## Two Men and Boy Drown In Copano Bay Saturday

Two men, George Dixon and Ira Ray Rucker, both of Corpus Christi, and Rucker's seven-year-old son, Dickie Ray, were drowned Saturday afternoon in Copano Bay.

Dixon accompanied Rucker and his son on a fishing trip and when their light boat was reported overdue, late Saturday afternoon, the Highway Patrol and sheriff's departments from Aransas and Refugio Counties started a search, halted at 11:15 p. m. on account of darkness.

The search was reorganized Sunday morning, with Coast Guard and Civil Air Patrol planes aiding members of the sheriff's departments, highway patrolmen, and members of the Aransas County Emergency Corps. The bodies of all three were sighted about 3:30 p. m. Sunday, and shore rescue parties were dispatched.

Rucker's body, and that of his son were picked up in the bay near the Aransas-Refugio county lines, but Dixon's was not recovered.

Their boat was first sighted Sunday afternoon, about 200 yards offshore, between Rattlesnake Point and Bayside. It was overturned but anchored. CAP planes flew over the spot three times before sighting the partly submerged craft. It was the last mission for CAP pilots, as they had just been ordered down due to high winds.

CAP pilots from the Refugio and Corpus Christi squadrons took part in the search. Refugio patrolmen Bill Bridges and R. B. Dees were the ones who sighted the boat.

One plane, a tri-nosed Piper, was nearly demolished as the result of high winds at Rockport, as it came in after all planes had been ordered down. Major Weldon Turner, of Corpus Christi, operations officer, said the pilot landed safely, but turned his tail into the wind while taxiing to the hangar, and the wind flipped it over, badly damaging the wings and tail. The pilot, E. P. Fancher, was bruised about the head, but otherwise unharmed.

Rucker and his son were taken to Cagle-Marshall funeral home at Aransas Pass.

## Aransas Butane Truck Wrecked, Burns, Driver Joe Mills Doing Nicely

An Aransas Butane Company truck overturned and burned last Friday morning near Three Rivers. The driver, Joe Mills, suffered minor burns and contusions, but is recovering nicely.

Noah Taylor said that about 4:00 a. m. a right front tire blew out and the truck capsized and caught fire, burning until it was a total loss, while \$3,500 damage was done to the trailer.

Mills was burned about the face and hands, and suffered from various scratches and bruises. He was treated at the Three Rivers hospital, returning to Rockport the same day.

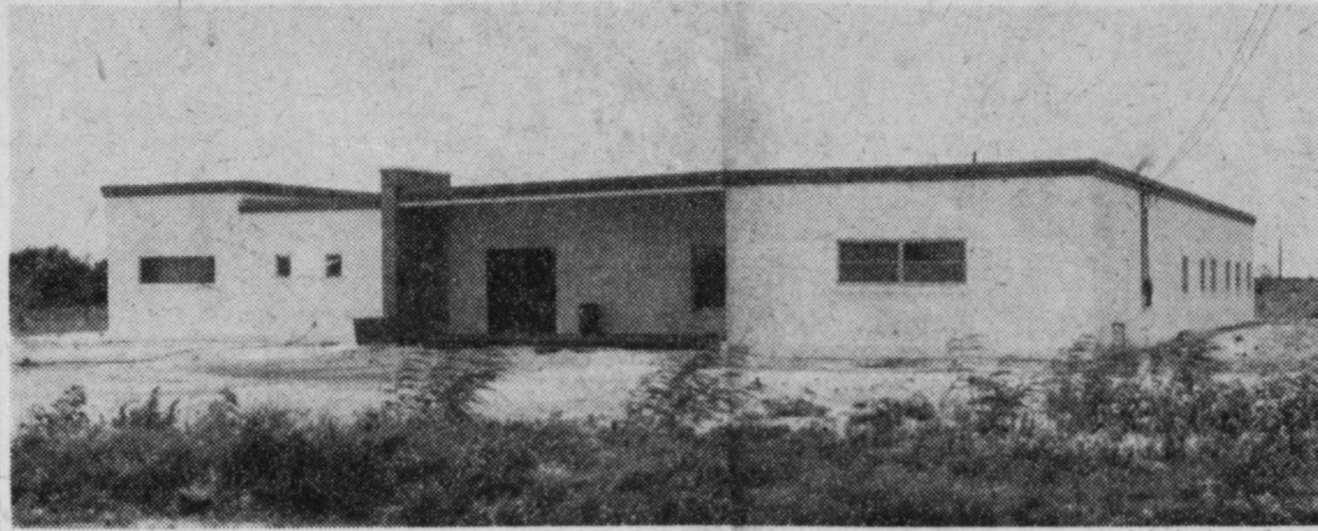
## SAN ANTONIO WOMAN CATCHES BIG SHARK

On June 19, Dr. Robert Sigler, of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Corpus Christi, will officiate, at 9 a. m.

