Fowler Will Build Catholic and Episcopal Rectories

Members of the building committee of the Sacred Heart Catholic Church, Leonard LeBlanc, Travis Johnson, Dick Picton, Dick Simpson, Jr., and Fred A. Bracht, opened bids for the erection of the new Catholic rectory Tuesday afternoon.

C. C. Fowler, local contractor, was low with a bid of \$22,866.32. Two other contractors submitted bids with a high bid of \$25,500.00.

Construction will start within a week and will take approximately 3 months to complete. The two-story, three-bedroom structure will be built of materials similar to those of the new church and will also be finished in stucco and roman brick.

Fowler was also awarded the contract for the new Episcopal rectory, starting construction on it Wednesday morning.

The bids on this building were submitted to the Bishop's committee, James Sorenson, Jr., chairman and were opened last Thursday afternoon. Fowler's bid of \$11,618.00 was low. The highest bid was approximately \$15,500.00.

The rectory, of frame construction, will be sided with asbestos shingles, and have hardwood and asphalt floors, a built-up roof, modernistic finish on the interior walls, and have 1,200 feet of floor space.

It is being built on the lots, known as the Peagler lots, north of the church building and will consist of a living room, study, two bedrooms, dining room and kitchen. A terrace is planned for the south side.

Otis Johnson, of Corpus Christi is the architect.

Mrs. Small had been ill for six years and seriously ill the past year, having spent much of the time in the hospital.

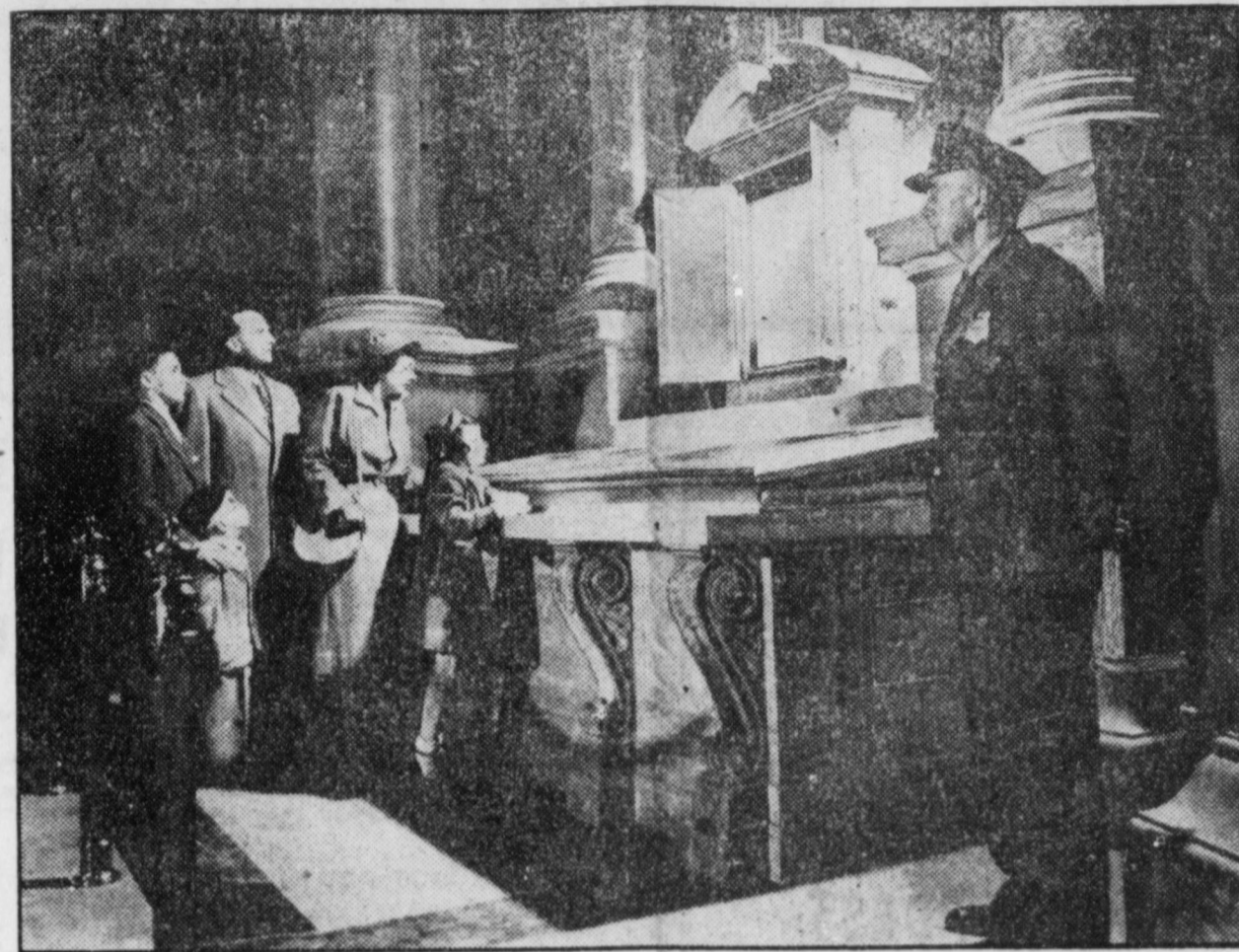
She was a member of the Methodist church.

