Mr. Mays at Snug Harbor on Copano Bay reports very good fishing with several 2-3 pound trout being brought in daily. He also stated that lots of rat reds were being caught.

School Board Sets Budget Hearing On August 10

The trustees of the Aransas County Independent School District held their regular monthly meeting at the high school Tuesday night. Several items of business were handled, according to Supt. Pat H. Greene.

A tentative budget was approved, and a budget hearing was ordered for August 10th. At this time any interested parties may appear before the board to ask questions or to discuss the budget.

A new handbook, with several changes, for the 1954-55 session was approved. This handbook will be printed soon and will be distributed to the parents.

Contracts for the following teachers were approved: Miss Ruth Lipscomb to teach the fourth grade in Fulton, Mrs. Electa Taylor to teach the sixth grade in Rockport, Mrs. Estelle K. Davis to teach the first grade in Rockport, Miss Harrie Hope Lang to teach high school girls physical education, Miss Margaret Cash to teach the sixth grade in Fulton, Mr. Robert Briger to teach high school mathematics, Mrs. Otis Gilley who taught the sixth grade in Fulton last year, is transferring to the Aransas County Junior High School to teach social studies.

A contract for fencing the new football field was awarded to Alamo Iron Works of Corpus Christi, the lowest of five bidders. The fence will be a chain link fence, topped with three rows of barbed wire, making a total height of seven feet.

The elementary school children living on the Blackjack Peninsula will attend the Aransas County schools this year. They will go to the Fulton Elementary School. These children will be transported in the school district station wagon to be driven by Mrs. Wood.

The board decided to do further study on the lighting of the football field and on the construction of bleachers. Current plans call for the completion of the field in time for the first game in September.

The building at the Rockport Elementary School, which was brought from Camp Hulen in Palacios, for \$5,500, is being divided into three classrooms. These classrooms will accommodate the sixth grade, which held classes in the gymnasium last year.

Two New Homes to Be Constructed In City

The following building permits have been issued at the city hall during the past two weeks:

Peyton Mims received a permit to add a 6x7 foot frame bathroom at his home. The approximate cost will be \$150.

Antonio Tartaglia received a permit to build a 10x12 foot frame store room with a sheet metal roof on the south half of lot 5 and all of lot 6, block 10, Doughty and Mathis. The cost is estimated at \$100.

F. W. Bush was granted a permit to construct two frame porches one with a concrete floor on lots 1, 2, and the north half of 3, block 20, Doughty and Mathis. These porches will measure 10x16 feet and 9x30 feet, and will cost \$500.

