Sheriff Arley Shivers was called to Aransas Pass Sunday to get a boy who was picked up and charged with speeding Saturday night.

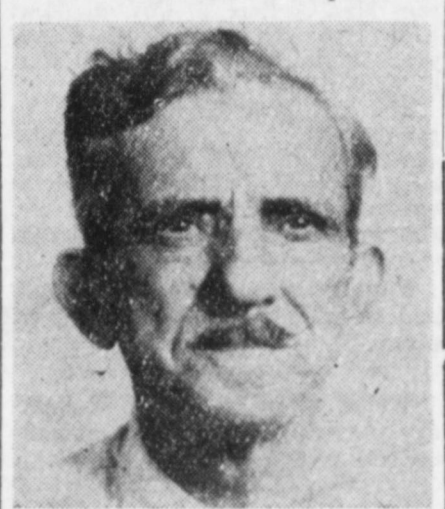

Navigation Comm. Plan Harbor Improvements

The Navigation Committee of the Chamber of Commerce and two members of the board of the Aransas County Navigation District No. 1 met with other interested parties last Friday night at a meeting called by the Chamber of Commerce Navigation committee, at the Chamber of Commerce building. A report on the financial condition of the Navigation District was given and a free discussion of what those present felt was needed in the nature of improvements was held. F. G. Huffman has been designated by the Navigation Board to develop preliminaries and estimates for the improvements needed.

Members of the Chamber of Commerce navigation committee were requested to work with Mr. Huffman in the development of the plans.

In general the plans will include the completion of the improvements already begun at Fulton, that is the dredging of the harbor and the installation of stalls for the docking of boats.

The engineer was requested to submit estimates on the cost of building additional harbor facilities to the north of the Yacht basin in Rockport. These proposed improvements will be similar to the existing ones, and when completed, with the existing facilities will form a large T-head with a new channel on the north. The spoils resulting from the dredging will be used to build a beach for bathing and recreational purposes.

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From Your State Capitol

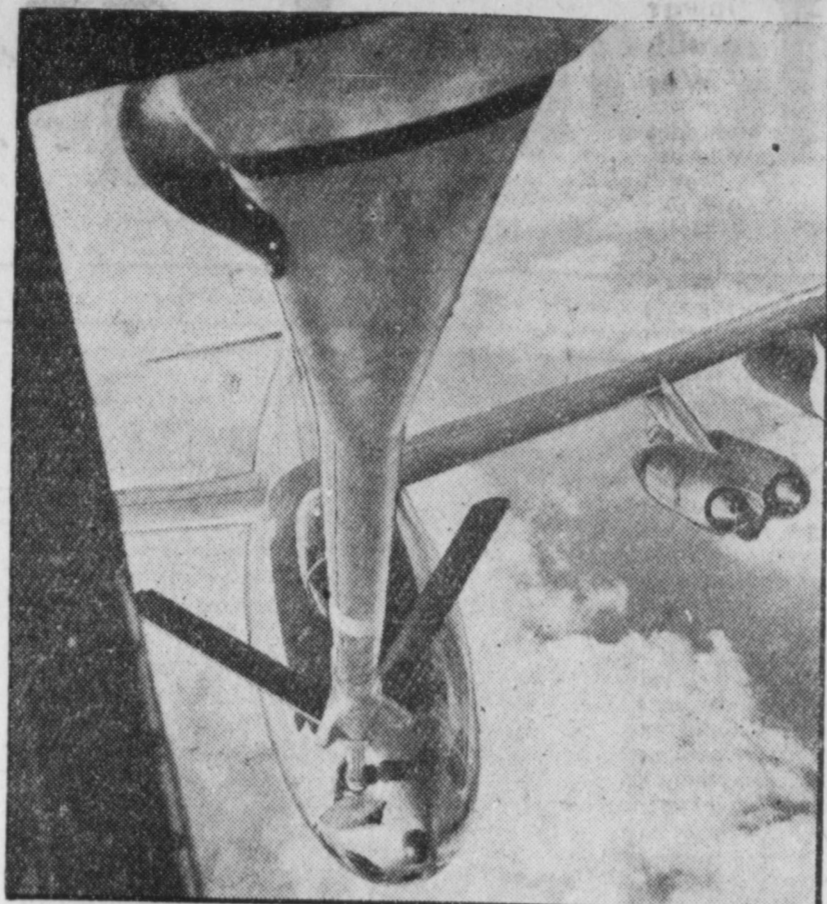

Austin, Texas. — The drought extend emergency credit to farmers and ranchers.

A bill passed by the Senate would set up a revolving fund from which the Agricultural Department could make farm and ranch loans.

A similar bill passed in the House.

