Hunt Test Slated For 9,000 Feet

William H. Hunt has staked location for a slated 9,000 foot Aransas County wildcat about 7 miles southwest of Rockport.

His No. 1 W. C. McCampbell will be 467 feet northeast of the common Aransas County line and lease line and 467 feet south of Puerto Bay, also the lease line, in the James Orick Survey. The test will be in a 251 acre lease.

Selby-Walker Corp. and P. G. Lake, Inc. No. 1 A. G. Collin, slated 8,000-foot test in the East Fulton Beach Field five miles northwest of Rockport in Lot 13 of Fulton Townsite, was drilling below 6,423 feet in shale. Coring from 7,150 feet was scheduled.

Mrs. Mazie Wrather No. 1 Live Oak Apartments and others, in the East Fulton Beach Field, will be drilled as an exception to Rule 37, 62 feet from the north and east lines of lot 1, Bachman subdivision, in the south 124 feet of outlot 7, Fulton Addition. Permit depth is 8,000 and ground elevation is 10 feet.

Placid Oil Co. and others No. 5 Milton Jackson and others, test in the Fulton Beach Field, will be 467 feet from the southwest and east lines of a depth of 5,400 feet, the try will be five miles north of Rockport in a 153.5 acre lease.

Sun Oil Co. No. 3 Aransas State Tract 66, test in the Lamar (D-L Sand) Field, will be drilled as an exception to Rule 37, 230 feet from the north line and 330 feet from the west line of State Tract 66, Aransas Bay subdivision. The slated 7,400 foot test will be one-half mile southeast of Lamar in a 1,719.16 acre lease.

Sun Oil Co. No. 6 Copano Bay State Tract 74 has been completed for 107 barrels of 42.6 gravity oil daily from the A-3 Sand through 9/64-inch choke from 20 perforations at 7,143-48 feet. Tubing pressure was 500 pounds. Gas-oil ratio was 680-1. The opener has 5 1/2-inch casing set on bottom at 7,190 feet.

Humble Oil and Refining Co. No. 1 Aransas Bay State Tract 80, in the Goose Island Field, has been completed as a gas well on perforations at 6,934-40 feet.

Sun Oil Co. No. 9 State Tract 41, in the Fulton Beach Field, was drilling at 1,050 feet on a 7,506-foot project.

Census Shows 1,048 Scholastics In District

Miss Katie Lee Clarke, who was in charge of taking the school census of the Aransas County Independent School District this year, reports that there are 1,048 students of school age in the district.

Last year there were only 952 students as compared to 1,048 this year, an increase of 96 students.

There are 114 pupils registered this year who will be six years old Sept. 1. Of these 20 have already started to school, but facilities to take care of approximately 94 first graders will be needed this fall.

The 1,048 students is a record number for this district, and there has been a new high recorded each of the past six years, according to the census, Miss Clarke said.

Draft Law Requires Registrants to Report Change of Address

The draft law requires every man registered with a local board to report any change in personal status to his board.

"Young men have asked us just what changes they should report," Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state draft director, says. "Generally, anything which has a bearing on classification should be reported."

The state director pointed to the following things which should be regarded as change of personal status:

1. Current change of mail address should always be sent to the board.
2. Marriage should be reported at once.
3. If a wife becomes pregnant with a couple's first child, a physician's certificate must be sent to the board immediately after the fact is known.

4. All additions to the family must be reported.

5. Any and all deaths in a man's family should be reported.

6. If a man and wife are divorced or they no longer live together, this must be reported.

7. Permanent change of job should be reported.

8. Serious injury or physical defect should be reported.

9. If a man becomes a student in a college or university, this fact should be reported.

10. If a man enters the Reserves or National Guard, he should ask his commanding officer to notify his board. He should assure himself that it is done.

11. If a man has attempted to volunteer for armed forces service and has been rejected, he should advise his local board.

