

C. of C. Directors Endorse Site Chosen For Courthouse

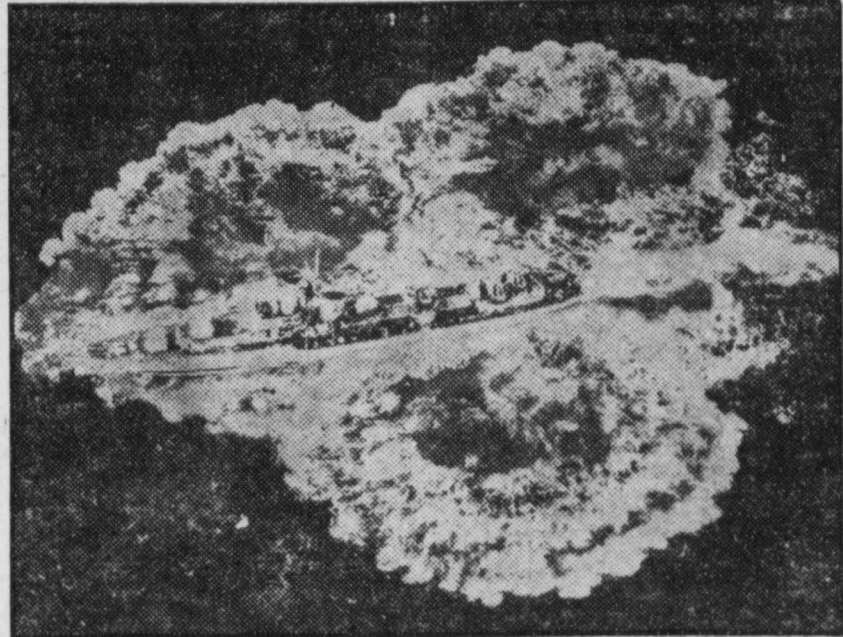
Chamber of Commerce directors, at their regular meeting Tuesday night, listened to the report of the budget committee, presented by James H. Sorenson, Jr., approved it; approved reports by the secretary and chairmen of the publicity, membership, industrial, tourist promotion, and civic affairs committees; and went on record as favoring the construction of a new courthouse on the site chosen by the

committee appointed some time ago by Judge Wendell. In addition, they discussed the formation of a United Fund drive, and authorized publicity to acquaint Rockport citizens with what such an organization can do for the committee.

The budget, as approved by the directors, amounted to \$7,873, divided as follows:

Manager's salary, \$3120; extra office help, \$125; printing and supplies, \$625; dues to organizations, \$142; expenses of manager to attend Chamber of Commerce Institute and meeting of the South Texas Chamber of Commerce, \$200; utilities, \$260; social security, \$41.10; building repairs, \$100; I.B.M. Corp. \$50; petty cash, \$175; prizes for TB X-ray, \$15; expenses attendant upon organization of banquets and luncheons, including such expenses of out-of-town speakers and entertainers as must be met, \$175; miscellaneous, \$600; committees, including tour-

Rogero and Porter Win City Slate; Elliot and Scott Elected School Trustees; County Set-up Same

Roy Rogero and Col. James W. Porter won the city council race easily Tuesday, with 141 votes being cast. Rogero received 56 votes in Precinct 2, his opponent, A. O. Burton, received only three. In Precinct 1 the race was a little closer, but Colonel Porter won handily. He polled 53 votes. A. H. Staffa, running against him, polled only 29. Porter and Staffa were competing for the place left vacant

by the expiration of the term of Charles Garrett. Rogero was running to succeed himself.

In the election for trustees of the Aransas County Independent School District, both races were close. Dr. H. F. Elliot, running to succeed himself, polled 159 votes against 121 for his opponent, Ran Wilde. At Fulton, where there was a very large turnout, the race was even hotter. Matt Scott polled 139 votes, to win by a majority of 8; J. R. DeForest polled 131.

Dick Fox, Arthur Bracht, and Fred Clobardants were unopposed for their places on the county board.

