

Fishing is Stable Source of Income for Aransas Co.

ACHS Trounces Benavides In First Conference Game

Fumbles, Penalties, and Injuries Mar Game In Which Camehl, Bradshaw, and Clingman Tally For Rockport; Eagles Score On Gallop By Sanex

In their first District 31-A game of the season, the ACHS Pirates scuttled the Benavides Eagles by a score of 33-6.

Scoring started in the first quarter when Eddie Morrison passed 22 yards up field to where Bradshaw, waiting just short of the goal line, took it in and stepped across for the score. Bradshaw added the extra point.

The two teams spent the remainder of the first half trading fumbles. The Eagles threatened just before the half when a pass play that was good for 35 yards carried down to about the Pirate 10. However, the Pirate line held, and the ball went over on downs.

Early in the third quarter, Ernest Camehl took a fake punt hand off and skirting left end, loped 45 yards along the sideline to paydirt, aided by Clingman. Continued on Page 4

Saturday David Harries of Grand Prairie, Texas, fished with Fred Christilles, and caught 97 trout. Monday a party of eight men flew in to fish with him, coming from Duncan, Oklahoma. Despite the bad weather they went out but caught only five or six trout.

Whooping Cranes Head South, To Reach Texas In Mid-November

One of the continent's most gripping gambles with death—the annual autumn flight of the whooping cranes from beyond Great Slave Lake to the Gulf of Mexico—is under way.

On its 2,000-mile journey, the little band of valiant travelers will get everything but actual aerial company from authorities in an effort to silence the millions of waterfowl hunters' guns in their lane of passage.

Only a few need to speak to bring racial disaster to the score or so of surviving birds, and defeat to a 15-year protective project that is just about unrivaled for the way it has joined international, federal, state and private conservation groups in a united effort.

Twenty-four birds went north last spring—six more than there were in the remnant flock when intensive protection began. Of these, 21 were mature birds, three represented the 1953 crop of young. How many more—or less—rose from the mysterious nesting grounds in the northwest territories south of the Arctic Circle have not yet been determined.

It was only this summer, says Assistant Director Ernest Swift of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife

Service, that the approximate nesting ground itself was located by Canadian Wildlife Service officials carrying on a survey by helicopter. When pinpointed, it too will be made a sanctuary.

The flight south to their traditional wintering ground on the 47,000-acre Aransas National Wildlife Refuge 45 miles north of Rockport, will carry the giant birds over Alberta, Saskatchewan, North and South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas and Oklahoma. The old birds—standing five feet tall with a wingspread of seven feet—are white except for black wingtips. The young are rust-colored.

Along the way, the birds always have stopped for a time in central Nebraska where the Platte River makes its loop southward. Swift says there have been more valuable observations made of the birds at that spot than at all other places combined.

The 1953 fall flight was the first since 1949 when none of the booming-voiced birds were killed. Two were shot in 1952. There also are two whoopers, crippled by gunshot but saved from death, in the New Orleans zoo.

The traveling flock is expected to reach Texas about mid-November.

Other Fishermen Catch Texas Tuna, Seeking New Fishery By-passed By Texans for Shrimp

Between May 1 and October 1, the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service Vessel, Oregon, caught 361 yellowfin tuna, weighing over 38,000 pounds, in the western Gulf of Mexico, yet other fishermen are beating Texans to them, just as they did to the red shrimp possibilities in deep water.

When the Oregon left Pascagoula, Miss., last May, she had seven miles of trotline aboard. This she proceeded to set in areas where the experts had said there couldn't possibly be any tuna. The tuna didn't know it, and despite the croaking, the Oregon hit the jackpot, and returned to port with 3,000 pounds of yellowfins.

Rockport-Fulton Earnings Are Over \$1,250,000 Annually

Shrimp Sales Alone Gross That Amount Yearly; Repairs to Pleasure Craft and Charter Boats Help Raise the Ante to Respectable Proportions

Shrimp sales in Rockport and Fulton gross slightly more than \$1,250,000 per year, practically all of which is spent again in the area. This forms the largest single source of income in Aransas County, with the exception of oil. These figures, taken from sales actually reported by the fish houses, are probably more accurate than those used two weeks ago in reporting tourist income, when the statistics

Rockport Harbor is used by approximately 40 shrimp boats, 18 party boats, 14 work boats, 40 pleasure boats, one tug, four barges, five sail boats and a number of other small boats of various types. More operate from Fulton.

Capital investment in the fishing business of Aransas County amounts to roughly \$1,500,000.00; annual expense is approximately one third that amount. Additional income is derived from repair of pleasure craft, charter boats, oil company vessels, and similar floating equipment, so that the total, including money derived from the sale of shrimp, probably amounts to nearly \$2,000,000 per year.

Woodsboro Eagles knocked off the Sundeen Eagles 26-7 at Woodsboro Friday night in their first 31-A conference game. All four Woodsboro scores were chalked up after a previous spectacular play while Sundeen's lone tally came after a sustained fourth quarter drive.

