**Harry Carter Says There Is No True Belgian Language**

Once more we have a letter from Harry Carter, globe trotting lay minister of St. Peter's Episcopal Church, in which he reports on Belgium. But let the letter speak for itself:

I was once asked "Can you speak Belgian?" and had to reply "There is no Belgian language!"

Flemish is the tongue of over fifty per cent of the citizens of this populous little country.

French is spoken by the remainder. The well educated speak both languages. Official notices in both offices and elsewhere are seen in both tongues. One finds that French is just gaining ground in the Flemish provinces.

We are in Bruges, fascinating city of spires, medieval Flemish architecture, canals and bridges, somewhat reminiscent of Venice.

I am staying at the palatial home of hospitable Dr. Hubert Peeters with whom I spent a delightful day in Mexico last Fall.

It is good to see again the world famous Belfry and listen to its wonderful carillon composed of forty-seven tuneful bells.

Will you join us in a trip to Brussels in the genial Doctor's Chevrolet. You will notice the low-lying countryside is as deeply green as that of England and as level as the cotton fields of South Texas.

These highway traffic signs are novel, pictorial and practically wordless. Mainly they are black silhouettes on a light background, successive boards we pass depict respectively two children, a railroad engine, an exclamation mark!

The first two are self explanatory, the third one means "Look out, danger ahead!" Now this white triangle tells to stop. Next we come to a sign reading 60 Km (kilometers). Farther along the highway we see a similar one but with this difference, there is a line drawn through the 60. This says to us "End of speed limit." Here is a silhouette of a man on a bicycle. It refers to a pathway reserved exclusively for cyclists.

We are entering the city of Ghent. That imposing, massive fortress is the Castle of the Counts. The Cour St. Georges, oldest hotel in Europe, is just around the corner. We make for the Church of St. Nicholas wherein lies buried one Oliver Minjou, whose sole claim to a resting place in this famous church is the fact that he and his wife had thirty-one children.

On our way again we pass fields

of ripening grain, red brick, red tiled houses, mixed cattle, Brahmins!

Bicycle races are now all the rage in this country. Everyone in the little town we are now in seems to be on the sidewalks. The reason becomes immediately apparent, for here comes the winner and the runner up of a local bike race, followed shortly by a closely packed flock of losers.

We overtake a green and white mobile chapel, the occupants collecting funds for East European relief. On the left is a Sherman tank and then an old German concentration camp with towers and wire fence. Grim reminders!

This white tiled, amber lighted tunnel takes us under the river Scheldt and we find ourselves in Antwerp. That skyscraper over there is said to be the only one in Belgium. It houses a Credit Bank.

Someone has remarked of Antwerp "It breathes an atmosphere of art." This might also be said of Bruges with its notable paintings by Hans Mebling, Van Eyck and other masters.

Now, however, we feel impelled to park near the Cathedral, the largest and most beautiful Gothic church in the low countries. It's classic spire is most satisfying to the eye. Once inside the building we hake straight for Peter Paul Ruben's two greatest paintings "The Elevation of the Cross" and "The Descent from the Cross." Now let's take a look at this masterpiece of Leonardo da Vinci "The Head of Christ" painted on white marble.

Next stop Brussels! Hullo! Another novel traffic sign — a red and a black car side by side. This one means "No passing!"

Have you noticed, Roy, the numerous avenues of trees through which we have been driving? They are so typical of highway features in Belgium, France and Holland. Here, not far from the King's Palace at Laeken, is an attractive avenue of tall chestnut trees. Now we are in the capital city, where, on the eve of the Battle of Waterloo "There was a sound of revelry by night." That historic ball was held in the Town Hall of Brussels. This immense building practically fills one side of the Grand Place, its graceful spire is 370 feet high. The architecture of every building that faces on the Grand Place is Flemish and, as a delightful climax to our sightseeing journey, we find the whole place floodlit.

