County Commissioners Met Monday, April 12

The County Commissioners met in regular session Monday, April 12, with County Judge John D. Wendell and Commissioner W. B. Allen, J. M. Sparks, Jr., A. L. Davis and J. H. Mills present.

The Court ordered an election called for Saturday, May 15, 1954, to vote on a proposed tax increase of five cents on each \$100 valuation, to be used to establish a county park fund.

Perry Jones met with the Court in regard to opening a road to Copano Bay. Same was refused.

The Court discussed hiring a Sanitarian for the county, but decided not to do so.

Judge Wendell was ordered by the Court to purchase wire and make other arrangements necessary to replace the wire on the airport fence and construct an airport entrance road.

Seth Steele's bid of \$5,980.00 for the construction of an addition to the county barn was accepted. Steele will furnish all labor and materials.

The Court voted to purchase a D-6 Type Crawler Tractor, with hydraulic loader and also to purchase additional equipment and dozer blade.

Due to the local maintenance shop and parts and the previous good service given by the Wm. K. Holt Machinery Company, the Court voted to purchase from them a Crawler Type Tractor, equipped with Hi-Lift and dozer for \$17,719.00, with a trade-in allowance on an old tractor of \$4,719.00, leaving a balance of \$14,000.00.

The Court also voted to accept and file for record the Plat of Thomas Green Survey, Abstract 72, as submitted by James A. Jarboe.

County Park Fund Election, May 15

The Commissioners' Court at their regular meeting April 12, called an election for Saturday, May 15, 1954, to determine if a County Park Fund will be created.

This fund will be raised by a special five cent tax on each \$100 valuation in the county and based on current valuations of slightly less than \$15,000,000. Judge John Wendell estimated the fund would amount to approximately \$7,500 a year. The present county tax rate is \$1.00 on each \$100 valuation.

With the increased revenue the county would build fishing piers at Copano Village, Fulton and Rockport.

A County Park Board will be created to handle the funds if the election passes.

No Fatal Traffic Accidents In County For Quarter of 1954

During March there were no fatal, one personal injury and three property damage accidents occurring in Aransas county, reported to the Corpus Christi District office of the Texas Highway Patrol. The total of four accidents resulted in no deaths, injuries to two persons and property damage estimated at \$1,900.

During the first three months of 1954, there were no fatal, two personal injury and thirteen property damage accidents reported from Aransas county. The total of 15 accidents resulted in no deaths injuries to three persons and property damage estimated to \$7,325, compared to 1 death, 3 persons injured and property damage estimated at \$8,630 in the same period of 1953.

All of the figures are for rural accidents only with the exception of any fatal accidents occurring in cities or towns with a population of excess of 2500 according to the 1950 federal census.

Farm Road 881 To Be Surfaced

Heldensfels Brothers, of Corpus Christi, submitted a low bid of \$123,777 for work in Aransas and San Patricio Counties for work on Farm Road 881.

The work includes 12.2 miles of grading, base and surfacing from Farm Road 136 to within two miles west of Rockport.

Road jobs in six South Texas counties will be included in bids on the largest single package of highway work ever undertaken by the Texas Highway Commission.

Mexico Seizes Rockport Boat

The Charleen B of Rockport was seized Saturday while allegedly fishing in Mexican waters.

The boat, captained by Robert Cole of Rockport, was taken into custody by a Mexican launch and brought to Tampico. Two crew members, both Mexicans, and Cole are being detained.

The Charleen B had a catch of 600 pounds of shrimp when seized. The shrimp have been confiscated.

According to Mexican officials, the Charleen B was fishing two miles from the coast line about 8 miles north of Tampico. Mexico claims its territorial waters extend 10 miles from shore.

Payment of the 5,000 peso fine was made by Gerald P. Bagnaud of Rockport, owner of the boat, through U. S. Consul Kennedy Crockett.

Aransas Wildcat To Run Casing

Sam E. Wilson, Jr. No. 1 Ocker Brothers, Aransas County wildcat eight miles southwest of Austwell in C. B. Lucas Subdivision, was drilling below 9,960 feet with 13.7-pound mud.

