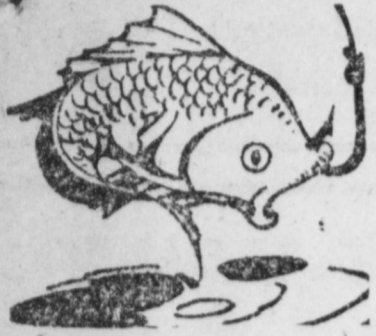


## Along The Waterfront



In spite of the cold wet weather there has been a large number of fish taken out of the bays in this area during the past week. At Jolly Roger Fishing Pier, the redfish are biting now, some nice ones being taken each day. One fisherman got a 12-pound red while fishing off the pier Tuesday afternoon.

Pat Greene says he has caught more fish before and after school hours and on Saturdays than he had caught in ten years before. Last weekend he hooked three bull reds and a large number of nice trout.

Willard Woods of Houston fished with Harry Mills at Mills Wharf last Friday, catching 55 trout and on Saturday, Lee Goldberg and party of four fished with Harry Mills. They brought in 98 trout.

Earle Thomas said he had not been taking out parties, but he had two parties of guests, six in all, who fish in the basin at night and on the flats in daytime. One party caught 190 trout and redfish and the other did not count their catch, but they had three ice boxes full of fish at Walton Courts.

Mr. and Mrs. "Shorty" Townsend and Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Ray of Houston, took a four-day fishing trip the past weekend. They got all the fish, including reds, trout and drum, that they could see down.

Bait is still very scarce and most of the fish caught have been taken with some kind of a lure. There are not so many fish in the basin since the wind has been so high; they seem to have moved out on the flats, according to Bob Morrison.

## Routine Business Takes Courts Time At Monday Meeting

County Judge John D. Wendell presided at the regular meeting of the Commissioners Court Monday, Jan. 11. Commissioners W. B. Allen, J. M. Sparks Jr., A. L. Davis, and J. H. Mills were present.

On the first order of business the court amended the budget to include Social Security.

Walter Paugh's resignation as constable was read and it was moved by Commissioner Sparks that his resignation be accepted. Motion was seconded by Commissioner Mills, and when placed to vote carried unanimously.

It was moved by Commissioner Allen that Dr. H. F. Elliot be re-appointed county health officer. This received the unanimous approval of the commissioners after being seconded by Commissioner Sparks.

Current bills presented to the court were examined and approved.

The county treasurer's monthly report was examined and approved.

Application by the Atlantic Refining Company to install a pipeline across the Fulton Beach Road was granted upon motion by Commissioner Davis, seconded by J. H. Mills.

After discussion it was moved by W. B. Allen that the Department of Public Safety be contacted requesting that a highway patrolman be stationed in Rockport. The court agreed that if request was granted the county would furnish office space to accommodate the patrolman. This motion was seconded by Commissioner Mills.

After discussion it was moved by Commissioner Allen that the special deputy employed at the request of the grand jury be dismissed. Motion carried unanimously after being seconded by Mills.

Sheriff A. C. Shivers was authorized to sign release with insurance company upon satisfactory repair to the radio in Deputy Sheriff Mundine's car. Mundine's radio was damaged recently when struck from behind by another car. This motion was brought by Commissioner Allen, seconded by Sparks and approved by unanimous vote.

The court voted unanimously to reject any and all bids called for on motor grader upon motion by W. B. Allen, seconded by Commissioner Sparks. Three bids were received by the court as follows:

## POLIO FIGHT CAMPAIGN OPENS

Preliminary work has been completed and B. T. Hardeman, director of the March of Dimes Drive in Aransas County for 1954, has the drive well under way.

"Faced with the added burden of financing validity testing of trail polio vaccine and the commitment to purchase a vastly increased supply of gamma globulin, which together add up to approximately \$26,500, the March of Dimes this year must rely heavily on special gifts in addition to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, at least 50 per cent more polio fighting and polio prevention money will be needed in 1954 than in 1953," Mr. Hardeman said.

The celebrated, miniature iron lung coin collector is no more. Taking its place on 1,300,000 counters throughout the land are small actual replicas of the polio poster showing 4-year-old Debby Dains, 1954 poster boy and a 3-D test tube.

Debby Dains took polio when he was a small infant and has had received \$415,000 worth of treatment from money derived from the March of Dimes during the past four years.