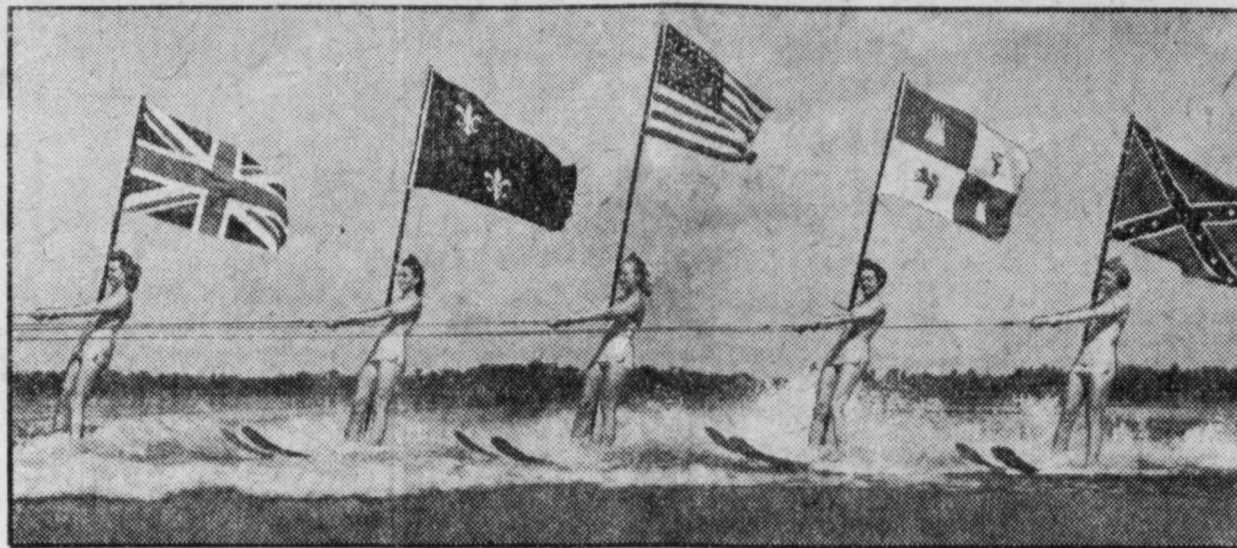

Arnold O. Morgan No. 1 D. W. Grant and Clyde Jennings, wildcat being drilled "tite" two miles west-southwest of Rockport, was unofficially reported to be drilling below 7,810 feet on a 9,500-foot permit.

William Herbert Hunt Trust Estate No. 19 E. M. Spencer and William Kent Jr., and others, proposed 5,300-foot Fulton Beach Field test two miles north of Rockport in Gilliland Survey, A-70, was drilling below 3,675 feet.

Sun Oil Co. No. 1 J. F. Brundrett, wildcat three-fourths mile west of Rockport, was drilling below 4,241 feet on 8,500-foot permit. Location is on a 1,154-acre lease in the John Smith Survey.

Heop Oil Corp. No. 2 Zeph Rouquette and others, slated 9,300-foot test in the West Rockport Field 2 1/2 miles west of Rockport was scheduled to drill plugs from 10 1/2-inch casing at 1,500 feet.

Commissioners Vote to Close Street in S. and W.

The County Commissioners' Court of Aransas County held a regular meeting at the courthouse Monday with County Judge John D. Wendell presiding. Commissioners attending were W. B. Allen, J. M. Sparks Jr., A. L. Davis, and J. H. Mills.

The county clerk's and county treasurer's financial reports were examined and approved. Several bills were also examined and approved.

The City of Rockport presented an application to cancel a portion of Smith and Wood Division, being a street between Blocks Nos. 264 and 295, Smith and Wood. Commissioners Allen, Sparks, and Mills voted to close this street, with Commissioner Davis voting against the motion. The closing of the said street was ordered.

Chester Johnson appeared before the Commissioner's Court and requested a roadway into his property east of Highway 35, an opening through Taylor Avenue to certain lots owned by him. After due discussion the matter was left pending.

The commissioners unanimously voted Commissioner Sparks' motion that the county purchase liability insurance on the county airplane. Commissioner Allen's motion to give George Pierson, indigent, \$25 for transportation to John Sealy Hospital and \$30 per month for three consecutive months for care of his family was voted unanimously.

Upon request of County Clerk Jas. C. Herring, permission was granted on motion of Commissioner Mills that three pages of Plat Records be copied and replaced in said Plat Book. A pipeline easement was granted to the Wyomere Oil Company.

\$441,226.99 Spent On County Roads In 5 Years

During the last five years, 25.55 miles of roads have been built in Aransas County. It was Texas' greatest period of road construction history, Highway Department files show.

The breakdown by counties as well as state totals prepared by the department showed that \$441,226.99 was spent in the county for maintenance of present roads and for the construction program.

The state's construction program is giving Texas motorists the best roads that engineering can provide. The report showed that 14,926.10 miles of roads added to the state highway system over the period covered cost \$575,158,577.32, more money spent for construction than in any other comparable period.

Figures also showed that farm-to-market roads came in for a lion's share of the total. The roads were named a priority because they give farmers needed routes to markets and access to towns surrounding rural areas, a highway official said.

Two New Wells Insure Rockport Sufficient Water

For the first time in ten years there is no longer a shortage of water in Rockport this summer. Two new water wells, which have been completed and will be tied into the main water line this week, will enable the city to have sufficient water for the hot days ahead.