Running final log between 10,025 and 10,050 feet was planned. Operator has 5½-inch casing on location. The test, with ground elevation 8.6 feet, is on a 366-acre lease.

Renwar Oil Corp., Heep Oil Corp., and Jack Modesett No. 1 Travis Bailey, indicated deeper pay opener in West Rockport Field 1½ miles northwest of Rockport was drilling below 9,250 feet with mud logger attached.

This test had earlier spotted 7-inch casing at 9,115 feet. Location is in Joseph Fessenden Survey, A-65.

F. William Carr No. 2 Murray Estate, wildcat five miles northwest of Aransas Pass in James Orick Survey, A-167, was drilling below 4,130 feet on an 8,000-foot permit.

A Bankhead Drilling Co. rig of Aransas Pass was rigging up for Atlantic Refining Co. No. 1 R. R. Barber, scheduled 9,500-foot wildcat five miles northeast of Aransas Pass in John Phillips Survey, A-175.

William Herbert Hunt Trust Estate has staked location for a test in Puerto Bay Field four miles north of Aransas Pass.

His No. 1 Bankers Mortgage Co., projected to 7,500 feet, is 467 feet out of the southeast corner of Tract 78, James Orick Survey, A-167. Penrod Drilling Co. has the contract.

Layton Brown Drilling Co. of Woodsboro No. 1 J. R. Barry estate, oiler in the Puerto Bay Field two miles northwest of Aransas Pass, was completed for a 24-hour flow of 111.4 barrels of 42 gravity pipeline oil.

Completion was through a ½-inch choke from open hole between 6,760 feet, where 5½-inch casing was set and 6,674 feet, the total depth. Gas-oil ratio was 1,356-1 and tubing pressure was 890 pounds.

The well was to be completed for gas through 47-shot perforations at 6,521-29 feet. Location is on a 427,28-acre lease in James Orick Survey, A-167.

George W. Graham and Emory M. Spencer No. 3 Brundrett, slated 10,000-foot wildcat four miles west of Rockport in William S. Sutton Survey, was scheduled to log at 6,950 feet.

Location was being cleared for a T G & M Drilling Co. rig to be moved to Placid Oil Co. No. 2 Fulton Outlot No. 4, scheduled 7,500-foot test in the East Fulton Beach Field. The test, projected to the B-2 Sand, is 330 feet out of the southeast corner of Fulton Outlot 88.

16 Whoopers Leave Refuge For Artic

Austwell. — The world's only flock of whooping cranes has started its migration to summer breeding grounds in Artic Canada.

Sixteen of the flock's 24 huge black and white cranes have left Aransas Wildlife Refuge.

Julian Howard, refuge manager said he discovered their departure in a loop of the refuge yesterday. "The whoopers were still here April 2 when we toured the refuge," Howard said. "Nobody knows when they began to leave. The weather has been too bad to search by plane. The others will be leaving any day now."

The colony grew by three this year. Twenty-one took off from the refuge last spring and 24, including three young ones, returned.

Careless or malicious hunters along the whoopers' flyway to the Artic are considered the biggest threat to the nearly extinct birds. Wildlife authorities have asked game wardens to assure the whoopers of safe conduct.

**Traffic Accidents
Greatest Single Cause
Of Death Among Children**

"Child killer No. 1" In these words, Col. E. B. Tilley of Houston, President of the Texas Safety Association, and Services Advisor for the Gulf Oil Corporation today labeled traffic accidents the greatest single cause of death among children 1 to 14 years old—a cause that claims hundreds more victims annually than cancer, it's closest competitor for this gruesome title.

Speaking in behalf of the current Child Pedestrian and Bicycle Safety program which the Texas Safety Association is sponsoring in cooperation with the department of Public Safety and the National Safety Council, Col. Tilley said, "Contrary to general opinion, neither cancer nor pneumonia, tuberculosis or polio, takes as high a toll of young lives as traffic accidents."

Quoting statistics for 1950 (the latest year for which figures on deaths from disease are available) he showed that traffic accidents were the leading cause of death among children from 1 to 14 years of age. "Traffic accidents claimed 3,655 victims," he said, "while cancer accounted for 3,156 pneumonia for 2,821, tuberculosis for 1,263, and polio for 862."

