Although there has been some very windy weather in this area the past week, there have been some fine catches of fish brought in.

Mr. and Mrs. Ones Ross, of Jolly, Texas, Fern Lancaster and Mr. and Mrs. Shorty Townsend fished down at the Laguna from Tuesday until Friday last week, catching some very nice fish. They did not bring in any weighing less than 1½ pounds, although there were some rats. They brought home over 100 pounds of fish.

The redfish are running out at the Jolly Roger pier now and some flounders are being caught. There was over 40 pounds of redfish caught off the pier with a cane pole, one night.

A. R. Parker and party of four, of Houston, fished with Hugh Morrison on the Rambler last Saturday. It was quite windy, but they brought in 47 fish. Sunday Gene Pilgrim and party of four, of San Antonio, landed 67. Monday Jas. E. Gunn and wife and son of Borger, out with Morrison, got 48, and although it was very windy Wednesday, Dr. J. Gross and party of three, of Houston, hooked 36 trout and one drum.

Earle Thomas had Mr. Harrison of Kerrville out fishing. They brought in 38 trout. Monday Dr. Spence and family of Raymondville fished with Thomas. They had to come in early, but had caught 36 trout before 9:30 a.m. James Cox and Earle Thomas went fishing together Tuesday morning. They caught 56 trout before 10 o'clock. Wednesday Mr. and Mrs. Carl Schuerring, of Garwood, landed 56 trout and 5 rat reds.

Out at Snug Harbor they are landing quite a few gaff tops and some drum. Trout are caught if the fishermen can find a calm time early in the morning. There is plenty of live bait on hand out there.

Aransas Test Gets Shows; Wildcat Fails

Heep Oil Corp. No. 2 Zeph Rouquette and others, indicated producer in Aransas County's West Rockport Field 2½ miles west of Rockport, was drilling ahead below 8,832 feet on a 9,300-foot permit after testing gas and oil on three tests.

Working pressure was 80 pounds and recovery was the 1,500-foot gas-cut water cushion and rathole mud on a 20-minute drillstem test through ¼-inch chokes from 8,808-21 feet. Bottomhole flowing pressure was 875 pounds and shut-in pressure 3,625 pounds.

The project started unloading water cushion and oil for 30 minutes after 10 stands were pulled following a 20-minute drillstems test through ¼-inch chokes under a 1,500-foot water cushion from 8,823-26 feet. Recovery was 930 feet of clean, pipeline oil. Bottom-hole flowing pressure was 3,325 pounds and shut-in pressure 3,925 pounds.

Working pressure was 32 pounds and recovery was 2,200 feet of pipeline oil, 30 feet of mud-cut oil and water, and 60 feet of salt on a 20-minute drillstem test through ¼-inch chokes from 8,828-32 feet.

A. O. Morgan No. 1 D. W. Grant and Clyde Jennings, wildcat 2¼ miles west-southwest of Rockport in Charles Zenn Survey, has been plugged and abandoned at 9,540 feet. Recovery was 2,800 feet of salt water on a drillstem test from 9,509-38 feet.

William Herbert Hunt Trustee Estate No. 21 Spencer-Kent-Crane, slated 5,300-foot Fulton Beach Field test two miles north of Fulton in Gilliland Survey, A-70, is 2,100 feet from the northeast line and 2,400 feet from the west line (shore line) of the 720-acre lease.

Sun Oil Co. No. 1 J. D. Brundrett, wildcat 3¼ miles west of Rockport, has been abandoned at 8,507 feet. Location is on a 1,154-acre lease in the William S. Fulton Survey.

NO FATAL ACCIDENTS IN COUNTY DURING '54

During June there were no fatal, no personal injury and three property damage accidents occurring in Aransas County reported to the Corpus Christi district office of the Texas Highway Patrol.

The three accidents resulted in property damage estimated at \$1,150.

During the first six months of 1954 there were no fatal, three personal injury, and 25 property damage accidents reported in Aransas County. The total of 28 accidents resulted in injuries to four persons and property damage estimated at \$13,175 compared with two deaths, four persons injured, and property damage estimated at \$16,175 in the same period of 1953.

The only counties in the district free of traffic deaths in the first half of 1954 were Aransas and McMullen. The seven counties recording less traffic deaths in the first half of 1954 than in the same period of 1953 in addition to the two listed above were Duval, Kleberg, Lavaca, Live Oak, Refugio, San Patricio, and Victoria counties. There was the same number of deaths in each period in Jim Wells County. There were more traffic deaths in the first half of 1954 than in the same period in Bee, Calhoun, DeWitt, Goliad, Jackson, and Nueces Counties.