The bill was reported out of Congress rushed legislation to the Senate Agriculture Committee,

tee, of which Senator George D. Aiken, Republican of Vermont, is chairman.

Aiken lamented that some people were trying to make money out of the Southwest's misfortune.

Bankers wanted to handle the loans, he said, and grain operators wanted to handle the distribution of feed under the program. The senator commented:

"I don't understand the workings of the minds of people, some of them thousands of miles away from the drought section, who are trying to figure out a way to profit from the situation."

Aiken was opposed to the suggestion of Senator Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas and others that Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson start a government cattle-buying program to bolster prices.

Aiken said a previous buying program was not very successful. Johnson said that the agriculture department had the money and the authority to buy cattle.

The Texas senator contended that credit will do no good, nor will cheap feed and low freight rates, unless prices are improved.

Benson has refused to support cattle prices or buy beef on the hoof to strengthen the market.

While Congress wrangled over emergency drought relief measures, the Production and Marketing Administration started feed going to parched Texas counties.

C. H. Moseley of the Dallas PMA commodity office said 277 rail cars of corn, 114 of oats, and four of wheat were on their way to 100 points in the state.

F. P. Biggs, PMA commodity director at New Orleans, stated that 6,154 tons of cottonseed meal and pellets were moving into Texas.

All this feed was being sold at low prices and was being hauled by the railroads at half the usual rates.

Ranchmen at Dalhart, meanwhile, found backers for their proposal of federal price supports for cattle.

They called stockmen from five states — Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, New Mexico, and Colorado — to a meeting for the organization of an association to forward their campaign.

Governors of the same five states met at Amarillo the next day to talk about the drought.

The conference was called by Governor Allan Shivers of Texas on a suggestion originally made by Governor Dan Thornton of Colorado.

A campaign to increase beef consumption at retail and consumer levels has been drawn by officials of organizations interested in the current livestock problem. The program resulted from a conference held Monday in Ft. Worth. In charge of the meeting was Robert M. Fielder, chairman of the agriculture and livestock committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Well, the end of the drought may not be far off.

That's based on the long-range predictions of Abraham Streiff, hydraulics engineer who worked on the Colorado River dams above Austin and incidentally made an intensive study of the weather.

C. L. Dowell, chief hydraulics engineer of the Lower Colorado River Authority, says Streiff's prophecies have been coming true for a long time.

The forecaster's idea is that floods will return to the river this year, that next year will be wet, and that heavy rains will fill the river in 1955 and 1956.

Another promise of rain came from the Rev. E. L. Taylor of Albany, Ga., who sent this telegram to Mayor C. A. McAden of Austin:

"The Rev. E. L. Taylor has sent this morning an order for rain for Texas. Look for rain within three days. I have been calling for rain for 27 years and getting it."

There was some moisture around the state, but nothing like what it would take to break the drought.

There was heavy precipitation in the Big Spring area, some rain in the Panhandle and all across the North Texas border.

The State Board of Education said it wanted the searchlight put upon itself to determine whether it was doing a good job.

Directing the searchlight will be the Texas Research League, a privately-financed agency set up for the purpose of studying the various phases of state government.

J. W. Edgar, commissioner of education, recommended the study.

There have now been four years of operation under the Gilmer-Aiken laws, Edgar said, and the program ought to be examined.

The State Education Board adopted a new economic index, reducing the contributions of 142 counties to the public school program next school year.

On the other hand 112 counties will be required to make increased contributions, and of this number, 62 will be assessed 10 per cent more than last year.

Study of higher education in Texas will be made by a House committee appointed by Speaker Reuben Senterfitt.

Committee members are Representatives H. A. Hull of Ft. Worth, J. O. Gillham of Brownfield, F. S. Seeligson of San Antonio, Reagan Huffman of Marshall, and Ben Glusing of Kingsville.

Also appointed by Senterfitt were House members to serve on the Legislative Budget Board for the next two years. They are Representatives Fred Niemann, Jack Fisk, Max Smith and D. H. Buchanan.

Short snorts: The state's general fund increased \$5,171,506 during June, mainly because of greater oil revenues. . . . Plans proceeded for construction of tourist facilities at Inks Lake State Park on the Colorado River and Eisenhower State Park on Lake Texoma. . . . Senator Price Daniel presented to Texas Memorial Museum the pen used by President Eisenhower in signing the tidelands bill. . . . Great progress has been made in modernizing the Texas prison system, reported State Auditor C. H. Cavness, who emphasized the warning, however, that conditions are bad at Eastham Farm, and trouble can be expected there unless improvements are made.