Mr. Hardiman and his committee mailed cards to all box holders in Aransas County this week and they have placed "Coin Drops" in most of the business houses.

An opportunity to take part in one of medicine's most dramatic developments is being given the school children of Aransas County this month, Mr. Hardeman said. He has placed 1,000 cards in the hands of the school children and he urges the parents to encourage their children to fill and hand in their March of Dimes cards before the end of January, it is the children, themselves, who derive most of the benefit from the March of Dimes.

## JACKSONS BUILDING YARD FOR CONSTRUCTION OF SHRIMP BOAT TRAWLERS THAT PROMISES TO BE LARGEST ON TEXAS COAST

The boat building industry— which boomed into prominence here during two world wars—is coming into its own as one of Rockport's top peacetime pursuits.

Already the Rockport commercial waterfront is sprinkled with boat repair yards.

Now Jackson Marine Services, Inc., is building a yard for the construction of shrimp trawlers that will be one of the largest along the Texas coast.

When it gets in full production, the Jackson yard will be turning out 16 trawlers a year—four every three months.

The boats will be either 65 or 70 feet long, equipped with wooden hulls, and ranging from \$35,000 upward in value.

The boat building division of the Jackson organization will require the services of about 30 men at the start, according to Norvell Jackson, vice president and general manager.

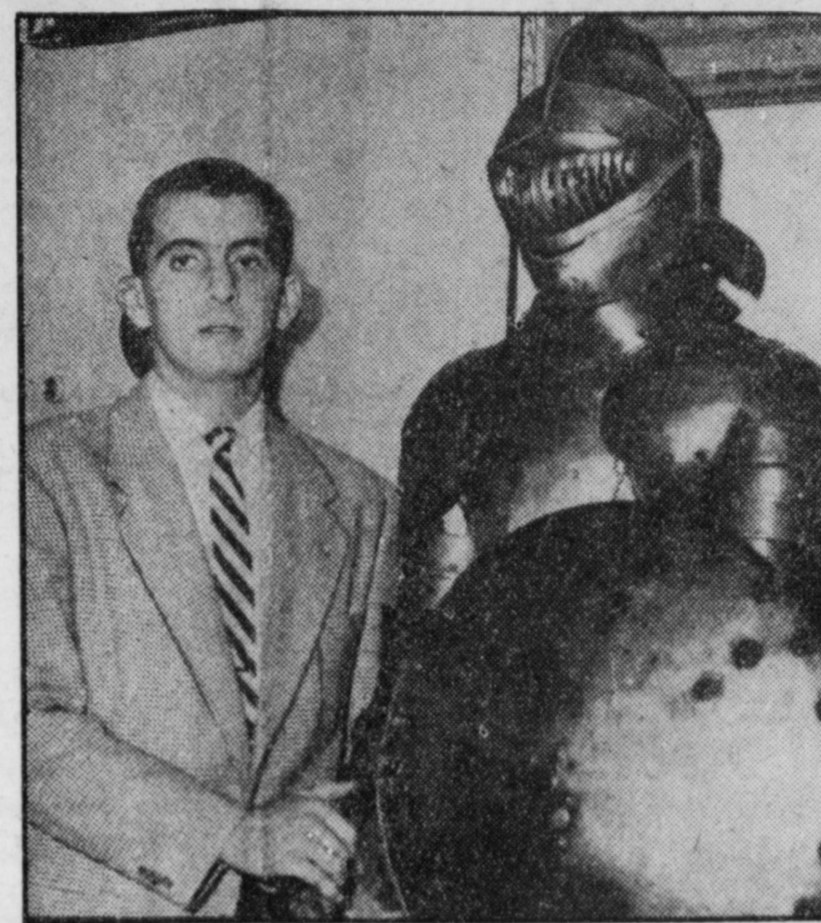
Others, he added, will be employed as they are needed.

"We decided to expand into the boat building business primarily because of the tremendous growth of the shrimp industry along the Texas coast," Jackson explained. "Then, too, we felt it was a logical step from our other marine services."

The Jackson organization was founded as a seafood concern in 1919 by S. F. Jackson, Norvell's father.

In 1949, Jackson Marine Services, Inc., was organized to provide boat maintenance and repairs, fueling, icing, and net and engine repairs to the Jackson boats and other shrimp fleets.