Sgt. Paul Oder reports that in the first half of 1954 Highway Patrolmen stationed in the Corpus Christi district made 3,704 arrests. One thousand sixty-five of the arrests were made in Nueces County, more than were made in any other county in the district. This was followed by San Patricio County in which there were 477 arrests made.

Commissioners Hold Court Saturday

The County Commissioners Court met in regular session Saturday, July 31 with the following members present: County Judge John D. Wendell and Commissioners W. B. Allen, A. L. Davis and J. H. Mills. It was moved by Commissioner Allen that the \$1,769.45, the county's share of the surplus in the lateral road account, be returned to the county for maintenance of lateral roads.

The court voted to purchase the City of Rockport Seawall and Breakwater Refunding Bonds at 4½%, in the amount of \$16,000 from the Southwest Company, Investment Brokers.

The county clerk and treasurer were ordered to issue warrants to purchase the bonds.

After a lengthy discussion the commissioners decided that they could not give a long time lease or sell certain portions of airport property along Copano Bay to the Game Fish and Oyster Commission for hatcheries, due to CAA regulations and other legal complications.

March of Dimes Drive Headed By Mrs. R. L. Hart

Mrs. R. L. Hart has been appointed County Chairman for the Emergency March of Dimes which will run from August 16 through August 31, to raise money for the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

People ask, "Why an emergency?" Because not enough money was raised in the January March of Dimes to provide for both patients and polio prevention.

There were a third more cases of polio reported in the first half of 1954 than the average over the same period over the last five years, and signs indicate at least 40,000 new cases by the end of the year, plus the 67,000 patients carried over from 1953.

Then the provision of increased amounts of gamma globulin and the evaluation of the trial vaccine also require vast sums of money this summer.

The following are the financial facts: The estimated need for 1954 as of January was \$75,000,000 and the amount actually raised in the 1954 drive was \$55,000,000, which fell short of the estimated minimum need by \$20,000,000.

Aransas County has had cases of polio this summer. Two new cases were taken to Memorial Hospital this week. So why try to side step a plain duty?

In a Nutshell, by Basil O'Connor: "From the beginning we have been pledged to see that no polio victim, regardless of age, race, creed or color, shall go without the best available care because of inability to pay for it. The American people want and expect us to keep that pledge and tell them when we need help to do it."

City Pound Master Assumed Duties Aug. 1

Ed Duge, employed by the City of Rockport as pound master, assumed his duties August 1.


The Rockport City Council adopted an ordinance regulating the keeping of dogs within the city limits of Rockport, which was passed and approved June 1. This ordinance which appeared in print in The Pilot in its issue of June 17 explained in detail the keeping of dogs within the city limits, it also provided for a dog pound; provided for the redemption of dogs, and the disposal thereof if not redeemed. The ordinance also provided for a penalty for its violation.

All dogs running at large on the streets of Rockport and not bearing a license tag, as having been vaccinated for rabies, will be picked up, according to Mr. Duge.

To date there have been 89 licenses for dogs issued by the city, and as there are an estimated 300 to 400 dogs in the city it appears that the dog pound will be quite full.

Dog owners are urged to have their pets vaccinated and secure a license at the City Hall.

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DID YOU KNOW?

The members of the Rockport Volunteer Fire Department actually pay dues for the privilege of serving their home town. As members of the Aransas County Emergency Corps, they not only man the fire department equipment to fight city and county fires, but they are sworn to the following:

Engage in regular drills in the care and use of the pumps and hose; the use and maintenance of the different types of portable fire extinguishers, Dry Chemical, Evaporative Liquid, Soda Acid, CO₂, Foam and Wet Water; how to handle the several types of hose and special nozzles and when to use them on different classes of fires; attend first aid classes, covering the use of the fire department's resuscitator and first aid to victims in drowning, burns, auto wrecks and other accidents; the members are also pledged to aid the State Police, Sheriff's department and Red Cross in times of storm or other disaster.

These skills and the equipment the members use are at your disposal, night or day, by calling Phone 214.