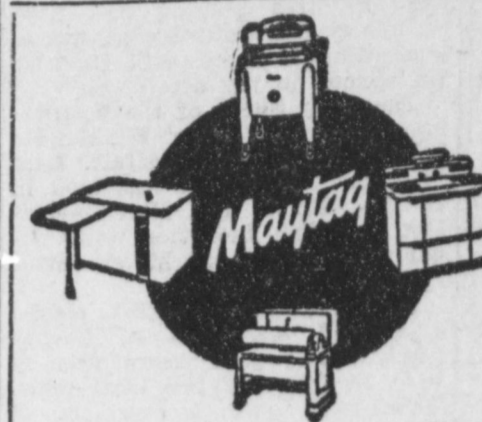

C of C Stories Tell of Area Attractions

The Rockport and Fulton area has recently received considerable publicity throughout the southwestern states stressing the vacation and playground facilities of this area.

This publicity is being handled by Vernon Smylie and Associates, public relations consultants of Corpus Christi who were recently employed by the chamber directors for that purpose.

Every week, Mr. Smylie has mailed stories to the hometown newspapers of those sportsmen fishing in this area, telling of their catches of trout, reds and other fish.

Following is an outline of a few of the feature stories mailed to various newspapers in the southwest by Mr. Smylie:

The world's largest live oak tree is located in Goose Island State Park near the coastal resort city of Rockport, 30 miles north of Corpus Christi. The tree is believed to be more than 200 years old.

The Aransas County courthouse at Rockport is becoming an increasingly popular tourist attraction. It was erected in 1889 and is of Moorish architecture.

Good fishing is nothing new to the Rockport area of the Texas coast. As far back as 1890, a survey showed that 1,244,100 pounds of fish were taken from Rockport waters in a single year.

Besides plenty of fine fishing, the coastal city of Rockport has plenty of places for its fishermen. A recent count showed that there are 37 tourist courts capable of accommodating 2,200 persons in the Rockport area.

Rockport is one of Texas' foremost fishing spots — and for good reason. It is the center of an area that includes 184,000 acres of landlocked bays.

The speckled trout is Rockport's No. 1 fishing catch. However, nearby waters also produce sizeable quantities of redfish, sand trout, drum, flounder, sheepshead, catfish, and golden croakers.

The Aransas National Wildlife Refuge, a 50,000-acre primitive area near Rockport, is the only known wintering ground for the nearly-extinct whooping crane. It attracts hundreds of visitors each year.

The Rockport area is one of the favorite wintering areas in the nation for water fowl. Mallards, red heads, blue bills, and pintails by the hundreds of thousands settle on the waters of Aransas, Copano, Puerto, St. Charles, and Redfish bays.

Rockport, noted for its fine fishing, also holds the distinction of having been the site of the only turtle packing plant ever established along the Texas coast. The plant was built during the Reconstruction period when turtles abounded in nearby Aransas Bay. It was abandoned at the start of the Twentieth Century as the turtle supply diminished.

Texas' most famous Nineteenth Century mansion still stands on the shore of Aransas Bay at Fulton, near the resort city of Rockport. It is the three-story home erected in 1875 by Col. George W. Fulton, an early-day cattle baron. The mansion is open to visitors.

General Zachary Taylor camped overnight at Rockport during his march to Mexico 106 years ago, making a lasting place for himself in the history of the Texas coast. The tree under which he camped still is known as the Taylor Oak.

Rockport and Fulton are becoming increasingly popular as a winter resort. Last season, playing hosts to thousands of guests from other parts of Texas and the Midwest.

Burial Allowance Is Paid to Families of Deceased Workers

A lump sum death payment is usually payable at the death of a person, who was insured by his work on Social Security jobs. According to H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration, this single payment is in addition to any monthly payments of survivors insurance which may be paid to the family.

An application for the lump sum death payment, which is in the nature of a burial allowance, must be filed within two years of the death of a worker. The amount ranges from \$75.00 to 255, depending upon the reported earnings of the insured worker.

The widow or widower is the proper person to receive the lump sum payment if the deceased worker was married and living with his spouse at the time of his death, Cleveland explained. If the worker was not married when he died, the payment is made to the person who pays the burial expenses.

When the payment is a reimbursement of burial expenses, a receipted bill, showing that the funeral expenses have been paid must be submitted when no widow or widower survives.

Further information about lump sum death payments, or any other question concerning aid-age and survivors insurance, may be secured by writing, visiting, or calling the Social Security Administration, 424 Haylor Street, Corpus Christi, Texas.