The elder Jackson is president of the marine service firm. James B., another son of S. F. Jackson, is secretary and treasurer. The Jack-

## Rockport Postoffice Shows Slight Increase In Postal Receipts

Postmaster Marion L. McElveen reports the gross receipts of the Rockport postoffice for 1953 to be \$26,288.01 as compared to \$25,461.89 in 1952, an increase of \$826.12; however, the last quarter of 1953 showed a \$1,218.15 increase over the same period of 1952.

## Hunt to Drill Semi-Wildcat

William Herbert Hunt Trust Estate had made location Monday for an 8,000-foot semi-wildcat near the Puerto Bay Field discovery well in Aransas County, at the No. 2 W. G. McCampbell.

This location is 467 feet from the northeast line and 3,545 feet from the southeast line of Block 58, McCampbell Subdivision. This is 1,797 feet southeast of the No. 1, Puerto Bay Field oil discovery at 6,746-50 feet. The No. 1 was drilled to 9,025 feet, but no details were released on tests, if any, below the completion sand.

The new Hunt test also will be about 2,100 feet east of the Renwar No. 2 Maryland Trust, the field's second oil well, at 6,750-53 feet, on the San Patricio County side of the line. It will be some 2,450 feet southeast of Aransas Fuel No. 1 State Tract 4, the field's gas discovery, on perforations at 6,792-98 and 6,805-11 feet. The location also is in the James Orick Survey, A-167, and is nine miles northwest of Aransas Pass.

George W. Graham and Emory M. Spencer No. 2 J. F. Brundrett, wildcat four miles southwest of Rockport, was being plugged Monday after an electrical log had been run to total depth, 7,778 feet. There were no commercial shows in the wildcat.

This is the 16th dry hole drilled in this area in the past few years, five by Graham and Spencer and the others mostly on farmouts from Graham and Spencer or promoted by these operators.

The wildcat play was started at their No. 1 Wheeler, which made a little oil from a sand topped at 7,118 feet. It now appears, however, that the oil was from a terraced formation, rather than structural, and that what oil might have been there had migrated.

The Brundrett was in the William S. Tatton Survey, A-202, about four miles northwest of the Puerto Bay Field and some four and a half miles southwest of the Salt Lake Field.

A TG&M Drilling Company rig was being moved in for a west outpost to the East Fulton Beach Field, at the George W. Graham and Emory M. Spencer No. 1 Fulton Outlot Unit 10.

This test, aimed at the B-2 sand around 7,200 feet, is 330 feet out of the northeast corner of Fulton Outlot 97.

Stanford Oil & Gas Co. No. 3 State Tract 10, proposed 7,050-foot test in the North Fulton Beach Field, three miles southeast of Lamar, is 2,000 feet from the south and 660 feet from the east line of Tract 10.

## School Census Will Include Children from One Thru 17 Years

The Aransas County School Board has directed the census takers to enumerate all children from one year to 17 years old and living in the Aransas County Independent School District.

While the state pays no money for children who are under six years old on Sept. 1, the school board needs to know how many under six years old there are in order to estimate future needs.

## Hodges Cops Weekly Fishing Prize

The redfish division took over in the local fishing tournament sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, last week. Many entries came in and a new winner, J. O. Hodges of Crosbyton, Texas, brought in the biggest fish, a 10 pound 2 ounce red. This fish measured 28 1/2 inches in length and is the largest entered so far this season.

Henry McKean is again a winner in the trout division with a 3 pound 15 oz. fish.

## Austin Street Collision Damages Two Cars

Monday morning, according to Deputy Sheriff Sherman Mundine, Oscar Kelly Allen was driving north on Austin Street in a 1953 Plymouth and stopped across the street from Ankele's Hardware to pick up some one.

Mildred Roskins, driving a 1953 north on Austin Street at the same time, ran into the back of the Plymouth while it was stopped.

Mundine said no one was hurt but there was about \$250.00 damage done to the Plymouth and about \$50.00 to the Mercury.

## City Council Hires Firm to Audit Books

At the regular meeting of the city council Tuesday night, Mayor Seth H. Steele presided with Aldermen Jimmy Hunt, Charles Garrett, Ernest Harritt, Roy Rogero, City Clerk Frieda Diederich and City Attorney Clark C. Wren in attendance.