On June 26, at 9 a. m., Confirmation and Holy Communion will be conducted by the Right Rev. Everett H. Jones, Bishop of the Diocese. Candidates will be presented by James Sorenson, jr.

The July 3 service will be held at 9:00 a. m. by Bryan Scott, lay reader from the Church of the Good Shepherd, Corpus Christi.

Mr. Carter will be back for services on the July 10.

## Aransas County Bond Sales Up

Aransas County sales of U. S. Savings Bonds are keeping pace with the hot pace they set last year, when this was one of the outstanding counties in the State, far exceeding its quota.

Fred Bracht, local chairman, said that over \$45,000 worth had been sold in the first three months of 1955, making 57.24% of the county quota. Only two other counties in the state have exceeded this, Hays and Kenedy.

## Red Snapper Fishing Produces Food and Fun

Red snappers are by far the most important and best known of the family, although, until about ninety years ago, they were only caught in the Gulf in limited quantities, being brought to market in live-well schooners.

They are generally found only in certain areas along the coast, usually gullies in coral or rock bottom. Here their food is supposed to be more abundant, so that the snappers gather in schools to feed.

As a matter of fact, so close do they stick to these favored feeding spots that it is not uncommon for a man fishing on one end of a boat to be catching red snapper, while a fisherman at the other end will hardly get a bite, until the vessel is moved further over the grounds!

However, there is some evidence to show that they scatter more widely at night.

They also gather about lumps of rock or coral. Such lumps are found on both sides of the Gulf, the most famous in U. S. waters being those south and east of Gal-

The Apache Drilling Company Inc., has scheduled three 7,500-foot Aransas County Field tests in the Lamar Townsite at the Nos. 1-102, 1-99 and 1-171 Helen Johnson and others.

No. 1-99 in the Fulton Beach Field is 50 feet from the north line and 85 feet from the west line of a 0.916-acre lease in Block 99, lots 1, 2, 3 and 4.

No. 1-102 in the Fulton Beach Field is 50 feet from the north line and 127 1/2 feet from the west line of a 2.782-acre lease in Block 102, lots 1 through 13.

No. 1-171 in the Lamar Field is 80 feet from the south line and 42.5 feet from the east line of a 0.528-acre lease in Block 171, lots 15 and 16.

In the Rockport West Field 3 1/2 miles northwest of Rockport, Renwar Oil Corp. No. A-3 Travis Bailey was making hole below 6,900 feet on a 10,600-foot permit.

Fred W. Shield No. 1 W. H. Womack, test in the East Aransas Pass Field five miles north of Aransas Pass, has been plugged and abandoned at 8,905 feet. It is on a 5-acre lease in the Burton and Danforth Subdivision Block "B."

Kirkwood & Company No. 1 State Tract 148, Aransas County wildcat 1/2 mile northeast of Rockport, was preparing to log Wednesday at 7,899 feet. It is permitted to 8,700 feet.

The sixteen-bed institution is a non-profit, charitable hospital, held in trust for the region by a non-salaried board of trustees which includes Emory M. Spencer and Dr. H. F. Elliot, of Rockport; Thomas M. Vlasek and Dr. J. M. Auten, Ingleside; Ernest W. Falgout, Palmer Coward, William Sheppard, Dr. W. S. Hughes, and Dr. W. N. Tinnerman, of Aransas Pass.

It is chartered as an open staff institution, which means that any physician licensed by the Texas Board of Medical Examiners can practice in the institution.

The building is located between 7th and 8th Streets, on Yoakum St., 1 block south of Highway 35, in Aransas Pass. The site was acquired and the building completed at a total cost of \$63,000, which extremely low figure is accounted for by the fact that contractors and sub-contractors on the hospital did the work and obtained the materials for the building at cost.

There is nearly six thousand square feet of floor space in the building. Surgery and work rooms are adequate for a fifty-bed hospital, and the patients' wing has been designed to allow additions as needed.

Dr. Gladys Auten, Ingleside, will be hospital administrator. The first patients will be admitted June 6.

Though only seconds remained before the bell would be sounded, releasing hundreds of homeward bound children, she reported the dog to her principal in time to prevent the dismissal of classes until police had been summoned to remove the sick animal.

Shirley and all members of her patrol have been presented with badges and certificates of membership in the national association of School Safety Patrols by an officer of the State Department of Public Safety, for their work in safeguarding fellow students at street crossings.

In commending the work of the Bowie school patrol Principal La-sater said, "Due to the vigilance and prompt action on the part of a member of this patrol not one pupil was endangered by the dog. In fact, none of the other pupils knew that a dog—apparently rabid, had been killed on the school grounds, just before they were dismissed."

