County Plane Sprays Mosquitoes

The Mosquito Control Board, Ed Barnard, Alex Scott, Walter Heldenfels and Leonard LeBlanc, met with the Commissioners' Court, and purchased an airplane from Pat McGuffin, to spray the county in an attempt to get rid of the mosquitoes.

The plane was delivered last Saturday and put into spraying operation Tuesday morning.

This week they are spraying with a solution of diesel, DDT, chloridane, and insecticide, which is giving good results. Because insects become immune to one kind of insecticide, next week the county will be sprayed with DDT and lindane.

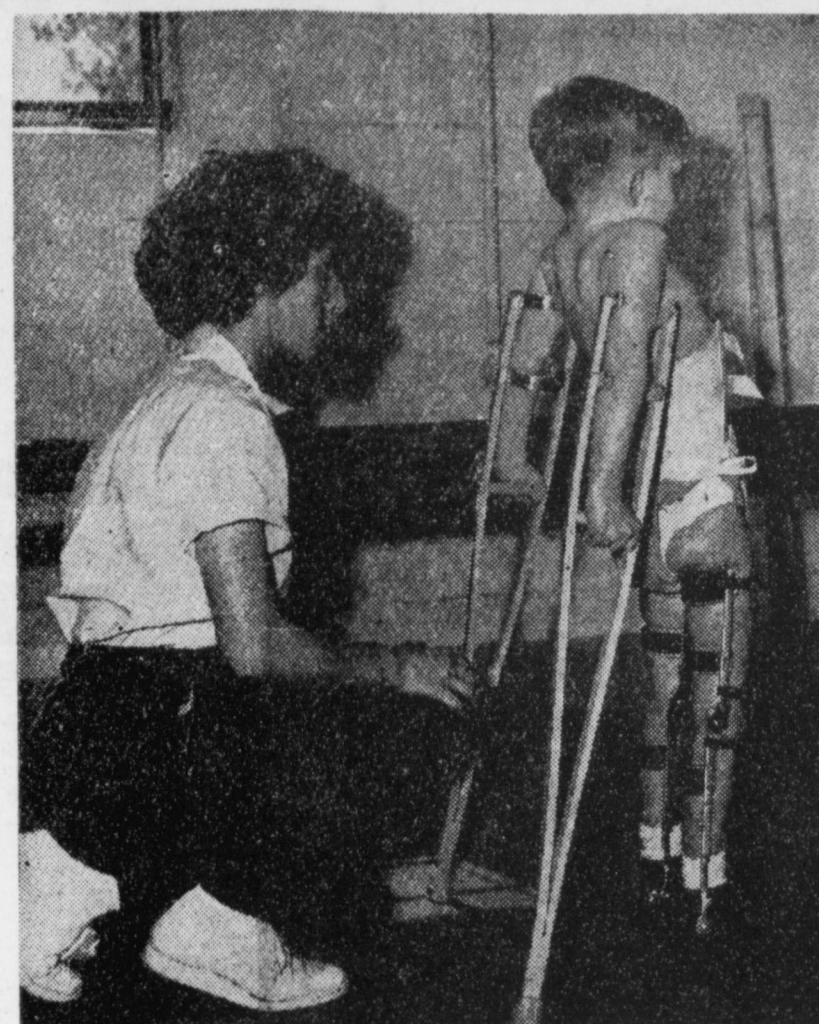

The Sacred Heart Catholic School opened September 1 with an enrollment of 87 students.

There are 43 pupils in the first and second grades; 26 in the third and fourth grades and 18 in the fifth and sixth grades.

Aransas Arkansas Strike Tests Gas

Arkansas Fuel Oil Corp. No. 1 State Tract 4, Aransas County gas-distillate discovery five miles north-northwest of Aransas Pass in Puerto Bay, was testing from 6,792-98 feet after flowing gas and distillate from the Marinulina sandstone.

On a 1½-hour test through 3-32-inch choke from 30 perforations at 6,805-11 feet, the well flowed gas and condensate at an estimated open flow rate of 15 million cubic feet of gas and from 12 to 15 barrels of 58.9 gravity distillate a million cubic feet of gas. Flowing tubing pressure was 2,500 pounds.

