## NO FATAL ACCIDENTS | Commissioners Hold IN COUNTY DURING '54 Court Saturday

During June there were no fatal, no personal injury and three property damage accidents occurring in Aransas Coounty reported to

The three accidents resulted in property damage estimated at \$1,-

During the first six months of 1954 there were no fatal, three personal injury, and 25 property damage accidents reported Aransas County. The total of 28 accidents resulted in injuries to four persons and property damage estimated at \$13,175 compared with two deaths, four persons injured, and property damage estimated at \$16,175 in the same period of 1953.

The only counties in the district free of traffic deaths in the first half of 1954 were Aransas and Mc-Mullen. The seven counties recording less traffic deaths in the first half of 1954 than in the same period of 1953 in addition to the two listed above were Duval, Kleberg, Lavaca, Live Oak, Refugio San Patricio, and Victoria counties. # Woman's Club Will Meet Next Tuesday



# "but electric service stayed on"

Recent record-breaking floods on the Rio Grande and Devils River temporarily disabled four of Central Power and Light Company's generating plants, but electric service stayed on.