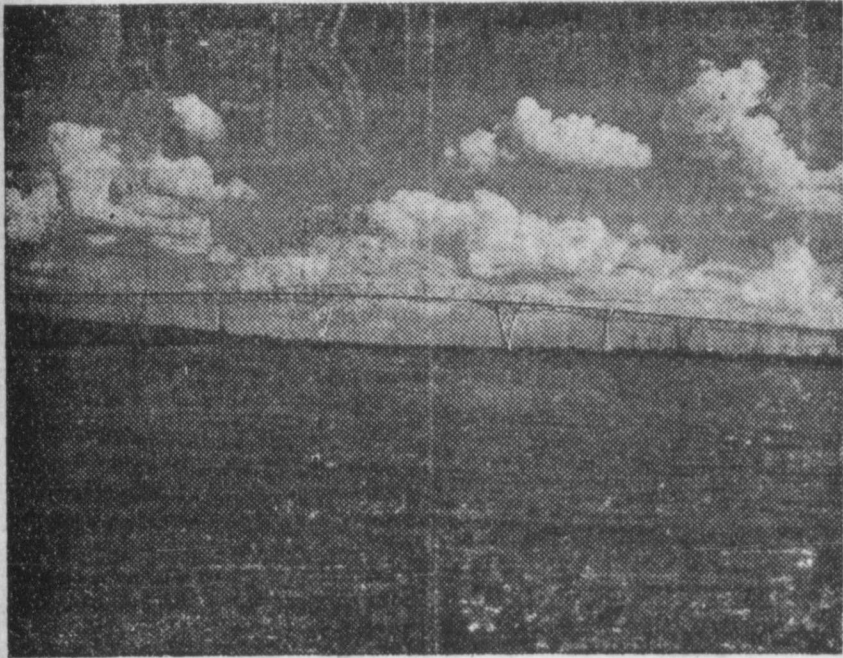

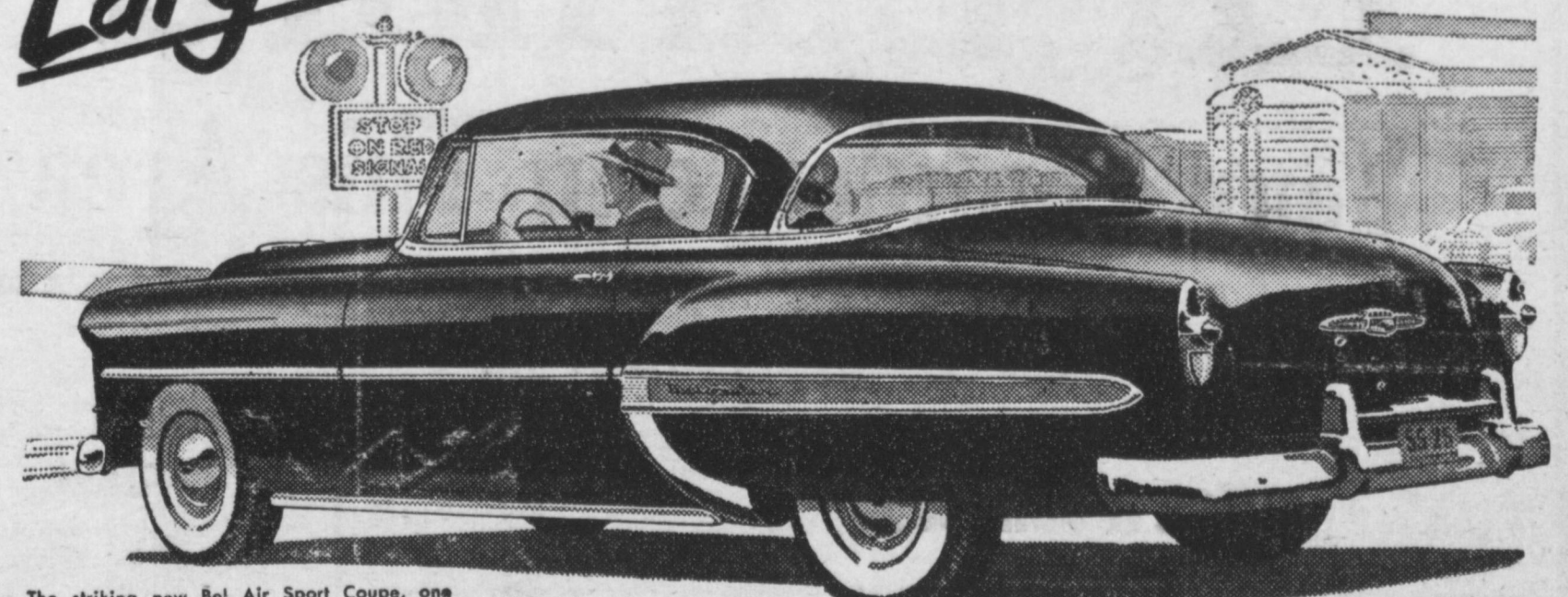

What Does the Bible Say?

WHY STUDY THE BIBLE?

I find that many business men and housewives spend more time reading comic strips or the sport pages or slick paper magazines than they do reading the Bible. I am not suggesting that we should read nothing but the Bible. There is a place for light reading for relaxation, but surely those of us who are mature should not starve our souls by failing to study the Bible! Here are some good reasons why I believe you should study your Bible daily.

