Renwar Corp. Schedules Deep Test

Renwar Oil Corp. has scheduled an 11,000-foot test in Aransas County's new West Rockport Field 3½ miles northwest of Rockport.

The firm's No. A-1 Travis Bailey is 737 feet from the north and 467 feet from the southwest line of the 1644-acre A-lease in J. G. Smith Survey, A-239.

The above test is 2,290 feet southwest of the Renwar, Heep Oil Corp., and Jack Modesett No. 1 Travis Bailey, indicated second producer and deeper pay producer which was testing through 5-inch liner which was set at 10,600 feet.

Plymouth Oil Co. No. 4-103 State Tract 103, wildcat four miles northwest of Rockport in Hollis Survey, A-76, was drilling below 2,500 feet on a 10,000-foot permit. It has earlier spotted 10¼-inch casing at 1,160 feet.

Atlantic Refining Co. No. 1 Outlet Unit 9, East Fulton Beach Field test was drilling below 6,259 feet in side tracked hole. The project was earlier whipstocked out at 5,750 feet and kicked to the north on a 7,250 foot permit.

Geo. Kriger Breaks Leg

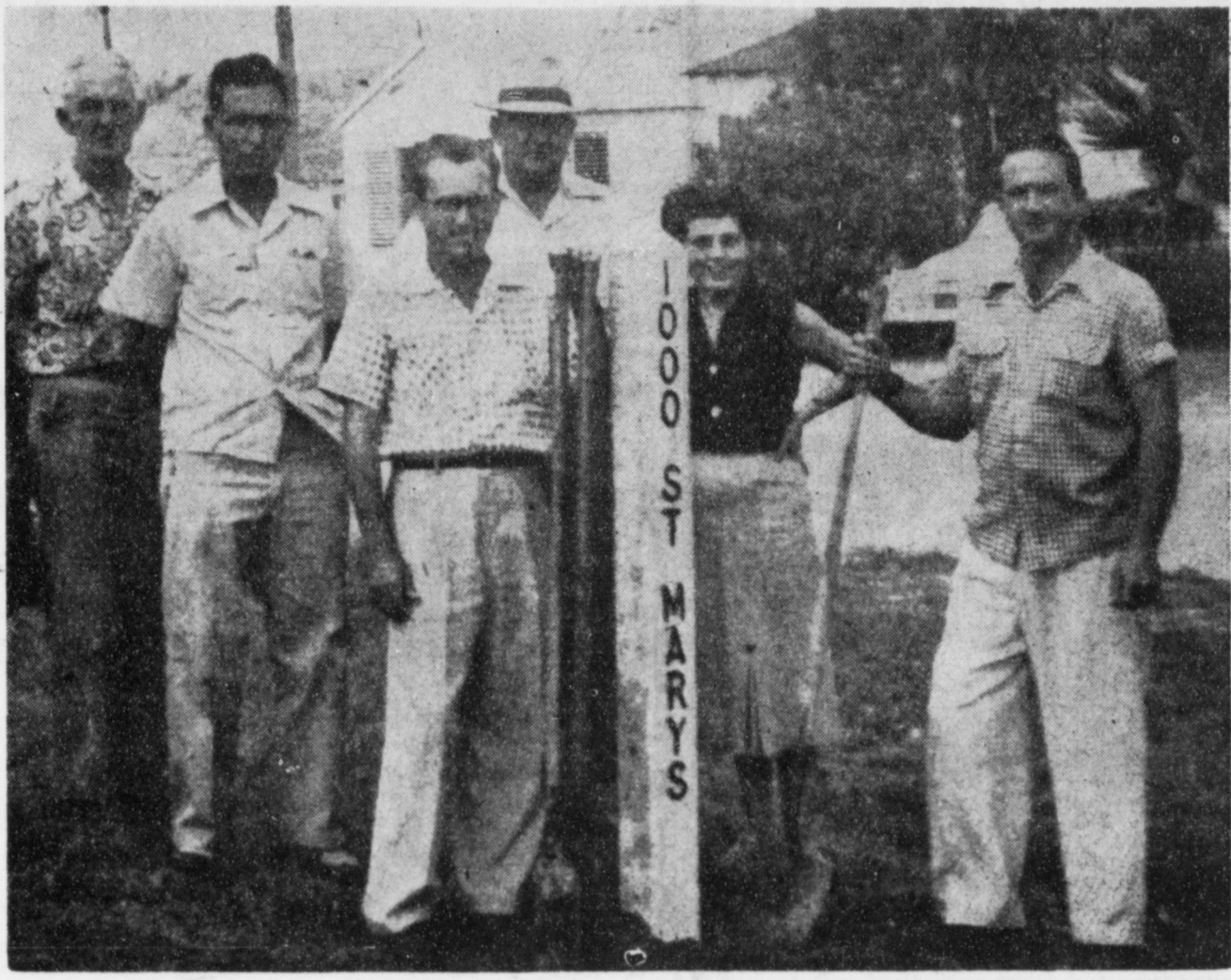
Mr. and Mrs. George Kriger went to Hitchcock Sunday to attend a family reunion and took their grand-daughter up there to meet her mother.

