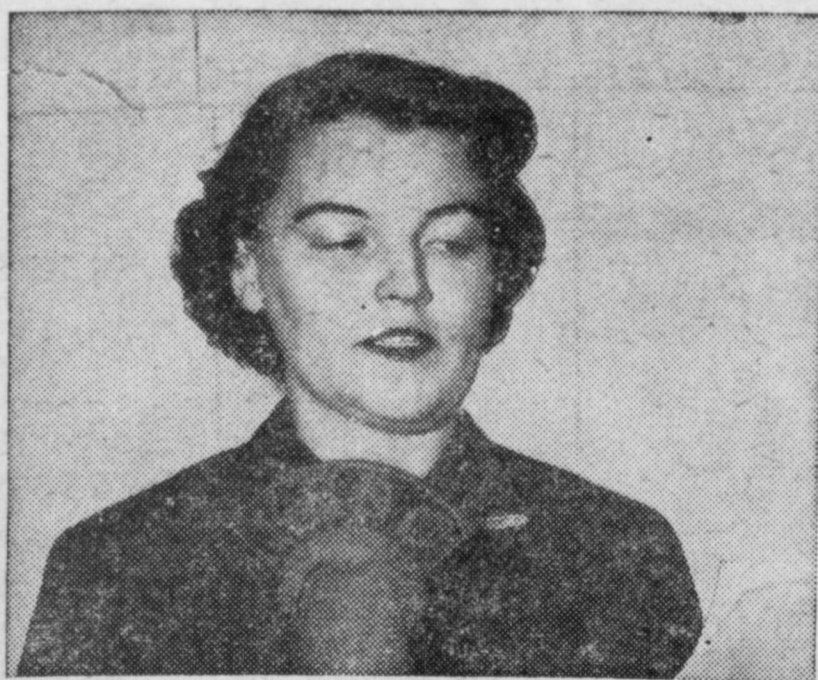

Clean-up Week Benefits Children

Children can derive important benefits from a successful community clean-up campaign. Fire Marshall Carl Osborn emphasized today as he announced the beginning of Clean-up Week here.

Pointing out that fire is one of the top three causes of child accident deaths and the No. 1 cause of home accident deaths in most age groups, Osborn urges parents to devote this week to getting rid of the combustible rubbish that adds fire danger to their homes, and to teaching their children basic rules of fire safety.

Clean-up activities should be extended, he added, to yards and nearby vacant lots, where children often play. These should be cleared of all tall grass and rubbish, both of which are fire hazards. Rubbish, of course, can further endanger the youngsters by breeding disease germs.

The fire marshal cited some additional safety precautions, recommended by the National Board of Fire Underwriters to protect children:

1. Keep matches and cigarette lighters where children cannot get at them.
2. Don't allow young children near a bonfire or campfire unless supervised by an adult.
3. When cooking, always turn pot handles so they do not extend beyond the edge of the stove where young hands can reach them.
4. Never leave children alone at home, especially where kerosene stoves or portable heaters may be in operation.

Whooping Cranes Sighted In N. Dakota

Whooping cranes having been sighted enroute through North Dakota at such widely separated points as Park River, Belfield, Kenmare and Arena, according to an announcement by Bernie Fashingbauer, waterfowl biologist for the North Dakota Game and Fish Department.

There were only 21 of these large beautiful birds in the entire world when they began their northward journey this spring. When they went south last fall, it was the first time since records have been kept of these birds that they returned to their habitual winter home in Texas that they had no young birds with them.

Seven separate authentic observations of these birds were made in the Minot-Kenmare area. These sightings may have been all of the same group of birds, however, since they were fairly close together and there were three or four birds in each group. Two reports of a group of six cranes were made in the Arena-Harvey vicinity and a group of three was observed near Park River. Two of these birds were also seen in a field in the southwestern part of the state, just north of Belfield, Fashingbauer reported. He also stated that the majority of these observations were believed to be accurate.

2,626 Texans Enter Armed Forces in April While 4,904 Discharged

Austin, Tex. — While 2,626 Texans were entering the armed forces in April, 4,904 were separated, it was shown Tuesday on an official report sent to Washington by the office of the state director of Selective Service.

Lt. Col. Morris S. Schwartz, deputy state Selective Service director, said that, of the 2,626 Texans who entered the armed forces in April, 2,225 went in by enlistment, the remaining 401 going in through the draft boards.

While these men were beginning and ending military service, a total of 5,998 young men, mostly 18-year-olds, registered with the state's 137 draft boards. Practically all of the total registration involved males reaching their 18th birthdays.

The federal draft law requires that all males in the United States register with a draft board on their 18th birthday, or within five days thereafter.

State Selective Service boards forwarded only 67 men during April for physical-mental examinations for military service. Thirty-five of this number were accepted by the army, the remaining 32 being rejected.

The vermiculite mineral used in the mix makes it up to four times more fire resistant than ordinary plaster. According to the Zonolite Company, Chicago miner and processor of the "miracle mineral," one inch of vermiculite plaster keeps fire from spreading by blocking passage of sustained heats as high as 2,000 degrees for as long as four hours.

ANGLERS DROWN AT RECORD RATE

Austin, Tex. — Texas fishermen and boaters are drowning at a record rate so far this year, according to Game and Fish Commission records.

The Commission's executive secretary said game wardens blame mainly carelessness and inexperience in operating new and strange watercraft equipment.

Eighteen fishing and boating fatalities already have been reported this year. The total as compiled by the State Board of Health for the entire year of 1954 were only 44 victims involving small boats.

