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### Courthouse Attracts Tourists to Rockport

This year-around coastal resort city makes one of the most unusual brags on record.

It claims its courthouse as one of its foremost scenic attractions. And, it might be added, for good reason.

The three-story county building, designed by a young San Antonio resident named Riley Gordon, was constructed in 1889 of Moorish architecture.

Exactly why Gordon, who later achieved fame as an architect in New York, struck on the Moorish design is one of those bits of information lost over the years.

But there's no question that he designed a building that was—

Even today, hundreds of visitors are attracted to the ancient structure by its unusual appearance.

In fact, the courthouse—where the business of Aransas County still is transacted—draws just about as much attention as the 2000-year-old live oak tree in the center of nearby Goose Island State Park, the George W. Fulton mansion, and other points of interest in the Rockport resort area.

The following application for permission to cancel a portion of the Smith and Wood Division, City of Rockport, Aransas County, Texas, has been filed in the Commissioners Court of Aransas County, Texas, on the 9th day of June, 1953, to wit:

I That the portion of the said Smith and Wood Division, City of Rockport, Aransas County, Texas which petitioners desire permission to cancel is a portion of a dead end street, described as follows, to wit:

The most westerly portion of Cornwall Street, bounded on the north by Block Eighty-Four (84), Smith and Wood Division, on the South by Block Seventy-three (73), Smith and Wood Division, on the West by the Guy Epps tract of land out of the Thos. Green Survey of Aransas County, Texas, and bounded on the East by Hood Street, Smith and Wood Division, said land being more particularly described as follows, to wit:

Beginning at the NE corner of said Block 73 in a northerly direction along the west boundary of Hood Street to the SE corner of said Block 84; thence in a westerly direction along the south edge of said block 84 to a stake in the East boundary of the said Guy Epps tract of land; Thence in a southerly direction along the east boundary of said Guy Epps tract of land to its junction with the north edge of said block 73; Thence in an easterly direction along the north edge of said block 73 to place of beginning; containing a rectangular shaped plot of ground of the same length as said Blocks 84 and 73, and of the same width as said Cornwall Street.

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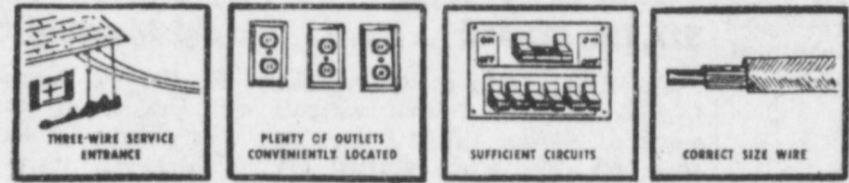

# What Does the Bible Say?

### Why Observe The Lord's Supper Every Sunday?

A visitor to the morning worship of the church has asked this question: "Why do Churches of Christ observe the Lord's Supper every Sunday?" That is a reasonable question. Perhaps you have wondered about it too?

We are striving to restore the simple worship of the Church in the days of the apostles. The Church in those days observed the Lord's Supper the first day of every week. The approved example of this is found in Paul's experience at Troas. Paul "tarried seven days" in Troas. Evidently he was awaiting the opportunity of breaking bread with the church there. "And upon the first day of the week, when we were gathered together to break bread, Paul discoursed with them . . ." (Acts 20:7.) This scripture shows that it was the custom of the early church to "break bread" or observe the Lord's Supper on the first day of the week, which day we call Sunday.

Secular history adds to this scriptural example and shows clearly that the early Christians did meet to observe the Lord's Supper or Communion on the first day of every week. (See Inter-

national Standard Bible Encyclopedia p. 1925.) Justin, who was martyred about 165 A.D., wrote that the Christians of his day met on the "Day of the Sun" because "it is the first day on which God, having transformed darkness and matter, created the world; and on the same day Jesus Christ our Saviour rose from the dead." Then he describes how they read the scriptures, and heard preaching and then partook of the elements representing the Lord's blood and the Lord's body.

So, we who are trying to reproduce New Testament Christianity in our present age follow the approved example of the early Christian in remembering the Lord's death until He come on the first day of every week. This

regular memorial is a source of much spiritual strength to Christians who partake in a worthy manner.

Hear this man in person at the Rockport Church of Christ, north of the courthouse, June 15 through 21, 8 p.m., nightly.

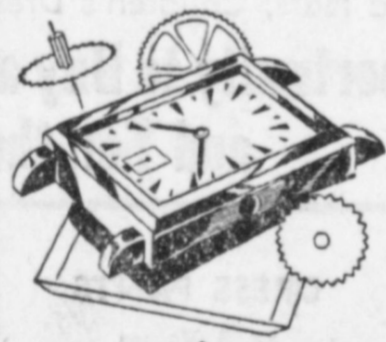

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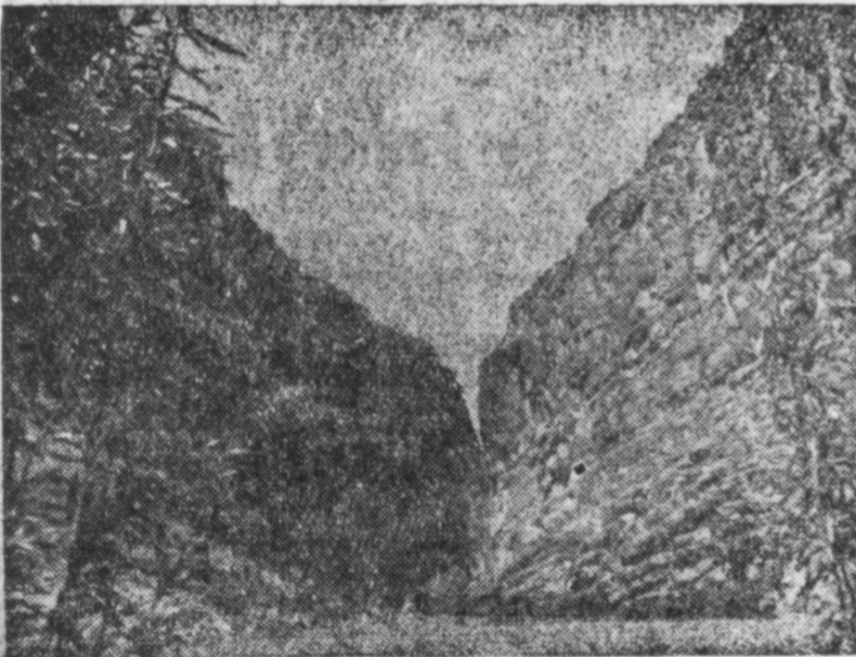