So, after gazing awhile in admiration, we secure a table at one of the many sidewalk cafes, order a "cafe filtre," relax and watch street traffic and the crowds pass by.

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**Draft Call for August Is 550 Men**

A Texas draft induction call for 550 men for August was announced June 21 by Lt. Col. Morris S. Schwartz, deputy director of state Selective Service.

The call is identical with the quota for July. Quotas have maintained an almost constant level for several months.

Local board quotas for August induction into the Army will be mailed about July 5 or 6.

There will be no physical-mental examinations of men for military service through the draft boards in August, except in isolated cases, Colonel Schwartz said.

With the exception of volunteers, the August induction call will be filled only with men who on August 1 are at least 21 years of age, said the deputy state Selective Service director.

**Japanese Try Fish Shelters to Improve Sea Fishing**

"Fish apartment houses" is the term used to describe the hollow concrete blocks which the Hyogo Prefectural Government is lowering to the bottom of Japan's Inland Sea in a move to increase the fish population and thus help commercial fishing. The Inland Sea fishing grounds are an important source of food for southern Japan, but have never fully recovered from the serious depletion caused by the intensive wartime fishing, state a May 12 U. S. Consular dispatch from Kobe.

The concrete forms are being sunk in selected spots in and near the channel between Awaji Island and the mainland and will serve to obstruct the hinder the currents along the bottom and thus afford shelter for bottom fish and a breeding ground for plankton and other marine life on which fish feed. The blocks, 4x4x5 1/2 feet, have windlike openings on all sides and top and are being sunk in 16 groups of 80 units each, making a total of 1,280 blocks. Total cost is estimated at approximately 9 million yen (US \$27,000).

Prefectural officials, basing their expectations on experiments conducted in Osaka last year, estimate that the catch of bottom fish off Awaji (bream, perch, bass, sand eel, and octopus) will show a 20-30 percent increase in two years because of the blocks.

**Wilson Has Test in Aransas Field**

Sam E. Wilson, Jr., No. 4 Ocker Brothers, slated 9,000-foot Aransas County Sam Wilson Field test 8 1/4 miles southwest of Austwell, is 660 feet from the east line of Lot 17, Block 3, C. B. Lucas Subdivision, and 400 feet south of the No. 1 gasser. It is on a 376.96-acre lease.

No. 1 was completed as a small gas-distillate well from perforations at 7,442-48 feet. Operator plans to complete the No. 4 as an oiler in a different zone.

Glover Johns fee is on the north and the Aransas Wildlife Refuge is on the east and south.

Atlantic Refining Company No. 1 Barber Oil Unit (tentative), Aransas County produced in the Aransas Pass, East (B-7 sand) Field five miles northeast of Aransas Pass, has been completed on the tubing for 116.62 barrels of 38.4 gravity pipeline oil daily.

Gas-oil ratio was 4,710-1. Production was from perforations at 7,339-43 feet in 7-inch casing set at 9,284 feet, with total depth at 10,000 feet and plugged back to 7,255 feet. On a P-35 choke tubing pressure was 1,800 pounds and casing pressure 2,225 pounds. Location is on a 57.31-acre lease in the John Phillips Survey, A-175.

Heep Oil Corp. has spotted location for a slated 9,000 foot Aransas County test in the West Rockport Field, 2 1/2 miles west of Rockport.

The firm's No. 6 Zeph Rouquette and others is 1,005 feet from the most northerly southwest line of the 300-acre lease in C. B. Lucas Subdivision of Puerto Bay Lands It is 150 feet east of the No. 1 Rouquette and others, an oiler in the G-1 sand. It is 933 feet south of the No. 2 oiler.

Sam E. Wilson, Jr. No. 4 Ocker Brothers, scheduled 9,000 foot test in Sam Wilson Field 8 1/4 miles southwest of Austwell in C. B. Lucas Subdivision, was drilling below 2,444 feet. It has 10-inch casing at 724 feet.



