Wildcat Cores Below 8,634 Feet

A. O. Morgan No. 1 D. W. Grant and Clyde Jennings, Aransas County wildcat 2 1/2 miles west-southwest of Rockport in Charles Zenn Survey, was coring below 8,634 feet.

There was a steady flow throughout the 20-minute drill-stem test through 1/4-inch chokes from 8,616-19 feet. Recovery was the 2,000-foot water cushion with bottomhole flowing pressure 975 pounds and 10-minute shutin pressure 1,900 pounds. Location is on a 247-acre lease.

Renwar Oil Corp. No. A-1 Travis Bailey, third producer for West Rockport Field 3 1/2 miles northwest of Rockport, was completed for a 24-hour flow of 80 barrels of 39.5 gravity, pipeline oil. The flow was through 1/4-inch choke from perforations at 8,812-15 feet in 7-inch casing which was set at 9,922 feet, one foot off bottom. Gas-oil ratio was 3,850-1. Flowing pressure was 750 pounds on the tubing and 2,925 pounds on the casing. Location is on a 164.4-acre lease in J. G. Smith Survey, A-239.

Sun Oil Co. No. 1 J. F. Brundrett, 3 1/2 miles west of Rockport, was coring below 7,082 feet on an 8,500-foot permit. Location is on a 1,154-acre lease in the William S. Fulton Survey.

Heep Oil Corp. No. 2, Zeph Rouquette and others, test in the West Rockport Field 2 1/4 miles west of Rockport, was drilling below 7,010 feet on a 9,300-foot permit.

Fire Marshal Osborn Attends Training School

Carl M. Osborn, Rockport's new fire marshal, says it's the real thing.

Dense black mushrooms of smoke rose and hung high in the air over the A. and M. campus daily last week during demonstrations at the twenty-fifth annual firemen's training school.

Two four-room frame houses, an auto drenched with gasoline, petroleum transport trucks, oil pits and butane tanks were set ablaze to give firemen "combat" experience. More than \$750,000 worth of equipment was put to use.

More than 1000 firemen and fire marshals from 312 cities in Texas, 15 from other states, 33 military establishments and 47 industrial plants attended.

Col. H. R. Brayton of the engineering extension service was director of the school, conducted under the auspices of the State Firemen's and Fire Marshal's Association.

Osborn attended the training school at A. and M. College and will conduct training classes for the local volunteer firemen and supervise an overall survey of fire hazards, which will save everyone insured in the city thousands of dollars in reduced insurance premiums, and fire losses. The credit earned by Mr. Osborn's passing of the tests at the school will mean several thousands dollars reduction in future fire insurance premiums paid here and with the cooperation of the merchants and homeowners in the reduction of fire hazards many more thousands in premiums can be saved.

It is estimated that these training schools are now saving the state yearly \$100,000.00 in insurance premiums alone, also the savings in loss of property and lives, through better fire prevention methods and fire fighting practices, is nearly a billion dollars a year.

CPL Asks That No Posters Be Attached to Poles

Political campaigns mean extra work for Central Power and Light Company employees—the tedious, time-consuming job of removing thousands of posters from utility poles.

There are three principal reasons why campaign posters should not be put on utility poles in the first place. B. T. Hardeman, CPL manager in Rockport, explained this week. Reason one: the practice is illegal in most communities. Reason two: Posters on utility poles create a serious accident hazard. If a lineman's or serviceman's climbers strike a nail or tack, they may be deflected and cause a bad fall. Reason three: An accumulation of posters on utility poles is unsightly.

Hardeman appealed to political candidates and their supporters, in the interests of civic beautification and safety, to refrain from posting campaign literature on utility poles.

Former Rockport Resident Dies In Refugio

REFUGIO—Vivian V. Bailey, 58, local businessman and civic leader, died Wednesday.

Bailey was born June 29, 1896, at Rockport, son of Norton Bailey, and moved to Refugio in 1912.

For 32 years he has been a partner in the Shelton-Bailey Motor Co. here and is an associate of the Refugio Oil Co. He has served as a member of the board of directors of the First National Bank of Refugio.

For 10 years Bailey served as secretary and member of the board of trustees of the Refugio school system. He was a director and the first president of the Refugio Chamber of Commerce; a past president of the Rotary Club; treasurer and for 33 years an elder of the First Presbyterian Church.

Surviving are his wife; a daughter, Mrs. Jack Kines of Corpus Christi; and a son, Charles Bailey of Austin.

Funeral services were held at 4 p.m. Thursday (today) at the First Presbyterian Church with the Rev. Allen Smith officiating. Burial was in Refugio cemetery under the direction of Zarsky Funeral Home.

Large Turnout of Voters Expected for Democratic Primary Election Saturday As Hard-fought Campaign Ends

When voters go to the polls, Saturday, July 24, they will bring to a close another hard fought primary political campaign.

Candidates seeking national and state offices have been visiting in Aransas County, contacting local voters, and several have made political speeches, creating quite a bit of interest in these offices, locally.

Citizens of Aransas County always take considerable interest in these primary election and there should be better than 1,500 votes cast here next Saturday. There are 1,253 paid poll taxes, 30 ex-

emptions and a large number of persons too old to pay poll tax who should vote.

There are two races for state offices which are drawing considerable attention, the governor's race with four candidates, two from Travis County, one from Jefferson County and one from Dallas County all seeking the office. The race for United States Congressman, from the 14th District, also has four candidates running, three who live in Nueces County and one from DeWitt County.

The only office in Aransas County which has more than one candidate for it is that of Commissioner of Precinct No. 2. J. M. (Jack) Sparks, Jr., the incumbent is serving his fourth term. His opponent R. Y. (Bob) Ayers, Jr., is running for this office for the first time. Mr. Ayers was School Tax Assessor and collector for four years.

The polls for the election will open at 7:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m., Saturday, July 24. The polling places are: Precinct 1, Fire Station, Rockport; A-1, Harbor Village Courts, Aransas Pass; 2, Aransas County Court House; 3, Fulton school building; 4, the Concession Hall in the State Park at Lamar.