The only compensation these volunteers ask is the wholehearted cooperation of the public (that is YOU) in abating the preventable hazards of FIRE; to be careful when boating or swimming and to drive carefully. This last is especially true when the department is making a run. Those pumps weigh tons and an accident with one may kill several firemen and others. Everyone is urged to check their own premises carefully, before the next official fire hazard inspection, otherwise the following infractions of the fire laws, will become a matter of insurance record:

1. Aisles or exits, insufficient or blocked
2. Boxes, barrels, etc., accumulation in or near building
3. Doors and windows to fire escapes blocked or locked
4. Electric wiring or appliances defective.
5. Fireworks stored on premises.
6. Flues, chimneys, etc., defective.
7. Furnace or boiler room unsafe.
8. Fuses bridged or incorrect capacity.
9. Gasoline or other volatiles stored in or within 30 feet of building.
10. Gasoline used for cleaning purposes.
11. Fire extinguisher charge out of date, defective or improper installation.
12. Oil or gasoline storage cans not approved type.
13. Oily mops, cloths, etc., improperly stored.
14. Paper decorations on light

fixtures or wires.

15. Rubbish or trash in yard or building.

16. Steam pipes, stove or heater vents too near woodwork or stock.

17. Stairways unsafe, blocked or nailed.

18. Stock or partitions too near stove or furnace.

19. Stove, improper installation, no metal protection underneath.

20. Gas hose defective or not approved type.

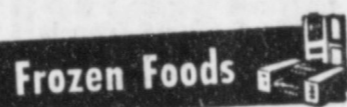

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16

proposing an Amendment to Section 19 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the qualifications for service on grand and petit juries shall not be denied or abridged by reason of sex; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 9 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualifications of grand and petit juries; provided that neither the right nor the duty to serve on grand and petit juries shall be denied or abridged by reason of sex. Whenever in the Constitution the term 'men' is used in reference to grand or petit juries, such term shall include persons of the female as well as the male sex."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon, or in counties using voting machines, such machines shall provide for the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to require women to serve on juries."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to require women to serve on juries."

Each voter shall cast his vote for or against such Constitutional Amendment either by marking out one of said clauses on the ballot and leaving the one expressing his vote, or by placing an "x" in an appropriate blank by the side of the clause on the ballot expressing his vote; this latter method to be used in all instances where voting machines are used; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have notice of same published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State. c19

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37

proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another Section to be designated Section 51g; providing that the Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable the State to enter into agreements with the Federal Government to obtain for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions coverage under the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act as amended; providing the Legislature may appropriate funds for the purpose of carrying out such agreements and may authorize the obligations necessary to obtain such coverage; prescribing the form of the ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 51f, to be designated Section 51g, to read as follows:

"Section 51g. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable the State to enter into agreements with the Federal Government to obtain for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions coverage under the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act as amended. The Legislature shall have the power to make appropriations and authorize all obligations necessary to the establishment of such Social Security coverage program."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for agreements between the State of Texas and the Federal Government to obtain Federal Social Security coverage for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for agreements between the State of Texas and the Federal Government to obtain Federal Social Security coverage for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provisions for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine and each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State. c19

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting the Legislature to fix the salary of the Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office and Secretary of State; providing that such salary shall not be fixed in an amount less than that provided in the Constitution on January 1, 1953; fixing the per diem of the members of the Legislature at \$25.00 per day for 120 days only; providing for the submission of this Resolution to a vote of the people; and directing the Governor to issue the necessary proclamation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as Compensation for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture."

Sec. 2. That Section 22 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for two years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Sec. 3. That Section 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office shall each hold office for the term of two years and until his successor is qualified; receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature; reside at the Capital of the State during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."

Sec. 4. That Section 21 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 21. There shall be a Secretary of State, who shall be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and who shall continue in office during the term of service of the Governor. He shall authenticate the publication of the laws, and keep a fair register of all official acts and proceedings of the Governor, and shall, when required, lay the same and all papers, minutes and vouchers relative thereto, before the Legislature, or either House thereof, and shall perform such other duties as may be required of him by law. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be

fixed by the Legislature."

Sec. 5. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto which shall read as follows:

"Section 61. The Legislature shall not fix the salary of the Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office or Secretary of State at a sum less than that fixed for such officials in the Constitution on January 1, 1953."

Sec. 6. That Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars per day for the first 120 days only of each session of the legislature."

"In addition to the per diem the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed \$2.50 for every 25 miles the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller, to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of a regular or called session."

Sec. 7. Said proposed Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendments shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR THE AMENDMENTS TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION PROVIDING THAT THE SALARIES OF THE GOVERNOR, THE ATTORNEY GENERAL, THE COMPTROLLER OF PUBLIC ACCOUNTS, THE STATE TREASURER, THE COMMISSIONER OF THE GENERAL LAND OFFICE, AND THE SECRETARY OF STATE, BE FIXED BY THE LEGISLATURE, AND THAT THE PER DIEM OF THE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE BE FIXED AT TWENTY-FIVE (\$25.00) DOLLARS PER DAY FOR 120 DAYS ONLY."