This discovery is on a 460-acre lease. It was directionally drilled from a rig location on land adjacent to the bay. The test is about 18 miles northwest of Corpus Christi and one mile northwest of the McCampbell oil field.

Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 1 State Tract 10, indicated producer in the North Fulton Beach Field three miles northwest of Lamar, was running 5½-inch casing to around 7,000 feet. This test was earlier drilled and cored to 7,511 feet. Location is on a 320-acre lease in Tract 10.

C. G. Glasscock and Union Producing Co. No. 2 State Tract 3 in the North Fulton Beach Field in Copano Bay, will by 600 feet from the south and 1,980 from the east lines of the tract. It will be 1,480 feet east of the No. 1-3 location and 1,320 north of Glasscock and Humble No. 2 Tract 11, oiler. The test will also scale 350 feet south-east of the Refugio-Aransas County line. Permit depth is 8,000 feet.

Public Schools Opened Tuesday

The schools of the Aransas Co. Ind. School Dist. opened at 8:30 a.m. Tuesday, Sept. 8.

The students at the high school met in the auditorium for a short session. Principal Dave Coleman made some announcements and introduced the new superintendent, Pat H. Greene and other members of the faculty.

Supt. Greene made a short talk. Principal Albert Griffith had charge of the opening of the Rockport school and Principal Millard Owen was in charge at the Fulton school.

The following is the enrollment by grades:

- Fulton: First, 21; second, 19; third, 15; fourth, 12; fifth, 15; sixth, 17. Total, 99.
- Rockport: First, 81; second, 73; third, 57; fourth, 72; fifth, 77; sixth, 61. Total, 421.
- Rockport Junior High: Seventh, 75; eighth, 83. Total 158.
- Senior High: Ninth, 54; tenth, 39; eleventh, 36; twelfth, 24. Total 153. There was a total of 831 students.

The Rockport Elementary school and the Junior High School both are at Rockport, making a total of 579 students in the Rockport school.

School Board Holds Meeting Tuesday Night

The trustees of the Aransas County Ind. School Dist. held their regular meeting Tuesday night.

The following report was accepted by the trustees. The school administration was directed to have it printed in The Pilot.

Once in a while it is well to take our bearings on the progress we have made and the distance we still need to go.

On the achievement side of the ledger we have:

1. The new building has ended half-day sessions.
2. We have set up a program that should limit classes to 30 pupils.
4. We have provided some new furniture and renovated the old.
5. We have made improvements in the gymnasium and painted the interior.
6. We have put new finish on all floors and plan to keep them waxed and polished.
7. We have made provision to get children from Rockport to high school without getting on Highway 35.
8. We have moved the home economics cottage and let contract to put it in good condition.
9. New and larger septic tanks have been provided at Fulton school.
10. We have employed sufficient custodial force to operate our entire plant.
11. We have secured a new 72-passenger bus and kept the old one as a standby.
12. Provision has been made for visual education.
13. Provision has been made to teach safety driving in Junior and Senior high school.
14. The high school is applying for membership in the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the highest ranking affiliation that it is possible for a school to have.
15. Consultant service has been provided.

Although our achievement record is impressive we have problems that are still to be solved.

1. Our teacher turnover between 1952-53 and 1953-54 was 31.25%. Unless we can find a way to reduce our turnover we almost defeat the purpose of our in-service training program.

2. Qualified teachers are so scarce that we still lack two of having a full faculty. The principals and superintendent have investigated many prospects and offered positions to at least 150 teachers and have not secured all that we need.

3. At this time our program of learning is short some essentials.

New Hospital Planned At Aransas Pass Meeting

On Friday evening, Sept. 4, at 8:00 p.m. was held the first meeting of the Board of Directors of the proposed new hospital in Aransas Pass.

