Now comes THE CITY OF ROCKPORT, TEXAS, a municipal corporation, the petitioner, in this its application for permission to cancel the following described portion of the subdivision known as the Smith and Wood Division of the City of Rockport, in Aransas County, Texas, would respectfully show unto the court the following:

That the portion of the said Smith and Wood Division which petitioner desires to have permission to cancel adjoins a plot or parcel of land upon which your petitioner plans to erect certain improvements and expansions to the sewer system of the City of Rockport, Texas, and is described as follows, to wit:
Being the street situated between Blocks Nos. Two-six-four (264) and Two-nine-five (295) of the Smith and Wood Division of the City of Rockport, in Aransas County, Texas, according to a map or plat of said city of record in Vol. E, pages 272-273 of the Deed Records of Aransas County, Texas, and more completely described as follows, to wit:

BEGINNING at the Southwest (SW) corner of said Block 295, in an Easterly (E) direction along the South (S) line of said Block 295 and its continuation across Ann Street to the Southwest (SW) corner of Block 296;
THENCE, in a Southerly (S) direction across Cherry Street to the Northwest (NW) corner of Block 263, Smith and Wood Division;

THENCE, in a Westerly (W) direction along the North (N) line of Block 264, Smith and Wood Division and its extension across Ann Street to the Northwest (NW) corner of said Block 264;

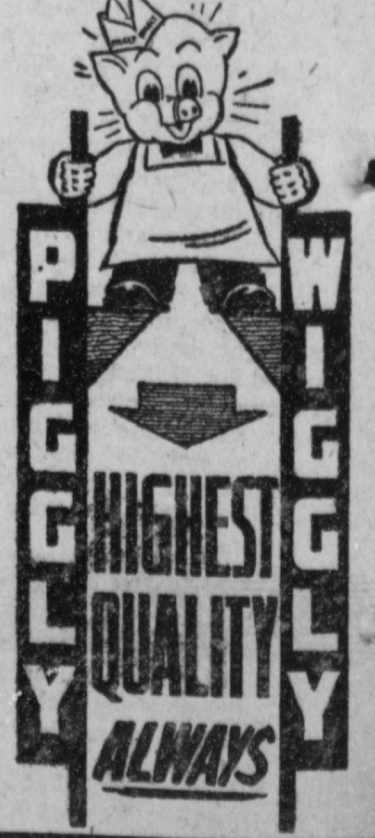

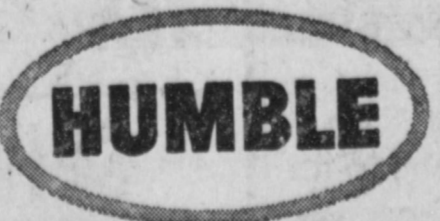