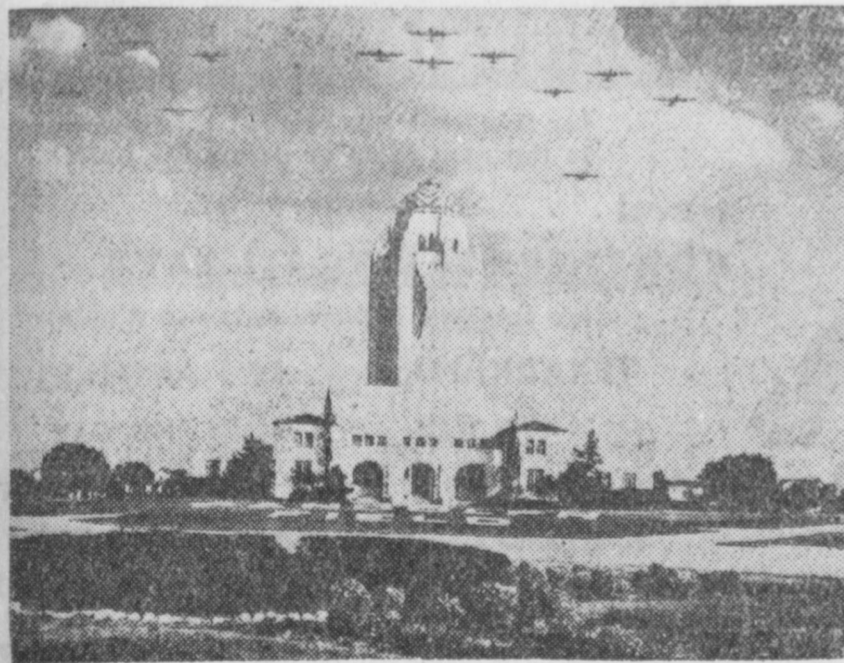

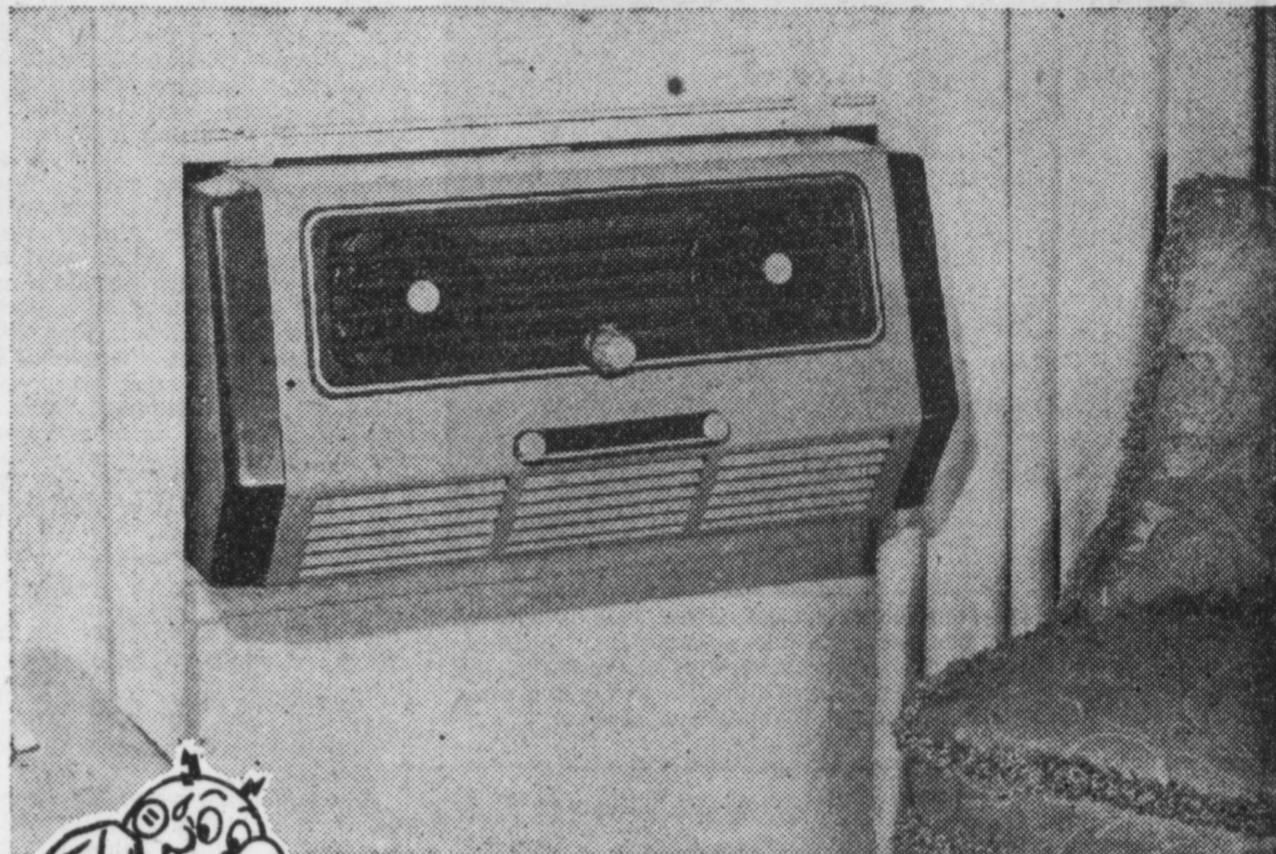

OUR NEW TEXAS LAWS

In the article below Attorney General Ben Shepperd lists five of the proposed Constitutional Amendments which will be voted upon by the people in November, 1954. They are:

- (1) Permitting the Legislature to determine the salaries of certain officials. The Constitution now sets the amount.
(2) Raising the limit of welfare expenditures for aged, blind, and needy children.
(3) Prohibiting the state from lending credit of the state to any individual, or corporation, etc., for toll roads.
(4) Requiring each county of less than 10,000 population to have a tax assessor and collector, beginning Jan. 1, 1955.
(5) Permitting employees of the state and political subdivisions to be under the old age and survivors insurance of the Federal Social Security.

A Small Claims Court with reduced expenses and costs was created to handle claims up to \$50; or, where a dispute is over wages or salaries, the claim can be as much as \$100. The justice of the peace serves as the judge of this court.

There were also a number of new laws concerning juries and jury service. Only dentists, doctors, and attorneys in active practice may be exempt from jury service. (Formerly 21 different occupational groups could be excused.) Jurors in the county and district courts and grand jurors will not receive between \$4 and \$5 per day, the exact amount being set by the county commissioners' court.

The commissioners' court may also provide that jurors in felony cases be fed and lodged by the sheriff in addition to receiving pay for their services. Changes were also made in the amount of fees collected by justices of the peace, the county courts and county courts at law.

When stock is found running at large they can be impounded and the owner required to pay a new fee for the keeping of the animals. The fee is graduated from 15c to \$1 per head per day depending upon the type animal and whether impounded by a public pound or private individual.

It is now a criminal offense for cattle to be on a state or national highway. The provisions for stock law elections were also revised to permit elections concerning the confinement of a particular class of animal.

A number of changes were made in local government. A total of 126 laws were passed dealing with counties and county officers while 52 laws were passed dealing with municipalities; and 54 bills dealt with schools and universities.

Bills on water, municipalities, counties and schools made up a little more than 50% of the total number of bills sent to the Governor for signature.

It is interesting to note that up to this time the Governor has vetoed only seven bills that were sent to him by the Fifty-third Legislature. In 1951, he vetoed 35 bills and in 1949, he vetoed four bills. As this is written, there are only 37 bills on the Governor's desk awaiting his action.

The major bills which are awaiting his action as this is written are:

Two bills creating five additional district courts; three bills making changes in the teacher's retirement system; one revising laws relating to mutual assessment and farm mutual insurance companies; providing a statute of limitation of four years for the collection of delinquent personal property taxes; several bills relating to local government and increasing the power of the county commissioners' court; one setting the salaries of court reporters; and several bills increasing the powers of school districts.

In these articles I have attempted to list the bills which, although important, have almost escaped notice. I cannot close without noting that of the 41 bills submitted to our office for opinions, almost half were held void for legal reasons.

I would recommend that the following steps be adopted by the Legislature to avoid legal pitfalls:

- (1) Submit all bills to the Legislative Council or other technical agency by November 15 before the January sessions, so that they could be printed

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 20th day of August, 1953, within Aransas County, Texas, to determine whether or not the Commissioners' Court of ARANSAS COUNTY, TEXAS, shall be authorized to levy and collect in each year for a period of six years from the date of said election, county taxes as follows:

NOT exceeding FORTY CENTS (40c) on the \$100 valuation, in any one year, for County purposes;

NOT exceeding THIRTEEN CENTS (13c) on the \$100 valuation, in any one year, for roads and bridges;

NOT exceeding TWO CENTS (2c) on the \$100 valuation, in any one year, to supplement the jury fund of the county, and;

NOT exceeding TWENTY-FIVE CENTS (25c) on the \$100 valuation in any one year, for the erection of public buildings and other permanent improvements;

WHEREAS, the Commissioners' Court of Aransas County, Texas, deems it advisable and to the best interest of said County to re-allocate the county taxes authorized to be levied annually by Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, by changing the rates in respect to certain county taxes as herein provided;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF ARANSAS COUNTY, TEXAS:

ON THIS, the 13th day of July, 1953, the Commissioners' Court of Aransas County, Texas, convened in Regular Session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the courthouse at Rockport, Texas, with the following members of the Court, to-wit:

JOHN WENDELL, COUNTY JUDGE, Presiding, and W. B. ALLEN, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 1; J. M. SPARKS, JR., COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 2; A. L. DAVIS, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 3; J. H. MILLS, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 4; present, and among other proceedings had by the Court were the following:

Commissioner Mills introduced an order and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Sparks. The motion, carrying with it the adoption of the order, prevailed by the following vote:

AYES: Commissioners Allen, Sparks, Davis and Mills.
NOES: None.
The order is as follows:

WHEREAS, at the general elec-

tion held throughout the State of Texas on November 7, 1944, the qualified electors of the State, voting on the proposition, approved the amendment to Section 9, of Article 8, of the Texas Constitution, which amendment provides that the Commissioners' Court in any county may re-allocate the county tax levies authorized in said Section 9, of Article 8, by changing the rates provided for any of the purposes authorized in said Section by either increasing or decreasing the same, but in no event shall the total of such taxes exceed Eighty Cents (80c) on the one hundred dollars' valuation for any one year, provided that before the Commissioners' Court may make such re-allocations and changes in such levies the same shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpayers voters of such county at a general or special election; and in event such re-allocations and changes are approved by a majority of the qualified property taxpayers voters of any such county, such re-allocations and changes shall remain in force and effect for a period of six (6) years from the date of the election at which same shall have been approved, unless the same again shall have been changed by a majority of the qualified property taxpayers voters of such county, voting on the proposition; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners' Court of Aransas County, Texas, deems it advisable and to the best interest of said County to re-allocate the county taxes authorized to be levied annually by Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, by changing the rates in respect to certain county taxes as herein provided;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF ARANSAS COUNTY, TEXAS:

That a special election be held in said County on the 20th day of August, 1953, which is not less than Thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpayers voters, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

"SHALL the Commissioners' Court of Aransas County, Texas, be authorized to levy and collect in each year for a period of Six (6) years from the date of said election, county taxes as follows:

Not exceeding FORTY CENTS (40c) on the \$100 valuation, in any one year, for County purposes;

Not exceeding THIRTEEN CENTS (13c) on the \$100 valuation, in any one year, for roads and bridges;

Not exceeding TWO CENTS (2c) on the \$100 valuation, in any one year, to supplement the jury

fund of the County; and Not exceeding TWENTY-FIVE CENTS (25c) on the \$100 valuation in any one year, for the erection of public buildings and other permanent improvements."

In the event that the annual levy of a tax not exceeding FIFTEEN CENTS (15c) on the one hundred dollars' valuation for the further maintenance of the public roads of said County has heretofore been, or shall hereafter be, authorized by a majority of the qualified property taxpayers voters of the County, voting at an election held for that purpose, nothing herein shall be construed as rescinding or in any manner affecting the power and authority of the Commissioners' Court to levy and to continue to levy said tax.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly amended Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution, and Section 3a, Article 6, of the Constitution, and all persons who are legally qualified voters of said County, and who are resident property taxpayers who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"FOR RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES."

"AGAINST RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES."

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote.

The polling places and presiding officers of said election shall be respectively as follows:

Precinct No. 1 (Box No. 1), Voting Place, Fire Station, Rockport, Texas; Presiding Officer, Mrs. Fay Brundrett.

Precinct No. 1 (Box No. 1a); Voting Place, Alamo Courts, Aransas Pass, Texas; Presiding Officer, Glenn Ellis.

Precinct No. 2 (Box No. 1); Voting Place, Courthouse, Rockport, Texas; Presiding Officer, Mrs. Alma Ratliff.

Precinct No. 3 (Box No. 1); Voting Place, Schoolhouse, Fulton, Texas; Presiding Officer, W. J. Moss.

Precinct No. 4 (Box No. 1); Voting Place, Concession Hall, Lamar, Texas; Presiding Officer, Mrs. Alma Johnson.

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the County Judge of said County, and certified to by the County Clerk of said County shall serve as proper and sufficient notice of said election.

Notice of said election shall be given by posting a copy of this order at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES," at the Courthouse door of said County, and in each of the election precincts of said County for thirty (30) days prior to the election, which notices shall be posted by the Sheriff or a constable, who shall make return on a copy of such notice, how and when he executed the same.

Notice of said election shall also be given by publication thereof in a newspaper published in Aransas County, Texas, once each week for three consecutive weeks, the date of the first publication being not less than twenty-one (21) full days prior to the date of said election.

Today's Children Are Larger and Healthier

Today's children on the average are larger and healthier, probably as the result of improved knowledge of nutrition and disease control. There are still fields to conquer in childhood diseases, however.

The control of four diseases formerly considered slaughterers of children — diphtheria, whooping cough, scarlet fever, and measles — are good examples of health advances. Through the development of effective vaccines and widespread education as to the value of immunization at the time of periodic health checkups, they have lost most of their terror.