The following members were present: Dr. W. S. Hughes, Aransas Pass, Palmer Coward, Aransas Pass, Oscar Galjour, Aransas Pass, Dr. W. N. Tinnerman, Aransas Pass, Emory Spencer, Rockport, Dr. H. F. Elliot, Rockport, T. M. Vlasak, Ingleside, Dr. J. M. Auten, Ingleside. Ernest Falgout, Aransas Pass, was absent.

The following officers were elected: Ernest Falgout, chairman, Emory Spencer, vice president, Dr. W. N. Tinnerman, secretary and treasurer.

The purpose of this meeting was to secure a hospital that will take care of the medical needs of Aransas Pass, Rockport, Ingleside and Port Aransas areas.

It was the consensus of opinion of the members present that the hospital should be located in the most accessible area convenient to the four towns.

As yet a definite site has not been obtained.

Estimated cost of the building and equipment of the hospital was set between \$120,000 and \$150,000. The date for the next meeting was set for Thursday, September 24, at which time a more detailed and definite program will be announced.

Harry Traylor Gives Historical Data About Lamar

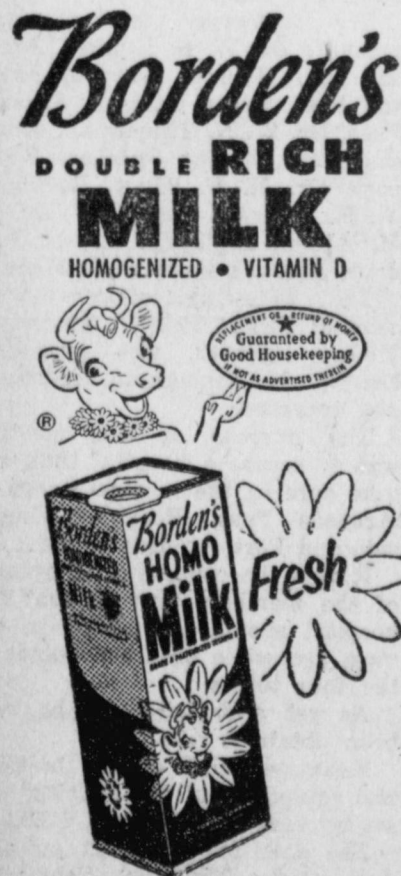

was the first notary public so far as known in what is now Aransas County, formerly Refugio County. He was appointed notary by Jas. Webb, Secretary of the Republic of Texas, on May 29, 1839. A copy of such appointment can be found in "Lamar's Papers", Vol. 3, Page 163, in the library at San Antonio. Mr. Byrne put on the townsite subdivision of Lamar after settling there in about 1837: To His Excellency, M. B. Lamar, President Of the Republic of Texas. Sir:

We, the undersigned, with much respect solicit for our friend, Mr. Wm. Byrne of the City of Lamar, the appointment of secretary of legation to the Court of France. Mr. Byrne, having received his education in that country, and his talents and perfect knowledge of the French language justifies us in making the application and we beg leave to express it is our opinion that Mr. Byrne would be of the greatest service to the embassy, and that the secretaryship could not be filled to a better advantage by the appointment of that gentleman.