Bills for the month were read and approved for payment.

The publishing of the city audit was discussed and it was decided to employ a firm of certified public accountants to compile this audit at the earliest possible date. A firm of accountants in Beeville was selected.

The matter of obtaining more and better lighting for Austin St. was discussed and it was decided that contact would be made with the Central Power & Light Co. in this regard.

Two applications were received for the position of city policeman, one from George Harrell of Aransas County, and the other from Assistant Chief of Police Echols of Aransas Pass. No action was taken at this meeting on these applications.

A contract from a bond firm offering to act as fiscal agents for the city was accepted. As fiscal agents these bondmen will prepare certain data and furnish other services necessary for the proposed revenue bond election for water and sewer.

The firm of Vernon Smylie, public relations organization, of Corpus Christi, will compile facts and figures on the present condition of the water and sewerage system for publication in the local newspaper so that voters and citizens may be properly informed concerning the needs and requirements for water and sewerage.

A special meeting is called for Monday night at which time the consulting engineer, bondsmen, public relations expert, and others will meet with the council to discuss the holding of the bond election.

While they were gone, another prisoner in jail, Cantrell, called Sheriff Arley Shivers, and asked him to come up and see what was being done up in the jail. Shivers and Deputy Sheriff Haynes went up into the jail and Cantrell showed them where one of the bars at a window had been cut through. He also showed the officers a bunch of hacksaws which he said were used to cut the bar.

Sheriff Shivers said it is believed that Mrs. Anderson gave the saw blades to her husband through the window and she is being held on suspicion of being an accomplice in helping a prisoner to escape jail.

Anderson is in jail charged with robbery.

Sheriff Shivers said that Anderson and his wife are each locked in a cell with no runway privileges.

Sheriff Shivers also said that anyone wanting to talk to a prisoner in the future must be accompanied by an officer.

## Refuge Flock of Whooping Cranes Increased By Three

The three pokey cranes whose slow flight attracted national attention, finally have reached their wintering ground on the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge near Austwell.

And the world's only flock of the majestic birds now numbers 24.

Julian Howard, manager of the marshy refuge on Blackjack Peninsula, said today "a definite count" has been made and he is sure the three controversial cranes are among those present.

The three cranes bobbed into the news in November when they were photographed near Regina Saskatchewan, heading south from their Arctic Circle nesting ground. They were expected at the Rockport refuge around December 1.

The whooper flock includes 21 adult birds, the same as last year, plus three young ones.

The birds will remain in the wildlife sanctuary until April, when they will fly back to Canada. The exact location of their northern nesting ground has never been determined.

## Close Season Trips Hunters

Austin.—The Director of Law Enforcement for the Game and Fish Commission cautioned hunters to watch out for wildlife protected by closed seasons.

He said he was prompted by a compilation showing that thirty nine arrests have recently been reported for shooting game out of season.

The director said nineteen of the prosecutions involved shooting of mourning doves, and added that "several violations" concerned deer in areas where there was no open season at the time.

Cases against violators showed addresses to include: Bryan, San Antonio, Port Arthur, Beaumont, Houston, Corpus Christi, Wichita Falls, Victoria, Galveston, Paris Pampa, Dallas, Fredericksburg, Kerrville, Llano, and Pleasanton.

The heaviest penalty paid by one individual was by a Rockdale man who assumed the personal responsibility for a headlighting foray involving himself and two companions. The three deer shot illegally, including one fawn and one doe, cost the man \$750 plus court costs.

The South Texas man paid \$500 and court costs for a solo raid on deer. The charges included headlighting, hunting in closed season, hunting from a car and purchasing a hunting license after previous license had been revoked.

## Rockport Becoming Another Gretna Green?

The City of Rockport seems to hold particular allure for couples from surrounding areas having marriage in mind. In addition to home and church weddings alone by local ministers, Judge C. O. Bailey of Rockport performed 50 marriage ceremonies during 1953, beginning Jan. 3rd and ending Dec. 31st.

Those married ranged in age from sixteen to seventy with honors for youngest and oldest going to the brides.

Some unique family relationships resulted because of these unions. In one instance the groom became his own nephew and the bride his aunt. Don't ask us to explain how?