FREEDOM'S SHRINE—Thousands of Americans each year visit the National Archives Building in Washington, D. C. where the nation's three most precious documents are enshrined. In the frame at top of the display is the Declaration of Independence, and in the slanted top of the case are the Constitution and the Bill of Rights. Guard at right is symbolic of the extreme care taken of the documents. The cases are hermetically sealed, and contain an inert gas under pressure which preserves the fragile paper and retards fading of the ink. The whole display is mounted on an elevating mechanism, which raises it from a 50-ton safe below the exhibit during visiting hours.

Boat Engine Stolen At Suttle's Wharf

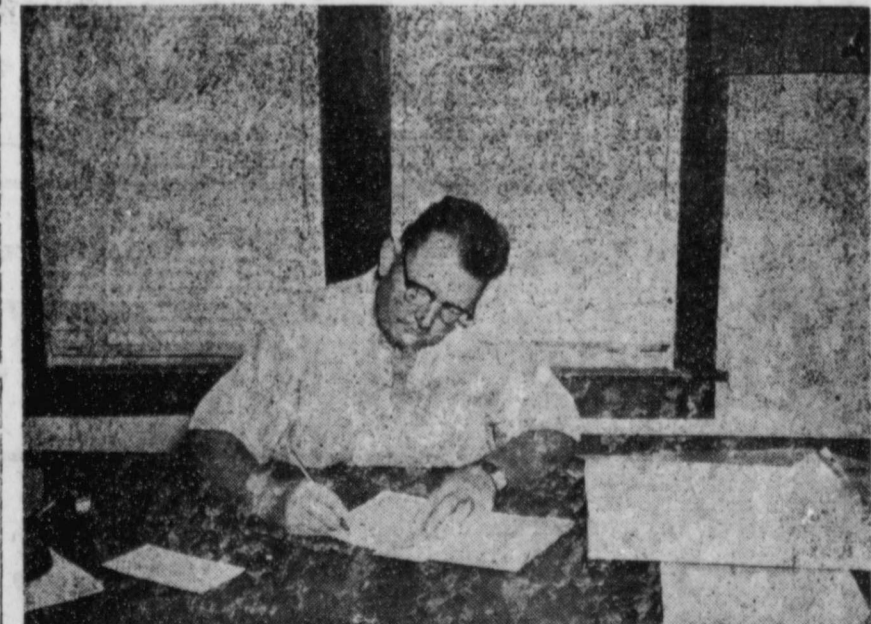

Varied Activities Planned For July 4th Celebration

HEEP SLATES DEEP TEST IN ARANSAS CO.

Heep Oil Corp. has scheduled a 9,300-foot test for immediate drilling in Aransas County West Rockport Field 2 1/2 miles west of Rockport.

The firm's No. 2 Zeph Rouquette and others is 467 feet from the northeast line and 1,547.87 feet from the west line of the 300-acre lease in C. B. Lucas Subdivision, Puerto Bay Lands.

The test is 933 feet northeast of the firm's No. 1 Rouquette and others, opener of the field in March of this year for 188 barrels of 41.5 gravity oil from perforations at 8,284-90 feet. A Conroe Drilling Co. rig was to move in by the first of next week.

Plymouth Oil Co. No. 4-103 State Tract 103, wildcat four miles northwest of Rockport in J. Hollis Survey, was drilling ahead after logging at 8,160 feet on the 10,000-foot permit.

A. J. & C. Drilling Co. rig was to start moving in this week for Arnold O. Morgan No. 1 Grant-Jennings, scheduled 9,500-foot Aransas County wildcat 2 1/4 miles southwest of Rockport.

The wildcat is on a 247-acre tract out of a 476-acre lease in Charles S. Zenn Survey, A-226. By extending the west line of the 229-acre Chicago Corp. lease to the north of this lease, the lease can be spotted 330 feet east of the west extended line and 660 feet from the south line of the Chicago Corp. lease.

Urban Chupe Receives Discharge from Army

Fort Campbell, Ky.—Sergeant Urban Chupe, platoon sergeant of Company "K", 503d Airborne Infantry Regiment, 11th Airborne Division, and son of Mr. and Mrs. John Chupe, Rockport, Texas, was given an honorable discharge from the Army, June 2.

Since entering the Army in July, 1951, Sgt. Chupe took his basic training at Fort Riley, Kansas. He then volunteered for airborne duty and completed the Basic Airborne School at Fort Benning, Georgia in March, 1952, and was then assigned to the 11th Airborne Division at Fort Campbell.

Sgt. Chupe took part in Operation Warm Wind, an airborne maneuver held in Alaska. He also acted as assistant umpire in Exercise Flash Burn, one of the largest airborne maneuvers ever held.

Prior to his enlistment into the Army, Sgt. Chupe was employed by the Marine Laboratory at Rockport. He is a graduate of Rockport High School and was active in the high school athletic program.

