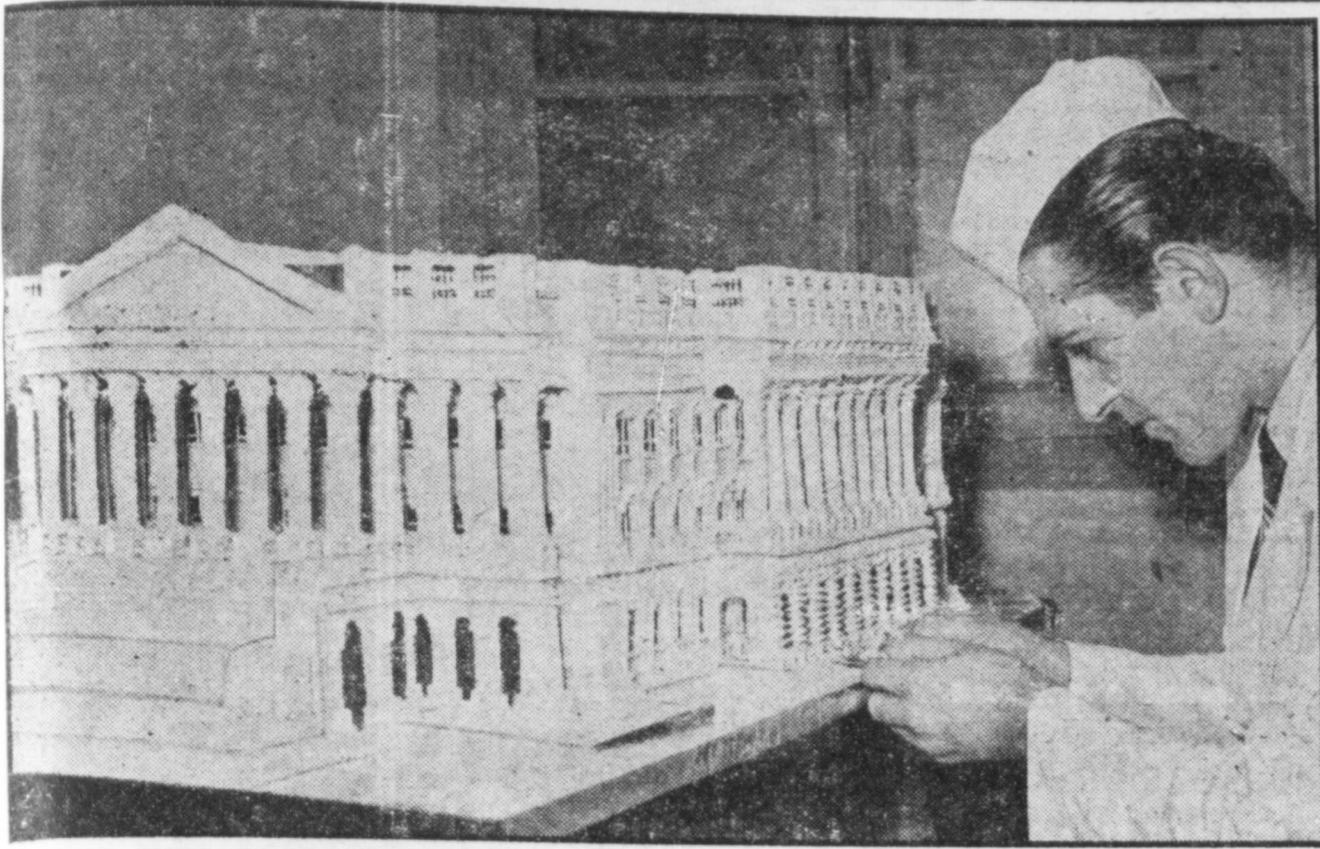

Crow—America's Unrecognized Game Bird

More extensive crow shooting as a sport could well replace the promiscuous roost bombing now widely practiced in the opinion of Dr. E. E. Good, a member of the Ohio Wildlife Research Unit, who recently made a study of the life history of this controversial bird. The crow is favorably distributed in relation to hunting pressure, is alert and not only offers a challenge to the hunter's wing shooting ability, but its flesh is rewardingly palatable. The crow must be judged beneficial or harmful to man's interests on a local basis, for its food habits vary widely with the locality, the season, and the availability of food.

Crow predation on waterfowl may be especially serious at times in some area, a bulk of their insect diet is found to consist of crop destroying caterpillars, beetles and grasshoppers.

Health Officer Warns Against Carbon Monoxide

AUSTIN—"You can't see it... you can't smell it... you can't taste it and yet it can kill you," said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, referring to carbon monoxide. A silent enemy, it strikes its victims in closed rooms, garages and cars where wood, coal, gasoline, or natural gas is burning.