In the past, local citizens have been asked to conserve water during the summer months. This meant cutting down on watering of lawns and shrubbery. However, now the city supply will allow people to use all the water they need and want.

Tom Shults, water superintendent, reports that the two new wells, which have been drilled west of Highway 35, are pumping 350 gallons per minute. The ten old water wells altogether produce only 320 gallons per minute. Thus, these new wells, one of which is near Anders' Garage, and the other one on Market Street, have doubled the city's water supply.

These ten old wells have cost the city at least \$30,000, while the two new wells, doubling production, have cost \$20,000. The new wells produce from three water sands from a depth of 190 feet. The old wells, which were from 70-208 feet in depth, were producing from only one water sand.

Layne-Texas have drilled these gravel wall wells. Gravel has been placed from 44 feet to 190 feet in the hole which is thirty inches in diameter.

These wells would have been completed sooner but the San Antonio firm which was supplying the pumps was meeting the emergency caused by the flood disaster in Laredo.

Shults stated that there are approximately 850 water connections in the city at the present time.

Seamen Defeat All Stars In Sunday Contest

The Rockport Seamen, after having to cancel their game with the Gregory Indians and not having enough time to schedule another game with an out-of-town team, played the Rockport All Stars Sunday afternoon at Dickson Memorial Field.

The Seamen won the game 11 to 8, but had to come from behind twice to show their power. Dickie Ballou, All Star second baseman, hit the only home run of the game off Lauriano Falcon with the bases empty.

The Seamen will play another home game this Sunday when they play host to an Ingleside team. At the last meeting of these two clubs the Ingleside crew won 4 to 0, so the Seamen will be out to change this score this time. On July 25 the Rockport teams, the Seamen and the All Stars, will play a doubleheader against the Port Lavaca Cardinals. Let's all come out to cheer the teams to victory.

Property Evaluation Increased to \$2,868,360 Edgar Duge Appointed as Pound Master

At the regular meeting of the City Council Tuesday night the bid of T. H. Lee of Corpus Christi on the sewer plant and ground storage tank was accepted.

Mr. Lee's bid of \$55,319.00 was the lowest of seven bids submitted. Included in Lee's bid were the following six items: Settling tank, \$23,819; trickling filter, \$12,766; sludge beds, \$2,868; plant piping, \$3,956; 200,000 gallon surface storage tank, \$9,232; demolishing existing plant \$2,678. Construction on the sewer plant will start immediately.

Refugio County Portion Of State Highway 35 To Be Repaired

Highway projects in three area counties were among 56 proposed projects on which bids were received by the State Highway Department in Austin yesterday.

Bids received yesterday totaled \$5,162,945, boosting the total involved in the two-day bidding to \$10,996,609.

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Goose Island Offers Picnic Area Away From Crowds

The following article, written by Travis Moorman, on Goose Island State Park, appeared in the July 11 issue of the Corpus Christi Caller-Times:

Goose Island is the answer to the vacationer or the weekend visitor who wants to get away from crowded streets and busy highways to enjoy leisure hours out in the open where nature remains unspoiled.

The 152-acre park overlooks St. Charles and Aransas Bays, a few miles north of Rockport. It is easily accessible from Highway 35 and attracts many tourists for drives along its all-weather roads as a welcome break to highway travel.

Shaded by live oak, sweet bay, huisache, and mesquite, the park's popularity for picnicking, overnight camping and fishing is growing each year. The eight campsite shelters along the shore of Aransas Bay are seldom idle during the summer months.

The shelters are equipped with running water, electricity, a concrete table, and barbecue pit. They are equally popular as overnight camp sites and mid-day havens for fishermen attracted to the area by the reds and trout in the two bays. Rates for the shelters are \$1.50 for overnight camping and all for day-time picnicking.

Other picnic tables with stone furnaces are set up in a large concession building. This picnic area, free to all comers, is the most popular spot in the park as family groups from Corpus Christi to Houston use the facilities for picnic dinners.

Unlike many other picnic grounds, the one at Goose Island is free of the proverbial picnic ant, and lunches may be eaten here free of dirt and sand so common

to outdoor lunching.