"The great tragedy in this whole picture is that most of this child slaughter on the highways is unnecessary," Col. Tilley said. "In the majority of cases, traffic accidents are due to somebody's carelessness. If we would just substitute careful walking, driving and bike riding for the careless variety so often practiced, the child traffic toll could be reduced sharply over night."

He urged parents and teachers to impress upon youngsters the importance of being alert in traffic, of crossing at cross walks and with traffic lights and of never playing in the street.

He made a special plea to motorists to watch out for children whenever they drive.

"Youngsters are carried away by play," Col. Tilley said. "Sometimes they forget entirely the real world around them. Motorists should be aware of this and always expect the unexpected from them."

He warned motorists to keep a sharp eye out for children when driving near school, playgrounds, in residential districts, or wherever else children are likely to be found.

"Whenever you're near their haunts, drive slow," he advised. "Remember, children move fast."

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HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From Your State Capitol

By VERN SANFORD Texas Press Association

Austin.—Most of Governor Allan Shivers' program passed through the legislative session with the greatest of ease.

There will be an increase of \$402 per year in public school teachers' pay; state employees will get a salary increase of \$120 per year, and \$10,687,500 will be spent for state buildings.

Not only did the Legislature make those appropriations, it also passed a tax bill to raise money.

To pay for the governor's program, the Legislature passed an increase in taxes on natural gas production, corporations, and beer.

Largest amount will come from gas, the levy being raised from 5.72 to 9 per cent of wellhead value, starting next September 1. This will bring an estimated \$14 million per year.

The tax will be reduced to 8 per cent the second year and 7 per cent the third.

Increased from \$1.25 to \$2 per \$1,000 per capital value was the franchise tax on corporations. This hike is expected to produce \$8.6 million per year.

Beer taxes were raised, from \$1.37 to \$2 a barrel and will bring in about \$3 million more per year.

Near the end of the session, one of Shivers' proposals ran into trouble.

To a conference committee went a bill to outlaw Communists. The Senate refused to accept House amendments to the measure.

Senator Rogers Kelley, author of the bill, had a sharp verbal exchange with Senator W. H. Moore about the proposition.

Moore asked the presiding officer, Lieutenant Governor Ben Ramsey, a question on the voting, and Kelley said, "If you want to vote with the Communists, vote no."

"I'll put my patriotism up against yours any day," Moore retorted.

"There will be order in the Senate," was Ramsey's order, and a sergeant-at-arms moved into the scene, which quieted when Kelley said he did not mean to reflect on any member.

Another snag was hit when Senator Jimmy Phillips "tagged" 18 appropriation bills, which means that a public hearing must be held, on each.

Finance committee hearings were set on the bills Saturday morning, just three hours before the deadline on committee action for the special session.

Appropriations involved included buildings for the Waco, Gainesville and Gatesville state institutions, several state colleges, a probation system, the committee on alcoholism, and emergency grants for state agencies.

Producers who wish to sell gas to Panhandle farmers for irrigation pump fuel may do so, according to a bill passed late Friday night. The bill sailed through the House of Representatives Thursday with only one dissenting vote and was whipped through the Senate committee in record time. Final passage came during the late session Friday night when the lawmakers locked themselves in to hold a quorum. The bill provides that anyone who sells gas to farmers for agricultural use is not to be placed under regulations as a public utility.

Seven cities in the drought stricken Panhandle area will benefit from a bill passed by the House which creates a Green Belt municipal and industrial water authori-

ty serving those cities.

Author of the bill, which received 112-to-one approval, was Rep. Elbert Reeves of Matador. The cities affected are Childress, Clarendon, Hedley, Memphis and Quanah, all on U. S. Highway 287 between Amarillo and Vernon and between Wellington and Pecos, and thirty miles north and south of Childress on U. S. 83. The House amended Reeves' bill to provide that the authority could not acquire or develop underground water. The authority would have the power to use ponds and could condemn property within its limits.

The Legislature also has created a water conservation district including the city limits of Nocona.

False charges have been made against the Texas insurance industry, says Garland A. Smith, chairman of the Texas Board of Insurance Commissioners.