'Build New Courthouse' Says Group

The commissioners court Thursday received and accepted the recommendation of a citizens committee that the courthouse block be used as a site for a new courthouse.

Members of the committee were C. C. Fowler, Harold Picton, Zeph Rouquette and Walter Heldenfels. The group considered four locations in its study, County Judge John Wendell said. The report estimated cost of repairing the roof and windows of the courthouse at \$25,000 to \$32,000, and the cost of another site suitable for a courthouse at \$25,000 to \$30,000.

The committee was appointed by the court to study the needs of the county for a new building and investigate possible sites for its construction.

"The cost of repairs that must be made to the present building in the immediate future, its expensive maintenance that will increase year by year, and the price of another site were factors that prompted the decision that a new building be constructed on the courthouse square," Wendell said.

The court Thursday authorized Judge Wendell to set the date and order a bond election to finance construction of a courthouse. Wendell said the date for the election will not be set for several days.

Scout Meeting To Be Changed

The usual Monday night meeting of Boy Scouts of Troop 49 will be postponed until Tuesday night, because a number of the boys are going to an Order of the Arrow election at Aransas Pass on that night. On Tuesday night, here, Aransas Pass Scouts will repay the visit, and hold their election at Rockport.

Scout Master Vernon Gray reports that Mike's Service Station has donated the gas for the Scout's bus for the past two months. All of the boys, and all of the leaders and committees extend their thanks for this gift.

Deputy Sheriff Mundine Foils Prisoners' Escape Try

Attempt Made By Six Prisoners to Tunnel and Saw Out of Old Building Almost Successful As Only One Layer of Bricks Remained In Wall

Saturday night about 9:00 p. m., Deputy Sheriff Sherman Mundine was eating a late supper when one of his daughters called him to hear a curious noise coming from the jail, upstairs over his living quarters. The six prisoners now being held for next term of court were attempting to make their escape, and had completely severed a bar on one window, and partially severed another. In addition,

they had almost tunneled through the wall, only one layer of bricks remaining between them and freedom, to which they would have made their way down ropes made of blankets which they had torn up and braided.

United Fund Badly Needed In Rockport Chamber Decides

Chamber of Commerce directors at their regular meeting Tuesday night, devoted considerable time to discussion of a United Fund for Rockport, and came to the conclusion that it is badly needed.

What Is a United Fund? This was one of the first questions asked, and because a lot of other people are going to ask the question, too, it might be well at this time to give, as fully as possible, the answer.

The books say that "it is a self-governing, non-profit corporation, formed for united community action toward eliminating duplicate campaign efforts and more adequately financing voluntary essential health and welfare services. It is designed to provide for national as well as local services, and its first purpose is to bring about one combined fund-raising campaign to take the place of many separate drives. Which causes are to be combined varies from city to city, and is a matter for local cooperation and determination."

Why Is Greater Unity So Desirable?

The reason for this is not hard to see. Excessive cost of raising funds have been an obvious result of duplication. Too many campaigns — as many as one or more important drives every month of the year around — have gradually overloaded the patience of the public and brought confusion and annoyance among givers, have overworked community leadership and developed reluctance and weariness among workers. The consequence has been frequent and repeated failures to reach the goals set for the drives.

In the united campaign cities the problem became so bad that public opinion demanded action — a state that has been reached in Rockport, where many a citizen has asked, "Why don't we have a United Fund?" In these cities community leaders acted, just as they will act in Rockport if you give them your support.

Today many, many communities which are plagued with a year-round succession of fund drives are observing the progress of the United Fund drives elsewhere with interest and are asking how does a United Fund drive get started. As we have said, this question has already been asked in Rockport many times, by many people, and in the next article of this series, the answer to that question will be given.

SEISMOGRAPH CREWS STILL ACTIVE IN ROCKPORT AREA

Oil company exploration crews are still active in the Rockport area. Seven or eight of them are operating in the bays. These include General Geophysics, Keystone Exploration, Independent Exploration, Apache, Rayflex, National, Geo-Marine, and Magnolia.