Sgt. Chupe has 28 parachute jumps to his credit.

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State Capitol NEWS

Austin—It will not take long to cast your ballot in the Democratic primaries on July 24.

There are only six contested races, as certified by the State Democratic Executive Committee, making up one of the party's shortest ballots. There are but 26 names on the ballots for 14 statewide elective offices.

Governor's Race

Governor Allan Shivers, running for re-election, designated Ralph Yarborough and his backers as "dreamers" who see as a solution of all our ills centralization of our government in Washington.

As an example of his meaning, Shivers said his opponents were blaming him for supporting the Republican nominee for President in 1952.

"They say I'm a traitor," Shivers commented. "If getting the tidelands back for our school children means I'm a traitor, then I plead guilty." The governor added:

"Our opposition paid lip service to the tidelands. This two-time loser's biggest backers said the tidelands belonged to the federal government . . ."

Yarborough had hurled the charge of disloyalty at Shivers because of the latter's support of Eisenhower.

Yarborough also struck out against Shivers' bid for a third elective term, saying, "Texas tradition condemns a third term. We approved the 22nd Amendment which forbids a third term for President."

Women in Politics

Two Texas women took over prominent spots in the state's political show last week.

Mrs. Pat Dougherty will manage the campaign of her husband, Dudley T. Dougherty, for the United States Senate. Mrs. Chas. Devall of Kilgore, whose husband is publisher of the Kilgore News Herald, was appointed state chairman of Texas Democratic Women for Shivers.

Demo Convention

A decision that will give big city counties who voted Republican in 1952 a strong voice in the Texas Democratic Convention was made by State Democrats in agreeing to count both parties' 1952 votes in deciding their convention strength.

The Democratic Convention convenes in September at Mineral Wells. The committee, meeting in Austin, agreed unanimously on the proposal after being told by its legal committee that the total vote was the correct basis on which to determine delegate strength.

Insurance Investigations

One Texas insurance firm went into receivership and another appeared ready in another week of insurance shake-ups.

Ralph W. Hammonds, of Houston, head of the Lloyds of North America Insurance Company, admitted insolvency and his firm went into permanent receivership.

Also caught in the whirlwind of insurance investigations was the suspended General American Casualty Company with headquarters in San Antonio. Suspension followed a voluntary request of the firm's president Ralph D. Stokes. Incomplete checks of the company's books showed it was "approximately one million dollars in debt," insurance

Board Chairman Garland Smith said.

No Insurance Mess

State Senator George Parkhouse told a meeting of insurance men in Austin that most of the controversy was being played out of true import.

He said that most of the trouble was being "generated artificially and unnecessarily to serve the political purposes of a little group of men." He added that the Legislature should, however, patch some present law loopholes and pay examiners better salaries.

'Ridiculous' Charges

Charges by a former agent of the State Liquor Board that the liquor industry and politicians run the board was termed "absolutely ridiculous" by Administrator Coke Stevenson, Jr.

Stevenson said the accusation of former member Weldon Burney, who called the board corrupt and dominated by politics, was without basis.

The San Antonio man resigned May 27. Stevenson said that he had been demoted in grade and appeared dissatisfied when he couldn't get a transfer back to McAllen where he was stationed when Stevenson took office.

Water is Big Problem

Water is one of the state's big problems, the president of the Texas Water Conservation Association told Texas University attorneys and water engineers.

Guy C. Jackson, Jr., asking for water improvements, called for a "state-wide water plan" and for the state to assume financial responsibility for dams and other water improvements.

Joins Campaign Staff

A manager of Governor Allen Shivers' successful 1952 race has been named to help manager the Governor's campaign for re-election.

Jack Dillard, director of Alumni Affairs for Baylor University, will assist Senator Otis Lock of Lufkin in forming strategy for the campaign which was fired off Monday with a rally and radio broadcast at Lufkin, Shivers' home.

Tax Exemption Asked

Two Texas turnpike corporations have asked the State Supreme Court whether toll roads built by private firms can have tax exemptions.

The Texas Turnpike Company and the Sam Houston Turnpike Corporation appealed from the Dallas Court of Civil Appeals.

Both are seeking to build toll roads in the state; one from Dallas to Houston and the other a Dallas-San Antonio route.

Horse Statute

Another work of Pompeo Coppini, legendary name to University of Texas students because his statutes cover the sprawling campus, has been slated for a campus location.

The bronze statue of a horse, called "Freedom," was given to the Texas State Historical Association by Mr. and Mrs. Hamilton Mesgruder of San Antonio. The work is from the family's private collection of statuary.

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Legal Terms Have Exact Meanings

The average person seldom needs any great degree of caution in selecting the words and phrases which he uses to communicate his ideas to others. We usually give voice to the first appropriate words which come to mind, and then make use of additional explanation to clarify our expressions if necessary.

In legal documents, however, words must have exact meanings in order that they may be uniformly interpreted by the courts. Lawyers naturally become accustomed to this situation, and frequently use terms which have a definite meaning to them, but which do not always convey the same meaning to laymen.