And those voters opposing said proposed Amendments shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENTS TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION PROVIDING THAT THE SALARIES OF THE GOVERNOR, THE ATTORNEY GENERAL, THE COMPTROLLER OF PUBLIC ACCOUNTS, THE STATE TREASURER, THE COMMISSIONER OF THE GENERAL LAND OFFICE, AND THE SECRETARY OF STATE, BE FIXED BY THE LEGISLATURE, AND THAT THE PER DIEM OF THE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE BE FIXED AT TWENTY-FIVE (\$25.00) DOLLARS PER DAY FOR 120 DAYS ONLY."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendments, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 8. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary Proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. c19

The men of the First Presbyterian Church held their monthly meeting Monday night, in the church assembly room, with the president, Pat H. Greene, presiding.

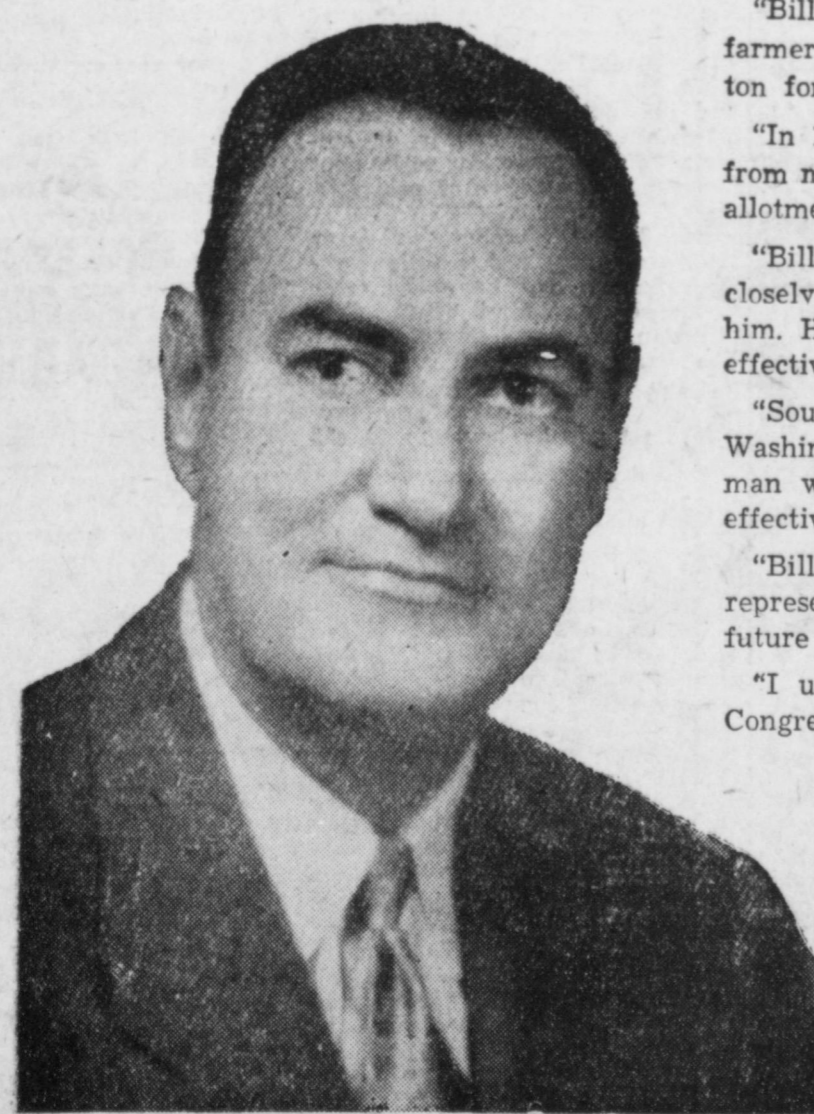

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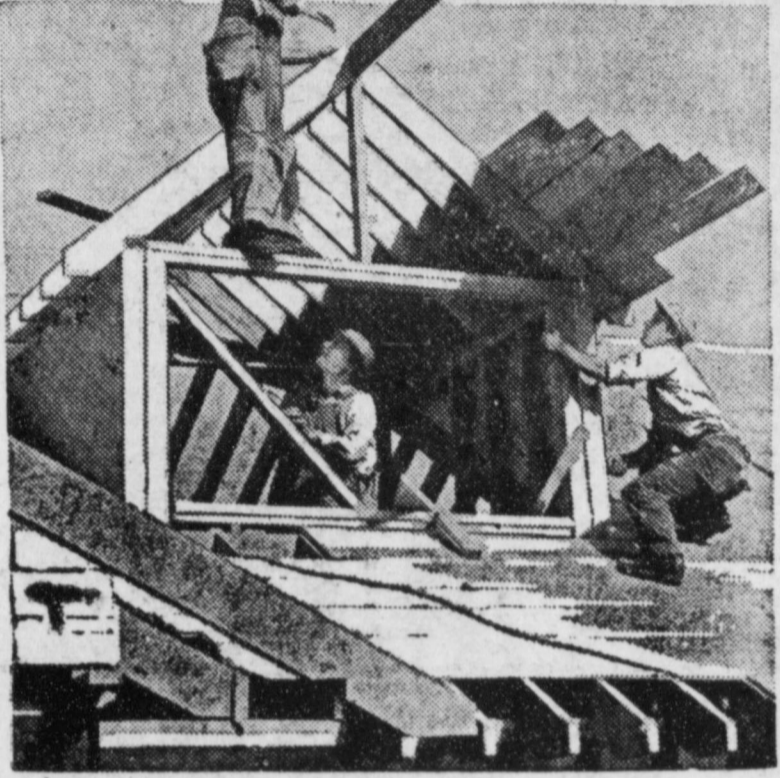

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by repealing Section 2a of Article VI and by amending Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI so as to confer the privilege to vote upon members of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Air Force, or component branches thereof who are otherwise qualified electors, and so as to limit voting by persons in the military service of the United States to the county in which the voter resided at the time of entering such service; providing for submission of the proposed amendment to the qualified electors; providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2a of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be repealed and that Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 1. The following classes of persons shall not be allowed to vote in this State, to wit:

"First: Persons under twenty-one (21) years of age.

"Second: Idiots and lunatics.

"Third: All paupers supported by any county.

"Fourth: All persons convicted of any felony, subject to such exceptions as the Legislature may make.

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like manner, the wife may pay the poll tax for her husband and receive the receipt therefor. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation. Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States, or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1954, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment of Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of Texas so as to confer the privilege to vote upon members of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Air Force, or component branches thereof, who are otherwise qualified electors; and so as to limit voting by persons in the military service of the United States to the county in which the voter resided at the time of entering such service; and for the repeal of Section 2a of Article VI of the Constitution, which now permits qualified electors in military service to vote without payment of a poll tax in time of war."

"AGAINST the amendment of Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of Texas so as to confer the privilege to vote upon members of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Air Force, or component branches thereof, who are otherwise qualified electors; and so as to limit voting by persons in the military service of the United States to the county in which the voter resided at the time of entering such service; and for the repeal of Section 2a of Article VI of the Constitution, which now permits qualified electors in military service to vote without

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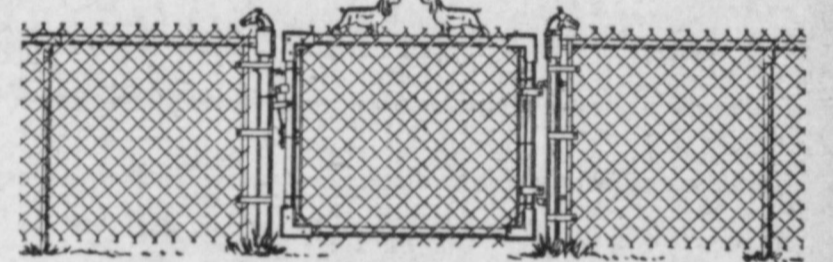

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 16a to Article VIII to provide that in counties of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants, as determined by the last preceding census of the United States, elections may be held to provide for an Assessor-Collector of Taxes; providing for submission of this Amendment to the voters of Texas; and providing the time, means and manner thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 16a shall be added to Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas so as to read as follows:

"Section 16a. In any county having a population of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants, as determined by the last preceding census of the United States, the Commissioners Court may submit to the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county at an election the question of adding an Assessor-Collector of Taxes to the list of authorized county officials. If a majority of such voters voting in such election shall approve of adding an Assessor-Collector of Taxes to such list, then such official shall be elected at the next General Election for such Constitutional term of office as is provided for other Tax Assessor-Collectors in this State."

Sec. 2. The Foregoing Constitu-

tional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at the General Election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amend-