### Fowler Home One of Rockport's Landmarks

The Fowler home is a long-time landmark in Rockport. This fine old house was built soon after 1868 by John M. Mathis. After Mrs. Mathis died, the Thomas H. Mathis family moved there in 1878. The date on the deed of transfer is 1880.

These Mathis brothers owned large ranches in Aransas and San Patricio counties. Mr. and Mrs. Thomas H. Mathis were leaders in church, musical, social and charitable activities. They raised eight children here.

The house was bought in 1948 by C. C. Fowler of this city, and he renovated the structure. However, it stands much as it did when it was built, as it was not necessary to replace any timbers. Some changes were made in the ell at the rear to meet modern ways of living.

This outstanding house, which is patterned after those in early Mississippi, is built on a six-foot foundation of red brick, with archways between piers, and white pickets in the archways. The original hand-turned cypress pickets still stand in the fence around the yard.

The hip roof was originally of slate. The two large chimneys in the very high part of the roof indicate the very useful double fireplaces in the inside walls. The molded cornice at the eaves, and the window headers are very attractive and well-proportioned.

In front a wide set of steps leads up to a four columned porch on the center front.

The large double doors with sidelight doors on each side, and transom lights above, give an air of spacious welcome.

The large reception hall opens into double parlors on each side, and a large dining room at the rear.

The walls are fourteen feet high with heavy beaded baseboards about 12 inches high, and the facings on the windows are wide. The twelve-paned windows are four by ten feet, with panels below. The tall four-panel doors have arched upper panels; and there is transom space above the doorways.

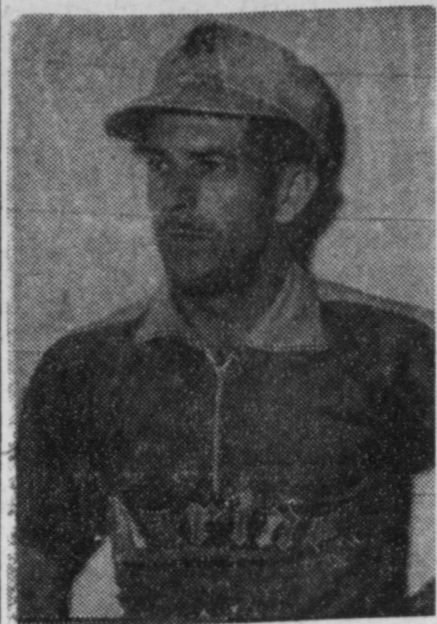
The double parlors have coal grate fireplaces, one with a granite front, the other of cast iron, in identical patterns.

The bedrooms have wood fireplaces, with cypress mantels four inches thick.

house is built of cypress. The ten by ten sills are scarfed, and wooden pegs are used in the foundation. Carpenters say that the structure was pinned together like a ship.

Two large rooms in the rear are made of shell concrete with solid foundations. This has long been considered one of Rockport's most noted old homes, and architects and builders that have seen it have always commented upon the quality of materials and workmanship used throughout.