The executive secretary said most of the fatalities in this year's unprecedented toll are from boats overturning principally from power causes or from rough water.

The 44 small boat victims in 1954 were in addition to the 397 persons who drowned from all other causes in Texas. This was an increase of 42 over the 1953 casualty figure.

The 1955 death rate has become so alarming that some remedial steps have been advocated. The Fort Worth United States Engineers office announced that small craft warning stations have been installed at Garza-Little Elm Reservoir. Red triangular pennants will be flown when winds higher than 25 miles per hour are forecast.

The city of Austin has tentatively approved a \$2.50 tax per boat for Lake Austin. The revenue would finance increased patrol protection. Houston city authorities have become officially concerned over the dangers in Lake Houston as reflected by fatalities. And the Corpus Christi Caller-Times newspaper editorially advocated definite safety measures after the second drowning this year in Lake Corpus Christi. Fifty persons have drowned in this lake

in the last 25 years, the newspaper reported.

The executive secretary said night accidents were taking a heavy toll of fishermen this year. Ten anglers already have drowned while fishing at night, with most of these fatalities involving motor boats.

The State Department of Public Safety also has noted the unusual number of water tragedies in observing the number of calls for its diving equipment from many parts of the state.

The executive secretary said many of the tragedies could have been averted by greater use of life preservers. He said none of the victims reported to date wore a life preserver.

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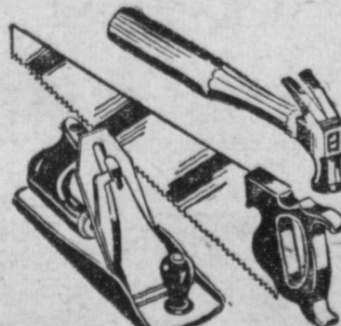
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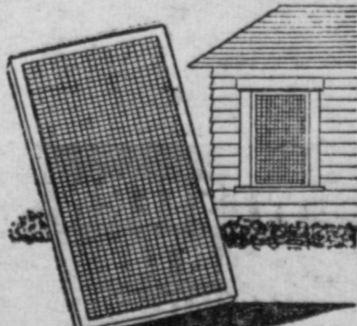

Johnny Coffee and party of Houston tried to fish with him Wednesday, and they went out, catching six trout almost as soon as they lit, but squalls and wind caught them and they had to come in. The bay was rough as a boot.

C. L. Thomas had Mr. White and a party of two from San Antonio, Sunday, and they brought in 51 trout that C. L. called average.

Mills Wharf reported that Red Lewis, Houston, caught 51 trout Wednesday.

At Palm Village, Mr. Michaels reported a number of catches besides that made by the Roy James party. F. G. Tarkington, Cuero postmaster, caught 15 trout that would run heavy; H. G. Templeton, wade fishing in Copano, brought in six trout weighing from 2 to 3 pounds. H. M. Hopkins, of Houston, fishing with Hugh Morrison on the Rambler, caught 31 trout.

Shorty Townsend fished Mr. and Mrs. Williams, Fort Worth, Saturday, and they caught seven trout and seven gafftops; Sunday his party consisted of Mrs. R. M. Laughlin and Ralph Norsworthy. They strung 15 trout.

Father O'Doherty, the genial pastor of Sacred Heart Catholic Church, went fishing with one of his parishioners this week, and ran into a situation that he wasn't quite sure he could handle.

According to Willie Close, who took Father O'Doherty and Hu Johnson with him Tuesday, they were all wade fishing in the upper end of the bay, when a trio of porpoises appeared close to where the Father was stationed. As a matter of fact, they passed so close to him that Willie says he could have

touched them with his rod if he hadn't been just a little nervous. Despite the porpoises, the party brought in 18 or 20 trout and small reds.

Willie had Mr. Maddox of Dallas, fishing last Thursday, on the Missie III, and brought in 47 trout; Friday, he took William Herbsleb, Sr., and Mrs. Herbsleb, from San Antonio, out, and caught 44 more.

However, Close said, the finest bunch of fish he has ever seen were caught by their two boys, Bill and Eddie, and their party, who fished with him Saturday and Sunday. Saturday the gang caught 157; Sunday they tallied an even 200.

Out of the bunch there were half a dozen or more that were weighed in at 4 1/2 pounds, any number that would run between 2 and 3 pounds, and a lot of smaller ones, as well as seven reds that weighed between 2 and 3 pounds apiece.

Most bait dealers do fly the white flag when they have live bait on hand. Many of the regular fishermen on this coast have learned the meaning of the white flag, and when starting out in search of bait, will look for the white flag before stopping at a bait stand.

Oliver says it is not known just who started the practice of using a white flag as the symbol of live bait. However, about 20 years ago, there was a fellow—known to every one as "Charlie"—who owned a bait barge down in Laguna Madre, and it is entirely possible that he became the originator of the live bait flag. "Charlie" had his barge anchored about a mile off-shore—near "Pete Island." When he had live bait for sale, he would hoist a large white flag that could easily

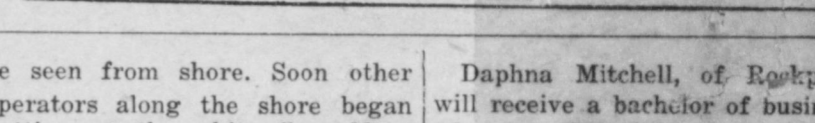

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be seen from shore. Soon other operators along the shore began putting up the white flag. Now, when fishermen see a bait stand flying the white flag, it is a safe bet the place has live shrimp for sale.