Below are explanations of several terms commonly used by attorneys. Exact definition has not been attempted, as this would take too much space and would involve the use of other terms having a legal meaning which might not be entirely clear. However, you will find below a general idea of the meanings involved. See how these correspond with your own definitions.

Real Property. Real property consists of land and includes generally buildings, fences and other improvements erected upon or attached thereto. Also generally included within the term are trees and crops growing upon the soil.

Personal Property. This term ordinarily includes movable possessions of a person which are not so attached to the soil as to become real estate. Stocks, bonds, notes, livestock and household furnishings which are not firmly attached to or made a part of the house itself, come within the ordinary meaning of the term.

Community Property. In Texas community property includes all property acquired by a husband or wife after their marriage, except such items as may be obtained by one of the parties through gift or inheritance.

Separate Property. This phrase covers property owned by either husband or wife before their marriage, and such real or personal property as either may acquire after marriage by gift or inheritance.

Trust. A trust occurs where one person holds the legal title of real or personal property for the benefit of another person. For example, a husband may direct in his will that after his death certain property shall be held and managed by some corporation or individual, with income going to his widow. In such a case the person holding legal title and control of the property is known as a trustee. Another type of trust is sometimes called a spendthrift trust.

The Eagle or the Oyster?

Now comes the season of the year when the Red, White and Blue is glorified in oratory throughout the land. Platitudes flow, Washington, Lincoln, Franklin, Patrick, Henry, and Jefferson are quoted. For speakers bold enough to break with this tradition, we suggest the examination of a speech written by Merle Thorpe, editor of SERVICE Magazine, for the July issue. Theme—"The Eagle or the Oyster?"

For a people . . . who elect opportunism rather than opportunity, who dream of security rather than success; who believe political charity is a virtue; who mock the frugal and plunder the thrifty; who adopt the rule that if I don't succeed you are to blame, that what you have is as much mine as yours; who contend that property is a shameful sign of success; who whimper that failure is the nobler cause; well-being is wicked; prudence, out-of-date; sacrifice silly—for such a people a fitting emblem is the Oyster.

For a people . . . who faced nature in the raw, with privation the rule and hardihood a virtue;

who endured defeat, disease and disaster for a hundred years in order to get a foothold on the Eastern Seaboard, the while with one eye on the interior, a no-man's land, a cockpit for settling international rivalries and private grudges, disputed by wild animals and wilder redmen; who sacrificed thus for a belief in the worth and dignity of the individual; who believed that economic freedom was as important as political freedom; who substituted "In God We Trust" for the Old World motto "In Government We Trust"; for a nation built by men who dedicated their lives to achieve the realization of these beliefs. I give you, fellow citizens—the Eagle!

This is an arrangement whereby one sets up a certain sum of money to be given out to another at a definite rate per month or per year, or under definite restrictions.

This type of trust is generally used in wills where a person desires to leave money to an individual, but feels that the individual is not capable of properly caring for the money and if left to them in full that the party receiving the money will spend and waste the money and not receive the maximum benefit from it.

There are certain technicalities in setting up such an arrangement, but in a proper case they will preserve to the beneficiary a definite income, and see that the principal estate left to the beneficiary is not wasted.

HIGHWAY PATROL REPORTS 34,868 TRAFFIC VIOLATIONS

If you were stopped by a Texas Highway Patrolman during the month of April for an infraction of the traffic laws—you had a lot of company. As a matter of fact you had exactly 34,868 other folks in the same boat with you.

You could have been "lucky" though. You might have been one of nearly half of the total got a warning ticket instead of an arrest ticket. And you might not have been involved in one of the 13,496 accidents during the month. Better than that . . . you might not have been one of the 6,840 persons injured in traffic accidents in April. And one thing is sure . . . if you're reading this you're really fortunate because you weren't among the 168 killed in Texas traffic during the thirty-day period.

Walter J. Elliott, Chief of the Texas Highway Patrol, has just released a comprehensive breakdown of the activities of 144 patrolmen who were on duty during the month. It shows that the men, comprising the sixteen Texas Highway Patrol Districts, worked a total of 107,922 hours during April at duties running the gamut from giving road information to tourists to making 11,850 arrest and passing out 16,926 warning tickets. Thirty-seven percent, or 40,239, of those hours were turned in on night duty.

The 444 patrolmen operated in 317 cars for the incredible distance of 1,082,617 miles. It wasn't all riding and writing tickets, however. Accident investigations took up 3,555 hours of the time; another 2,151 hours were devoted to safety work other than enforcement; and the men spent 3,612 hours on court duty.

According to Chief Elliott's figures, 8,544 of the arrests made were for hazardous traffic violations—the sort that cause accidents. Speeding, as usual, led the field with 4,803. Next in order was "Improper Passing" with 801; and

drunk driving accounted for 554 of the apprehensions. Speeding was also the leader in the "Warning Tickets" category, with 7,438. The nearly 17,000 motorists who received warnings, however, didn't get off entirely "free." A copy of the warning ticket was filed in their permanent driving record at the headquarters of the Driver's License Division of the Texas Department of Public Safety where enough of them, just like a small collection of arrest notations or accident experiences, will automatically bring the errant driver up for suspension or revocation action on his license.