Unscrupulous Lumber Salesmen Bilk Corpus Christi Customers

Unscrupulous lumber salesmen are engaging in highway robbery in Corpus Christi, Henry O. Schlenk, manager of the Corpus Better Business Bureau office said last Saturday.

The sheriff's department has reported several complaints from Corpus Christians who have bought lumber from trucks parked just beyond the city limits. There is not as much lumber on the truck as buyers are led to believe and it is of questionable quality, Schlenk said.

An apparently good grade of lumber is placed outside of the stack. The Coastal Bend Retail Lumber Association has found the lumber inside is usually green and unfit for building, Schlenk said. Deputy Sheriff Leslie Chappell said such dealers can be picked up in the city for peddling without a permit, but there is no ordinance governing them in the county.—C. C. Callier-Times.

COASTAL FISH REGAIN PEAK

The chief marine biologist of the Game and Fish Commission said reports indicate Gulf Coast sports fish have regained the population losses caused by the severe freeze three years ago.

He said that, while sports fishing itself has been only fair because of prolonged windy weather, marine biologists have checked various areas to ascertain the comeback dimensions.

Marine Biologist Ernest Simmons, who operates in the popular Laguna Madre area, reported that the favorite redfish and trout have been restored in good numbers and that many large trout are being caught. Strangely, he observed that many drum moved out of the Laguna during the heavy salt period last summer. Salinity apparently killed small shells which the bottom-feeding drum live on.

The chief marine biologist said a typical comment on the present coastal fishing was made in The Rockport Pilot column, "Along the Waterfront": "Two men went out. They got 65 trout. They say there are plenty of fish if the wind would calm down."

CLOSE RELATIVES ARE NOT COVERED BY SOCIAL SECURITY

Do you work for your son or daughter, or are you on the payroll of your husband or wife? If so, you are not earning social security wage credits toward retirement after age sixty-five. Likewise, the wages which a child under age 21 receives from his father or mother do not count in figuring old-age and survivors insurance benefits. This information was furnished by H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration.

Work done by any person in the employ of his own child, or spouse, and work of a minor child for his parent is specifically excepted from coverage under the Social Security Act, Cleveland pointed out. This family employment exception applies to foster and step-relationships as well as to natural and adoptive relationships.

The wages of these three classes of relatives are not taxed and they do not get social security credit for such earnings. All other relatives receive credit for their earnings just as workers do who are not related to their employers.

Cleveland stated that the Social Security Administration deletes wages erroneously reported by employers for their parent, spouse, or minor children. This means that workers whose only employment has been for close family members may find that they are not entitled to benefits when they retire.