1. It is inspired of God. "Holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Spirit." (II Peter 1:21).

2. Through its pages we come to know God, our creator and the one in whom we live and move and have our being.

3. We learn of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. "Search the scriptures, for in them ye think ye have eternal life; and they are they which testify of me." (John 5:39). The four gospels, Matthew, Mark,

Luke, and John, were written that "ye may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing ye may have life in his name." (John 20:31).

4. We learn how to be free. Man needs a guide. It is not within man himself to direct his steps. Jesus said: "Ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free." This is true in everyday life, and particularly true of spiritual things. Jesus went on to say: "My word is truth." The New Testament teaches us, especially in the book of conversions, the book of Acts, that we can be free from our past sins by believing in Jesus as the Christ, repenting of our wrong-doing, confessing our faith in Christ, and being buried with Him in the likeness of His death

and resurrection. (Read Chapters 2, 8, 10, 16 in Acts).

The sermon on the mount (Matthew 5, 6, 7) and other teaching of Jesus and the apostles instruct us in attitudes toward others that will bring joy, peace of mind, and success both here and hereafter. People who live by the Bible are the most secure and happiest people I know. Paul says to Christians: "Rejoice and again I say, Rejoice . . . In nothing be anxious; but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God. And the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall guard your hearts and your thoughts in Jesus Christ." (Philippians 4).

6. We learn how to prepare for the future. "Be prepared" is a good motto. Many wise businessmen have prospered because they had the vision to prepare for the future. They looked ahead 20 or 30 years and are ahead because they did. But what about the next 100 years, the next 1,000, the eternity beyond this life? The majority of those who seriously think about the future believe there is a life beyond the grave. Those who study the Bible know that God "hath appointed a day, in which He will judge the world in righteousness." (Acts 17). "For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ; that everyone may receive the things done in his body, according to that he hath done, whether it is good or bad." (II Corinthians 5). Jesus will be the judge. You and I will not judge each other. We will all be standing before the same great judge. Jesus said: "He that rejecteth me, and receiveth not my words, hath one that judgeth him. The word that I have spoken, the same shall judge him at the last day." (John 12).

Let us urge you to study the Bible daily. Come and study the Bible with us.