Smith referred particularly to reports printed in armed service publications that "thousands of Air Force personnel will suffer cash value losses in now defunct life insurance and endowment policies" from a Texas insurance company that recently went into receivership.

The reports are without foundation, said Smith in a telegram to Robert B. Anderson, undersecretary of defense.

Smith told Anderson that the

company involved, United World Life of El Paso, sold only one policy to a member of the armed forces.

Texas, added Smith, could not have become the insurance capital of the world, with 1860 licensed companies and \$15 billion of insurance in force if the state's insurance laws were not basically sound.

Senator Joseph McCarthy will be a San Jacinto Day speaker if he is "still alive" at that time, he has told Hugh Roy Cullen.

University of Texas students opposed the selection of McCarthy as a speaker and asked Cullen that the matter be reconsidered.

Signatures of 1,571 students were on the petition delivered to Cullen, Houston oil millionaire and philanthropist, by Bob Kenney, editor of the university newspaper, and Ronnie Dugger, a former editor.

C. Woodrow Laughlin, ousted district judge of Alice, has paid \$3,079 in court costs resulting from the historic trial that brought about his removal.

Laughlin, elected to his position with the help of Duval County Boss George Parr, lost the case when Texas Supreme Court found that he improperly dismissed a grand jury that had indicted him, and that he feared would indict his brother, a Jim Wells county commissioner.

Another development in the South Texas strife occurred when the court of criminal appeals here refused the appeal of Mario (El Turko) Sapet from conviction and a 99-year sentence in the slaying of Jacob S. Floyd Jr. of Alice.

The Parr forces carried an election in Duval county last week—but not by the margin to which they have been accustomed in former years.

Orders went out from Department of Public Safety headquarters to start enforcement of the automobile inspection law immediately after the April 15 deadline.

Many thousands of vehicles had not been inspected as the deadline approached, and a last minute rush was anticipated. Auto owners missing the deadline are subject to a \$200 fine.

Modified this year, the car inspection law is concerned only

with lights, brakes, horn and windshield wipers.

State politicians were beginning to crank up for the campaigns designed to get votes in the Democratic primaries in July and August.

At the moment, the Senate race is drawing considerable interest. Incumbent Lyndon Johnson has a definite opponent in Representative Dudley Dougherty of Beeville whose wife made his race official by paying the \$625 filing fee to Wallace Savage of Dallas, State Democratic chairman.

Coke R. Stevenson Jr. also was mentioned as another possible candidate. He now is administrator of the Texas Liquor Control Board. It was Stevenson's father who was defeated by Senator Johnson in the much publicized race six years ago. Austin friends of the junior Stevenson revealed that he had been approached about making the race this year.

Thomas Evans Riddle, one of the last five survivors of the Civil War, died at the Texas Confederate Home for Men last week. The attending physician said that death was caused by the "accumulative infirmities of old." He was 107 years old.

There now are only four remaining veterans of the War Between the States. Walter W. Williams III is another Texas veteran of that war. He lives on a farm near Franklin, Texas, Williams a sprightly 111 years of age, appeared in Austin recently to kick off the second annual "Lone Star Car Races" sponsored by Bergstrom Air Base.

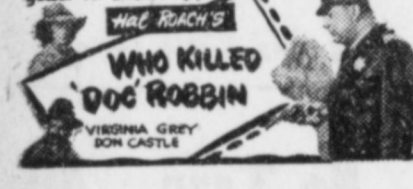

Joe McCarthy Will Speak In Houston Apr. 21

Houston.—A record crowd is expected at the San Jacinto Battlegrounds near Houston for the April 21 San Jacinto Day address of Senator Joe McCarthy.

The address will start at 3 o'clock from a stand in the shadow of the San Jacinto monument, the world's tallest, which commemorates the victory of General Sam Houston's forces won April 21, 1836, to free Texas from Mexico.

Senator McCarthy is appearing on the invitation of the San Jacinto chapter, Sons of the Republic of Texas, Roderick J. Watts of Houston, president.

The San Jacinto chapter, Daughters of the Republic of Texas, Mrs. Eugene T. Harris of Houston, president, will join the Sons in the April 21 program.