"Our men always give two or three times as many warnings as they do arrest tickets," Elliott explained. "But sometimes we wonder if we're really doing the motorist a favor when he is released with merely a warning. We always hope the warning will work; that is, it will keep the driver from repeating his error, but many times a Patrolman is called to investigate a fatal traffic accident and the driver of one of the cars is a fellow to whom he gave a warning a couple of hours earlier. Maybe an arrest would have saved a life. Maybe. I don't know."

J. H. Knight fished from Floyd's Boat and Sales Co. Tuesday, landing 40 trout and A. J. Sutherland, fishing from there got 40 trout, also. All the boats going out from Floyd's have been coming in with nice strings of fish.

ORDINANCE

REGULATING THE KEEPING OF DOGS IN THE CITY OF ROCKPORT; PROVIDING FOR A DOG POUND; PROVIDING FOR THE REDEMPTION OF DOGS AND THE DISPOSAL THEREOF IF NOT REDEEMED; PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE AND PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE IS CUMULATIVE OF OTHER ORDINANCES UNLESS IN CONFLICT.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCKPORT, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. There is hereby levied and assessed upon each dog, male and female, kept or owned within the city of Rockport, Texas, an annual tax of One Dollar and Fifty Cents (\$1.50), which tax is due and payable on or before the 1st day of July of each year hereafter, and it is hereby made the duty of the owner or keeper of any dog, male or female, to pay over to the Chief of Police of the City of Rockport, Texas, or his duly authorized agent, the said dog tax on or before the 1st day of July of each year hereafter.

SECTION 2. The Chief of Police shall collect or have collected under his supervision all dog taxes, and he may employ, with the advice and consent of the City Council, a special officer to be known and designated as Pound Master, whose duty it shall be to carry out the terms and provisions of this Ordinance, and the Chief of Police shall be authorized to pay unto the Pound Master a commission on all dogs impounded as hereinafter provided in the amount of \$2.00 per head. The Chief of Police shall be responsible to the City of Rockport for all moneys collected under this Ordinance, and shall make monthly reports in writing of all moneys collected under this Ordinance to the City Clerk of Rockport, and shall pay over to said City Clerk all moneys so collected at least once each month.

SECTION 3. Upon payment of said Dog Tax the Chief of Police, or his authorized agent, shall furnish the owner or keeper of said dog or dogs with a tag on which is stamped the number of registration with the year for which said tax is paid, which tag the owner or keeper shall attach to a collar securely fastened around the neck of such dog, male or female; and no dog shall be allowed to run at large without the proper tag attached to the collar around the neck of such dog. In no event shall the Chief of Police, or his duly authorized agent, issue a license tag to any owner or keeper of any dog unless such owner or keeper shall exhibit to him a

vaccination certificate issued by a licensed veterinarian or the Pound Master certifying that such dog or dogs have been vaccinated against rabies by him. And in the event that such vaccination certificate is signed by the Pound Master, such certificate must be accompanied by written authorization signed by the owner of such dog or dogs allowing the Pound Master to so vaccinate such dog or dogs against rabies.

SECTION 4. All dogs kept within the City of Rockport, Texas, are hereby required to be vaccinated against rabies by some licensed veterinarian or the Pound Master on or before the 1st day of July of this year and on or before the 1st day of July of each year hereafter.

SECTION 5. It shall be unlawful for any owner or keeper of any dog, male or female, to allow or permit any such dog to run at large in the City of Rockport, Texas, without a proper dog tag securely attached around the neck of said dog; and it shall be unlawful for any owner or keeper of any female dog to allow such female dog, while in heat or season, with or without a dog tag, to run at large in the City of Rockport, Texas.