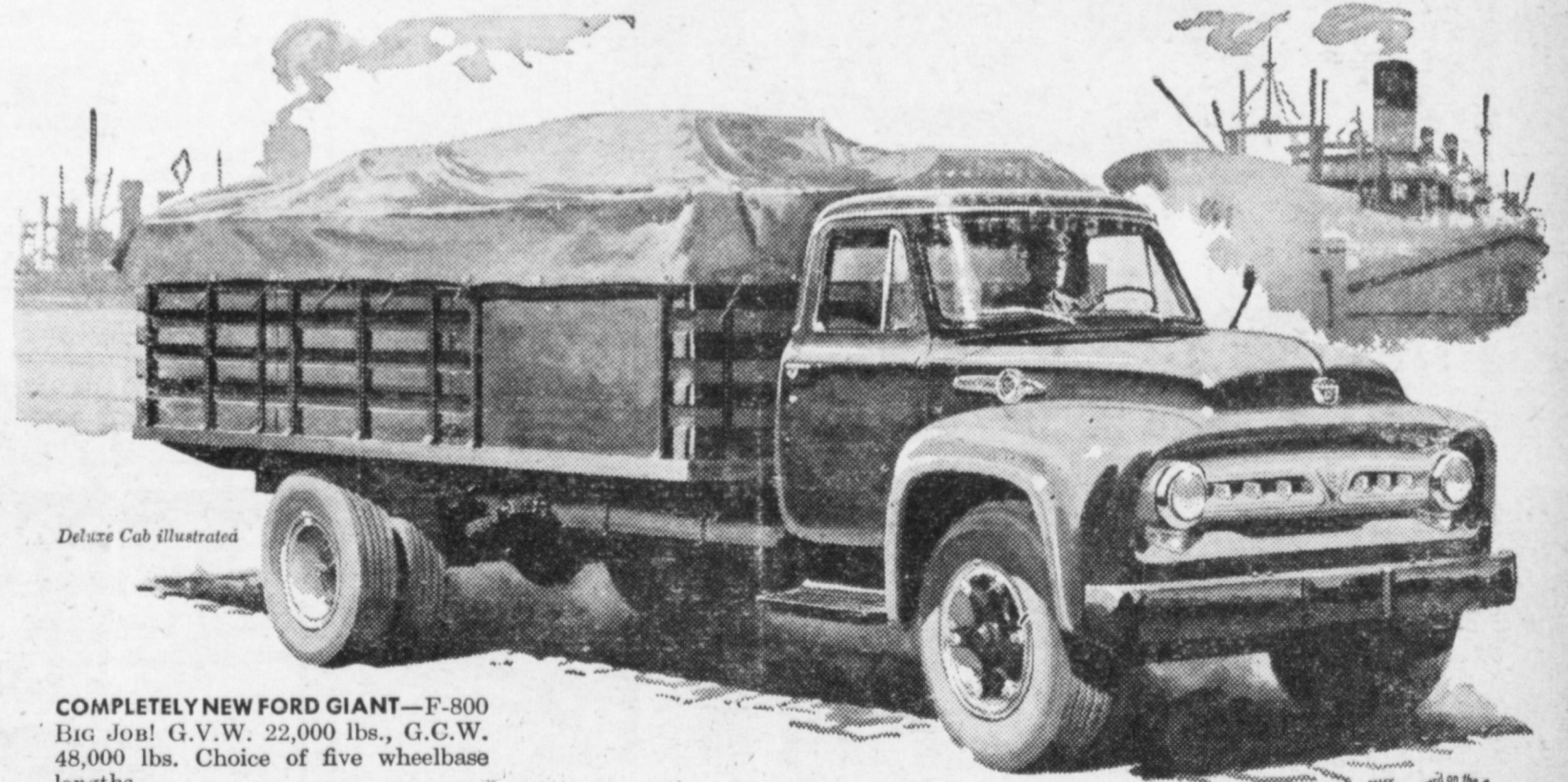

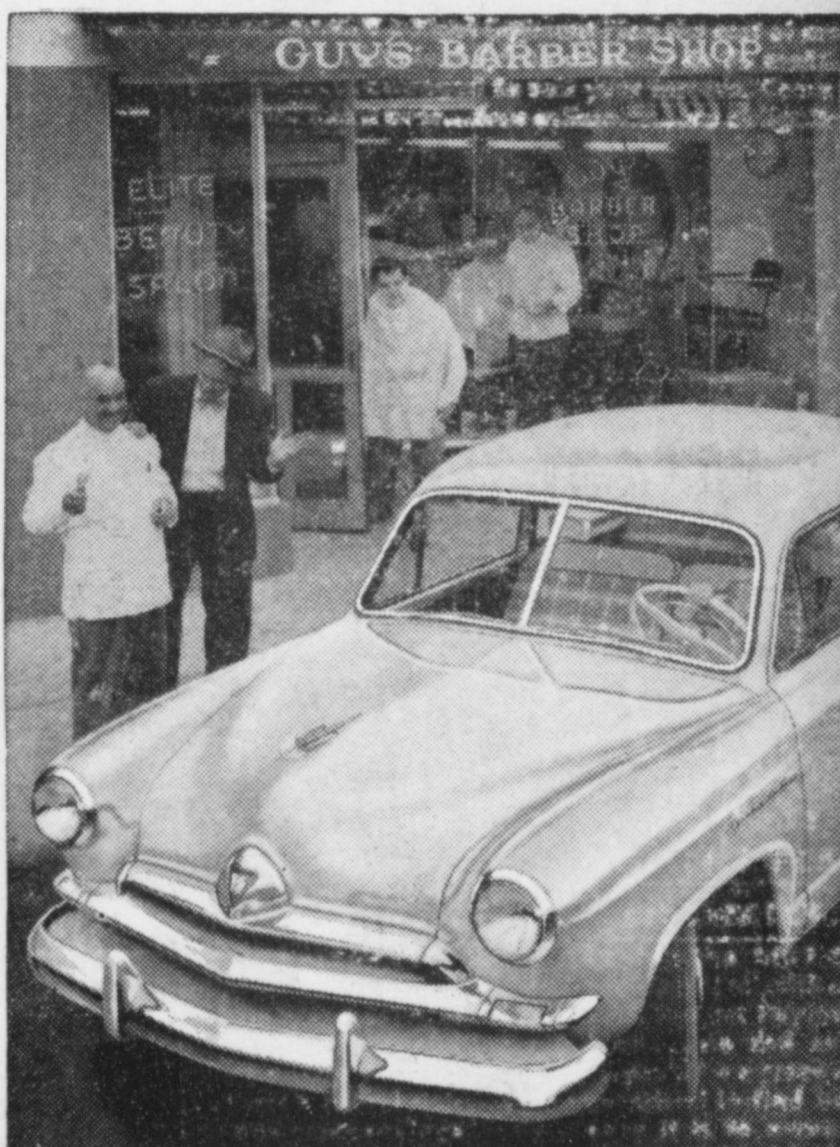

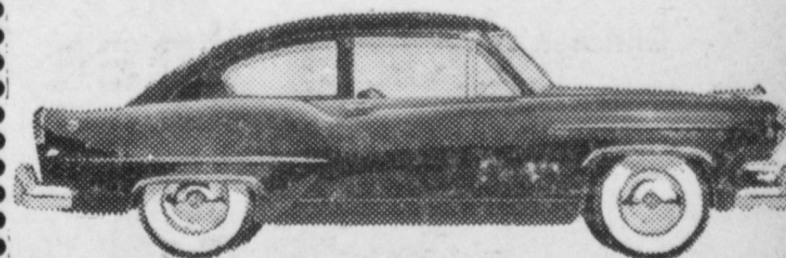

WHITEWINGS ARRIVE SOON

The assistant director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish Commission said substantial numbers of whitewing doves are expected in the Rio Grande Valley any day now.
 He said the swift, game birds which usually are hunted during a special September season ordinarily appear en masse about mid-April but that the migration trend this spring may bring them in ahead of schedule. Whitewings winter in distant parts of Mexico.
 The assistant director said reports from field men in the Valley where the distinctive game

birds nest are that housing facilities for them may be improved this year. Whitewings have been short of nesting areas since the severe freeze of January 1951 which killed so many citrus trees.
 The assistant director pointed out that the whitewings have been constantly harassed for nesting grounds since citrus and farming operations depleted Valley