The jail, which was built 65 years ago, had offered little to impede the men's bid for escape. The outer wall, made of brick, had been attacked beneath one barred window, and as the cement was old and the bricks crumbling, one strong push would have opened a hole large enough for a man to crawl through and slide to the ground. As an actual matter of fact, daylight was actually showing through a slit at the top of the hole.

The bars in the other window, instead of being casehardened steel, were apparently only of iron, for, although almost an inch through, one had been sawed completely in two at the bottom, while another was almost half-cut at the time the escape attempt was discovered.

An odd thing about the whole matter was that, when the wall was so easily attacked, the men still had worked on the bars in the other window. Had they been content to wait a little while, they could have removed the bricks with little trouble and in silence. It was the noise they made sawing that gave them away.

Prisoners making the attempt were Jintsey T. Hinton, arrested in New Orleans and returned here the week of March 19; Jimmie Lee Hinton and Henry Cambran, arrested in Galveston and returned to Aransas County on March 22, all of which were wanted for forgery of checks on Dietrich Brothers Seafoods; and Billie Joe Poole, Sidney Pruitt, and Jimmie Smith, all jailed on March 21 in connection with thefts of shrimp from a boat in the harbor at Aransas Pass.

I would like for each of you to write me outlining what phase of work that you would like for me to cover with you. If you would like, we can visit different ranches over the county and assist the ranchers with their various problems as you see fit. If you have any reseeded, brush control and other range improvement demonstrations in your county, I would like very much to visit those for my benefit. If you would like a county-wide meeting, I will have slides, projector and screen for conducting such a meeting. Please let me know specifically what work you plan for us to do so that I can make some preparation before leaving college.

I will be in a position to discuss and go over the Ranch Development Handbook with you. This handbook is to take the place of the Farm, Home Development Handbook for the various ranching areas of Texas. 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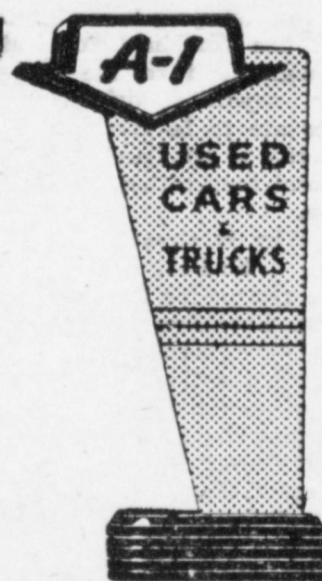
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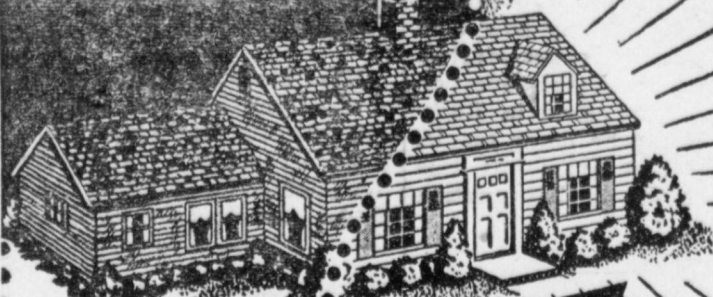

Aransas County High Track Summary

The Aransas County Pirate track team this season competed in five track meets so far. The 440 yard relay and mile relay each placed third.

The 440 relay team consisting of Washington, Close, Slider, and Weber placed second.

This year's track team consisted of eight freshmen, nine sophomores, six juniors, and three seniors. The three seniors J. D. Spencer, Pete Haynes, and Ray Longino, were elected tri-captains of the team.

Nine boys are going to Kingsville on April 23 to run in the regional meet.