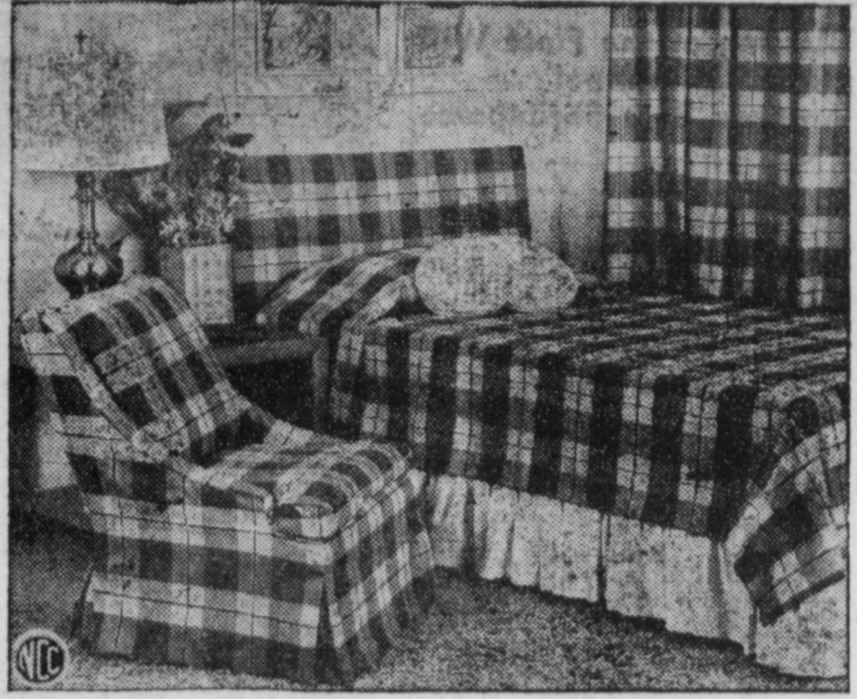

It shall be the duty of the Chief of Police, or his authorized agent, to capture and impound in a pen to be provided by the City of Rockport, Texas, for that purpose and called the Dog Pound, any dog, male or female, found running at large within the City of Rockport, Texas, without a tag as provided for in this ordinance, and any female dog, in heat or season, with or without such tag; and if such impounded dog is not redeemed and reclaimed from said dog pound within the time required under the provisions of this Ordinance, the Chief of Police shall advertise said dog for sale by posting for twenty-four hours at the door of the City Hall in Rockport, Texas a notice of such sale, which said notice shall describe the dog or dogs to be sold, and shall state the time and place of such sale; and the Chief of Police, if such dog or dogs are not redeemed prior to such sale, shall sell such dog or dogs at public auction, starting each dog at a price of no less than \$2.00; and if such dog or dogs are not sold at such sale the same shall be bought by the City of Rockport, and immediately disposed of in some humane manner under the direction of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, if such Society will recommend a manner of disposal, and if not such dog or dogs shall be disposed of humanely.

SECTION 7. (a) The owner or keeper of any dog or dogs captured or impounded under the terms of this Ordinance shall be permitted, at any time within forty-eight hours after such dog or dogs have been impounded, to redeem, reclaim and again obtain possession of such dog or dogs upon payment to the Chief of Police, or his duly authorized agent the sum of \$1.00 for each day or fractional part thereof, with a minimum of two days or \$2.00 payment, for such time as every such dog may have been impounded, which sum so paid to him shall by the Chief of Police be paid over to the Pound Master as compensation for feeding, handling and housing such dog.

(b) It shall be the duty of the Chief of Police and duly authorized Pound Master to enforce the terms of this Ordinance; provided, however, that the terms of this Ordinance shall not be applicable to dogs following countrymen into the city.

SECTION 8. The Chief of Police, the Pound Master, or any policeman of this city shall have the right and duty to shoot or kill any dog manifesting the symptoms of rabies and any dog showing a disposition to bite.

SECTION 9. Any person who shall wilfully take from any dog a collar or tag shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any

sum not to exceed \$100.00.

SECTION 10. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$100.00.

SECTION 11. This ordinance shall be cumulative of all other stock and dog ordinances and regulations of the City of Rockport unless in conflict with the terms of said ordinances or regulations, in which event such portions of such prior ordinances and regulations in conflict are hereby repealed and this ordinance shall prevail.

CAPTAN NEW KILLER OF BLACK SPOT ON ROSES

COLLEGE STATION—Rose growers troubled by black spot on rose leaves will welcome captain—a new effective control. This new substance added to a spray is a sure control for the number one enemy of roses.

Black spot first appears on rose leaves as tiny dark spots which spread and kill the leaf. It may also cause leaves to turn yellow and drop off. The loss of leaves weakens the plant and single flowers or pale flowers may form. Black spot causes die-back which begins at the bloom and runs all the way down to the roots.

Sadie Hatfield, homestead improvement specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says roses need to be treated within 24 hours after every rain. When the weather remains cloudy for a long period, roses should be sprayed once every ten days.

Various effective treatments for black spot are available, but sprays containing captan will stop black spot after it has started.

If sprays containing captan are not available, use a light dusting of copper-sulphur dust or 325-mesh sulphur. Another control is bordeaux spray which should be used according to directions on the container.