A disease which has yielded to sanitation measures and treatment in most sections of the nation but which continues to be a leading health problem in the Southwest is diarrhea in infants. In 1949 the death rate in Texas children younger than 1 year old from diarrhea and enteritis (inflammation of the intestines) of 5.9 per 1,000 living births was exceeded in the United States only by New Mexico and Arizona. The national rate in that year was 1.6.

Since death rates from diarrhea are a fairly good indication of the sanitation of a community or a state, it's evident that Texas still has a long way to go. The condition spreads more rapidly among infants of families with low incomes, with a resulting higher death rate. Usually children who die with diarrhea are those who don't receive medical attention until too late. Therefore, the problem is not only to prevent epidemics but to see that infants are seen promptly by a doctor should they become ill. Without replacement of the body fluids and minerals lost through the intestines, a baby may lose four or five pounds within the first twenty-four hours.

Public health officers and private doctors are attacking the problem in a preventive way by teaching all who care for infants of the absolute necessity for cleanliness of food and feeding equipment. Health departments conduct clinics and hold infant care classes; they send nurses into homes to demonstrate correct ways to sterilize formulas, prepare foods, disinfect clothes and dishes of sick infants, and point out needed improvements in sanitation.

Doctors also are having to overcome the mistaken belief on the part of parents that it is all right to expose children right and left to the measles and mumps. Although the chances of catching these diseases before growing up is great, it may be extremely unwise to allow a very young or sickly child to come in contact with the diseases. Red measles (rubeola), sometimes called the "nine-day measles," is serious at any age and especially dangerous in infants and old people.

Physicians will go so far as to head off completely an attack of rubeola in a child just recovering from another illness. In one method they give by hypo gamma globulin, which is made from the liquid part of the blood. If the serum is given early enough after exposure, the child usually doesn't come down with red measles, but this kind of immunity is good only for about six weeks. Sometimes a smaller dose is given or the full dose is delayed so that a light case results, giving lifelong immunity.

It is true that measles or mumps in adulthood can have uncomfortable, if not dangerous complications. German measles (rubella), a usually mild disease lasting about three days, occurring during the first three months of pregnancy can cause miscarriage, or if the baby lives, it may have defects of the eye, ear, heart, or teeth. For this reason some doctors make an exception to their rule of not exposing children to "catching" diseases and recommend that girls be allowed to take the German measles during childhood.

In men, mumps may affect the sex glands but sterility seldom results if patients follow their doctor's advice to stay in bed and receive treatment designed to avoid the complication.

CHECK TITLE WHEN PURCHASING HOME

A real estate title is a claim of ownership, or your right to land you have purchased. Most of us have little or no idea of the possible pitfalls in acquiring a good title when we buy a home. Many prospective home buyers' title difficulties result from commonly held misconceptions of the significance of certain kinds of real estate papers.

If you can prove your title against all the world, it is a good title. If, in addition, the evidence of your claim of ownership is contained in proper public records, it is a good record title. Ordinarily only a good record title is salable.

How do you know if you are receiving a good title to property you plan to purchase? The safest method is to have a title examination made — that is, a careful study of the abstract and other title evidence.

Here are a few of the common sources of trouble in real estate transactions to show why the minor expense of a title examination is justified.

Many persons sign "earnest money contracts" believing that they are mere receipts with no serious implications. In reality they may specify, among other things, the kind of title you must accept.

A "warranty deed" from a responsible seller is comforting to have but it is a poor substitute for a careful title examination. A warranty deed does not guarantee a marketable title.

Moreover, serious title defects may not come to light until long after the seller on a warranty deed is dead, has moved to an unknown address, or is bankrupt. Even if he is available a good title is much better than a law suit.

The fact that the seller has possession of an "abstract" does not mean that he owns the property. An abstract is only a history of a title. Possession of an abstract no more indicates ownership of land than possession of the history of Texas means that you own the state.

Some purchasers of land feel safe because the title is being examined at the time of purchase by an attorney for the mortgage lenders. This seems logical but is a dangerous theory. Mortgage lenders are sometimes willing to accept less than good record title as security. This is sound business for them because, among other reasons, the chances are that the

mortgage will be paid off so that no expense in perfecting the title would ever need be incurred. It is risky business for you when you are putting your life savings into the purchase.

These are a few of the reasons why a title examination is an important safeguard to you. When it is completed, the attorney gives you a written opinion stating his conclusions as to who owns the land, the defects in or charges against such ownership, and the requirements to be met if any, to make good record title.

Off-hand this may seem a simple operation. In fact it is not. It requires the interpretation of numerous deeds, mortgages, wills, court decrees and other instruments; the consideration of the order in which transactions and events affecting the title occurred; and the application of statutes and court decisions to the various situations disclosed in the abstract.