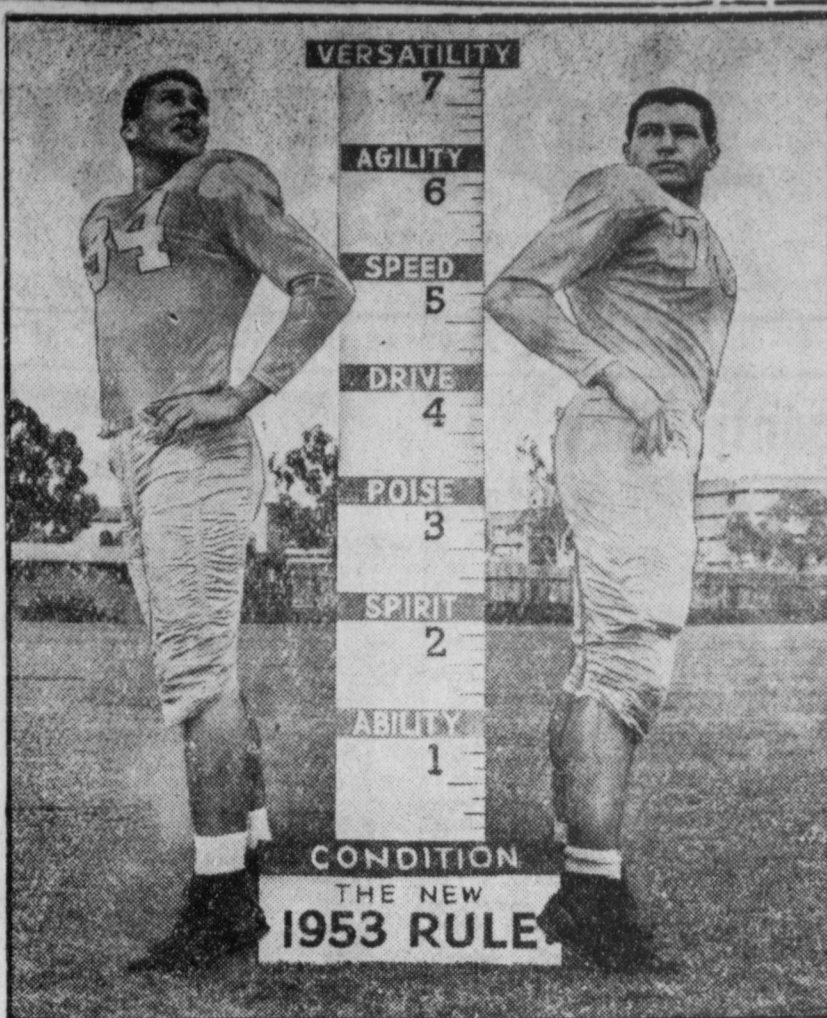

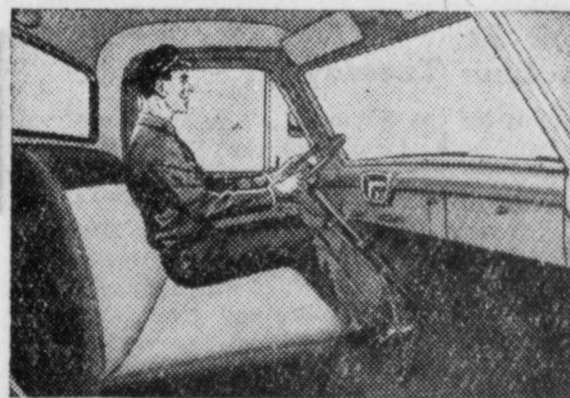

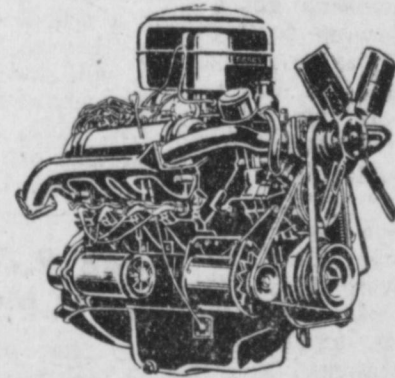

IT'S THE LAW
in Texas
A public service feature of the State Bar of Texas

Always, there will be families in the United States who are having financial difficulties. At this time, the number is relatively few. To those few and to their creditors, this article should be of particular interest.

The principal reported causes which throw families into financial difficulties are: Inflation and high taxes, inability to resist "impulse" buying, combined with easy credit, illness or other emergencies, or just plain bad judgment and mismanagement.

Some people in financial difficulty, when threatened with legal proceedings to collect outstanding debts, seek relief offered them by the federal bankruptcy law.

The purpose of bankruptcy laws is to permit an honest, but unfortunate or weak debtor to surrender or account for all his property for the benefit of his creditors and in exchange be discharged of his debts.

Any adult who owes debts may become a voluntary bankrupt by having his attorney prepare for him a bankruptcy petition, together with schedules of his assets and liabilities and then filing the same in the proper United States district court.