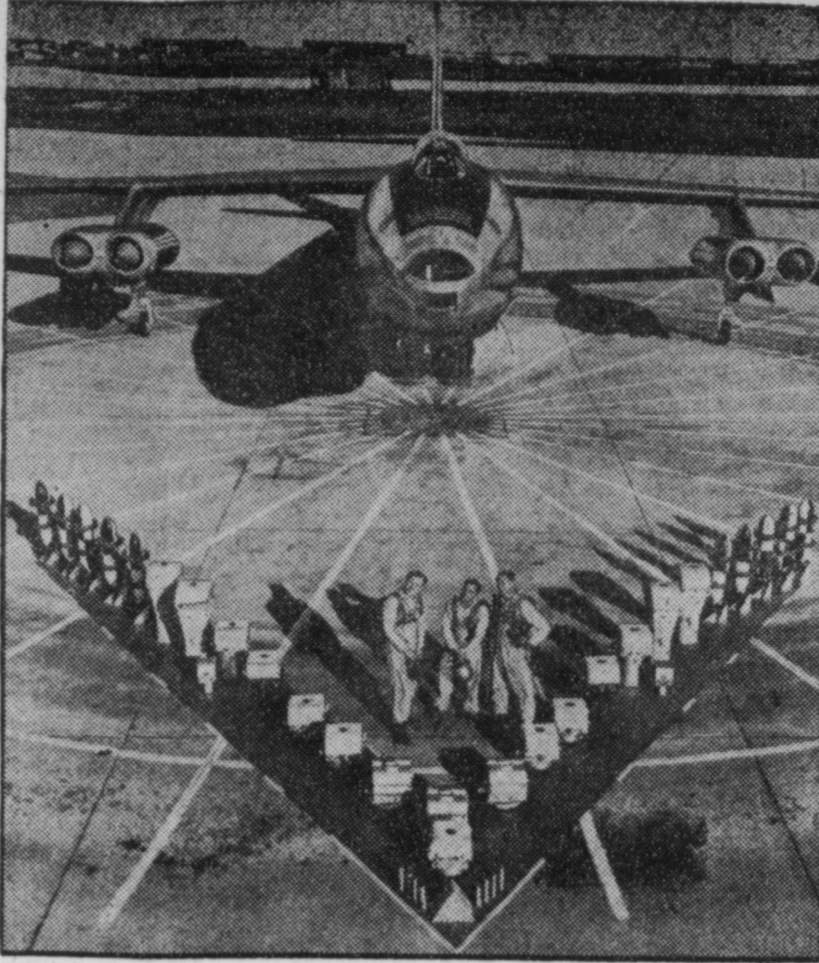

PEARL BEER DISTRIBUTORS BUY NATION'S 1ST BALE COTTON FROM RAY BARNICK, MISSION, TEXAS — PAY \$6.25 PER LB.

HARLINGEN (Spec.) — The Rio Grande Valley Distributors of the Pearl Brewing Company, the Largest Brewery in the Great Southwest, paid \$6.25 per pound the largest price ever paid for the Nation's first bale of Cotton.

A world price record of \$6.25 was paid for the first 1954 bale of cotton by Pearl Beer Distributors Pete McNamee, Harlingen; L. L. Woodman, Corpus Christi; Horace Etchison, McAllen; Frank Perez, Mission; and Luis Ysaguirre, Rio Grande City. Ray Barnick, grower of the 454 lb. bale, realized \$2,837.50 from the Pearl Beer Rio Grande Valley Distributors, plus a \$1,500.00 bonus from the Harlingen Chamber of Commerce, to bring his total to \$4,337.50.

Colonel F. E. Snowden, veteran Rio Grande Valley auctioneer, said this \$6.25 was more than twice the price paid for the first 1953 bale of cotton. The lowest price on record for a first bale was in the Depression year of 1932, when the cotton sold for .05c per pound, and no bonus.

The Pearl Beer Distributors gave this first bale of 1954 cotton to the Valley Boys Ranch, of Harlingen, and they, in turn, are going to have it auctioned to the highest bidder on the Cotton Exchange Floor, Houston, Texas. Funds to be used by the Valley Boys Ranch in its expansion program.

In acknowledging the checks, Mr. and Mrs. Ray Barnick expressed deep appreciation to the Harlingen Chamber of Commerce

for its \$1,500.00 bonus, and to the five Pearl Beer Rio Grande Valley Distributors for their bid of \$6.25 per pound, which netted them \$2,837.50.

The Auction was preceded by a Style Show, under the auspices of the Junior Service League, featuring twenty-eight models, Maid of Cotton wardrobe.

The bale of cotton auction was followed by a reception held at the Harlingen Country Club for the Pearl Beer Distributors, the Junior Service League, and the special Cotton Committee. Stanley Crockett, President of the Harlingen Chamber of Commerce, was Master of Ceremonies, and presented Miss Joan Chaudoin, Cotton Queen, with her Crown of Cotton.

PLAY SAFE—DO NOT SPEED

"When you speed, you're burning up more than the road. You're also burning a good-sized hole in your pocketbook."

This reminder from Col. E. B. Tilley of Houston, President of the Texas Safety Association, and Services Advisor for the Gulf Oil Corporation spotlights an aspect of speed that is not generally given much attention. It was pointed out by Col. Tilley today in a discussion of the current speed control program of the Texas Safety Association, the Texas Department of Public Safety and the National Safety Council.

"Excessive speed is pretty rough on a car," he said. "The speed demon usually finds this out when he trades his car in on a new model. He can't get as good an allowance as the fellow who's driven his car at a more sensible rate of speed. Accelerated speed accelerates depreciation."

"The car that's driven at an excessive rate of speed will also cost its owner a good deal more in upkeep," Col. Tilley said. When speed is increased from 40 miles per hour to 65 miles per hour, gasoline consumption increases 30 per cent. Oil consumption increases even more, and tire wear is two and a half times as great as it is at the

lower speed.

"But," he said, "the greatest cost of unsafe speed is its cost in human lives. According to the National Safety Council, unsafe speed contributes to more than 19,000 traffic accidents annually."

He advised motorists to avoid unnecessary expense and danger of unsafe speed by always driving at sensible speeds.