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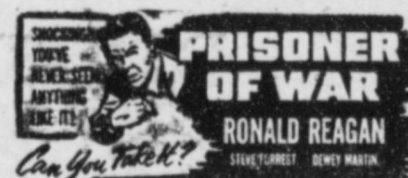
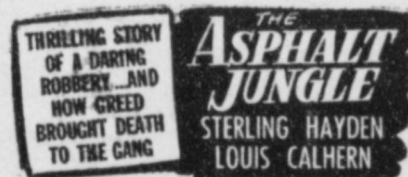

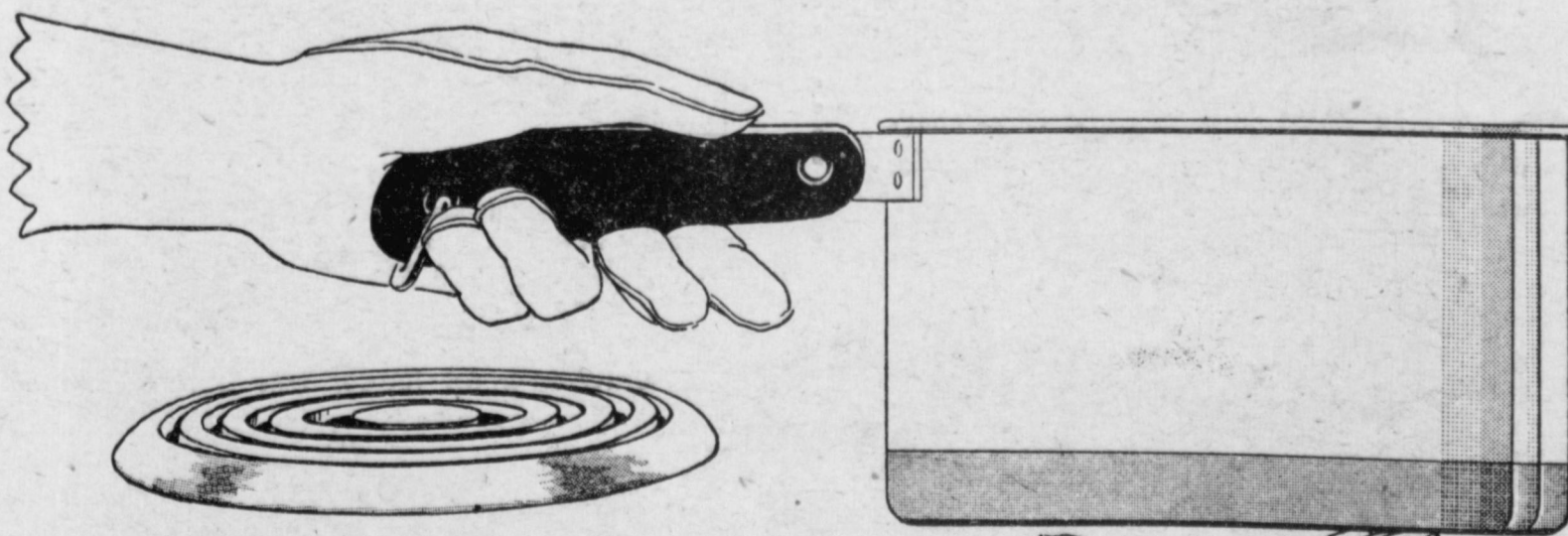

Texas Slated for Three Federal Fishery Offices

Texas is slated for three new Federal fishery statistical offices in the near future, according to a recent release by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, to be located at Galveston, Aransas Pass, and Brownsville.

Under the terms of the Saltonstall-Kennedy Act (Public Law 466, 83rd Congress), which is designed to give special aid to the American commercial fishing industry, funds have been allocated to expedite the Service's work of collecting and issuing statistics on the catch of fish and shellfish, the value of the catch, and the employment of men, fishing craft and gear in the fisheries.

Such information is the acknowledged basis of most fishery research, and must be available before practical management plans can be attempted. Increased funds will make possible much more of this type of work.

During hearings held prior to passage of the bill, expert witnesses from the fishing industry from all parts of the country were in full accord that the Service should do this.

Such statistics are invaluable to State and Federal agencies seeking to conserve the fisheries. C. H. Lyles, who has had wide