wilderness area. Then, after the birds had readjusted themselves to citrus cover, the crisis became more acute when the freeze decimated the orchards. This caused the birds to drop from a peak of about 500,000 in 1950 to an estimated 150,000 last year.
 Game Warden Supervisor Chas. Jones of Weslaco said general

nesting facilities seemed improved this spring and were particularly promising for the whitewing concentration in a favorite 120 acre thicket near Santa Rosa where from 50,000 to 60,000 whitewings usually nest.
 Wildlife Biologist William Jen-

nings of Harlingen, said his survey showed that while a 24,000-acre brush tract north of Mission was being cleared, that only a comparatively few whitewings nest there. He described nesting facilities for 1953 as "improved over the last two years."

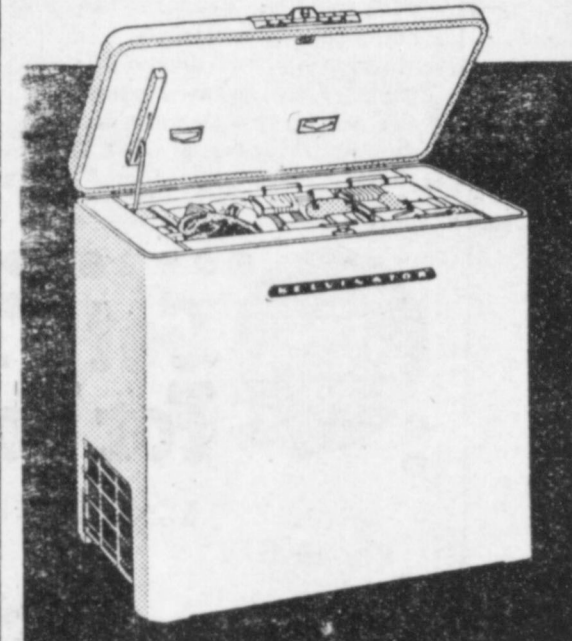

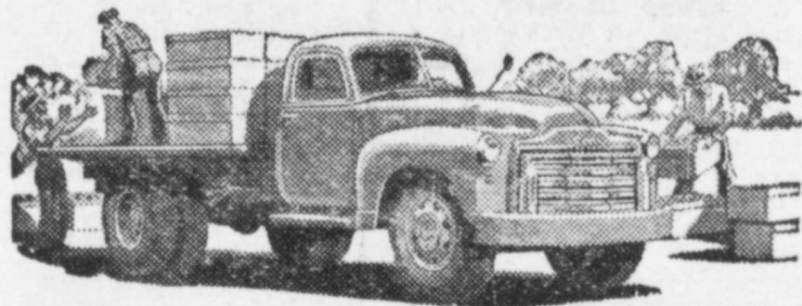

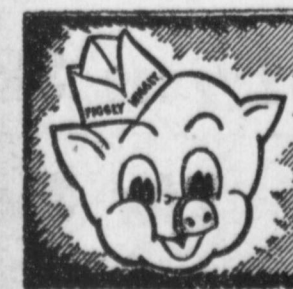

Mr. and Mrs. Harry Taylor returned Monday from San Antonio where they spent the Easter holidays.