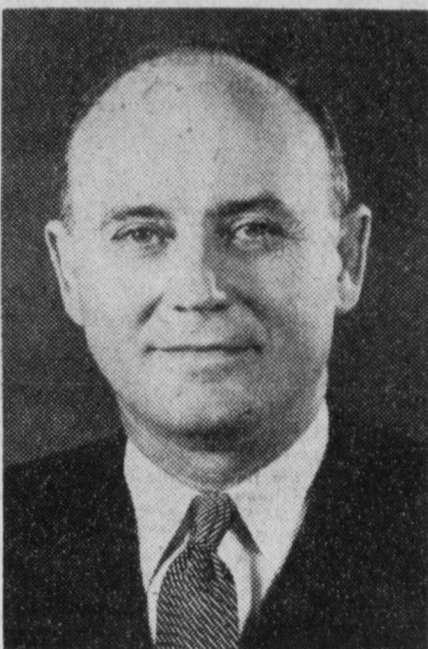

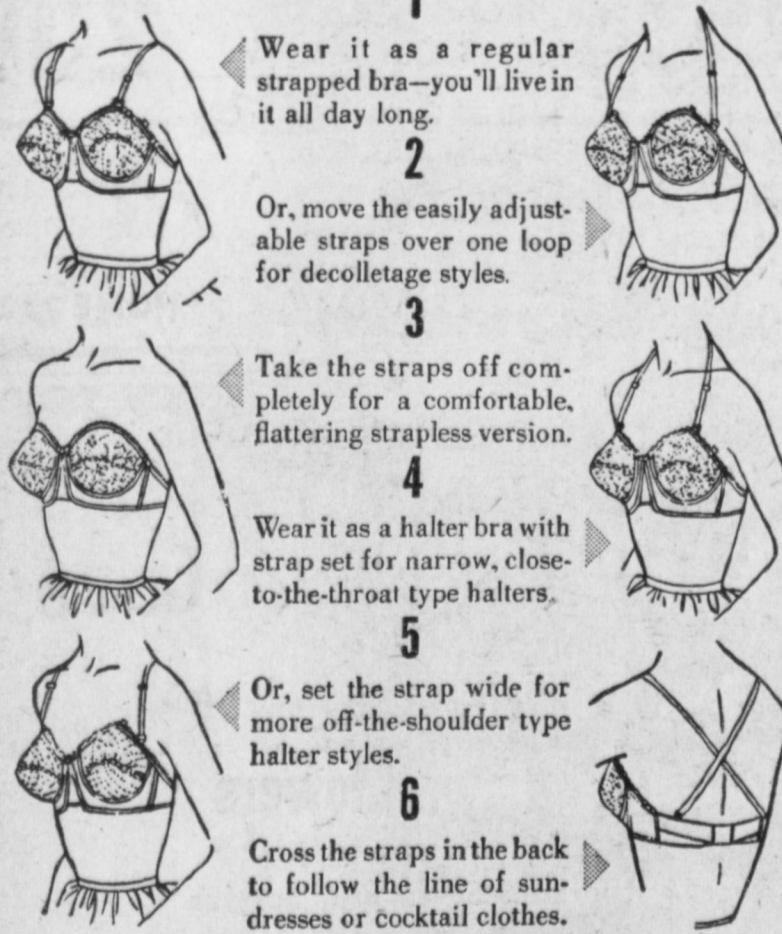

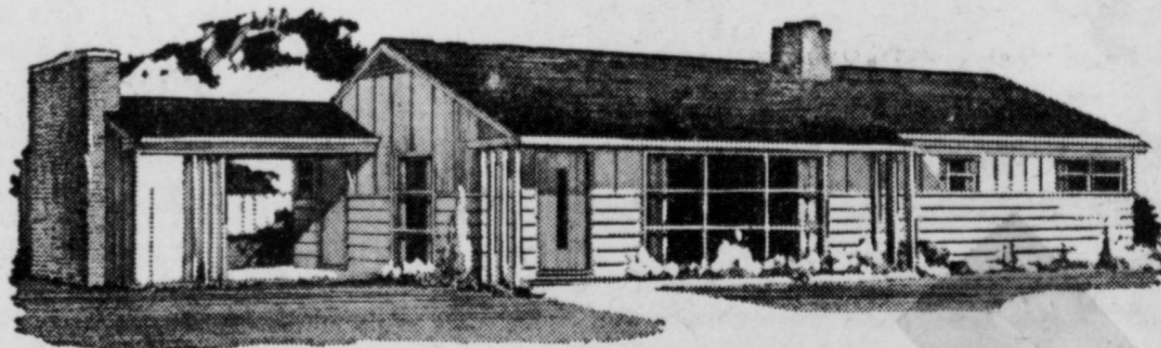