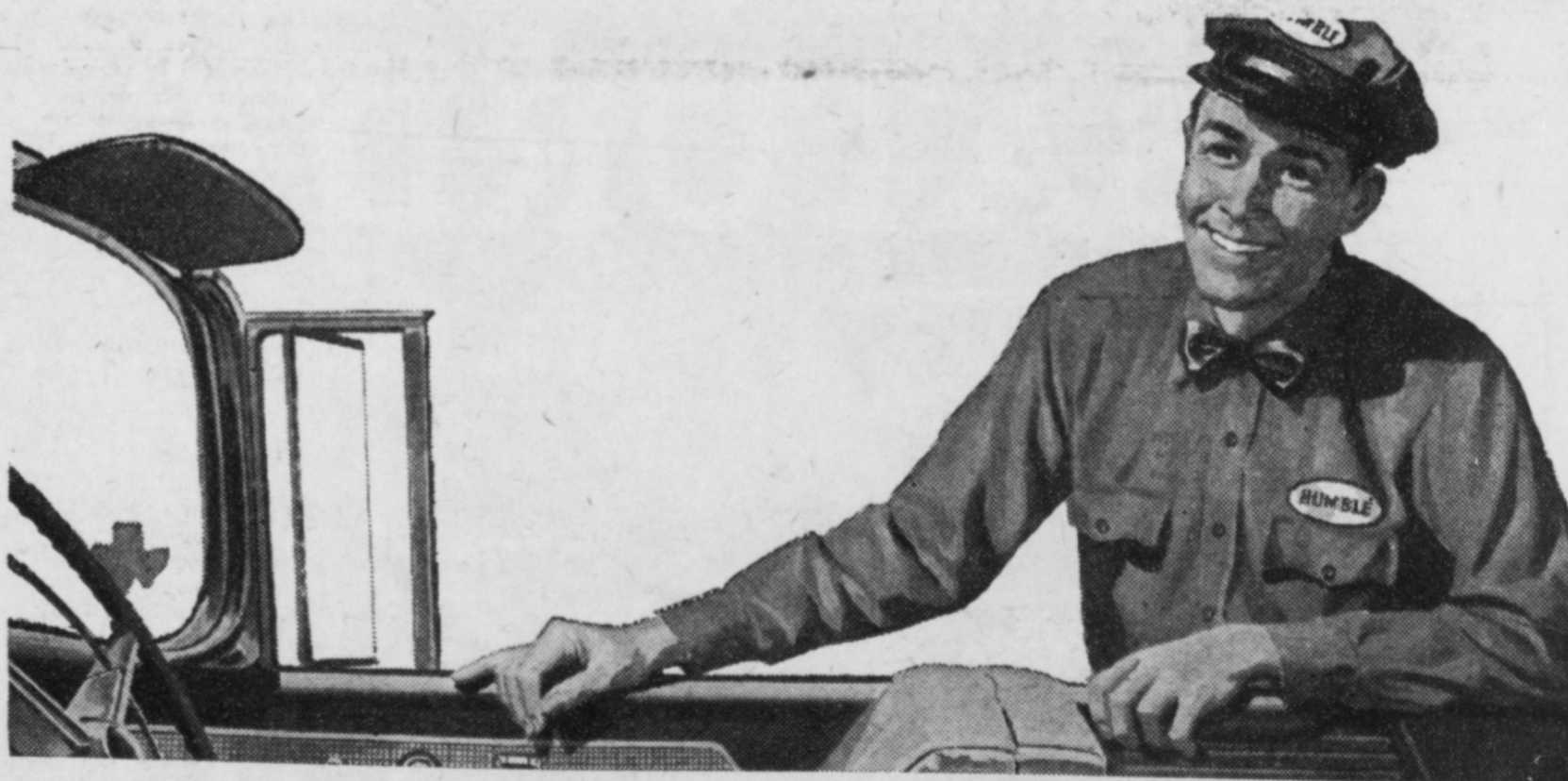

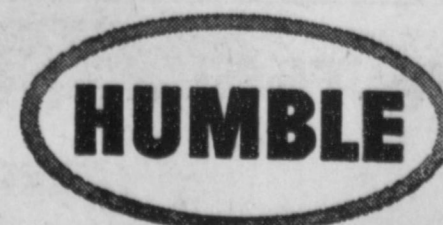

the town, making the area known throughout the nation.

Development Would Be Drawing Card

One of them pointed out that the development itself would be a drawing card for people who had no intention of staying on the island and who would patronize courts already here because of their lower rates.

The few owners who objected wanted the Navigation Board to reject the present offer because it was against their interest.

Other owners felt that this was an extremely short-sighted view, that would do the Rockport-Fulton area much harm. It would, they said, cut off a high type of development that would bring in a

great deal of revenue, not only to the development, but to the towns themselves.

They stated that they did not feel such a set-up would compete with theirs, and believed that they would benefit from it, directly and indirectly.