After he is adjudicated a bankrupt he is required to appear for examination as to his assets in the bankruptcy court, and if he fully accounts for his assets and has not violated any of the bankruptcy laws he will thereafter receive a discharge of his debts.

If he is granted a discharge of his debts, he has started a new financial life as of the date he filed bankruptcy. All wages and assets acquired by him thereafter cannot be reached to satisfy the old debts, nor will creditors be permitted to sue him on the old debts.

Dishonest debtors may endeavor to gain advantages for themselves not allowed by the bankruptcy laws. In these instances on objections to discharge by creditors they not only will be denied a discharge of their debts, but the courts will be prone to deal harshly with the offenders if they have violated the criminal laws.

The head of a family is entitled to claim as exempt any property which is exempt under Texas homestead laws, which in the ordinary case will be his home, household furniture, wearing apparel, the family automobile and tools of his trade or profession. However, if any of this property is covered by a mortgage or conditional sales contract he must pay any balance due thereon, or the owner of such mortgage or contract may repossess.

Bankruptcy has a lasting effect upon a person's future credit and in the usual case causes the creditors to lose their entire debt.

Many bankruptcies could be avoided if the "overloaded" debtor would make a timely effort to sit down with his creditors and work out plans for reduced payments over extended periods.

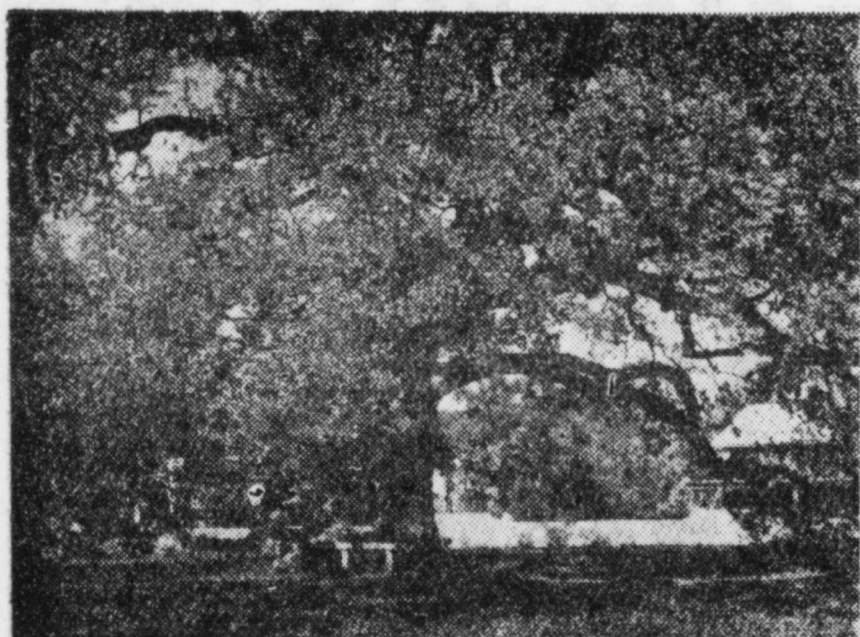

Duties of Anesthesiologist And Pathologist Told

The duties and responsibilities of two medical specialists, the anesthesiologist and the pathologist, may not be well understood by the average person.

The anesthesiologist, who with the surgeon shares the responsibility for the patient's safety during surgery, has the following specific functions to perform:

1. To review the patient's records and confer with the attending physician to find out the patient's general condition before surgery in preparation for giving the anesthetic.
2. To decide, in conference with the surgeon, the anesthetic and method of anesthesia, also the drugs (if they are to be used) to be given beforehand to relieve fear and tension and make the anesthetic easier and more comfortable for the patient.
3. To keep a constant watch on the patient's condition during surgery by counting the pulse and respiration, measuring the blood pressure, watching the patient's

blood and problems of blood transfusion.

By his diagnosis the pathologist also influences directly or indirectly the course of treatment. A pathological report on tissue examined during operation may determine whether surgery is to be conservative or radical; the establishment of the diagnosis of diabetes through specific tests may determine whether or not insulin therapy is to be used.