One of the park's main attractions for sight-seers is the Big Tree, believed to be 2,000 years old. It measures approximately 60 feet around the base and the gnarled, weather-beaten limbs of the oak shade a wide area. This oak was old before Columbus sailed the Atlantic Ocean and was well on its way to becoming a full-grown tree when Christ was born in Bethlehem. The tourist is directed to the tree by road signs throughout the park area.

Trout and redfish have been abundant in the neighboring bays this summer. This park has six boats with motors to rent to parties who wish to fish off-shore, and bait and ice are now sold in the park.

Summer is not the only busy season at Goose Island. Its facilities are taxed to the limit during duck and goose season by hunters who hide in blinds by day and camp out under the stars by night. In late February and early March, the acres of bluebonnets and flowering desert cacti in the park attract amateur photographers by the score intent on capturing the beauty of these fragile flowers in their tropical setting.

Appellate Courts Insure Justice

The institution of appellate courts, of which the U. S. Supreme Court is the highest, illustrates how America has tackled the problem of attaining justice. The idea of justice in the abstract is difficult to come by. It is perhaps even more difficult to translate into human conduct and apply in the settlement of individual cases.

How does a case come before an appellate court? If you and your neighbor have a dispute over the property line between your two lots, you would be foolish to go to court for a settlement if you did not believe that right was on your side. Therefore, practically every civil action that comes before a trial court originates in an honest difference of opinion as to what the law or the facts of that case are.

But right cannot be on both sides; so one or the other of the litigants must be mistaken. When you seek legal counsel on such a question, it frequently happens that your lawyer will advise you not to go to court. Only a relatively small percentage of cases reach trial. The law is clear enough so that among the millions of transactions taking place in the country only a relative few ever result in lawsuits.

But suppose you and your lawyer have decided that your case has enough merit to warrant going to court. The facts on both sides are presented, the lawyers on both sides argue the merits of their clients' cases and the court is then called upon to render a decision. In some cases this decision will be based on findings of a jury. The vast majority of the cases are settled then and there with the decision of the trial judge.

But judges, like all of us, are human, and the law is complicated and subject to varied interpretation. At times the trial judge may err in admitting or evaluating the facts, or in interpreting the law applicable to the facts. Under such circumstances your case may be

appealed to an appellate court.

Some states have no intermediate courts between the trial court and the state Supreme Court. In such states a case from District Court is appealed directly to the Supreme Court, the highest court of appeal in the state.

In Texas, cases are appealed from a District Court to one of eleven Courts of Civil Appeals. Sometimes the judgment of the latter court is final, as in ordinary divorce cases not involving property. But if the case meets certain requirements it may be further appealed to the Supreme Court of Texas. Criminal cases are appealed directly from the District Court to the Court of Criminal Appeals, which is the highest state court in criminal matters.

Federal cases are appealed from a U. S. District Court to a Circuit Court of Appeals and from there to the Supreme Court of the United States, provided the latter will assume jurisdiction of the matter. When you appeal your case, you ask that the error you believe you have found be corrected. If it was an error, that is what will happen—the trial judge's decision will be reversed.

Sometimes the courts are compelled to decide a question one way because the law says so, but the results bring to light serious defects on the existing law. When such an injustice is discovered, the legislature may remedy the defect by passing laws to correct it.

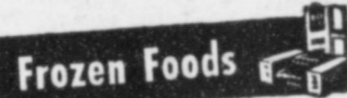

VACATION DRIVING IS BIG BUSINESS

"Vacation driving is big business," Col. E. B. Tilley of Houston, president of the Texas Safety Association, and services advisor for the Gulf Oil Corporation, said today.

He spoke in connection with the July vacation driving traffic safety program his organization is sponsoring in Texas this month in cooperation with the National Safety Council.

"The American habit of vacation travel has grown to such an extent that tourists now spend about 10 billion dollars annually on auto trips," he said.

"Highway travel has become so heavy during the summer months that a definite traffic safety problem has been created."

"According to the American Automobile Association," Colonel Tilley explained, "a total of 66 million persons, traveling in 22 million cars, take automobile vacations during the year. The average car travels 1,200 miles in 11 days of travel."