Modern Developments Attract Business

During the course of the meeting, it was pointed out that while competition in the court business was extremely keen, the areas that were constantly building and improving were the ones that attracted the greatest amount of business.

Miami Beach was cited as an example of this. Here, where there are over 225 great hotels, with more building, there is a tremendous overflow of people to the surrounding facilities. These people either cannot or do not want

to pay rates charged at the larger hostels, but are still attracted to the area by the glamor of these de luxe establishments.

Ask For Parks

The minority group asked the Navigation District to establish extensive free parks, at the expense of county taxpayers, by establishment of a County Park Board to be financed by a bond issue.

Other parks of this type in the area have not done too well.

The Padre Beach Park, at the north end of the island, has been an almost bottomless pit into which Nueces County tax funds have been poured without any commensurate return.

Cameron County commissioners are also unhappy over the costs attendant upon their park at the south end of Padre, which has been absorbing money almost as fast as it could be raised.

Suggestions Contrary to Federal Anti-trust Laws

One suggestion offered by the minority group doing the objection was in conflict with Federal anti-trust laws. This group wanted the Navigation District to write a clause into any lease that might be made, dictating the rentals which developers should charge for their facilities.

Lease Price Criticized

Strong objections were voiced by the same people to the lease price, and they stated that any potential developers should be charged at least \$100 per front foot for the island.

Navigation commissioners pointed out that the lease price asked would return the cost of the island to the Navigation District at once, and that the yearly rentals would add to this.

Rentals Would Furnish Funds For More Improvements

In addition, they said, rentals for the island, which would be part

of the lease price, would make it possible to finance other improvements in the long range program, without further taxes, and would hasten development of the Cove area.

The commissioners pointed out that, with an assured income of this sort, it would be possible to issue revenue (not tax) bonds, and to use this money for new construction and maintenance of the harbors of the county, without any further call on the taxpayers.

They further stated that the initial lease price, plus the enormous early expense in getting a project of this type underway, would raise the cost to almost that, anyway, over a period of time.

The commissioners also brought to the attention of the group that, if the district had not purchased the island, the whole thing would have been thrown open for public purchase in November, and that the development that might have resulted from this could well have been much more competition to tourist courts now here than this hotel-type that is projected.

As it is, the District holds title to the island, and can control the development. In the other case, anyone with the money to buy the island could have thrown it open to any type of development they wished, without being accountable to anybody.

Believe Development Is Sound

Charges that the development was unsound financially, and that it would not pay, were held to be without foundation.

Even in these days \$5,000,000, he amount that it will probably take to finish development of the island, ain't hay, and most of the operators as well as the Commissioners were of the opinion that people who can command this sort of financing were not such poor business men that they would go in to the proposition without knowing how to make it pay off.

In the final analysis, commissioners believe that it is a sound project, of benefit to the community. However, at the request of some of those present at the meeting, they agreed to ask potential developers for further clarification of their program.

regatta, or, behind fast outboards do a little water skiing.

Playground for Little Fellows

For the little fellows, there is a play area, complete with all the necessary equipment, and with trained personnel in attendance.

And, because this is a vacation, no one has to do any cooking if they don't want to, for there will be a big dining room in the hotel, or, around the cabanas, meals will be served on specially designed rolling equipment, that will deliver the food, piping hot to the side of your chair.

Aimed at the Cadillac Trade It is a luxury type development,

definitely pointed at the Cadillac trade, and to bring this in, an annual advertising budget, 50 times as large as Rockport has ever spent in a year, has been set aside to give the resort national coverage.

The main building, as the plan now is, will be a five-story hotel, complete with all Miami Beach trimmings. As adjuncts to this, ten two story buildings, fifty by five hundred feet will help make up the total of 550 units at which the developers are aiming.

The main building will be built on the bay side of the island, the other ten will flank it, five on each side, between it and the mainland. Palms and other greenery will help give the whole set-up that tropical look, so popular among Florida tourists.

