#### **VACATION DRIVING IS BIG BUSINESS**

"Vacation driving is big business," Col. E. B. Tilley of Houston, president of the Texas Safety Association, and services advisor for the Gulf Oil Corporation, said today.

He spoke in connection with the July vacation driving traffic safety program his organization is sponsoring in Texas this month in cooperation with the National Safety Council.

"The American habit of vacation travel has grown to such an extent that tourists now spend about 10 billion dollars annually on auto trips," he said.

"Highway travel has become so heavy during the summer months that a defnite traffic safety problem has been created."

"According to the American Automobile Association," Colonel Tilley explained, "a total of 66 million persons, traveling in 22 million cars, take automobile vacations during the year. The average car travels 1,200 miles in 11 days of travel.

"Since about 70 per cent of vacation travel is done during the six months between April and Septem-



ber," he said, "a big extra load is placed on the nation's highways during the summer months.' And for years, he pointed out, this increased summer travel has been accompanied by increased

traffic accident fatalities. "Every year, with the coming of warmer weather, pleasure driving becomes more extensive," Colonel Tilley said. "When this happens, it becomes more important than ever for the motorist who wants to avoid accidents to practice alertness and caution behind the wheel. Good planning before

a trip also is important. "And I can't emphasize too strongly the value of courtesy in preventing accidents on our highways and streets. The safe driver makes courtesy his code of the road, and also is ready always to recognize and acknowledge the courteous acts of others."



This was Rev. Noah T. Bryar's blacksmith shop at old Washington-on-the-Brazos. The Texas declaration of independence was drafted and signed here. The convention met here on March 1, 1836. It was an unfinished house without doors or windows, in place of glass, cotton cloth was stretched across the windows which partially excluded the cold wind.