"Since about 70 per cent of vacation travel is done during the six months between April and Septem-

ber," he said, "a big extra load is placed on the nation's highways during the summer months."

And for years, he pointed out, this increased summer travel has been accompanied by increased traffic accident fatalities.

"Every year, with the coming of warmer weather, pleasure driving becomes more extensive," Colonel Tilley said. "When this happens, it becomes more important than ever for the motorist who wants to avoid accidents to practice alertness and caution behind the wheel. Good planning before a trip also is important."

"And I can't emphasize too strongly the value of courtesy in preventing accidents on our highways and streets. The safe driver makes courtesy his code of the road, and also is ready always to recognize and acknowledge the courteous acts of others."

He urged all vacationists to heed the July slogan of the Texas Safety Association, the Texas Department of Public Safety and the National Safety Council, "Vacation Time — Make Courtesy Your Code of the road."

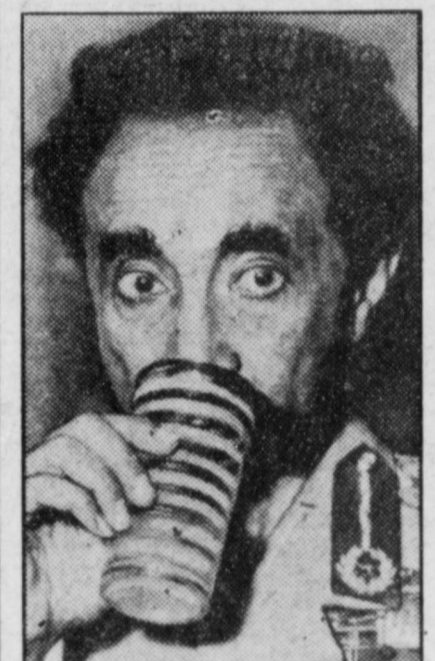

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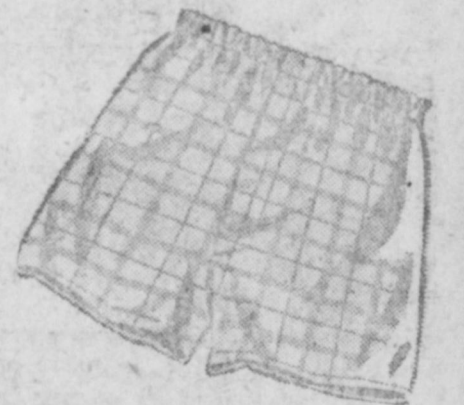

SOME INSECTICIDES CAN CAUSE DEATH FOR HUMANS

Austin, Texas. — Walk into practically any home gardening supply store in the state and ask for an organic phosphate insecticide. Chances are the clerk will sell you a bottle or package without fuss or bother.

What's wrong with that? Just that organic phosphates happen to be among the most deadly of chemical compounds, for humans as well as insects.

Last year a Texas rancher accidentally killed 48 cows by spraying them with the potent insecticide. He wanted to kill their insect parasites, and didn't realize the chemical was highly toxic for all warm-blooded animals.

A six-year old Oregon boy found a bottle of TEPP, one of the organic phosphate insecticides, in a field near his home. Workmen presumably had left it after spraying an orchard. The curious lad spilled a cupful on his pants and was dead in less than 24 hours.

Conscious of the same thing happening in Texas, State Health Officer Henry A. Holle would like to make it hard for part-time home gardeners to buy the compounds.

"Used as chemists intended, organic phosphates are a great help in fighting agricultural pests," says the health official. "Used indiscriminately without protective clothing, they're lethal."

Organic phosphates were developed in Germany after the last war. They are the chemists' answer to demands from agricultural men for a real bug killer to combat hordes of insects which do billions of dollars of damage to crops annually.

In the hands of professionals, trained in precautions to be taken in using them, chances of accidents are slight. But in recent years, bottles and packages have appeared on retail shelves for home gardening use. Since then, incidents of human poisoning have increased.