Would Not Cost Aransas County a Cent

It won't cost Aransas County a cent, but, in the long run, will help to pour dollars into the pockets of local residents, as well as those of the developers.

In the first place, if the deal goes through, there will be \$60,000 returned to the Navigation District, which represents the cost of the land, plus legal fees and survey costs expended nearly two years ago to clear up the rights of the Navigation District to bay bottom granted it by the State, but claimed by Dabney E. Petty as part of the island.

Will Enable Cove to Be Completed

Next, there will be an annual rental, the exact amount of which is yet to be negotiated, that will assure the District of sufficient money to expand its facilities in the other harbors, and to press work at the Cove to completion much sooner than would have otherwise been possible. Here again, the District will save money, for revenue bonds (not tax bonds) can be issued against the rental income to pay for the dredging and other work on the harbor.

Other Benefits

There are other benefits attendants upon the plan, which are not at once apparent. For instance, the hotel plans to book fishing parties for the local charter boats, and to furnish them a fancy harbor, somewhat like Pier 5 at Miami, where they can tie up when not fishing. In this same harbor, there will be room for boats belonging to guests of the hotel, if they have them.

The very services the hotel will offer will give employment to many Aransas County citizens, if they can meet the requirements.

There will be gardeners, clerks, bookkeepers, baby sitters, stenographers, playground attendants, cooks, lifeguards and dock attendants, to number only a few

all of which have to come from somewhere, and, in addition, a good deal of extra money will hit the pockets of local filling station men, charter boat men, fishing tackle stores, bait purveyors, and what have you.

Similar Developments Raise Standards

Similar developments elsewhere have raised standards, and brought new business to the area in which they are located. On Miami Beach, where over 200 luxury hotels stand side by side along Collins Avenue, and more are still building, people come to look at the glamorous life they have read about, and through the streets in crowds. Not all of them live in the deluxe places; many are satisfied with more modest accommodations, where prices are lower, but they would never have come at all had it not been for the glittering establishments which are show windows for the city.

Will Take a Lot of Money

To do all this will take a lot of money. Remember, however, that this money will not come from the pockets of Aransas County citizens if the development receives the green light, and goes into construction. Every cent will come from people elsewhere—people in Dallas, New York, Los Angeles, and Sauk Center Junction—for the whole thing will be financed by bankers or other big lending agencies, just as the Shamrock was financed. This is reassuring from another angle, for men like these do not lend money to anyone who does not have a sterling reputation for producing, and, moreover, because these lending agencies have to account for every nickel, they will not make the money available unless they are sure that the project is a good investment.

Navigation District Lease Will Protect County

Commissioners for the District have outlined a policy under which they will lease the island for recreational development to serve

the tourist trade and people of this area. This includes free public use of, and access to the beaches along the island; retention by the District of a portion of the western shore of the island, along Little Bay, for eventual construction of a storm harbor; work on the project to begin within one year after the lease is signed, and to be completed within three, with a minimum expenditure of \$3,000,000 to develop a high type resort.

The 20th annual Texas Deep-Sea Roundup is scheduled for July 19, 20, 21 in Port Aransas with more boats available for deep-sea fishing than ever before and greater emphasis placed on Bay-Surf Division.

During Deep-Sea Roundup the Offshore Division include Sailfish, Dolphin, Ling, Tarpon, King, Mackerel, Jackfish and Shark over 6 ft., while the Bay Surf Division includes Tarpon, Trout, Gafftop, and Redfish. The entry fee for Offshore is \$10.00, for Bay-Surf, \$2.50. The Bay-Surf Division is designed for anglers who fish from the piers, jetties, wade or from skiffs or outboards.

Among the plans for entertainment are a sand crab race, a crab and shrimp boil, square dance, and dance.

believe we should lease the island to the group now negotiating with the Navigation District for the development of the project described to us.