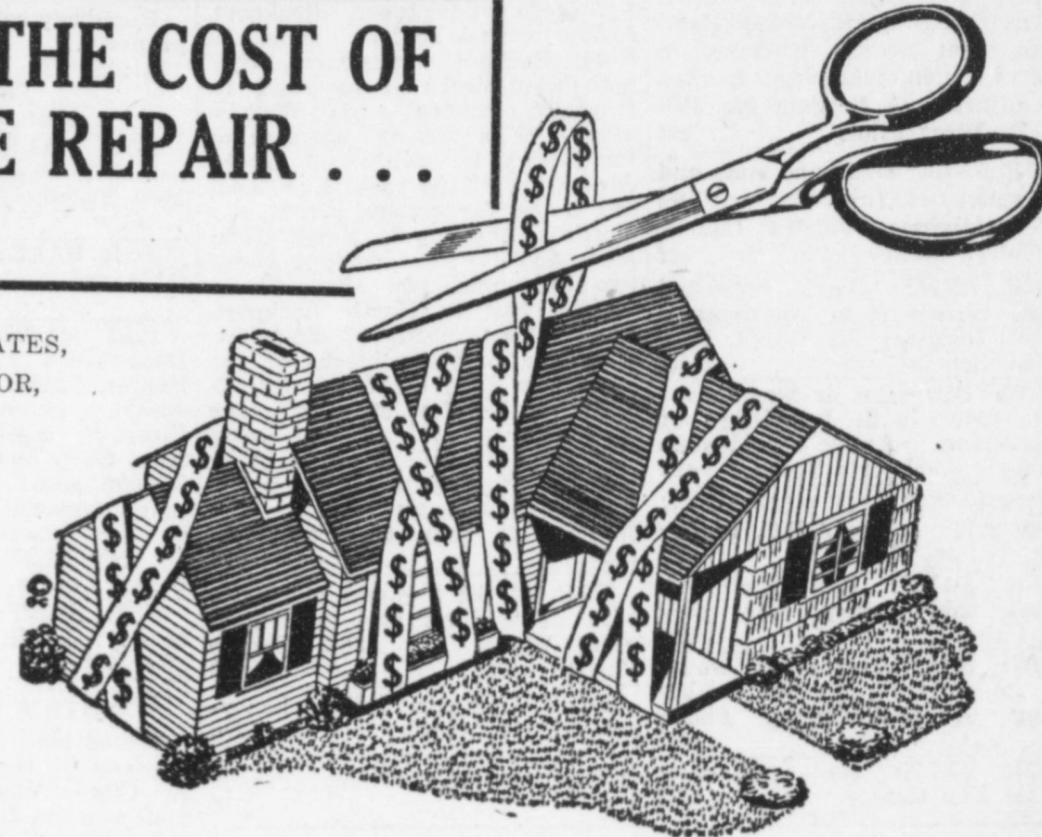

On March 20, the Office of Defense Mobilization announced a plan for the distribution and use of Gamma Globulin — the blood derivative used in preventing paralysis in polio, telling the state health officers how the limited supply of Gamma Globulin might be best employed during the coming polio epidemic season.

If your child is exposed to polio, contact your family physician. He will examine the circumstances surrounding the case and if he feels it is warranted and the serum is available, he may obtain the necessary supply of the immune serum globulin from the State Health Department and administer it to the exposed child.

The National Blood Program emphasizes several factors in its announcement of the Gamma Globulin allocation plan:

1. Gamma globulin used under very special circumstances of which your doctor is aware will help to minimize the crippling effects of polio.
2. One inoculation of gamma globulin will not last a child throughout the entire polio season.
3. Gamma globulin will only afford a partial immunity for about five weeks.
4. The polio season extends over a period of approximately ten weeks in the months of June, July, and August.

The Office of Defense Mobilization has notified state public health officers that there will be an available supply during the coming year of gamma globulin for use in the fight against polio, in addition to that amount of gamma globulin needed to combat measles and infectious hepatitis.

The initial delivery of this allocation will be made on or about May 1 when each state will receive an amount of gamma globulin. In addition to this allocation, further shipments will be made from a national pool when the polio rate in any one state reaches epidemic proportions or an emergency situation. Within the limits of available supply, the state public health officers will in turn distribute the gamma globulin to family physicians when there is a need.

Under the best circumstances, the supply of gamma globulin will be limited.

Unless you give your blood, it may not be available in sufficient quantities for your children.

More blood must be donated by the people of this nation to meet the needs for defense and for the production of gamma globulin to meet the needs for defense and for the production of gamma globulin for the prevention of paralysis in polio.