Woodsboro broke into the scoring column early in the second quarter after recovering a blocked punt on the Sundeen 1-yard line. Guy Meissner plunged over on the first play from scrimmage, Billy Grimes carried over for the extra.

Meissner again tallied in the second after a sweeping 21-yard right end run. The extra point attempt failed.

A 30-yard pass play from Gene Wilkins to Charles Boenig set up Meissner again carried over from the 1-yard line. Robert Duncan rushed the extra point.

A one-man-backfield of Meissner organized the final Woodsboro score as he romped 48 yards to the Sundeen 4, just missing an unassisted touchdown, Duncan carried the pigskin over to make it official. The extra point attempt failed.

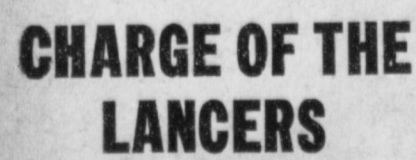

dustries attendant upon it are along the Texas coast.

At one time it was estimated that commercial seafood business had an investment in Texas of around \$40,325,000. In this were considered not only investments existing directly along the coast, but also those of inland retailers, wholesalers, and freezing plants dealing in marine products. A year or so later, the Texas Game and Fish Commission, in a little publicized report made by A. W. Anderson, now of the Navy Biological section in Washington, published some exceedingly interesting figures. These, although five years old, are still by far the most accurate survey ever made of the situation, and it might be interesting to quote a few of them.

At that time, along the entire coast of Texas, there were 83 fish houses, valued at \$2,583,000. The annual payroll, for permanent and part-time employees, amounted to \$1,177,000. Fish houses owned 150 trucks, valued at \$329,000, and they spent \$166,000 a year operating them. 1,393 fishing boats were appraised at \$7,383,000, and their annual expenses were \$3,325,000.

Freezing and cold storage capacity for the coast exceeded 3 1/2 million pounds; there were 21 shipyards, worth \$1,163,000, with an annual payroll of \$575,000. There were 114 charter boats, valued at \$415,000. They cost \$147,000 a year to maintain and operate.

Capital investment for the whole coast was \$12,333,000; expense was \$6,029,400.

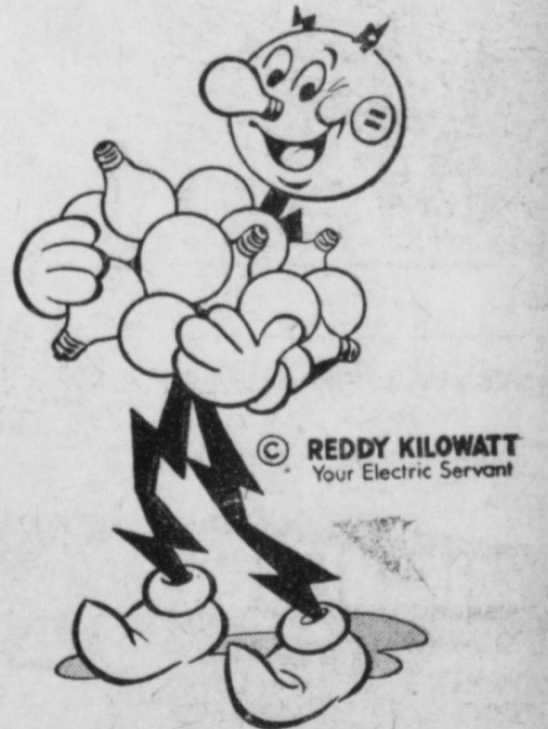

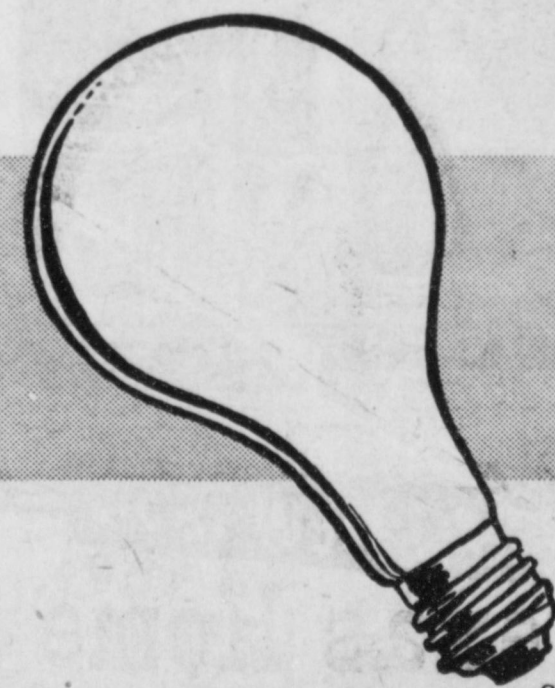

Retirement and Family Insurance Not Limited To Taxes Paid

"Will these payments continue until I have drawn out all I paid in, or how long will they be paid?" That question is often asked at the Social Security office by those who claim their retirement and family insurance payments.