A luxury motel of this type will open the door to many new opportunities and if it isn't built here, it is only a matter of time until some such project is completed in the Port Aransas-Padre Island area. When this is done, it will attract much traffic in that direction.

I don't believe that a development of this type will hurt motel owners here any considerable amount; on the other hand, I do think that it will benefit the entire community in many ways, and make possible an earlier development of the Cove without additional taxation.

If the Cove is completed in the very near future, it will attract many types of businesses and add to the employment and income of Aransas County, thus benefiting everyone.

**Judge John Wendell** — No comment.

**Charles Roe, Sr., Piggly Wiggly** — I think it would be a wonderful thing for all of Aransas County if they can develop it as outlined at the present time. I don't know of anything they could put out there that would be much better.

**Leonard LeBlanc, Rockport Lumber Company** — From what I know of the proposed project, if it goes through, it will be a fine thing for the community.

The recreational facilities the syndicate will provide will be available only to those who can afford to pay for them and are incidental to their main purpose of securing a location unequalled anywhere along the Texas coast and which became that only when the water rights became available with the Island. The money offered \$60,000.00 plus 2 per cent of some imaginary gross would not even start to pay for the costs of developing the Cove the immediate need of which is very doubtful in many persons minds. Frandolig Island with the water rights is worth many, many times what is offered.

There is no instance that I know of where recreational facilities for the public as a whole is not provided by tax money and few if any are as fortunate as we in that 93% of our total taxes comes from sources other than residents of the area.

famous Marshall Ney, one of Napoleon's generals.

At fourteen the son of these pioneer Americans was sent to Phillips Academy, at Andover, Mass., a famous school for boys which had already been in existence for over 100 years.

He there received sound training for the studies which he was to pursue later, graduating from the academy in 1887.

He went on to Yale University, where he received his first degree in 1891. He continued at Yale in the Law School, and was graduated in 1893. He then practiced law, living at Salem with his parents until he went to Cleveland, Ohio, as attorney for the Land Title Abstract Company.

While in Cleveland he was baptized and confirmed in the Episcopal Church. He was made a lay reader at Trinity Cathedral there, and in 1911, he decided to go into the ministry. On his Bishop's recommendation he went to Bexley Hall Theological Seminary at Kenyon College, Gambier, Ohio, graduating in 1913.

His work took him to Worcester, Ohio, and thence to Michigan. He lived in Muskegon and was missionary priest for the church there, as well as in Manistique and Menominee, traveling from place to place, ministering to the parish folks in the scattered little towns of that cold country.

In time, Reverend Walton passed his retirement age, but worked on. He was called to Marquette, Mich., to serve as Dean of the Cathedral there, and remained for two years. At the end of this time, he was ready to retire.

The Dean started from Marquette to tour the United States in a trailer. After covering a good part of the country, he reached Texas, on the way to Galveston. In Corsicana he met an old friend, the Rev. H. A. Ellis. Mr. Ellis knew Mr. and Mrs. Jack Hagar of Rockport, and he convinced the Dean that he should visit this part of the Texas coast.

Two days before Thanksgiving, 1937, Dean Walton parked his trailer in the spot it stood for so many years, and attended church in St. Peter's-by-the-Sea.

To fill the place of the regular clergyman, who was ill, Dean Walton conducted his first service in St. Peter's at midnight Christmas Eve, 1937.

He resumed his travels soon after this, and went to California for a year. He then returned to Rockport for a time, before going north again, and then he came back once more, by way of Florida.

World War II (and gas rationing) found him in Rockport again, in 1942, and he has lived in this area since that time until his death.

He was a simple man, and he lived simply. For years his constant companion was a brown mongrel dog, called Pancho. His physical vigor was that of a man much younger than he was.

The Quaker influence of his boyhood contributed simplicity, honesty, and sure direction in his approach to life. The classical education he received as a boy and young man brought discipline and richness to the workings of his mind. His practice of law gave him a background of experience such as few clergymen can claim. His years of service in the rigorous climate of upper Michigan