H. R. Cullen, Houston oilman and philanthropist, is general chairman of the arrangements committee, and will introduce Senator McCarthy.

The invitation to Senator McCarthy has been marked by controversy. A group of University of Texas students petitioned that the invitation be withdrawn. But Mr. Cullen said "the telegrams and letters of approval far out-number those disapproving."

"Texans have a reputation for hospitality and fair play. I am sure Senator McCarthy will have a large audience for his patriotic non-partisan address, which will be in keeping with the spirit of San Jacinto Day."

"I am for Senator McCarthy, because I believe he is doing more than anyone else to fight the Communist conspiracy in this country."

Another feature will be the thoughts—"after 10 years"—of Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, Lieutenant General Julian C. Smith, Major General Merritt A. Edson, General Shoup, Colonel Henry P. Crowe and a score of others who played a vital role in that historic battle.

As Admiral Nimitz says, "Never before was such a tough job done so completely in such a short time."

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Dr. Cox Advises On Safety for Children

Austin.—"It is the adult's job to prevent childhood accidents," declares Dr. Geo. W. Cox State Health Officer.

As children do not always conform to the practices that would assure greatest safety, adults must be made to understand the accident problem of children and be as concerned about it as they are about childhood diseases.

A notable decrease in infant mortality has been brought about by physicians and public health work during the past quarter century. Despite the efforts of the medical profession to protect the country's future citizens, childhood mortality continues high because of accidents—accidents that for the most part are preventable.

The accident rate among children is being reduced only about one-third as fast as the rate for death by disease. Preventable accidents are the leading causes of death in the age group one to fourteen. Only by the understanding and cooperation of adults can the toll of child accident deaths be reduced.

Besides causing deaths, accidents are responsible for thousands of school children being injured sufficiently to require the attention of a physician or cause absence from school. Injuries occurring in school buildings account for 26 per cent of such cases, on school grounds 29 percent, going to and from school 5 per cent, at home 17 and other places 23 per cent.

"Children deserve the right to grow up and it is up to every adult to give them that chance," said Dr. Cox.

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Quarterly Household Workers Tax Deadline Near

April 30th is the deadline on which social security payments for household workers for the first quarter of 1954 are due at the office of the Director of Internal Revenue in your district.

The federal law bringing household workers under the old-age and survivors insurance system went into effect January 1, 1951. However, lawyers say that many persons who employ help in their homes are still in the dark about requirements of the law.

Here are some provisions everyone should know. Household workers covered by the law include maids, laundresses, housekeepers, cooks, nursemaids, gardeners, handymen, valets, footmen, grooms, chauffeurs of privately owned cars, practical nurses, and others.

Whether or not a household worker is included in the law depends on how many days she works and how much money she is paid. If the person works 24 days and earns \$50 during any one of the three month periods into which the calendar year has been divided, a tax report must be filed and payment made.

Only cash wages are considered which includes bus fare if paid in cash, but does not include bus tokens, clothing, room and board, or other noncash items furnished the employee. A domestic worker does not have to put in a full day to count on the 24 day rule—any portion of the day worked counts as a full day.

The rule is different for domestic workers on farms operated for profit. In such cases the domestic is considered a farm worker and is covered only if he or she meets the test for farm labor.

The tax in all amounts to 4% of the cash wages paid. You, as an employer, must deduct 2% from your household worker's cash wages if the person meets the 24 day, fifty dollar test. You then include another 2% which is the employer's contribution. After the close of each specified three-month period you should send the tax, with a report of the wages paid, to the Director of Internal Revenue.

These three-month periods, or quarters, end on March 31st, June

30th, September 30th and December 31st. Reports and payments are due by the last day of the month following the close of each quarter. During any quarterly period that a household worker does not work 24 days, the employer need not be concerned. You need not consider the work your employee performs for any other employer.