Some victims of this silent poisoner never knew their life was in danger. As others died, they may have realized that the killer was at hand, but were helpless to do anything about it. They were so benumbed that they could not get out into the fresh air; they couldn't walk or even stand up. Those who escape death, once this silent killer permeates a closed room, garage or automobile,

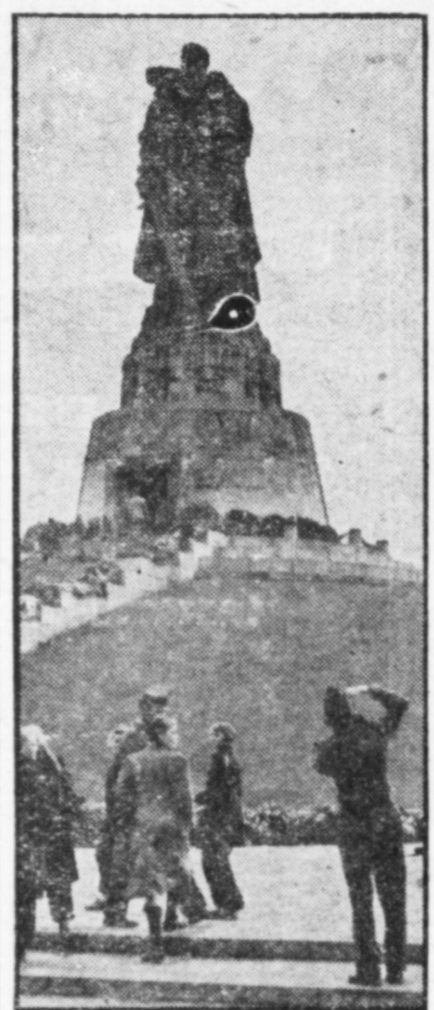
are rescued by someone who discovers their plight.

Carbon monoxide is given off when wood, coal, gasoline or natural gas is burned, but not all the gas is burned. Its danger is greatest in cold weather because people tend to close their houses and cars so tight that no fresh air can circulate. When this happens, carbon monoxide accumulates to a dangerous concentration. It kills because it prevents the victim from getting enough oxygen.

To help prevent such deaths all stoves should be vented, keep heated rooms ventilated, do not leave gas heaters burning while you and your family are asleep, do not entirely close all the windows in your car and do not run your car in a closed garage.

Whether your stoves, heaters and your car serve you and your family usefully, capably and safely, or whether they become

agencies of death depend upon how wisely you use them. Remember, ventilate at all times.

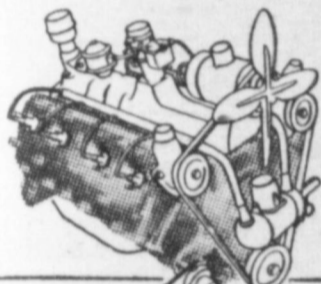

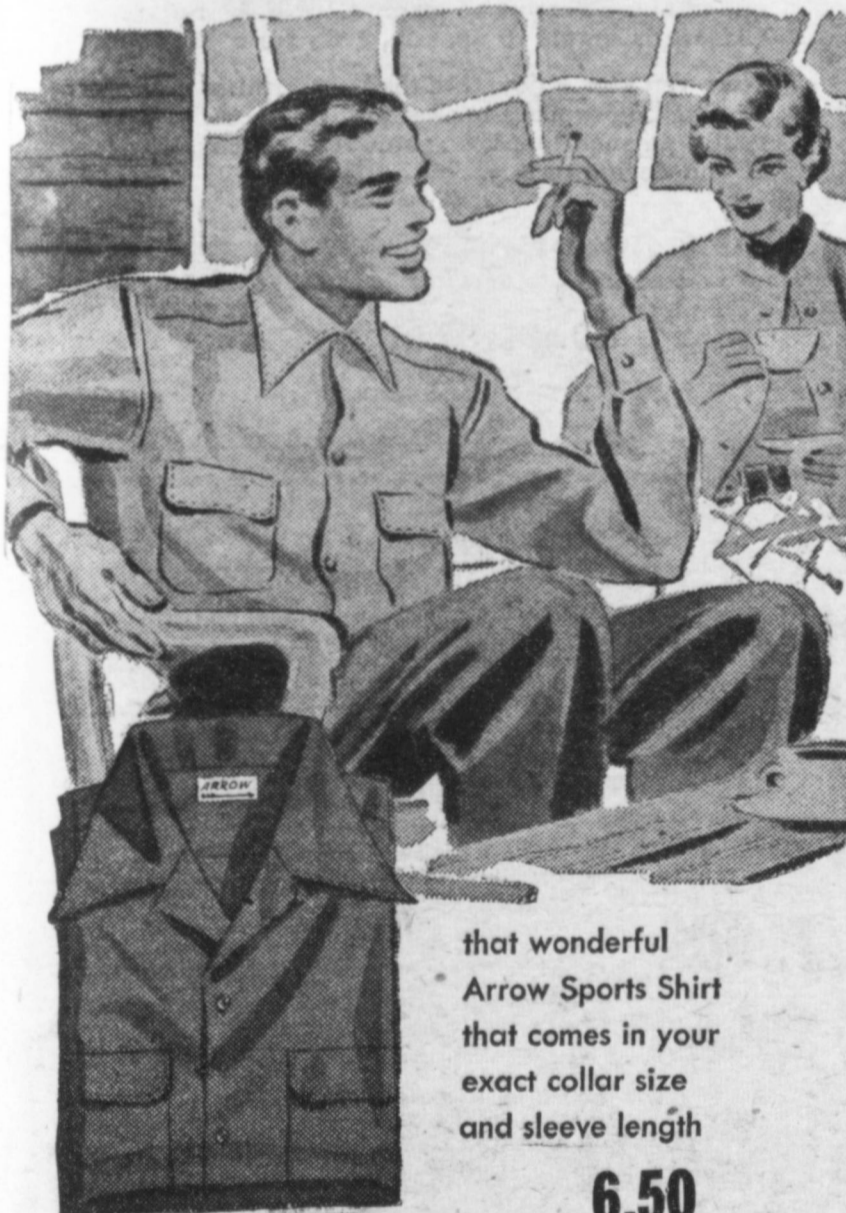