"The only safe speed is speed that's determined by conditions," he said, "and the only intelligent speed is a safe speed."

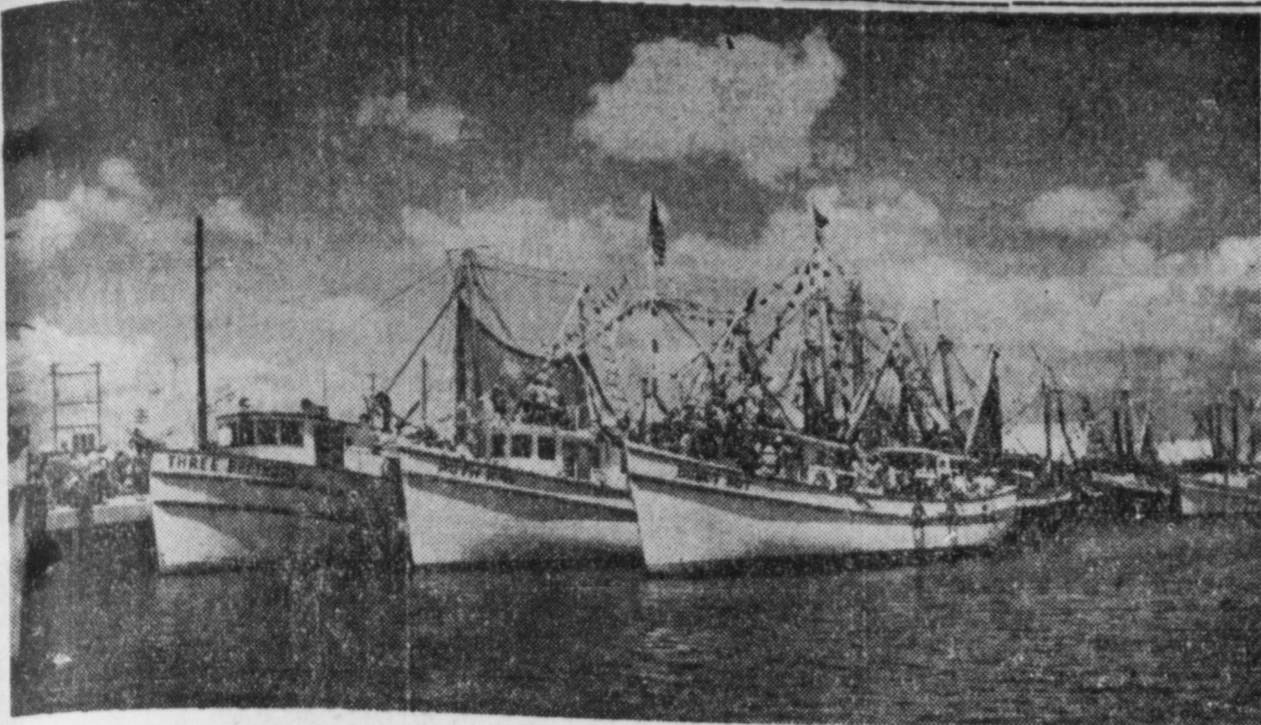

Poliomyelitis Increase Can Be Expected

Austin—This is the season of the year when an increase in poliomyelitis can be expected and Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer, is urging the public to cooperate in helping to prevent the spread of this crippling disease. "Children should not visit homes where poliomyelitis or symptoms of this disease are present. Promptness in diagnosing poliomyelitis is one of the most important factors in its control," Dr. Holle declared. "Direct contact between persons is the chief factor in the spread of infantile paralysis and since carriers are difficult to determine, it is advisable to reduce to a minimum all human contacts during any outbreak of this disease." Dr. Holle stressed the fact that a rigid program of sanitation is advisable since it has been suspected that flies and other seasonal insects may convey the virus or germ of poliomyelitis. He added that insect transmission has not been scientifically demonstrated but pointed out that sanitation is always advisable in controlling disease and that filth is likely to prove dangerous. Early symptoms of infantile paralysis are headache, fever, vomiting, unusual drowsiness, and irritability, followed by stiffness in the neck and back. Children under five years are most susceptible and all children under twelve years should be watched for suspicious symptoms. Dr. Holle urged that a physician be called immediately if infantile paralysis is suspected. If the disease is definitely diagnosed, local health authorities should be contacted immediately and patients isolated for at least 21 days.

College Station—Hamburgers, watermelon, fried chicken and ice cream will headline an appetizing July plentiful foods list.

Broilers and fryers will continue plentiful at reasonable prices says the U. S. Department of Agriculture. More are expected to be on the market than a year ago.

Other abundant foods for July include small turkeys, fresh fish, cantaloupes, milk and other dairy products, peanuts and peanut butter, vegetable fats and oils and locally home grown vegetables. Budget buys in vegetables may be sweet corn, green beans, cabbage, lettuce and beets or green peppers, depending upon local markets.

July is the month of peak production and consumption of ice cream and other frozen dairy products. Higher grades of beef will be readily available, yet the supply of the less expensive medium and lower grades will be increasingly plentiful and will be top buy for picnic hamburgers, the U.S.D.A. says.