"The answer is," according to H. M. Cleveland, Manager of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration, "that the payments will continue as long as there is a person living who is entitled to receive payments on the account. Beneficiaries may receive much more than was ever paid in on the account, or they may receive less."

"Social Security is not a savings account," Cleveland said, "which you can draw on only until it is exhausted. It is insurance which pays regular monthly payments to partially replace earnings which are cut off or reduced in retirement or death."

Texas forests are rapidly increasing in size, the Texas Lumber Manufacturing Association said.

Results of a survey the association made showed Southern Yellow Pine timber, the basic construction wood of Texas, is being scientifically grown much faster than it is being cut.

Clyde Thompson of Diboll, president of the association, said "Our survey of East Texas' vast piney woods shows growth of timber now exceeds removal by more than 33 per cent."

He said that nearly 2,300 Texas lumber mills and factories are producing timber products. He placed the value of their output at \$550 million a year.

Texas leads the nation in scientifically operated tree farms with 570 in East Texas covering 3,366,375 acres.

Mexico Bill Proposes Upping Fishing Fine

Mexico City, Sept. 30.—A bill increasing fines for foreigners fishing in Mexican waters and establishing jail sentences was offered in Congress today.

The bill was drafted by the executive branch, which virtually assures its passage. It is aimed at reserving fishing rights in Mexican waters for Mexicans and at stamping out foreign fishing in territorial waters.

The measure would increase the present maximum fine for foreign fishing boats from 5,000 pesos to 50,000 (\$400 to \$4,000). It would also provide for jail sentences of from one to eight years for foreigners convicted of fishing in Mexican waters.

Mexico annually arrests half a

dozen or so U.S. fishing boats on charges of fishing within nine miles of shore. The boats are almost invariably fined 1,000 to 5,000 pesos and released after nets and catch are seized.

The bill would also provide that only Mexicans may fish for the Mexican market. Permits can be given foreign boats to work in Mexican waters, as is done now on the Pacific Coast, but these boats must sell their catch outside Mexico and pay a tax on it. The foreign boats working under permit must also deposit a bond to cover any fines for violation of fishing laws.

A 30-foot ground swell in the Gulf of Mexico caused huge waves which grounded at least two shrimp boats last Thursday.

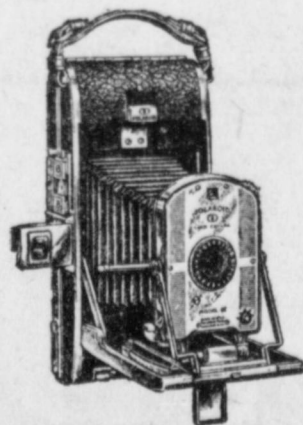

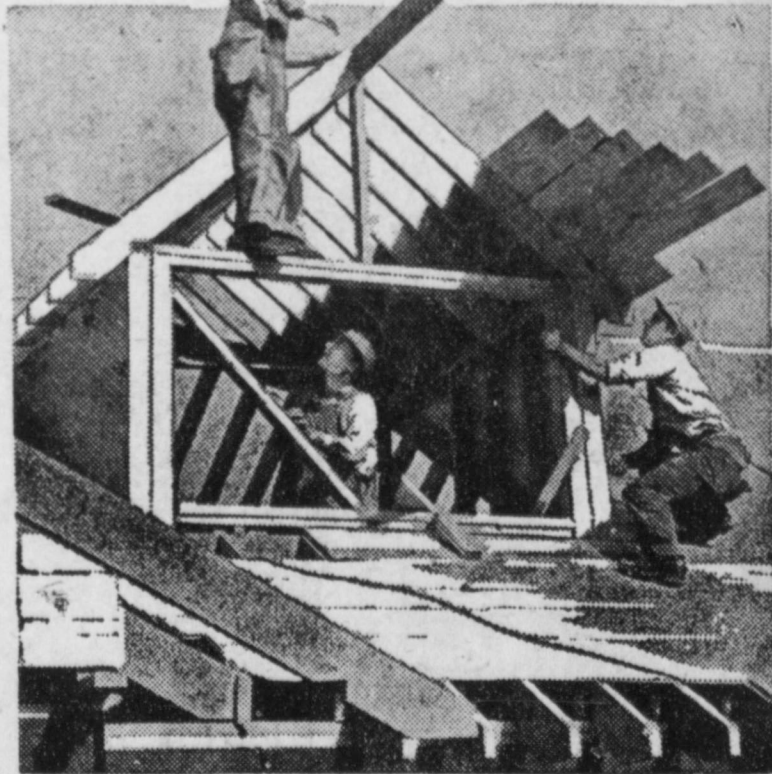