The pathologist counsels interns and residents in the skillful use of laboratory procedures and teaches them how to select tests that will cover the requirements of a given bedside problem at the least cost of money and time. He confers with the attending physician as a consultant to work out any laboratory problems that arise and joins other doctors in staff meetings and discussions for the purpose of improving the quality of medical care given patients in the hospital. Finally, he trains medical technicians who work with him, supervises their work, and interprets the results of tests they perform, as well as those he does.

color and general appearance, and other similar measures.

4. To report at intervals on the patient's progress to the surgeon, who, although perhaps he has to concentrate chiefly on the details of the surgical technique, nevertheless is deeply interested in this vital information.
5. To see that the patient's condition remains good throughout surgery by giving blood transfusions, injections of fluids by vein, and other drugs as needed.
6. To keep an accurate written record of all important data about the operation.
7. To return the patient to his bed, to see that a nurse or attendant stays with him as long as needed, and in consultation with the surgeon to leave instructions for the patient's care after surgery.

The usual domain of the anesthesiologist is the operating room; that of the pathologist is the hospital's laboratory. The pathologist is a physician who limits his practice to laboratory medicine, which is basically concerned with the nature and causes of disease. His tools are the microscope, incubator, centrifuge, and other equipment commonly found in the medical laboratory.

The field of duties of the pathologist is vast; his examination usually contributes greatly toward diagnosis. As examples, he performs and interprets special tests, examines tissue removed at operation or autopsy, studies bacteria—helpful and harmful, and studies

October Draft Quota Calls 1,208 Men

Austin—An October draft quota of 1,208 men was received Monday at State Selective Service headquarters according to Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state draft director.

The quota is the Texas share of a national call for 23,000 men. The September quota, announced about a month ago, is 1,232. The August quota for Texas, now being filled, is 1,235.

General Wakefield said under present plans local board quotas to fill the October call should be placed in the mail sometime during the first week of September.

Because of an ample supply of examined and acceptable men, there will be no regularly scheduled physical examination call in October, the state draft director said.

Instructions were received with the October call that, where possible, only men 20 years old or older would be inducted. Boards are authorized, however, to fill calls with men under 20, if necessary.

Currently, the number of men under 20 years old being inducted has dropped. Twenty men out of every 100 being inducted so far in August are under 20, General Wakefield pointed out. In July, 23 out of every 100 were under 20 and in June, 32 out of every 100 inducted were under 20 years old, statistics at state selective service headquarters show.

than 500 pupils has no library. b. Public school music and art are needed in both elementary schools.

c. Fulton school needs sufficient classrooms not to have to use the auditorium for a regular classroom. The auditorium is a special room and should be available at all times for special use.

4. Some provision for adult education is desirable.

Athletic Insurance
The school board authorized carrying insurance on all athletes in all sports at school expense; the school board to pay local doctors for all x-rays which the insurance company will not pay for. In case of accident and hospitalization the parent is responsible for that part of the hospital and doctor bill which is not paid for by insurance.

The board set a policy on awards for athletes in the schools of the district at this meeting. Only members who letter on the "A" squad of the High School can receive a sweater or jacket. An athlete may be awarded a sweater for the first sport he letters in, football, track, basketball and etc. Letters or emblems may be awarded for succeeding sports in which he may letter. Only one sweater may be awarded a student in any one year.

"B" squad and Junior High athletes may receive letters or emblem awards, but are not eligible for sweaters. No athlete may receive more than one sweater award in a year. It is the responsibility of the coach of each sport to determine the standards necessary for an athlete to receive an award. The board voted to introduce visual education, setting aside funds to purchase a projector, films and membership dues in the San Patricio County Film Library. The films will be shared with Aransas Pass, Gregory, Ingleside, Taft and Sinton.

The board passed a resolution directing the school administration to make application for the admission of the local high school into the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. This year's budget provides for the expense of the necessary committees to evaluate the work of the local school. The visiting committee is a requirement for membership. Membership in this association is the highest affiliation standard that a Texas school can reach. Membership will permit 15 per cent of the High School graduates to join the National Honor Society.