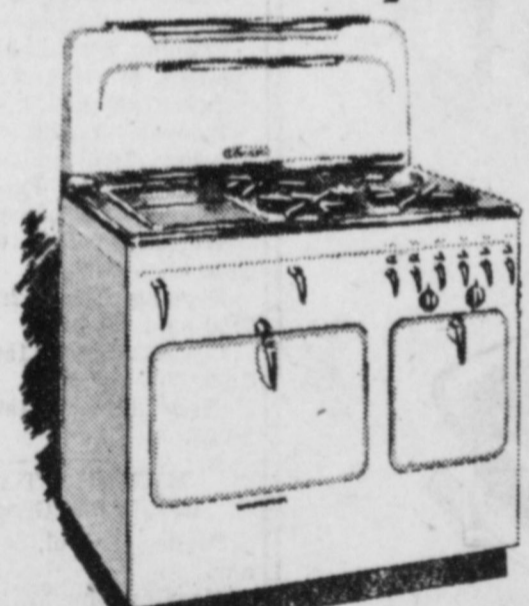

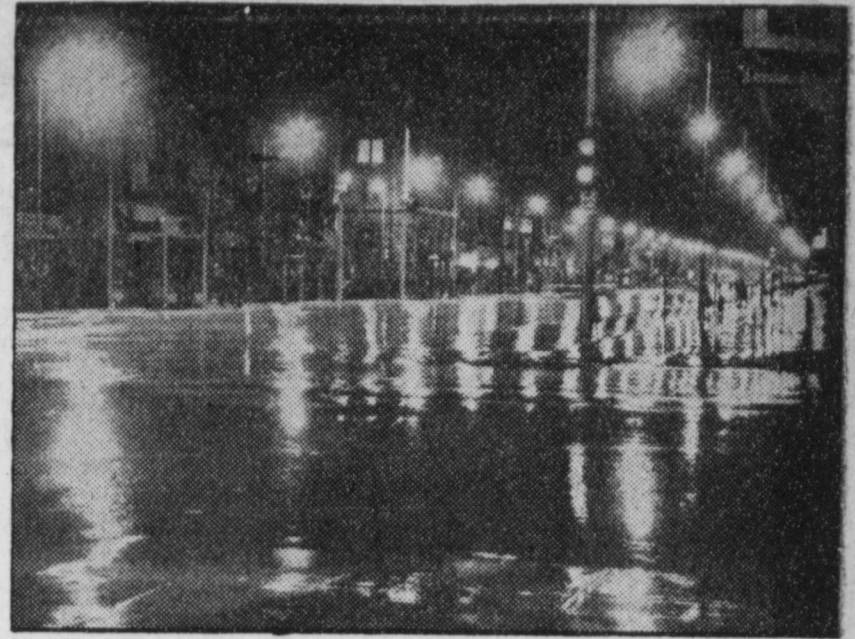

FOR EACH 100 SEPARATED FROM U. S. ARMED SERVICES 84 ARE INDUCTED

Austin.—As the armed forces separated each 100 Texans during the first quarter of 1954, state draft machinery and recruiting stations averaged taking into service 84.

This was shown in reports of Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state director of Selective Service Friday, when a March report was completed for national Selective Service headquarters.

A total of 3,426 Texas were drafted during the first three months of 1954, while 3,668 enlisted. More than 14,300 Texans were separated from the various forces during the same time.

All draftees went to the Army, while enlistees went into all the services—Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force, and Coast Guard.

The Air Force appealed to more enlistees than any other service, the Army second. Army led in the number of separations, the Air Force second.

During this quarterly period, Texas Selective Service examined 4,902 men, the report showed, 1,664, or 34 per cent, being rejected as unfit.

Legal Terms Explained

Many of the terms used by lawyers in their every day work are baffling to the average layman. From time to time explanations regarding some of the more commonly used expressions will be published in this column.

A good example of the questions sometimes asked by laymen is, "What is a deposition?" Many people think this may be only a simple sworn statement, but their impression is wrong.

A "Deposition" is a means of taking a statement to preserve testimony for future use in litigation, or to be used in a case which is then pending before the Court.

At times, when it is thought that perhaps a witness will not be available at the time a suit comes to trial, a statement is taken from him that may be used on the trial of the case. To be capable of being introduced and used on the trial of a case, a statement must be executed with certain formalities. A simple sworn statement is not sufficient.