The three most important types are tetraethylpyrophosphate (TEPP), hexaethylethyltriphosphate (HETP), and parathion. All are sold under various trade names. Most manufacturers spell out in bold black or red letters the fact that the contents are highly hazardous for humans, and recommend wearing respirators, rubber gloves, coveralls, and a rubber cap or hat when using the sprays. But warning labels don't always help.

Dr. Holle thinks legislation regulating sale of organic phosphates for home use would help. But without legislations, he says, it's up to users to read warning labels and believe what they read.

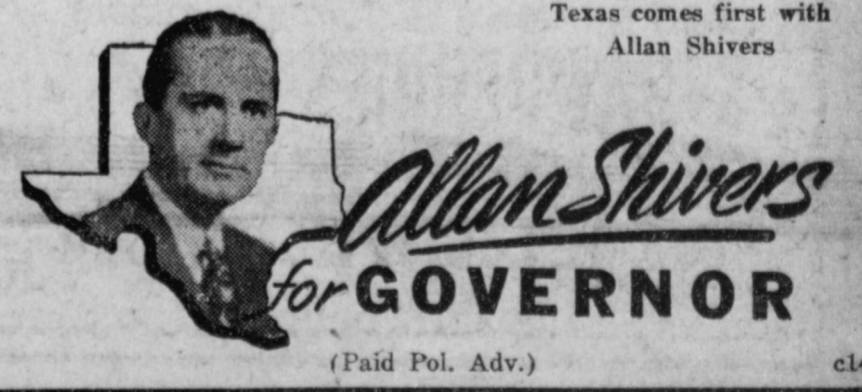

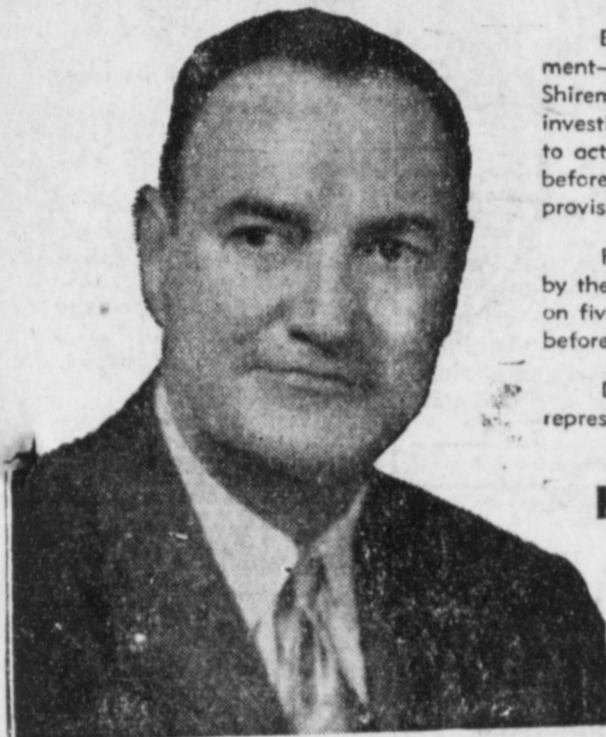

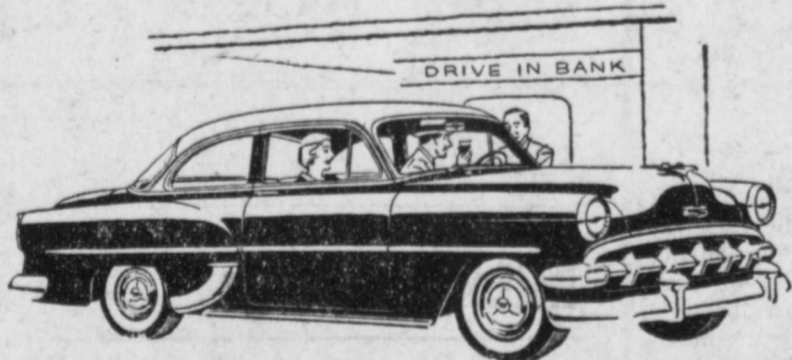
