Entries for the show will be received from 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. All exhibits must be removed after 8:00 p.m. on the evening of the show. It is requested that all horticulture specimens be labeled with correct names, wherever possible. The committee will provide containers for all specimen classes, and the club will exercise due caution in safeguarding the exhibits and containers, but will not be responsible for damage and loss. Anyone residing in Aransas County is invited to enter any and all classes.

BOAT RAMP BILL KILLED IN HOUSE

After wrangling over it most of the day the House finally killed a bill by Rep. Charles Murphy of Houston to allow the state to build motor boat facilities on Texas bays and rivers.

Lengthy debate over the Murphy measure developed as its opponents thought it might cause the Highway Department to build pleasure facilities in some counties rather than needed roads in others. It would have provided launching ramps for boats.

Murphy described his bill as minor legislation and said he could not understand all the opposition to it.

The bill had been recommended by the Committee on Highways and Roads.

Local Singers Perform In Presentation of Faust At Corpus Christi

Two Rockport singers, Mrs. Mario Scorza and her daughter, Yolanda, performed in the ensemble last Thursday night, as the Corpus Christi "Pops" Concert Association, Inc., and Clarence's Cramer's Opera Festival, of Chicago, presented Gounod's opera, Faust, to an appreciative audience.

Mrs. Scorza, who has had extensive experience as a lyric soprano, has sung in religious oratorios as far as the west coast, and, since she has been living here, has formed the Bach and Handel Oratorio Society, among the singers of Aransas Pass, Ingleside and Taft.

As Frederick Vajda, the conductor was aware of this experience, he contacted Mrs. Scorza and her daughter, and asked them to form a part of the ensemble in this, Corpus Christi's first opera.

The scene of the opera is laid in Germany of the 16th century. Faust, the aged philosopher, longs for his youth. To regain it, he sells his immortal soul to Mephistopheles, the Evil One, who reveals to him a vision of Marguerite, and the pair go in search of her, finding her at a village festival. Through the arts of Mephistopheles, Faust appears as a young man. Valentine, Marguerite's brother, is on his way to the wars, and he leaves his sister with Siebel, a youth timidly in love with her.

Mephistopheles contrives a meeting between Faust and Marguerite; later he casts a spell over Marguerite's home, allowing her and Faust to meet, while he (Mephistopheles) flirts with Martha, the chaperone.

After a lapse of time, Marguerite is again seen, deserted by Faust, who has left her with child. Valentine returns and is killed by Faust, cursing his sister as he dies. Marguerite, deserted by her friends, seeks solace in the cathedral, but the voices of demons drive her to madness, and she kills her child, for which she is sent to prison. Here Faust visits her, in company with Mephistopheles. At the sight of the demon she takes refuge in prayer. As the final curtain descends, a chorus of angels attends her, chanting her salvation through repentance, while Mephistopheles drags Faust to the underworld to fulfill his compact. The lead was taken by Virginia

McWatters, and she was supported by a cast consisting of Rosalind Nadell, who played both Siebel and Martha, John Drury, as Faust, Donald Dickson, as Marguerite's brother, Jan Gbur as Mephistopheles, and Dave Chapman, as Wagner.

The peasants, townspeople, and soldiers and so on, were played by local people from Corpus Christi and the surrounding territory, among who were Mrs. Scorza and Yolanda.

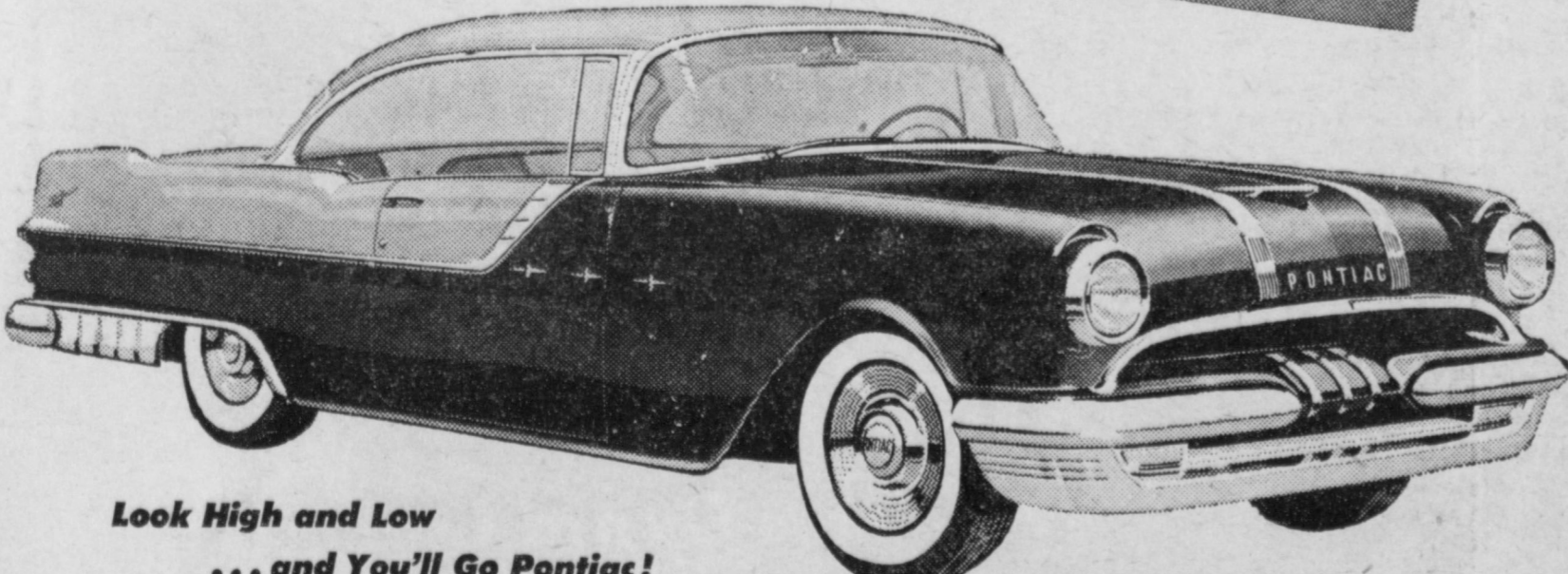