The home counties of those married by Judge Bailey covered a considerable portion of the state and quite often the licenses were obtained in other than Aransas County, by the couples coming here to be married.

Among the fifty unions performed, seventeen brides and grooms were from San Patricio County, ten from Nueces, one from Starr, one from Brazoria, one from Galveston, one from Bexar, one from Harris, one from Dallas, one from Refugio, one from Bee and one from Lavaca. A serviceman and his bride stationed at Cabanis Field obtained their license here but did not give their home county or state. Thirteen couples were from Aransas County and of these three individuals were members of the same family from Rockport. Among those from Refugio were two couples who took part in a double ceremony.

This Is Time of Year For Chapped Hands, Face

Austin.—State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox looked at the calendar today and saw chapping weather ahead.

"Two weather changes—dew point and barometric pressure—cause skin to chap and crack," the season-conscious Dr. Cox pointed out. "Chapping is always more frequent and severe from December through February."

That is the time of year when weather forecasts are likely to read: "low barometric pressure, moist air followed by sudden high pressure and dryness with low dew point." It adds up to real chapping conditions.

Dew point is the temperature at which moisture begins to condense into visible form. It makes a useful index of actual humidity. When it is low, chapping can be severe.

Wind hastens chapping, too, Dr. Cox commented, especially when skin is wet. Quick evaporation is the big factor here. Dryness might actually be increased by hot water soap, or the so-called protective oils, lotions, and creams. A day's injury sometimes takes weeks to heal.

A chapped condition can run the gamut from plain dryness and itching to splits and fissures which bleed and crust. An artificial humidifier in the house would be a big help, the health officer said, but you could probably get the quickest relief by checking with your doctor.

And if you happen to have a psychrometer, an instrument which determines humidity, you'll be able to foresee chapping weather ahead and take precautions. Don't think in terms of "relative humidity," though. That indicates the percentage of atmospheric saturation at a given temperature, and is unreliable because warm air can hold more water vapor than cold air. For example, relative humidity of 80 percent indicates far less moisture at 40 degrees than it does when the thermometer stands at 60 degrees.

Hunt Fatalities Boosted By Four

Austin.—Four additional hunting fatalities have brought to twenty three the number of Texans succumbing during the fall hunting season, according to the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

All of the latest deaths were attributed to firearms. Of the previous list of eight reported, six had been caused by drowning of duck hunters.

The latest casualties included: A Bonham man shot by his own gun which was discharged when he set is down against a tree. The bullet struck him in the head.

A Corpus Christi man killed by his son near Uvalde when the latter fired at a wild turkey.

A 15-year-old Marshall lad killed hunting rabbits when a companion's gun was discharged as he hurried through a fence to shoot at a rabbit.

A 14-year-old Fort Worth boy killed by a self-inflicted rifle wound while hunting.

The Executive Secretary said the fall casualty list seems to be running slightly higher than that of last year.

He said that while the reports have not been made, it is significant that not one case has been reported of a hunter being killed in Texas when mistaken for wild game.

The Executive Director said the final total would not be known for some time since the last phase of the major fall harvest carries on through January 16 when the quail season ends under the General Law.

ONE IN A HUNDRED MILLION

Just 17 years ago the first social security account number was issued to a New England woman worker. Since then, more than 100 million persons have been assigned account numbers and over 5 1/2 million beneficiaries are now receiving retirement and family insurance payments, amounting to about 233 million dollars a month, according to Arthur Finck, field representative of the Corpus Christi Social Security office.

Each of these benefits is based on some worker's social security account number, and the earnings which were credited to that account. Each social security card represents a government insurance account, and the number on the card is the key that makes it possible for the government to keep that particular social security record correct.

It is the worker's responsibility to show his social security card to his employer, Finck emphasized. Also, the worker is responsible for safeguarding his card. If he should lose his card, he should immediately get a duplicate from the social security office.

To the young, old age seems a long way ahead. Some people fail to realize that the social security insurance system is both for the old, and for survivors of a worker who dies at any age.

Finck called attention to these facts about your social security account number card. (1) Show it to every employer you work for—the employer needs your number when he reports your wages and pays social security taxes so that your account will be credited properly. (2) Keep your card in a safe place. When you or your family claim the benefits, the number will make it easy to identify your account. The record of your earnings will determine the amount of the payments to which you or your family become entitled.