Depositions are of two kinds. One kind is where the attorneys on each side go with the witness before a Notary Public and ask the questions. Questions and answers are taken down by the Notary or the Court Reporter and then typed up and signed by the witness.

The other type of deposition is one in which the questions are written out in full by the attorneys for each side and the questions are sent to a Notary Public who notifies the witness to come in and answer the questions. The Notary then reduces the answers to writing, executes the written interrogatories, together with the answers, to the Court for use at such time as they may be necessary in the trial of the case.

Another question sometimes asked is, "What is the difference between participating and non-participating royalty?"

With reference to oil and gas leases, royalty is that sum paid to the owner of the land, or the owner of the mineral interest, for the oil and gas which is taken from the property.

If in a deed a person reserves an undivided one-half interest in and to all the oil, gas and other minerals in and under the premises conveyed, this means that the individual is retaining for himself an undivided one-half interest in the minerals.

This terminology would entitle the individual retaining the interest to a similar share in the royalty and bonus and rentals paid for oil and gas leases, and would require his signature on a lease of the whole tract of land.

If the deed reserves by proper provisions one-half (1/2) of the oil, gas and other minerals, and specifies that the interest shall be "non-participating," the party reserving the mineral interest would not share in the bonus money paid for the lease, or the annual lease money paid to keep the lease in force. He would however be entitled to his share of any of the payments of oil which is produced upon the property.

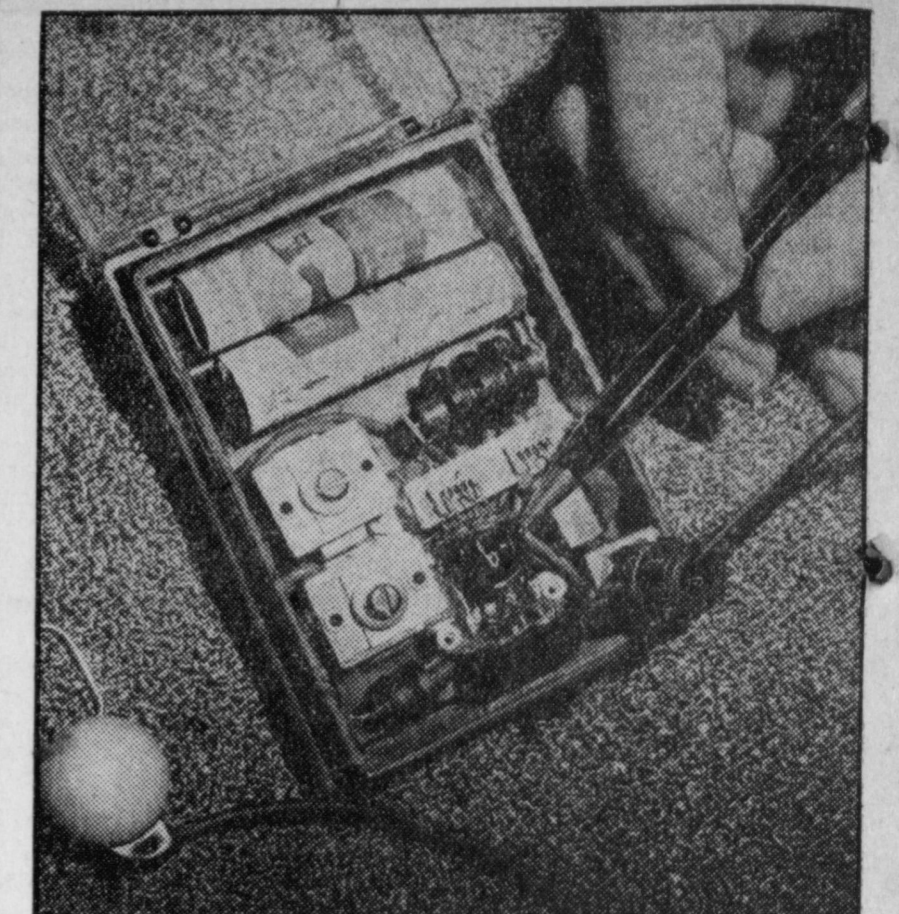
